Election Brings Questions

By the end of election night, Tuesday, Nov. 2, the winners of the race for Golden Valley School Board seemed pretty clear: Kathleen Crumpton - 1,825 votes; Mona Diaz - 1,690 votes; Brian Freeman - 1,203 votes; John Grauer - 1,196 votes; Write In (Steven Lewis) - 1,102 votes; and Edward Moseley - 832 votes. But as of today (Nov. 18) there are still 560 mail-in votes and 100 provisional votes for the School District race that haven't been counted and the County has until Nov. 28 to count them.

With a total of 660 votes still out there Crumpton and Diaz are safe but Freeman is only ahead of Grauer by seven votes. That many votes could make Steven Lewis the number three candidate and do the same thing for Edward Moseley.

Obviously all those votes will not go to one candidate, but Grauer and Lewis are both within striking distance and Freeman potentially has the most to lose. Keep watching!

Family Tragedy Finds Comfort in Ranchos Community

Newest Ranchos Family Endures Horriffic Accident on Same Day Escrow Closes on Ranchos Home

On Sept. 28 during an evening commute in Fresno, California Highway Patrol Sergeant and new Ranchos resident Lincoln McKenna was off duty and riding his Kawasaki KLR 650 dualsport motorcycle east on Herndon Avenue near Palm Avenue. McKenna had done this drive before, but something was different this night. At around 5:15 p.m., McKenna was being tailgated by a silver, fourdoor, Toyota Tundra pickup whose driver appeared to be unhappy moments the dissatisfac-

tion morphed into a type of road rage that left McKenna forced off the road, crashed into a light post with his right leg severed below the knee.

The driver of the Toyota Tundra sped off and has not been found.

Life Changing



In Memoriam

Wayne Trittler

April 4, 1955 - October 26, 2010

Liberty High School suffered a great loss the week of Oct. 24 when their head custodian, Wayne Trittler, perished Tuesday morning, Oct. 26 at 6 a.m. due to complications after a stroke the week before.

Wayne Trittler was a man who gave more of himself to others than any of us will ever know. Those who attend Liberty will probably not take a second glance at the ground they walk on, but Wayne valued the students and faculty so much that he would come to the school at four in the morning to pressure-wash the concrete so it would be presentable.

When asked what memory from LHS would last forever, Wayne replied with a smile, "The kids – they're a great bunch of kids." Some students had the privilege of knowing Wayne as more than just "the custodian."

Jordan Grossardt recalled a memory from last year. He tells of how it had just rained and there were puddles on the campus. "Wayne drove through a big puddle in an attempt to splash me, but got himself wet instead. 'Why'd you get me wet for?' Wayne asked, jokingly. He then made it his mission to get me wet by driving through more puddles, only to continue drenching himself. As a last resort, he drove through the sprinklers until both of us were soaked."

Jokes like this were common with Wayne. Tyler Abell, another student at Liberty, is a neighbor of Wayne and reflects on a fond memory of him. Tyler's father would shoot the squirrels that would run atop the fence. Knowing this,

Adult Fiction: The Christmas Secret by Donna VanLiere.



Another election has come and gone and with it great changes.

But not in California.



Where'd We Put that Scarlet Letter?



On the contrary, it would appear that being a lady is seen as old-fashioned, and to be seen as oldfashioned is far more humiliating then belching up your lunch in the middle of a restaurant.

Sadly, this goes far beyond a simple act of shame for bad manners. Part of the deterrent for bad behavior has always been the negative stigma attached to it. Men wanted to be seen as strong providers

for their family so they worked two jobs if necessary to ensure there was food on the table and a roof over their family's head. Young women didn't want to be seen as harlots, so they took care not to

have four children, out of wedlock, by four different men. Now, with the stigma a thing of the past, judging women who can't seem to figure out where babies come from makes me the bad guy. Case in point, MTV airs a show dedicated to teenage mothers, idolizing them and raising them to the level of celebrity. Shouldn't we be telling these young girls, "Look, you made an irresponsible deci-

Well, that is just a terrific idea – let's show teenage motherhood in a flattering light so all the young, impressionable, child-bearing-aged twits that believe it is glamorous to get pregnant at 16 might run out and follow suit. After all, they are going to need a new crop for next season, right?

I personally believe that a lesson learned from a mistake made is a positive step in life's journey. However, mistakes made over and over again without an adjustment in behavior is irresponsibility, and unchecked irresponsibility is clearly how we have ended up in this mess. Now, thanks to the disappearance of the social consequence, girls are less ashamed of promiscuous behavior, clearly exhibited with multiple offspring via multiple sires. Guys feel no humiliation for fathering multiple children and not providing for them. Instead of accepting the absentee deadbeat father as a staple of society, shouldn't we avoid them? Shouldn't we make it a point to alienate them from so-

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The Stress-Free (well ... almost) Holiday Plan

This year I'll be unhurried, And enjoy the holidays; With shopping done and gifts all wrapped I'll proceed to the parties and plays.

My cards are all signed and packages sent,

The tree is lit up with a glow; The cookies are baked; it's time to enjoy,

A moment under the mistletoe!

Is your dream of unhurried holidays about as likely as a Ranchos White Christmas? They do happen, but it's not likely. If you want to sleep in heavenly peace this holiday season read on

In his book, Getting Things Done, David Allen talks about the stress of open loops. "Open loops," he says, "can include everything from really big to-do items like 'End World Hunger' to the more modest 'Hire new assistant' to the tiniest task such as 'Replace electric pencil sharpener."

Put into holiday terms, your open loops might be anything from "Ensure everyone's happiness at Christmas" to "make cupcakes for the class party."

A Trusted System

Allen's solution to open loops is getting things off your mind and captured in a trusted system. Your trusted stress-reducing system starts with creating a Holiday Binder. Equip it with pocket dividers and label the sections — Holiday Planning, Cards/Gifts, Food/Décor/Parties, and Highlights/Review.

Holiday Planning – In this first section list your "No-Matter-Whats." These are the traditions, activities, foods, etc. that are most important to

you and your family. Have a family meeting between now and Thanksgiving and record everyone's holiday favorites. They might include a trip to the tree farm, attending a Christmas Eve Service, or simply watching a favorite Christmas movie together. The items that qualify for No-Matter-What status must be scheduled on the family calendar. As other opportunities arise throughout the holidays make sure they don't bump what you've already prioritized as a family.

Schedule all the tasks associated with holiday planning such as decorating, shopping, baking, etc. on your calendar as appointments.

Create a Holiday Budget sheet (go to www.practicalspreadsheets.com for free downloadable forms) where you project the amount you will spend on gifts, entertaining, travel, decorations, etc. and the actual amounts spent. Keep a "Receipts" envelope in the divider pocket to store gift and other holiday receipts.

Cards/Gifts – Input your Christmas card names and addresses into a label program or Excel, so you can easily update it annually. Excel documents can be imported into Microsoft Word to create labels (see again www.practicalspreadsheets.com).

Schedule your photo session (if doing photo cards) and give yourself a deadline of December 1 to have your cards signed, stamped and ready to send. As you receive change of address info for people on your card list, slip it into the divider pocket for updating later. If preparing Christmas cards is particularly stressful for you, consider sending a New Year's greeting in January and eliminate it from your pre-holiday to-dos.

Your Gift List should include the names of each of the people you're giving to and columns for Gift Ideas, Gifts Purchased, Budget Amount, Amount Spent, Wrapped and Shipped/Stored. Keep your Holiday Binder handy throughout the year so that if you think of a gift idea, or purchase something prior to the holidays, you can record it. Schedule on your calendar two shopping trips and wrapping sessions during November.

Food/Décor/Parties - Create a page for each meal or party you're hosting and list supplies and tasks associated with those events. Be sure to check stock of what you have before

Can You Hear Us NOW?

American voters spoke loud and clear this election. Sen. Mitch McConnell (R-KY) so aptly stated, "We're determined to stop the agenda Americans have rejected and to turn the ship around." Republicans now hold the majority in the House of Representatives. Relieving Nancy Pelosi as Speaker of the House, future Speaker John Boehner said, "We'll work with the administration when they agree with the people and confront them when they don't." This alone was a huge victory for

the American people who voiced concern via Tea Parties across the nation. Make no mistake that the Tea Parties will stay engaged in the process.

Through this historic election, American voters are not asking so much

as demanding a much smaller, more accountable government — one that will put a stop to bailouts and runaway spending that has accumulated exorbitant debt over the last two years. Voters want lower taxes, including the extension of the Bush tax cuts as well as banning earmarks and special interest group spending that has been "tucked away" into appropriation bills. A Profound Effect

The Tea Parties had a profound effect in capturing the passionate mood of most

of the country and bringing about victory for many conservative candidates. "Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world," said Margaret Mead, an American cultural anthropologist. "Indeed, it is the only thing that ever has." The Tea Party started out as small groups throughout the nation, but necessity fueled their growth. And we are not about to quit.

So what about California? A tidal wave swept the country, then abruptly crashed before reaching the Golden State. What possessed the majority of Californians to again elect Jerry Brown and Barbara Boxer, who continues to rule us instead of represent us? Some voters are

too young to have any memory of Brown's "Moonbeam" nickname. Chicago columnist Mike Royko said in 1976 that Brown attracted "the moonbeam vote," meaning the young, idealistic and nontraditional voters.

Royko embellished his fictitious idea by calling California "the world's largest outdoor mental asylum" also noting in 1979 that, "If it babbles and its eyeballs are glazed, it probably comes from California." Royko later retracted the comment, but the nickname stuck. The fact remains that California (and by re-electing Harry Reid, Nevada too) is in free fall. The high state business tax that continues to drive businesses out, staggering unemployment, the high number of welfare recipients, gerrymandered districts and unions are the main contributors.

For the majority of the country, though, Americans have no tolerance for an out-of-touch, out-of-control, fiscally irresponsible government. And although we still have a war to win in 2012, we must take a moment to celebrate our victory. The aftermath of the 2010 midterm elections has put the American citizens back in the driver's seat. American voters spoke, but

(John 7:19 NIV) (Jesus asked them) Why are you trying to kill me?

In the Gospel of Jesus Christ according to John, before the end of the 12th chapter there are no less than eight references of death threats or plots against Jesus. Often times the threats and plans to kill him came from the religious and community leaders of His time. The people trying to kill Jesus were often times described as having self righteousness personalities filled with criticism and hypocrisy. These folks who were driving these violent plans against Jesus seemed to thrive on power-driven arguments and inflammatory claims and dismissive speech.

For example, in John 8:13: "(They challenged Jesus), 'Here you are, appearing as your own witness; your testimony is not people, places and things we don't valid." In John like, or disagree with, or feel alien-8:48: "The (religious rulers) answered (Jesus), 'Aren't we right in saying that you are a Samaritan demon-possessed?" In John

8:52: "At this the (religious rulers) exclaimed, 'Now we know that you are demon-possessed!" They just didn't want to hurt Jesus and let him move on. They wanted to kill him! All the time, hiding behind the outward appearance of virtue and morality. They were voices of hostile intentions and toxic personality. They rejected true Christian fellowship. These folks trying to kill Christ seemed to live for each other and for those on whom their favor rested. In the end they brought out the worst in everybody around them and they crucified Jesus.

Turning Everything Upside Down

When Jesus broke into their world He seemed to turn everything upside down. Those that thought they were on the inside of God's will found themselves on the outside and those who were judged to be outsiders of God's will found themselves inside of the love of God in Jesus Christ. The parable of the sinful and unclean and detested tax collector who stood far off at a distance and cried out, "God have mercy upon me a sinner," revealed that even the sinful could be redeemed while the "right-

eous" found themselves on the outside (Luke 18:11ff). In Jesus, the wretched poor folks found themselves blessed and on the inside and the rich folks who loved their wealth more than God or their fellow human beings found themselves cursed and on the outside of the Kingdom of God (Luke 6:20).

So when you understand what they did to Jesus; when you understand the personality of hostility in the world of Jesus; vou can understand what Jesus meant when he said, "The man who loves his life will lose it, while the man who hates his life in this world will keep it for eternal life (John 12:25)." It is not that we should hate what God has created in us, but rather we should hate the life that we have created that is opposed to the love of God in

> Jesus Christ. I hate what they did to (John 19:18ff), I hate how those who were outcasts were treated (John 8:1ff). I hate how darkness multiples darkness today. I hate how hostility attracts even greater hostility, still today.

On the other hand, I love how there is a Kingdom coming where there

will be no more sorrow and no more mourning and no more tears (Revelation 21:1ff). I love that God loves us so much that he gave us Jesus to give us an alternative to those who are messengers of hostility and violence and death. It is just that those days that so many of us are looking forward to with love and the coming of our Savior have not yet fully been realized yet. An unkind word today and a hostile and unthinking and uncaring attitude today multiplied by a million or a billion can turn into a horrifying violence of sickening proportions.

We are at our greatest potential to sin when we are dealing with people, places and things we don't like, or disagree with, or feel alienated from, because now is the time when we can lose the evidence of our citizenship in the Kingdom of God. Rudeness, hostility, destructive criticism, judgmentalism, dominating attitudes, lack of mercy, lack of compassion, lack of service and lack of sacrifice are all signs of the citizenship of the world that is not the Kingdom of God.

Swords to Plowshares - the Honor our Vietnam Veterans Deserve

Swords to Plowshares of San Francisco is the only veterans' service in the United States that provides a full continuum to low-income and homeless veterans. The organization does not discriminate based on length of service, branch of service or military discharge status. Swords to Plowshares is a community based organization founded in 1974 by six veterans whose guiding principle was that veterans must never again be treated as second-class citizens – such as they were after the Vietnam War – and that war in general causes wounds that last beyond the battle field.

1974 - 1984: The Decade of Neglect of the Vietnam Veterans

The public did not want to be reminded of the "dirty little Vietnam War" and could not separate their negative feelings about the war from the soldiers. Vietnam veterans were not only rejected by the public but also by groups like the VFW, American Legion and the VA. In 1974 *Swords* developed tailored services

for discharged upgrades, working with incarcerated veterans and provided training and educational assistance. In 1979, Swords won one of the first Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) cases on behalf of veterans. This was a time when policy affecting veterans was controlled by the agency which blatantly neglected the Vietnam Veterans. In 1980 community based organizations serving veterans began to rise up all over the country and PSTD was recognized. In 1983 the Vietnam Wall was build in Washington D.C., giving overdue recognition to the Vietnam Veterans. "Agent Orange," a chemical herbicide and defoliant which was used during the war, was being investigated because of negative side effects that were surfacing in our Vietnam Veterans. In 1984 the lawsuit was finally settled in favor of our veterans.

In 1985, around the 10 year anniversary of the Vietnam War, the American public began discussing the Vietnam War and made a concerted effort to understand the struggles Vietnam Veterans faced during combat and coming home. At this 10 year anniversary, "Welcome home Parades" began springing up to

honor the Vietnam Veterans. In 1986, Sword established its Health and Social Services and, thanks to public funding in 1988, Swords began its first housing program for homeless veterans. In 1990 advocates founded the National Coalition for Homeless Veterans. This led to a broad understanding of the growing population of homeless veterans and prompted the Veterans Administration to act on this sad situation of the men and women who fought for and died for us.



A Trip Abroad

In the last Ranchos Independent I was getting ready to leave for a 14-day trip to Europe with a group of seniors. It was an interesting historical trip. When I go to this part of the world it always makes me realize just how young a country the U.S.A. is. I love Roman history and the Roman ruins. I will try to give you a taste of what I saw on my trip.

We started our trip in Paris, France

where the Roman Emperor Julius Caesar built a fortress on the Ile de la Cite in Paris in 53 BC. Paris has a long and bloody history and yet it has some of the best known sights of interest in the world. The Notre-Dame Cathedral was started in 1163 and took 170 years to complete. The Louvre is one of the world's greatest museums with the Tuileries Gardens close by which are used by the locals as well as tourists. The Champs-Elyees is a famous boulevard of light with Napoleon's Arc de Triumph built in 1836. Napoleon never got to march under it because he was defeated but also because he died in 1821 before it was finished. The Eiffel Tower was erected for the 1889 World Exhibition in Paris. The Sorbonne is a worldfamous college and was founded in Paris in 1253. The Moulin Rouge is a large 500+ seat playhouse that has been

having live shows since 1889. The Can Can dance was invented at the Moulin Rouge. Las Vegas, Nev. has built an imitation of this famous Paris playhouse. Artists from all over the world have been coming to Paris for hundreds of years to

practice their art because freedom of expression was allowed in Paris. Paris is a very large city with beautiful old buildings.

We took a bullet train from Paris to Mertz, France and then a bus to the Avalon riverboat on the Moselle River which was our hotel for the next 10 days. The boat moves up the river at night and stops at small medieval towns in the morning. Trier, Germany was our first stop. In 16 BC the Romans founded this city by a ford across the Moselle River. By 306 to 324 AD Trier was a favorite residence of the Roman Emperor Constantine the Great. In 311 AD the Romans passed the Edicts of Tolerance which guaranteed the Christians' religious freedom. The mother of Emperor Constantine went to Jerusalem and brought back the Holy Robe, which is called the Robe of Christ, to Trier. People have been making pilgrimages to the Holy Robe in the ancient Trier

bird, but it sure beats defrosting it in the refrigerator - the same size turkey would take three or four days. This is done on Wednesday, but while that is going on you can do other preparations. Make your pies, make the fruit salad or whatever else can be made ahead of time. When the turkey is defrosted, I put it in the roasting pan and put it on the bottom shelf of the refrigerator awaiting Thursday morning. With the perfection of the turkeys over the last 50 years you don't have to get up at 5 o'clock in the morning it get it in the oven. We would figure about 22 minutes per pound of stuffed turkey, taking about 71/2 to 8 hours. It only takes 4 to 5 hours to cook a stuffed 18 to 20 pound bird today as opposed to all morning 50 years ago.

the same way mama did 50 years ago, except I don't toast the bread. I cheat and buy three boxes of Mrs. Cubbison's - two boxes of bread and one of the cornbread. Add the sautéed vegetables, salt, pepper and even though the bread is somewhat seasoned, I usually add some more sage. Then start mixing in chicken broth and water until it tastes just right. I don't use the giblets but sometimes I do cook the neck and take off the meat and add to the stuffing. Take the bird out of the refrigerator, rinse it out and pat dry, cover inside and out with butter (or margarine), salt inside and out and you're ready to stuff. A lot of people don't stuff the bird

but we think the stuffing is better that is cooked in the bird than in a baking pan. But, whatever you or your family prefers.

I hate the smell of a turkey cooking for the first hour or so. I don't know what it is, but it just smells yucky to me. But after it gets cooking, the smell changes, and I love it. It smells like "home."

Some people call it stuffing and some dressing but do you know the difference? I read somewhere that if you put the mixture in the bird it is called stuffing and if you cook it in a pan it is called dressing. As far as I'm concerned, whatever it is called I love it.

A Special Casserole

As for the dinner, we serve about the same thing everyone else does and the same thing mama served: Turkey and As for the stuffing, I do it stuffing, green beans, mashed potatoes and gravy, sweet potatoes, fruit salad, cranberry jelly and rolls. However, we have added one thing: Zucchini Casserole. As I've told you in a previous article, my mom loved to get recipes wherever she went. This one she got from a cousin from Tennessee. Mama passed away in October 1988 and when we were cleaning out her deep freeze we found one she had made so we cooked it for Thanksgiving that year. My sister Maxine has taken over the duty of bringing one (sometimes she brings two so that there can be some taken home) to all our family dinners. In fact, everyone likes it

Zucchini Casserole

- 6 C thinly sliced zucchini
- ½ large onion chopped
- 1 C grated carrot
- 1 can cream of chicken soup
- 1 C Sour Cream
- 2 boxes Stove Top Dressing (Chicken or Turkey)
- 2 cubes of butter or margarine

Cook the zucchini and onion for about 5 minutes or until al dente, and drain as much liquid off as possible before adding the carrots, cream soup, and sour cream. Set aside.



Liberty Hawks. In the past two seasons, Coach Nolte has also led many victories and even took the team to an exciting, nailbiting Valley Championship play-off game last season.







Cathedral since 1512 and as late as 1996. The Romans were brilliant engineers, architects and military strategists but also had wonderful grape vineyards and wine cellars and crushing presses. Trier is still producing some of Germany's best Riesling white wine. In 460 AD the Vandals and Franks pushed the Romans out of Trier and were in control until 1200 AD when the Archbishop of Trier became the Elector of the Holy Roman Emperor. I was having trouble trying to figure out how the Romans got to this part of Germany when our tour guide pointed out that these ancient rivers run all the way to the Mediterranean Sea and right back to Rome, Italy. This was one of my favorite towns.

More Medieval Europe

The next medieval town that we stopped at was Bernkastel, Germany. This town is famous for the Moselle wine that it produces on very steep mountainsides. The soil here is decomposed slate. Because of the steepness of the vineyards the grapes are all picked by hand. Coming from Madera, where there are thousands of acres of grape vineyards that are machine picked, it seemed strange to me to see these very steep hills planted to grapes. Their wine is world famous and has been for hundreds of years.

The next morning we woke up in the medieval town of Cochem. Germany. This town has the Reichsburg Castle which sits on a hill. We actually got to visit this castle and the day we were there they had seven weddings. One of the castle workers said that the reason there were so many weddings was because the day was 10-10-10 and the husbands would be able to remember their anniversary. While the young folks were getting married, I was having my picture taken with a pair of medieval knights' armor with the beautiful ceilings and stained glass windows of the castle. There are many castles and palaces along the Moselle and Rhine Rivers. These were important medieval military buildings owned by rich and politically important people. The owners charged people for using the part of the river in front of their castle. Napoleon's French army destroyed many of the castles during the time he ruled this area.

Rudesheim, Germany was our first medieval village on the Rhine River. During the night our ship had moved from the Moselle River to the larger Rhine River. This is another wine grape growing area with grapevines growing on terraces up and down steep hills. Small towns are built all alone the riverside. Both the Moselle and Rhine Rivers are full of locks that are controlling the water in the rivers and also control the speed that ships travel the rivers. Two ships can go through the locks at a time. Ships are lifted up and down on the rivers 24 hours a day. We took a trip down the Rhine to see the castles setting on all the hill sides. Some have been converted into hotels.

Next was the large town of Cologne, Germany. This town was almost completely destroyed during WWII. When they started rebuilding the town they kept finding a lot of Roman artifacts. There is another medieval Cathedral here that wasn't destroyed during the war.

That night we left Germany for the Netherlands (Holland) and Belgium where there was fierce fighting against the German army by the British and American forces during WWII. It was sad to visit cemeteries and battle sights. The Netherlands has a very complex system of canals and locks to both allow water to flow to the North Sea and to keep the North Sea from flooding the low laying land since it is all under sea level. Amsterdam sits on a canal system that empties into the North Sea. It has been an important shipping port for hundreds of years. I came home with over 500 pictures. One thing about a digital camera is that you don't run out of film like the old cameras did.

I came back in time to attend the funerals of two of my friends. The first one was for Liberty High School Custodian Wayne Trittler. I was on the School Board when Wayne was hired as the head Custodian of Liberty. He took such good care of that campus. He will be missed not only by his family but also by his Liberty family: teachers, administrators and friends. Wayne's memorial service was held at the Liberty Theater on Oct. 30.

The very next Saturday, Nov. 6, I attended the memorial service of my friend Thelma Combs. Thelma lived with her daughter Linda and her sonin-law Joe Venhaus in the Ranchos. Thelma was a member of the Ranchos/Hills Seniors and the Golden Valley Baptist Church. She had been ill for some time. Her memorial service was held at the Golden Valley Baptist Church. She will be missed by many.

Rest in peace my friends.

excitedly posted a message to her Facebook page to announce the great news: "By this time tomorrow we will be residents of Madera Ranchos! And then we start the next chapter." "Just as I finished that posting the phone rang. It was a call I'll never forget," Melinda said.

Road Rage

According to Fresno Police

Spokesman Jeff Cardinale, on that illfated night Sgt. McKenna was eastbound on Herndon Avenue and was stopped at Palm Avenue with a couple of other vehicles when the tailgating Tundra appeared. Cardinale said that McKenna legally shared the lane with the other vehicles as he moved his motorcycle to the front of the intersection. As he did so, the turned green, Cardinale said that McKenna moved into the middle lane at a legal speed with the truck right next to him. Witnesses say the driver of the Toyota Tundra sped up and intentionally struck the motorcycle, causing no damage but forced McKenna and his motorcycle into the right lane. Then, according to witnesses, the Tundra driver veered into the slow lane, inten-

tionally running McKenna off the road and

into a light post before speeding away. The

crash into the light post pinched McKenna's

leg between the light post and his bike and

severed his right leg below the knee at the

scene of the accident. Amazingly, Sgt.

McKenna was able to give a full report at the

scene of the accident.

Several witnesses attempted to assist McKenna at the scene of the accident. Laurie Tucker saw the incident and immediately dialed 911. "I was really upset when I was put on hold for several minutes!" Tucker said, "Thankfully, other callers had already gotten through." A doctor appeared on the scene as well as a sergeant from the Women's Correctional Facility. The doctor rendered medical assistance at the scene of the accident and he also called Melinda and told her the bitter truth that Lincoln had lost part of his leg. The doctor told her he didn't know any more medically about McKenna's condition, but he assured Melinda that help was on the way. McKenna was transported initially to Community Regional Medical Center where he was met by Melinda and several of their CHP Family members. He was air lifted to a hospital in San Francisco at 6:30 p.m. where doctors unsuccessfully attempted to save his right leg. The next day Melinda once again posted a message to Facebook: "Well now, God has a new plan for my next chapter. We are going to have a talk."

Word of Lincoln's accident spread very quickly. Family and friends from all over the country came in to help along with their CHP family and their North Park Church family. Some new Ranchos neighbors stopped by with gift baskets or food and let the family know they were praying for Lincoln and for

their family. Complete strangers who had heard about the accident either on the news or on Facebook all wanted to know how they could help. Prayer groups were organized, gift cards were donated and a fund was setup to help the family with expenses. Melinda posted to Facebook: "We are so touched by all the support from everyone including perfect strangers. God is at work and doing great

things. I hope you are all blessed, for you have blessed us. We are so grateful that the Lord is working all around us. Man, God is great!"

What happened next would put Extreme Home Make Over to shame.

The McKenna Project

"The McKenna Project" was born.

T-Shirts were made for everyone on the crew complete with a logo depicting Abe Lincoln inside a house, hammer in hand and complete with a stick figure family standing in the yard. Mom, Dad and four children, the only thing missing was the little baby belly on Mom's tummy. Melinda's father, Bill Walton, was designated as I Manager. One group was designated

belly on Mom's tummy. Melinda's father, Bill Walton, was designated as Project Manager. One group was designated as the moving crew while another group immediately went to work to give the new house a complete makeover. The CHP officers closed ranks, family, friends, church members and neighbors, old and new, all pitched in to help the family get moved safely into their new home and insure it was ready for Lincoln's return home. Melinda's father was working one evening when a Ranchos neighbor stopped by to see what was going on. After talking for a few minutes the new neighbor picked up a hammer and went right to work. The volun-

teers painted walls, installed new baseboards, removed popcorn ceilings, enlarged the master closet, reconfigured the bathroom and cleared weeds and debris from the property. They completed other construction projects on Melinda's "Honey Do" list. "They have done everything in our two-year plan within

three weeks," Melinda said. "We are so thankful for all [their] hard and dirty work. In six months we will make Lincoln walk the property [you] all have worked so hard on clearing."

The CHP office is like a second home to Lincoln so it only seemed fitting that his CHP family would take care of him by making sure his new home was ready for his family. They said Lincoln would be the first person to volunteer if any of them ever needed help with anything. With the new home in good shape it was soon moving day for the McKenna family in Clovis. Lincoln's co-workers also took on the responsibility of getting his family situated. There was no

shortage of helping hands. Dozens of volunteers helped the family move into their new home.

McKenna is now recuperating at the family's new home in the Madera Ranchos after spending six weeks in San Francisco hospitals. McKenna arrived home in style this week when the CHP Helicopter landed at Radio Control Park. "It feels so great to be

home with my family rather than so far away in the hospital," McKenna said. Over the past the past six weeks he has endured 11 painful surgeries and he began physical therapy so his body can adjust to its new circumstances. He's also become a Ranchos homeowner and he was able to be with Melinda at her latest doctor appointment through the magic of Skype technology to see that the new baby will be another precious daughter.

When he first came home Melinda said he was, "... pleasantly surprised that everything looked so good." She also said that he had told her he felt extremely blessed to have such won-

derful coworkers, friends and even strangers who have done so much to help him and his family.

McKenna is currently in a wheelchair experiencing moderate pain and phantom pain from his missing right leg. The doctors say the phantom pain could last for months or even years. "The swelling will have to go down before he's able to be fitted for a prosthetic leg," Melinda said. "He can't wait to go back to work. He would go now if he could."

You can't meet Melinda McKenna without admiring her deep faith in the Lord. Her ability to get through all of this and hold everything together for her family with such strength and grace is absolutely amazing. This is from Melinda's Facebook page a week after the accident: "To the man who hit my husband: You have changed my life forever. It will never be the same. I love the man I married more than I did last Tuesday. My faith in God is stronger and it grows ever day. I realized who my friends are and I meet strangers who really care. You have showed me that the grace of God is alive and living. YMcKenna's want to extend their sincerest thanks to the Ranchos community. "Everyone has been so friendly and welcoming to us even though we've just moved in. We've received gift baskets and messages from many people, most who we haven't had the opportunity to meet, but who've heard about the accident on television and have welcomed us to the community," Melinda said. She also said they've received messages from

> a number of people on Facebook. "If it wasn't for our friends, our CHP family, and the community, we wouldn't have been able to get through this alone."

Request for Prayer

As Lincoln begins his recovery, the McKenna's ask for continued prayer for their family. They also ask for the community's help in finding the driver of the silver, four-door, Toyota Tundra. Fresno Police are aggressively searching for the driver involved in the hit and run accident. "Police are checking nearby video surveillance cameras for evidence of the collision," Detective Brian

Hance said. "There is a chance the pickup's color was tan or pewter, instead of silver."

Anyone with any information about the Toyota Tundra pickup or its driver can call Crime Stoppers at (559) 498-STOP, where a cash reward is offered for information leading to an arrest or conviction.
