## In the Heat of the Night Area businessman loses \$70,000 in mysterious hay bale fire.

On the evening of January 3, 3V Feed and Garden Supply owner Jessie Kang got a message on his cell phone at about 11:15 p.m. He was busy and didn't think anything of it. After all, if it's important they'll call back.

Well, it was important. Within 10 minutes the same person called back. Jessie recognized the number -- it was a regular customer at Jessie's feed store on Highway 145 just to the east of the outskirts of Madera. Jessie figured the customer was probably having some trouble with his horse and wanted Jessie to open up the store for some supplies the customer didn't have, a practice that Jessie had done several times with many customers.

But this call was not about a horse or supplies or about someone needing Jessie's help. This customer had happened to be driving home down Highway 145 and when he drove past 3V Feed was horrified to see the huge stacked bales of oat hay across the street from Jessie's store were on fire. There was a California Highway Patrolman already on the scene who had been driving back to Madera from a call in eastern Madera County, and had already called for the fire department. When Jessie's customer called 911 he was told they were already aware of the fire and that emergency crews were on their way.

Jessie, who lives about 1 mile away from his business, jumped in his truck and rushed over to his store to be greeted by a horrific sight: \$70,000 of prime, dry, seasoned oat hay was burning horribly out of control.

By 11:30 p.m. it had become a massive fireball. Three different stacks were all on fire and were burning ferociously. "The majority was oat hay, but there was some straw in there as well," Jessie said as calculated the devastation. Over 4,500 bales were being lost as he helplessly stood and watched. The bales were stacked on top of \$2,000 of wooden pallets. All tolled, Jessie estimated the loss at approximately \$70,000.

"I got a good deal on it this summer," Jessie said. "When I get a good price I pass it on to my customers. There are a lot of people who have animals that are hurting and my prices really help them out. But now ... I can't imagine all of the animals this would have fed."

Jessie said that oat hay is at a premium right now. "The shortage of rain this last year made oat hay like gold," he said. Right now, he said there is none in Cali-

#### A Little History

The first thing you'll notice about Frank Bigelow is his hat. To Frank's way of thinking, that hat acknowledges the sacrifice of those who settled our region and serves as a commitment to preserve our way of life. With family roots that date to the late 1800's, Frank's great grandparents, Harmon and Leota Bigelow, settled in the O'Neals area of Madera County and established a cattle and sheep ranch along with a wagon and stage line that served the high country of the Sierra Nevada.

Later, Harmon strung two wires through the trees so that his wife could talk to her friend a half-mile away with a

## FBI Helping to ID Dead "John Doe" Found South of Ranchos

On Friday, Jan. 6 Sheriff John Anderson announced the FBI is working with Madera County Sheriff's Office to learn the identity of an elderly man whose nude body was found in an olive orchard south of the Ranchos last month. A second rendering of the dead man is being released. Numerous database searches have so far come up empty despite a sketch that was released late last year, Anderson said.

John Doe remains a mystery.

"We still have no idea who he is. We

don't know where he lived; if he had family," Anderson said. "All we know right now is that the lifeless body of a man was found dumped in an olive orchard four days before Christmas."

It's still not clear how the man died because preliminary autopsy results were inconclusive. Additionally, Anderson said he is aware that some law enforcement agencies are releasing actual photos of an unidentified corpse, rather than rely on an artist's rendering, when seeking help from the public, but Anderson said he's not prepared to release a grim photo at this time.

Apart from working a number of angles with Sheriff's Detectives, a forensic specialist with the FBI has created a second sketch which is being released in the hopes that someone might recognize the man and give John Doe a name.

The man is described as a light-skinned elderly African American approximately 60-

## **Thatcher vs. Decline**



Margaret Thatcher is on the cover of Newsweek, or -- the next best thing --Meryl Streep is on the cover as the former British prime minister in a new biopic.

Thatcher is a rich theme. If the types who expound on such things didn't so hate her politics, she'd launch a thousand dissertations on those inexhaustible academic themes of class and gender. As the daughter of a grocer, she was looked down upon as the personification of, in the words of one highfalutin critic, "the worst of the lower-middle-class." As a woman in a man's world, she was venomously attacked by her opponents as a Britain's fate without correctly diagnos-"bitch" or "the bag."

At this moment in our history, though, it is Thatcher's central purpose that is most important: Her unyielding rejection of British decline. She rejected it with every bone in her middle-class body even though sophisticates scoffed at such a naive nationalism. She rejected it even though the grandees of her own party said it was inevitable. She rejected it even though she knew reversing it meant forcing a wrenching political and economic crisis.

The acrid whiff of decline is in the air in America, in the enduringly weak employment picture, in the spiraling debt, in the persistent pessimism about



our prospects and in the intellectual preparation for a "post-American world." Part of the volatility in the Republican presidential field is the unfulfilled hunger for a Thatcher-like figure. Needless to say, Thatchers aren't often on offer.

The country she wanted to save was by the late 1970s an embarrassing wreck. After World War II, Britain's leaders had grounded the ship of state on the shoals of socialism. The country was broke and beset by maliciously powerful unions. Humiliatingly, it had to go to the International Monetary Fund for a loan. Henry Kissinger told President Gerald Ford in 1975, "Britain is a tragedy -- it has sunk to begging, borrowing, stealing."

It wasn't enough to rage against ing the source of its sickness. As Claire Berlinski, author of the book-length study of Thatcher titled "There Is No Alternative," notes, she made an unsparing and comprehensive case against socialism. "In the end," Thatcher thundered, "the real case against socialism is not its economic inefficiency, though on all sides there is evidence of that. Much more fundamental is its basic immoralitv.'

Bold but never reckless, as prime minister Thatcher undertook a comprehensive free-market program to tame inflation, restrain spending, cut taxes, privatize industries, bring unions to heel and deregulate the financial industry. At one point, her approval rating dipped to 23 percent, but her vindication was a sustained return to dynamism and growth. Her victory in the Falklands War represented a turning point in national pride. She was Ronald Reagan's partner in defeating the Soviets. By the end of her career, she had accomplished what Britain's consensus had once deemed impossible.

In today's America, the circumstances are very different, and the basic challenge is profoundly the same. Thatcher's lesson is that decline is inevitable only if its self-fulfilling prophets prevail.

SARA had such strict laws that some of the acts were grandfathered in so they would not become laws until the late 1990s, then each new regulation would start each year thereafter for the next 10 years. Do any of you remember fuel tanks being taken out of the ground and being replaced with double lined tanks? Do you remember asbestos being taken out of every school, government center and industry to only find out that all asbestos was not bad?

Instead of listening to environmental elitists, read for yourself how laws and regulations, like SARA Title III, cost each American taxpaying citizen and industries to comply. I think you will find the dollar amount in the billions. The Right-to-Know Act was the right thing to do at the time and the laws and fines are still in effect today. 
#### Madera Chapter Tea Party Meetings



cookie sheet, but use whatever size is good for your party. The layers I use (from bottom to top in this order) are:

**Refried Beans** Sour Cream Guacamole Chopped Green Chiles (drained) Shredded Lettuce **Diced** Tomatoes Chopped (or sliced) Olives Green Onions – chopped Shredded Cheese

I didn't put any amounts down because it will depend on the size of the platter you will be using. Additionally, I brown a pound of hamburger, drain it well on paper towels and then stir it into the beans before beginning to layer the other ingredients. The cheese can be of your choice: Cheddar, Monterey Jack, or use pepper jack, or a combination of these. Serve with tortilla chips.

Depending on how much work you want to go to before your party, you could do chicken wings. I'm not a fan of the hot wings, but I do like the BBQ or this recipe for Brandied Chicken Wings.

#### **Brandied Chicken Wings**

3 lbs. Chicken Wings with tips removed.

- Sauce:
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> C Brown Sugar (packed)
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> C Cooking Sherry
- <sup>3</sup>⁄<sub>4</sub> C Soy Sauce
- 2 t Ground Ginger

1 or 2 Cloves of Garlic – chopped

Combine sauce ingredients. Place chicken in baking dish and pour sauce over chicken and let marinate in the refrigerator overnight. When ready to bake, place wings on greased cookie sheet and place in 450 oven for 10 minutes and turn wings over and cook for another 10 minutes. Reduce oven to 350 and cook wings for another 15 minutes or until wings are done.

2 or 3 Stalks of Celery, chopped

1 Pkg. Knorr Vegetable Recipe Mix

3 Green Onions chopped (optional)



## **New Restraint Law Classes Offered**

According to Safe Kids, motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death for children 3 to 14 in the United States. Car seats can reduce fatal injuries by as much as 71 percent for infants younger than 1 year of age and by 54 percent for toddlers ages 1-4. Children seated in a booster seat in the rear of the car are 45 percent less likely to be injured in a crash as compared to those using a seat belt alone. Effective Jan. 1, a new California law went into effect making it a legal requirement that children under 8 years old must be properly buckled into a car seat or booster in the back seat. This new law mandates more stringent standards for parents to follow so they can protect their children in the event they are involved in a car crash.

The interview with the Fresno Bee reporter brought back memories from way back. In 1959 I was elected as PTA president of Viking Elementary school. In those days there were no parents' clubs in schools, it was always a national organization of PTA that schools had. Some of you may never have heard of the PTA. This is the first organization that made people realize the important role that parents play in the education of their children. Here is the history of the PTA.

On Feb. 17, 1897 the Parent Teacher Association was founded in Washington D.C. by two women, Alice McLellan Birney and Phoebe Apperson Hearst. All over our nation the month of February was chosen to honor these national founders as well as the past presidents of local units. I had gotten involved when my oldest child was in Kindergarten. I learned a lot about working with teachers and administrators

from the PTA speakers and programs. I worked with the state PTA to encourage elementary schools to have libraries on their campuses to encourage reading. Scandinavian School District was an Elementary School District consisting of Viking, Vinland, Erickson, Norseman and Scandinavian Middle School in east Fresno. This was not a unified school district so they could not build a high school. California is a state that seems to think bigger is better and more efficient. In 1959 the California State Board of Education forced the Scandinavian School District to join either Fresno Unified or Clovis Unified so that their students would have a high school to complete their education. Lots and lots of PTA meetings at all the schools were held and the people decided to go with Fresno Unified and the Scandinavian School District was taken over by Fresno Unified. I guess what I am trying to say is that creating a school district is complicated and if you don't do it right you

## Madera DA Reports on Animal Abuse Prosecutions

Madera County District Attorney Michael Keitz and his staff met with the board of directors of the Friends of the Madera Animal Shelter on Jan. 10. Concerns raised by the group at the Jan. 4 meeting of the Madera City Council provided the District Attorney's Office an opportunity to meet with and inform members of the public about prosecution of animal abuse cases. During the meeting, the District Attorney's Office presented statistics on animal abuse cases referred over the past year.

In 2011, county prosecutors processed a total of 8,781 criminal cases referred from law enforcement agencies.

Of those cases, 27 involved charges of animal abuse including mis-treatment of dogs and cats, starving horses, cock fighting, abandonment, and other acts of abuse. The District Attorney's Office found sufficient evidence to bring charges in 85 percent, or 23 of the cases submitted. Of those, 16 cases resulted in conviction, while seven cases are currently pending.

Persons convicted of animal abuse charges in 2011 were sentenced by the Madera Superior Court to various punishments including fines, probation, and community service. Conviction may also result in incarceration, as did an earlier case prosecuted in 2010.

Several instances of animal abuse discovered in Madera County in the recent past received extensive media coverage. However, not all of these cases have been

presented by the law enforcement agencies to the District Attorney's Office for prosecution, either due to continuing investigative efforts or lack of evidence.

The District Attorney's Office takes all criminal matters seriously, including animal abuse. District Attorney Michael Keitz encourages the public to report suspected animal abuse to the appropriate law enforcement agency.

## **GVUSD Going Solar, \$1 Million Rebate First Savings**

Finding ways to reduce costs is a high priority for the Golden Valley Unified School District board, administration and staff. However, after several years of belt-tightening, it isn't easy finding new ways to reduce costs that don't negatively impact the district's educational program.

One area the board and administration have been exploring for the past 18 months is reducing electricity costs. Payments to PG&E represent almost 10 percent of the district's nonpersonnel budget and are the fastest

growing item in that part of the budget. Electricity costs are also the least predictable and controllable item in the district's budget.

With this in mind, almost a year and a half ago, the board directed staff to explore the implementation of Valley schools.

Solar Photovoltaic (PV) energy facilities. After looking at a number of alternative approaches, last May, the district contracted with TerraVerde Renewable Partners, an independent public energy advisor, to assist the district in developing a plan to implement solar PV energy project.

The first step was for TerraVerde to analyze the district's electricity usage to see if using solar PV energy facilities to generate electricity for the district would result in meaningful savings. Several presentations of TerraVerde's findings to the board last summer and this fall demonstrated that the district could significantly reduce its short- and long-term electricity costs by replacing power purchased from PG&E with power generated by district-owned solar PV energy facilities. Also, the board learned that with the implementation of solar PV energy project, it would be eligible to receive over \$1 million in rebates offered by the California Solar Initiative.

The next step involved a review of potential locations of the solar PV energy facilities at district sites. In making this decision, the board weighed both the look and costs of the solar PV energy facility structures. One consideration was the placement of solar PV panels on structures in parking lots and over playgrounds to provide the additional benefit of shading.

> Based on these findings, the board then authorized TerraVerde and staff to run a bidding process to select a qualified solar contractor to design and build the solar PV energy facilities for the district. The staff involved in the bidder evaluation process in

cluded Jim Monreal, Dave Baughman and Melinda Cullins, as well as, consultants from Harris Construction, Taylor Teter Architects and TerraVerde.

At their Jan. 17 meeting, the board voted to enter into a contract with Cupertino Electric, Inc., a large electrical contractor with both extensive school and solar PV installation experience.

While project supervision will be provided by Cupertino Electric, they are committed to 100 percent of the labor on the project will be provided by local electricians and other skilled trades out of Madera County.

The project is currently scheduled to begin at the end of February and be completed by the summer. As soon as the project is commissioned by PG&E, electricity, budget savings and rebates will start flowing. For more information, please contact Jim Monreal, GVUSD Chief Business Official.

## **GVUSD Ponding Basin Information**

Many changes have taken place since the original construction of the ponding basin that is located at Ave. 12 and Road 36. In June of 2002, GVUSD partnered with Madera County to accept and accommodate some road related storm runoff as referenced within the Master Drainage Plan for Madera Ranchos.

The storm drainage facility was designed partly to accommodate the necessary road improvements at the intersection of Ave. 12 and Road 36. Road construction included the installation of a storm drainage pipe running under Road 36, which would then run into the existing retention pond.

With the construction of the Ranchos Middle School in 2007, soil was removed to increase the capacity of the ponding basin. The west end of the basin was also then graded for appropriate drainage. Additional fencing and sprinklers were subsequently added to this area for use as additional turf fields for the district.

With our Madera County partnership, heavy equipment was brought in to assist in the maintenance of the basin. We attempted to reach a soil layer to promote percolation. We were also able to remove the excessive foliage growth in the basin promoted by standing water.

As our winter season continues, we will monitor water flow and dissipation as well as vegetation growth.



## **Denham Reacts to Pipeline Denial**

On Wednesday, Jan. 18 Representative Denham issued a statement on Presiden Obamat's decision to deny the application for construction of the Keystone XL Pipeline, sending more jobs and resources overseas.

"More than three years ago the application was filed to build the Keystone XL pipeline and bring jobs and energy security to America, and today the Administration rejected it. The Keystone XL pipeline is one of the largest private infrastructure projects in American history. It would have created 20,000 jobs immediately; spurred the creation of 118,000 spin-off jobs, and reduced our dependence on Middle Eastern oil.

"The Administration's excessive regulations have continually hindered job creation in the Valley and around the nation. We must invest in our natural resources, and encourage access to available resources and the jobs that come with them," Denham said.

fornia. "Dealers bought what there was and the majority of it went to Texas where they're having a drought."

When the fire department arrived on scene Jessie was initially relieved, thinking that he would be able to salvage some of his hay. But he quickly realized that not a drop of water was going onto his hay. A tractor that was near the inferno was being wet down by the firefighters to try to save it but

the firefighters considered the hay a total loss by the time they arrived.

A firefighter who didn't want his identity revealed said that there wasn't enough water in the trucks to put a dent in a fire of this magnitude. "Our trucks hold thou- 3V Feed storefront are mountains of hay. sands of gallons. A

fire like this would have taken millions of gallons," he said. Part of the problem was that there are no fire hydrants in that area of the country, limiting the available water to whatever the fire trucks are carrying.

"The firefighters stayed there and made sure that there were no embers blowing away that could have caused even more problems." he said.

Jessie disagrees.

"The hay burned for the next two days. The next day at 1

o'clock there were still flames and you couldn't stand on [the north side] of the road because of the heat," he said.

Jessie's concerns were justified because his feed store across the street from the fire has massive stacks of hay all around his business. "There were black embers all over my driveway in front of my store, just yards from more stacks of hay," he said.

Jessie is also concerned that no one appears to be investigating the crime that was committed against him.

"The sheriff's department said that arson is investigated by the fire department, and no one from the fire department has contacted me."

The source that I talked to said there probably wouldn't be an investigation.

"In a fire like that there's nothing left. There's nothing to investigate. Unless someone sees someone in the act and you pursue that, you've got nothing," he said.

Because life goes on and Jessie heard nothing from any investigators, has cleaned up the area where the bales were burned. "I have to get replacement hay for my customers." He was also concerned about liability in the event that a strong wind could possibly kick up and spread all of the ash across Highway 145, possibly

causing a traffic problem

Jessie's commitment to his customers is Hurculean. Almost immediately after the fire, and knowing that no oat hay could be found in California, Jessie got in his car and went on a 2,000 mile trek through the

western United States, meeting with hay brokers in Oregon, Arizona, Nevada -anywhere that he could to try to get replacement product. His tenacity paid off and he has shipments coming in from all

over.

Jessie had initially offered a reward of \$1,000 to anyone who might know something about this crime that will lead to an arrest and conviction and he has just upped the reward to \$1,500.

"Someone knows something and somebody else

probably knows something as well," Jessie said. "Ultimately, the one who did this knows and God knows and the truth will come out one day."

Two things have helped sustain Jessie throughout this ordeal: His faith in God and his customers.

"The almighty has helped me. I feel it was Him who guided me on my 2,000 mile trip and now I have all types of hay coming in at this time," Jessie said proudly.

But his customers are amazing as well.

"My customers have been very supportive and have offered up their prayers and whatever help they can," Jessie said. "This is a community store. I help those who I can and now they are reaching out to me."

First, it appears that there is some confusion about what is permissable to burn here. Since we're in the country, many people (particu-

larly recent transplants from the city) seem to think you can burn anything you want which is leading to a lot of people burning garbage in

Burning garbage is never permitted and espetheir yards and cially if you leave it unattended. fields. Of all the thing that

are permissable to burn, know this: Trash is the one thing in the San Joaquin Valley Air Pollution Control District handbook that is NEVER allowed to be burnt. The bottom line? If you've got trash, don't

burn it.

Secondly, people are confused about when they can and can't fire up the wood stove here in the Ranchos. The APCD looks to prohibit any type of wood burning, including wood, wood pellets and manufactured wood logs. They can't be

> burnt in open hearth fireplaces, EPA certified stoves and inserts, pellet stoves, outdoor chimineas or fire pits. Pretty prohibitive, right? Here's the loophole: We are exempt from all of that. You are exempt if burning wood is your ONLY means to warm your home OR if you do

not have access to natural gas service (and propane doesn't count). There's your loophole. There is no natural gas service in the Ranchos so burn away. Responsibly ...

plus years old. He stood 5 feet 8 inches tall and weighed 160 pounds. He had brown eyes, a shaved head, sported a salt-and-pepper colored mustache and goatee, had several chipped teeth and some missing teeth. He also had an 8inch vertical scar between his chest and his abdomen, a small scar across his nose and he also had a "cauliflower" left ear. Cauliflower ear is a condition usually associated with boxers that can occur when the external portion of the ear suffers a blow, blood clot, or other collection of fluid. If not properly treated, in time the cartilage separates from the overlying perichondrium that supplies its nutrients, causing it to die and results in the formation of fibrous tissue in the overlying skin. As a result, the outer ear becomes permanently swollen and deformed, resembling a cauliflower.

The man was discovered at around 9 a.m. on the morning of Dec. 21, 2011. His naked body had been dumped about two rows into an olive orchard near the southwest corner of the Avenue 7 and Road 34 intersection.

> **Releasing** – Is your gift wrap container full of wrapping you never choose to use when wrapping a

gift? Is your closet jammed with three sizes of clothes, some from a decade ago? Are your drawers full of single socks or plastic lids with no containers?

The releasing lens helps you see what is


inhibiting your current lifestyle and gives you permission to let go of that which is not enhancing it.

**Boundaries** – Are there untouched books jammed into and spilling off the bookshelf, and even more stashed in boxes that are keeping the car out of the garage? Are there shoes covering the "walk in" part of your closet making it difficult to reach your clothes?

The boundary lens enables you to control your stuff so it doesn't control you. Decide how much space you want to assign to certain items and then whittle down and maintain that amount.

When a frustration occurs in your physical space check it out through these four lenses – accessibility, zoning, releasing, and boundaries. Chances are a little tweaking in one of these areas will solve the problem.
