
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



Conrad's career "Takes Off" in a BIG Way



Conrad recently released the video to his latest song, "Romeo," which was filmed right here in the Valley. You'll quickly recognize shots of River Park, Woodward Park and Friant, along with inside shots of Rome Night Club in Fresno. Though Conrad's public relations team finds it simpler to say he's from Fresno, Conrad is very proud to let people know that he's from the Madera Ranchos. "I miss the Ranchos every day," he said. "I'm excited to say I got to shoot my music video for Romeo where I grew up. I really want to show the world the side of the Central Valley that the media never shows."

Conrad, born Jared Blair, grew up here in the Ranchos attending Webster Elementary and Liberty High School where he graduated in 2006. Two years after graduating from Liberty High School he left the Ranchos with a one-way train ticket to Los Angeles, a suitcase and \$40 in his pocket to pursue his dream of a career in music.

Conrad credits his first grade teacher at Webster Elementary School, Carol McKercher, with nourishing his interest in music saying "I had a special bond with Mrs. McKercher who happened to love music. I would stay in with her at recess and she taught me how to play the piano and to sing," he said.

Conrad now writes all his own music although he didn't start performing as a solo artist until he moved to LA. When asked about his musical influences he said, "I would literally sit in my room all day long just listening to music nonstop. I listened to a lot of pop music and the then popular boy bands. When I go into the studio we just play around and see what becomes," he said. "My music is pop with a rock edge. When I wrote the music for 'Takeoff' I wanted all of the songs to be positive. There are pure pop songs and R&B influenced songs. There is an acoustic guitar ballad called 'Safe Here Now' I wrote about my good friend and her struggle with losing her father from cancer. Romeo acquired a slight 'Maroon 5' vibe to it. I love how this song turned out." Conrad just finished a brand new single called Young Again that will be released near the end of the year. "The music is still young but more pop, rock ballad with a more grown up sound to it," he said.

Death of Lexi Delgado/March • The death of a child is never easy, and it was even more difficult when the Ranchos took 14-yearold Lexi's cancer fight under its collective wing through fundraisers and countless volunteer efforts. Just when it looked like she had turned the corner and was in remission, the cancer roared back and in no time she was gone. Heartbreaking.

2 The Flag Barn/February & June • After some incredibly harsh winter winds, the iconic "flag barn" at Avenue 12 and Highway 41 looked like it was on its last legs. After an incredible outpouring of sentiment, the owners of the property finally got the message that the barn meant something to the Ranchos. By June there were repair teams at work and a flag raising ceremony was possible July 4th.

3 What's Happening to Our Water?/August • All of a sudden, during a particularly nasty heat spell last summer, people had no water. No water to cook with or bathe with or wash clothes in -- nothing. It brought into sharp focus how precarious the Ranchos' water supply is. An antiquated system coupled with dwindling supplies brought home that sooner or later we are going to have to do something.

Water Privatization/April • Four months befor the Ranchos' water problem (see above), an outside group was meeting with Madera County Supervisors to present the prospect of privatizing Madera County's water system, including the Ranchos. At issue for the Ranchos was the fact that the County didn't own our water system (although they do service it) so how could they consider selling it? Talks slosh on ...

Trash Collection Confusion/October • This was a Public Relations debacle from the gitgo. All of a sudden the Ranchos' County-provided trash service was out and no one knew what was going on. Madera Ranchos Teen Gets Shot at Pro Baseball Experience in Australia



The opportunity of a lifetime awaits a 16-year-old Madera Ranchos baseball player who leaves for Australia for two weeks in December to play baseball against some of Australia's best players.

DeAndre Smith is a 16-year-old junior at Liberty High School and a lifetime resident of the Madera Ranchos who has been selected to play on the Goodwill Series baseball team that will be traveling to Sidney and Perth, Australia on Dec. 19 and will return to the U.S. on Jan. 3, 2013. He will be playing 12-14 games, some of which will be against professional baseball teams; some of the best baseball players that Australia has to offer.

The Goodwill Series has been around for 30 years and pits the nation's best 15-18year-old baseball players against foreign players in Australia and China. All of the coaches for the players are major league baseball pro scouts for the Chicago Cubs, Houston Astros, Washington Nationals and San Diego Padres.

DeAndre will be playing on the Washington National team, playing centerfield and pitching, and will be in good company with the Goodwill Series. In the 2010 All Star game, 22 players were former Goodwill Series players, including Albert Puljos and Brain Wilson.

DeAndre's family are confident he will be able to enhance his baseball skills and gain confidence in himself from the experience.



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School Tragedy, Gun Control Truths

As a father of three and grandfather of three, I can't imagine the grief being suffered by the parents and families of the murdered children in Newtown, Conn. No sane person has the ability to grasp the personal emptiness. As a parent and grandparent, I grieve in empathy.

As usual however, the gun control advo-

cates are coming out of the bushes once again to further their own agenda, but there must be truth told and I will attempt to tell it.

From current news reports, the shooter was in possession inside the school with Glock and Sig Sauer semi-automatic pistols. These are NOT full-automatic weapons, like a machine gun, as some news agencies have reported. Further, he was NOT in possession of an assault rifle. The police discovered a Bushmaster M4/AR15 .223 semi-automatic rifle in the car he parked at the school. Later reports stated that he used some type of rifle to enter the school. The Bushmaster M4/AR15 .223 semi-automatic rifle isn't a full-automatic like its military counterpart used by our troops. Again, it is NOT an assault rifle as Dianne Feinstein attempts to portray. It is a rifle that looks like the military counterpart, but is not. A similar rifle is the Ruger mini-14, which uses the exact same cartridge as a .223 and is magazine fed just like the Bushmaster. However, the Ruger does not visually appear as "sinister-looking" as the Bushmaster. That's the main visual difference (Google them for further reference).

Election Post Mortem


I am already reading so many pundits and other talking heads analyzing the disaster that was this year's elections. I am adding my own ten cents. Here goes:

1. We are outnumbered

We accurately foresaw the enthusiasm, the passion, the commitment, the determination, and the turnout. Married women, men, independents, Catholics, evangelicals - they all went for Romney in percentages as high or higher than the groups which voted for McCain in 2008. It wasn't enough. What we saw in the election on Tuesday was a tipping point: we are now at a place where there are legitimately fewer Americans who desire a free republic with a free people than there are those who think the government should give them stuff. There are fewer of us who believe in the value of free exchange and free enterprise. There are fewer of us who do not wish to demonize successful people in order to justify taking from them. We are outnumbered. For the moment. It's just that simple.

2. It wasn't the candidate(s)

Some are already saying, "Romney was the wrong guy"; "He should have picked Marco Rubio to get Florida/Rob Portman to get Ohio/Chris Christie to get [someplace else]." With all due respect, these assessments are incorrect. Romney ran a strategic and well-organized campaign. Yes, he could have hit harder on



Benghazi. But for those who would have loved that, there are those who would have found it distasteful. No matter what tactic you could point to that Romney could have done better, it would have been spun in a way that was detrimental to his chances. Romney would have been an excellent president, and Ryan was an inspired choice. No matter who we ran this year, they would have lost. See #1, above.

3. It's the culture, stupid.

We have been trying to fight this battle every four years at the voting booth. It is long past time we admit that that is not where the battle really is. We abdicated control of the culture – starting back in the 1960s. And now our largest primary social institutions - education, the media, Hollywood (entertainment) have become really nothing more than an assembly line for cranking out reliable little Leftists. 

Banana Raisin Muffins

2 C Cheerios cereal 1 ¹/₄ C all-purpose flour 1/3 C packed brown sugar 2 ¹/₂ tsp. baking powder 1 C mashed ripe bananas (2 or 3 medium) 1 C raisins 2/3 C milk 3 T vegetable oil 1 egg- beaten

the bottom of 12 regular size muffin cups with shortening, or spray with cooking spray.

Place cereal in resealable storage plastic bag. Seal bag and coarsely crush with rolling pin. In large bowl, mix cereal, flour, 1/2 cup. brown sugar and baking powder. Stir in remaining ingredients just until moistened - do not



beat until smooth. Divide batter evenly among the muffin cups. Bake 18-20 minutes or until golden brown.

Makes 12 muffins.

Chocolate Chip Zucchini

1 ¹/₄ C sugar 1/3 C butter or margarine -

2 eggs

softened 1/3 C vegetable oil 1 tsp. vanilla

> 2 ½ C flour 1/4 unsweetbaking

1 tsp. baking soda 1/2 C butter-2 C shred-1/3 to ½ C

semisweet chocolate chips 1/2 C choptional)

Heat oven to 350. Grease 13 x 9 pan with shortening or cooking spray,


lightly flour.

In large bowl, beat sugar, butter, oil, vanilla and eggs with spoon until well blended. Stir in flour, cocoa, baking soda and buttermilk until well combined. Fold in zucchini, chocolate chips and the nuts. Spread batter evenly in pan.

Bake 35 to 45 minutes or Heat oven to 400. Grease just until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool completely, about 1 hour. Cut into 20 pieces. If you don't have any buttermilk for this recipe, use 1 ¹/₂ tsp., vinegar or lemon juice to milk to make

- Chewy Peanut Bars
- 4 C Wheaties cereal
- 1/3 C lightly salted dryroasted peanuts, coarsely chopped
- 1/2 C light corn syrup
- 1/3~C packed brown sugar
- ¹/₄ C peanut butter
- 3 T semisweet chocolate
- chips

Spray 9 inch square pan with cooking spray. In large bowl, mix cereal and peanuts. In a 2 quart saucepan, heat corn syrup, brown sugar and peanut butter to boiling over medium heat, stirring constantly. Boil and stir 1 minute. Pour over cereal mixture, stirring to coat entire mixture. Press in pan, using your fingers. If mix is too sticky, dampen your fingers with water.

In a small microwaveable bowl, microwave chocolate chips uncovered on high 30 seconds, stir. Continue microwaving 10 seconds at a time, stirring after each time, until smooth. Drizzle over bars. Refrigerate about 30 minutes or until chocolate has hardened. Makes 16 bars.

Fruit and Nut Snack Bars Snack Mix

- 4 C Honey Nut Cheerios cereal
- 1 C dried tropical three-fruit mix ***
- ½ C sunflower nuts***½ C dry roasted peanuts
- Syrup
- ³/₄ C packed brown sugar
- 1/2 C corn syrup
- ¹/₄ C peanut butter 1 tsp. vanilla

Spray 13x9 inch pan with cooking spray. In large bowl, mix snack mix ingredients, set aside.

In 2 quart saucepan, mix all syrup ingredients except vanilla. Heat to boiling over medium-high heat, stirring constantly. Boil 1 minute. Remove from heat, stir in vanilla. Pour syrup over snack mix, stirring until evenly coated. Press mixture firmly in pan. Cool completely at least 30 minutes. Cut into 9 rows by 4 rows, making 36 bars. Store lightly covered.

*** If you can't find the dried tropical fruit, use whatever dried fruit you like – apricots, dates, pineapple, but be sure to chop them to bite size. Same for the sunflower nuts – if you don't like them, use chopped toasted almonds, pistachios, or even cashews.

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Got Stuff?

Chances are if you didn't have stuff before the holidays, you do now. In his essay titled, "Stuff," Paul Graham says, "Stuff used to be rare and valuable." He gives an example of the fact that his Cambridge house, built in 1876, didn't have closets in the bedrooms. Back then people's stuff fit in a chest of drawers. Can you imagine all

your stuff fitting in a chest of drawers ... or your kids' stuff?

I'm not suggesting we all adopt a minimalistic lifestyle, but I do frequently see the effects of having too much. Feelings

of overwhelm, anxiety and frustration are common. And, with the advent of the Dollar Store, these feelings are not limited to the rich. One of the antidotes to having too much is developing a realistic estimation of our stuff's worth.

The Value of an Acquisition

Graham goes on to say, "What I didn't understand was that the value of some new acquisition wasn't the difference between its retail price and what I paid for it. It was the value I derived from it. Stuff is an extremely illiquid asset. Unless you have some plan for selling that valuable thing you got so cheaply, what difference does it make what it's 'worth?' The only way you're ever going to extract any value from it is to use it. And if you don't have any immediate use for it, you probably never will."

Earning One's Keep

As I help people de-clutter, one of my mottos is, "Everything has to earn its keep." If you're frustrated or overwhelmed with too much stuff, here are some questions to help you determine if you're stuff is earning its keep:

- Have I used this item in the past vear?





Prop. 30 Passed, Taxes are Going Up: Now What?

By LeAnn Nowlin

Many people may be thinking "Proposition 30 passed, now what are the schools going to spend the money on?"

The answer is simple: there is no new money.

When Governor Brown developed the state budget for the current fiscal year, he developed it on the belief that Prop 30 would be passed by California voters and incorporated the additional tax revenue. Because the budget was built on this assumption, if Prop 30 failed, schools were going to experience severe funding cuts

over the next few years.

The passing of Prop 30 has simply eliminated the trigger on the cuts. School districts have been "flat funded" from the 2011-2012 fiscal year, meaning that, while salaries and benefits have increased, revenue limit levels are exactly the same as they were last year.

Revenue limit funds are calculated based on the average daily attendance (ADA) of the school district and is, by far, the largest revenue source for the district. The passing of Prop 30 did; however, implement a new cash flow deferral to the state's EPA or "Education Protection Account" in the amount of 21.2004 percent of the district's total revenue limit.

According to School Services of California, the amount of the new deferral totals \$6.9 million, the amount of the anticipated revenues from the increased tax rates of Prop 30. The deferrals give the state time to receive the additional income before it becomes due to the schools. Although, schools will receive the EPA deferral as part of their June revenue payment from the state, they will have to manage through the rest of the fiscal year with less cash.

In the end, schools will receive the same amount of revenue from revenue limit sources as they did last year, they will just have to wait longer to receive it.

"Child Find Program" Helping the Kids of Golden Valley

The Child Find Program of Golden Valley Unified School District was created to make sure every child who has a disability receives the help they need and is not overlooked.

Anyone in the GVUSD community may participate in the Child Find process.

The program accepts referrals and screens children who may have a disability. The child is then referred to an appropriate educational facility for evaluation or services. The assessment is provided at no cost to the parent.

A referral to the program may be made by a parent or anyone concerned about a child. Parent involvement and agreement is obtained prior to any further action and all information is confidential.

The Child Find Program is created to help children with the following disabili-

ties: autism, deafness, emotional disturbance, intellectual disability, orthopedic impairment, health impairments, a specific learning disability, speech or language impairment, traumatic brain injury or visual impairment.



ricane Sandy, or the growing strength and brazenness of our enemies. American voters stick their fingers in their ears and say, "Lalalalalala, I can't hear you."

It is unpleasant to think about the circumstances it will take to force Americans to grow up. It is even more unpleasant to think about Obama at the helm when those circumstances arrive.

5. Yes, there is apparently a Vagina Vote

It's the subject matter of another column in its entirety to point out, one by one, all of the inconsistencies and hypocrisies of the Democrats this year. Suffice it to say that the only "war on women" was the one waged by the Obama campaign, which sexualized and objectified women, featuring them dressed up like vulvas at the Democrat National Convention, appealing to their "lady parts," comparing voting to losing your virginity with Obama, trumpeting the thrills of destroying our children in the womb (and using our daughters in commercials to do so), and making Catholics pay for their birth control. the local area. Jim is an award-winning sports and nature photographer whose work has appeared in books, magazines, calen-


