Thank god for the rain. After multiple years of drought conditions in the Central San Joaquin Valley, after two generous rainy seasons back-to-back, the state of California officially announced that the drought was "over." There's only one way for a drought to be over and that is to replace dry conditions with wet conditions. But wet conditions can bring its own unique set of considerations that didn't have to be dealt with during a drought. The number one difference is the presence of mosquitoes.

Lots of mosquitoes.

The San Joaquin Valley is home to the *Culex* mosquito, often referred to as the common house mosquito. It can spread West Nile fever, St. Louis encephalitis and Japanese encephalitis. *Culex* are night feeders who love humans and animals and can be found indoors and outdoors.

Another Valley regular is the *Anopheles* mosquito. *Anopheles* is capable of spreading malaria, a devastating disease, however we seem to have a handle on this one, with the last case of malaria reported in the Central Valley in 1986, 33 years ago.

The common thread that ties all mosquitoes together is water. All Valley varieties require standing water for their eggs to be laid, fully develop and hatch. That's where the problem of our abundant rain comes in.

Too Much Water?

When excessive water is present, it runs out of places to go. When the ground becomes saturated, the water becomes "standing water" and it's this standing water that provides the perfect breeding ground for mosquitoes. In addition to saturated ground, plant containers, swimming pools and virtually *anything* bowl shaped serves as a container for standing water.

The eggs must be covered by water, usually from rainfall, before the larva can hatch. Then, once they do



hatch, the larva feed on microorganisms growing in the standing water. The developing mosquito goes through all four life stages -- egg, larva, pupa, adult -- in the same standing water in as little as 7-8 days. A mosquito's full life cycle is about three weeks.

The newest visitor to the Central Valley is the Aedes mosquito. It's the carrier of the Zika virus, dengue, chikungunya, yellow fever and Rift Valley disease. They are easy to spot based on their unique black and white markings on their bodies and legs, but what really makes Aedes unique is they only feed in the daytime, primarily early morning and right at dusk. What's important to know about Aedes aegypti is that they prefer to feed on people, meaning they live near humans and are therefore much more likely to spread disease among people than other mosquito varieties.

What makes *Aedes* particularly subversive is they can bite people without being noticed. It's referred to as the "ankle biter" because it attacks from behind, biting

ankles and elbows.

Mosquito Avoidance

The best way to avoid diseases borne by mosquitoes is to not get bitten and there are specific steps you can take to reduce the liklihood of that happening.

- 1. Standing Water -- Step one is to eliminate them where they are breeding and laying eggs. With all of the rain we've had, investigate your property. Turn over all areas of standing water. Old boats, cars, appliances, bird baths, pet watering bowls, gutters, even tree holes can be a source. We have some 90 degree days on the horizon and it won't take long to completely dry out your standing water areas. The best part is if you eliminate the standing water, you don't have to buy and use any poisons.
- 2. In the Home -- Use air conditioning when you can, or make sure your rooms have good screened windows and doors. In extreme
- cases you can even use mosquito netting over your bed Just like outside, make sure there's no standing water inside as well.
- 3. Outside the Home -- You can always start by minimizing skin exposure by wearing long sleeves and pants. If you need an insect repellant, make sure it contains DEET or another active substance, like picaridin, oil of lemon eucalyptus or IR3535. Always follow the instructions and do not use repellents under clothing.

Amazingly, there are no anti-viral drugs to treat these diseases and, with the exception of yellow fever, there are no effective vaccines to prevent them. But common sense and being proactive can go a long way toward getting the upper hand with these pests. They can't grow and flourish where there are no hospitable conditions for them, and the majority of these actions do not require any poisons or other harmful chemicals. They *do* require a degree of perseverance and consistency on your part, but the payoff is well worth it.

Any Ranchos resident who has a warm heart is devastated by the deaths of two precious souls (again; last time it was five souls) on Avenue 12 between Road 35 and 341/2 on Saturday, April 13. I called "311" to report possible pertinent information about that stretch of road. The "front office" personnel from the Sheriff's Department raised their voice at me for my efforts to call attention to an unsafe traffic situation at this very location. The dispatcher's rude words were to this effect: "... this accident is a closed and finished case ..."

In my opinion, any extenuating circumstances to a tragedy of this magnitude in this location are, and should be at the very least, considered. There definitely COULD be a plausible "second or third scenario."

The extenuating circumstances I was trying to report were as follows: When trying to enter onto Avenue 12 from Road 35, turning either west or eastbound, vision has been severely obstructed by a semi trailer/truck parking on the north shoulder of Avenue 12 facing westbound. I have commented to passengers that sooner or later there would be a tragedy here.

After this morning's tragic news - and to have a dispatcher from the Sheriff's Dept. raise their voice at me for my efforts to call attention to an unsafe traffic situation at this very location - is unacceptable. This "accident" is NOT an "open and closed case" by any stretch of the imagination (texting/distraction issues notwithstanding). Anti-Chicken, New McCarthyism

The fast-food chain Chick-fil-A is wanted on suspicion of aiding and abetting Christian organizations.

The home of the "original chicken sandwich" was banned from its second airport in two weeks for the offense of contributing to Christian groups deemed anti-gay by its critics.

The San Antonio City Council voted to exclude the restaurant from its airport, and Buffalo, New York, soon followed suit, thus denying travelers the option of juicy chicken sandwiches and waffle fries in the cause of social justice.

This is about punishing the Georgiabased company for the faith of its leadership. The official bans are anti-Christian, unconstitutional and a harbinger of a larger effort to hunt down and punish any organization that has uncongenial views on sexual morality.

In San Antonio, the leader of the anti-Chick-fil-A effort, City Councilman Roberto Trevino, explained that, "Everyone has a place here, and everyone should feel welcome when they walk through our airport." The irony of discriminating against Chick-fil-A in order to demonstrate the city's famous open-ness was, of course, lost on him.

The hostility to Chick-fil-A stems from a controversy back in 2012 when its CEO, Dan Cathy, made statements opposing gay marriage, and the foundation es-

tablished by the company's founder contributed to politically engaged social-conservative groups. There was nothing wrong with this, but since most profit-seeking enterprises don't like controversy, Cathy said the company would back off the gay-marriage debate and focus on the chicken.

It has, but its critics still detect a lingering stench of Christianity.

The left-wing outfit ThinkProgress issued a report cited widely in the press and among Chick-fil-A opponents accusing the company's foundation of "anti-equality" giving. By which it means it donated to the Salvation Army and the Fellowship of Christian Athletes (and a small Christian home for troubled young men in Vidalia, Georgia).

Needless to say, a lot of other people are guilty of the same offense, given that the Salvation Army raises about \$2 billion a year. To consider all that the Salvation Army does -- its thrift shops, aid for the homeless, disaster relief, anti-trafficking programs, Christmas gifts to needy children and much, much more -- and reduce the organization to an allegedly anti-LGBT group is perverse.

For its part, the Fellowship of Christian Athletes stands accused of seeking "to spread an anti-LGBTQ message to college athletes." It's true that FCA asks its leaders to forswear homosexual acts, but it also wants them to pledge not to engage in heterosexual acts outside of marriage and, for that matter, refuse to use drugs, alcohol or tobacco.


According to Chick-fil-A, its donation to FCA supported sports camps and school programs for inner-city kids -- not exactly controversial causes. And its gift to the Salvation Army went to youth camps and Christmas presents for thousands of Atlanta kids.

The latest campaign against Chick-fil-A is based on the idea that it is impermissible for it to associate with any group with a traditional Christian understanding of sex and marriage, for any purpose whatsoever, no matter how unobjectionable or noble.

It is the enemies of Chick-fil-A who are intolerant and out-of-the-mainstream. They desperately need to abandon their tawdry McCarthyite crusade and "Eat Mor Chikin."




can manage to it make in. Don't worry about the clients who are waiting for service, or the team that is relying on you support. They all know you are totally worth the wait.

Strawberry Time

What is your favorite sign of spring? There is one thing I look forward to in spring and that is the strawberry stands going up in the strawberry fields. When we see them, we know it is strawberry season.

My neice Vicki's late Grandma Henderson made strawberry freezer jam and I was the benefactor of a jar or two from time to time. Delicious! I understand great niece Lauren has been moaning the fact that she misses Grandma's jam. Well dear, now is the time to learn how to make it and continue your Grandma's tradition. I went through my Mom's recipe cards and found a recipe (not sure if it is the same one Grandma Henderson made, but it will work). So in memory of Grandma Henderson here is my Mom's recipe:

Quick No-Cook
Fresh Fruit Jam
2 qts. Ripe Strawberries
¹/₄ C Lemon Juice


1 pkg. (2 oz) Jam and Jelly Pectin

1 C Karo Light Corn Syrup 4½ C Sugar

Fully crush fruit. It should measure 3½ C. In a 4 qt. bowl stir together the fruit and lemon juice. Slowly add pectin, stirring vigorously. Set aside 30 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add corn syrup, mix well. Gradually stir in sugar until dissolved. Ladle into clean ½ pt. jars or freezer containers leaving ½" headspace. Cover tightly. Jams in use should be kept in refrigerator up to three weeks or stored in freezer for up to one year. Makes seven containers. This recipe can be used with peaches or nectarines using 2½ pounds ripe fruit in the place of the strawberries.

If you want to make a strawberry pizza, you really don't have to have a pizza pan. The last one I made, I used a deep dish glass pie plate. Use your ingenuity and your imagination.

I used a pie crust recipe, using butter and adding a little sugar, but here again you can use



your favorite crust. I went on line to see what was used, and believe me, just about anything can be used. There were recipes using Bisquick, sugar cookie recipe, or even one recipe used a package of ready to bake sugar cookies. But the one I like the best was the one used for Republican Dessert.

Strawberry Pizza
1 C Flour

1 C Flour

1 Stick Butter-softened

½ C Chopped Nuts (optional)

2 T Powdered Sugar (optional)

Mix together like pie dough. Press into pan with fingers and bake 10 minutes in 350 oven. Let cool before putting on second layer.

Second Layer:

1 Pkg. (8 oz) Cream Cheese – softened

½ C Powdered Sugar2 C Sliced Strawberries

In a mixing bowl, beat cream cheese and powdered sugar until smooth. Spread on cooled crust. Arrange sliced berries on top.

Top Layer:

1 C Sugar

1/4 C Cornstarch

2 C Crushed Strawberries

In a large saucepan, combine sugar, cornstarch and crushed berries. Bring to boil, cook and stir for 2 minutes or until thickened. Cool slightly. Spoon over strawberries. Refrigerate until ready to serve.



The Sum of Small Efforts

The other day I was putting away an extension cord. Its container is located in the entry closet – higher than I can reach – with other things I seldom use. I opened the closet, looked up at the container and almost tossed it on the floor and closed the door.

Robert Collier said: "Success is the sum of small efforts, repeated day in and day out."

Staying organized requires many small efforts. We tend to comply with this idea more effectively at work and we expect public places – grocery stores, schools, libraries, and department stores – to abide by a standard of excellence that often exceeds our own

at home. We don't want to have to search through a pile of canned goods at the grocery store to find the cream of chicken soup.

It's not that we WANT to search through piles of random stuff in our own homes, but neither do we want to do that which prevents the piles and keeps things organized. It's those "small efforts" Collier referenced that have big effects when it comes to keeping clutter to a minimum.

What stopped me from wanting to put away the extension cord? Getting a step stool from the laundry room. How hard is that? Not very. Sometimes the small effort is having the right products in place. Other times, it's practicing a simple routine. Here are six small efforts that lead to big effects:

Step Stools – This is a simple fix to the "it's too high to put away" excuse. Purchase a few of the plastic fold-up step stools that can slide into a 2-inch space and have a little handle on top when folded. Strategically place them in or very near closets with high shelving. Slide one between the fridge and cabinet in the kitchen and between the washer and dryer if you have high cabinets in there. You'll be empowered to make the small effort to put the high stuff away.

Recycling Bins - Are there maga-

zines, newspapers, catalogs and ads piled around your easy chair? Is the entry table stacked with recyclable mail? Do empty soda cans amass on the kitchen counter? What about your home office desk or bathroom? Do each of these areas have a receptacle for items that need recycling? It doesn't have to be a big blue bin with the recycle emblem stamped on the side. Choose baskets or containers that look appropriate for the location and place them wherever you tend to create recyclable materials.

Remove Stuff From Bags – You already have a routine of taking your groceries out of their bags before putting stuff in the fridge. Copy that routine for everything else you buy. Whenever you toss a shopping bag of stuff into the pantry, closet or drawer, you're likely to not remember what's in it, not be able to find the stuff when you need it and ultimately create clutter by purchasing more to replace it. Small effort: Remove stuff from bags and place it intentionally where it belongs.

Ten-Minute Tidy – Take 10 minutes before you go to bed to tidy up your living space. The little pile that got dumped on a chair when you returned home, a few dishes on the countertop, the popcorn bowl on the coffee table. A few

minutes of tidying up daily means no major, overwhelming task at the end of the week, month or year. Truly big effects, for a small effort.

Two-Minute Rule – You use the scotch tape in the other room and leave it there. You dump a load of clean laundry on the sofa and walk away. You pull three tops from the closet before deciding which one to wear and leave the others on the corner of the bed. The Two-Minute Rule ends the "leave it here for now" clutter. Here it is: "If it takes less than two minutes, DO IT NOW!"

I would venture to say that if you implemented just one of these "small efforts," the most impactful for long-term change would be to consistently use the Two-Minute Rule. I tell it to myself regularly. In fact, even though I've since purchased an extra step stool for the entry closet, it took me less than two minutes to get the one from the laundry room and return the cord to its container.

May the sum of your small efforts, equal big effects!

We are so proud of our Ranchos/Hills Seniors member, Roy Cochran. As an honored veteran of the Korean War, he was chosen to participate in the Veteran's Honor Flight to Washington D.C. April 9-11. The Honor Flight Network is a non-profit organization created solely to honor America's veterans for all their sacrifices. 
"Sober Grad Night" is being planned for

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

SEMCU's ongoing community projects and accomplishments.

Our motto "for the community, by the community" describes very well SEMCU's operating goals, while our community's volunteering members run the nonprofit on behalf of all of us; their efforts show great results.

Dry Wells: In the last three years, FREE to our area residents due to SEMCU's efforts, we have drilled 110 dry wells measuring 2 ft. in diameter by a depth of 50 ft., with 12 more scheduled for this summer. Recently Provost and Prichard Engineering conducted a scientifically measured test on a 3 ft. by 75 ft. dry well and the results were astonishing. Measured water was introduced to the well for 19 days over a fourweek period. That one well recharged over 40-acre feet or 13,200,000 gallons of water. This amount of water will last a family of three using 200 gallons per day for over 23 years. SEMCU recently applied to the Department of Water and Resources for a \$1 million grant so we can drill more than 200 such wells. Later this year, DWR will consider our request along with other applicants and hopefully will approve our application. There are many competing for the same money. Any resident of Southeast Madera County that has flooding problems or has a creek running through their property could apply to

qualify for a FREE dry well. The number one problem to resolve in Southeast Madera County is working on our sustainable water future.

Low Flow Devices: Our grant application to DWR of \$218,594 was approved and implemented in July 2017 and ended in August of 2018. Six hundred ninety-two households were given 4,121 water and energy saving devices. We still have some of these devices at the Golden Valley Chamber of Commerce at 37167 Ave. 12 Ste. 5C free to anyone who needs them.

Grant Writing Class Reimbursement: SEMCU is promoting grant writing and we have a standing offer to our area residents: Take a grant writing class at Fresno State and with a completion certificate we will reimburse you for the class tuition. It will be a free course with no obligation.

SEMCU's annual meeting was held on Monday, March 18 and Verlaine Elinburg was elected as the next board president for 2019. Jeff McGrath was voted in as treasurer and Igal Treibatch as elected as secretary.

We continue to work on other projects as well. Yes, we're getting a new library but we need a park and a community center as well.

We're meeting only once per month for about an hour, not too big a commitment for people to come, share their opinions, bring new ideas and help make our community a place we want to come home to. We meet on the third Monday of every month at 6 p.m. at the Pizza Factory at 37184 Ave 12 in the Ranchos. You can reach SEMCU by phone at 59-363-9095 or on our website at www.semcu.org.





A Wake Up Call

Hello 93636,

I've selected this month's article topic based on something interesting and unusual that recently occurred in my shop. What I didn't realize when I began this article was how much I did not know about this topic and how much not knowing was going to impact my business. This article served as a "Wake Up Call" for me.

During the research of this article it became very apparent to me how much the Partial Zero Emissions Vehicle, or PZEV, is going to impact me and the independent aftermarket automotive repair industry. Although I've known PZEVs have 15-year, 150,000-mile manufacturer's emission warranties, I didn't realize EVERY CAR (not truck) sold in America by 2025 would be PZEV compliant.

With the implementation of the EPA's Tier 3 Vehicle Emissions Standards passed in 2014, I now realize we independent aftermarket automotive repair facilities will be disqualified from performing emissions repairs on every NEW CAR sold in America for up to 15 years or 150,000 miles. That represents a significant potential revenue loss for me and my industry. There is no doubt in my mind many independent repair facilities are just as capable, better trained and better equipped to diagnose and repair these cars as the dealerships. Why don't my customers have a choice?

Let's start from the beginning. Three weeks ago, a young lady from the state of Louisiana rolled into the shop with an illuminated Malfunction Indicator Lamp (MIL). As you all know, the MIL, or better known as the "Check Engine Light," is an emission failure warning light and only illuminates for an emissions failure. When I looked under the hood, I realized her vehicle was a PZEV so I directed her to the local manufacturer's dealership to claim her warranty. Several days ago, as I was reviewing the shop's Google reviews, I noticed a very nice review thanking me for not repairing her PZEV and instead helping her claim her manufacturer's warranty. It was her review that prompted me to write this article.

How many Ranchos Independent readers drive PZEV's? How many have paid for emissions repairs? Since the writing of this article, two more PZEVs rolled into the shop in need of emissions diagnostic and repairs. They were beyond their warranty, so I fixed the first and I'm currently in the diagnostic process of the second. What impact will PZEVs have on my business?

OK, what is a PZEV? A PZEV is a California car (soon to be an American car). It is a transitional car as California transitions from fossil fuel vehicles to Zero Emission Vehicles). ZEVs are essentially all electric- or hydrogen-powered vehicles. Because of excessive costs and time needed to develop new ZEV technology, automotive manufacturers were not able to meet California ZEV goals. The PZEV is California's compromise with automotive manufacturers as manufacturers continue ZEV development. For now, manufacturers can count PZEVs as ZEVs in order to meet California ZEV compliance goals. The PZEV has ZERO evaporative emissions from its fuel system and meets SULEV (Super Ultra Low Emissions Vehicle) tailpipe-emission standards. SULEV cars produce 90 percent fewer emissions then similar non-SULEV cars.

According to Popular Mechanics, PZEVs possess four unique features that differentiate them from other fossil fuel vehicles. The first difference is of course the zero-emissions fuel system. Small amounts of fuel vapor can es-

cape into the atmosphere through plastic fuel tanks, seals, connectors and associated fuel system plumbing. This process is known as "Permeation." To decrease permeation, many PZEVs use steel fuel tanks. Steel fuel tanks are 20 percent heavier and heavier is the enemy of fuel efficiency.

A new PZEV weight-saving plastic fuel tank has been developed that defeats permeation. The fuel delivery components and plumbing have been relocated inside the tank, so all vapor leaks are self-contained. The plastic fuel tank is blowmolded around the fuel tank components in a process called "ship in a bottle."

Another PZEV technology improvement is Carbon Canister technology. Fuel tank vapors generated from higher ambient temperatures and displaced during refueling events are directed into a carbon canister where they are absorbed into charcoal granules. These vapors can become desorbed and bleed off into the atmosphere. With new PZEV carbon canister technology a third chamber has been incorporated, filled with specially designed, highly absorbent, high-capacity carbon to eliminate hydrocarbon bleeding.

The third PZEV technology uses carbonabsorbing devices in the engine air intake system. When a fossil fuel engine is shut off, unburned fuel in the cylinders vaporizes and migrates through the air intake system into the atmosphere. Carbon devices installed in the air intake system capture those hydrocarbons and store them until they are inhaled back into the engine at the next start up.

The fourth PZEV technology is not really new. Catalytic converters have no impact on tailpipe emissions until they reach light-off at approximately 600 degrees F. PZEVs locate catalytic converters into the exhaust manifolds because the closer proximity to the heat source decreases light-off time.

OK guys that's all for this one. In conclusion, after a week of reflection it's obvious my industry is entering a transition in time. It's called progress. History has taught that with change comes opportunity. I think I'm going to embrace the PZEV and new technology. It should be fun. It's just science. As I see it, training will be the primary and essential component for my opportunity and future success. Looks like a lot more late nights for me, my team and our trainers.
