Summer Brings Increase of Criminal Activity in the Madera Ranchos

Madera County has experienced a rash of residential burglaries, property theft and an array of other illegal activities this summer. This activity has caused Madera County Sheriff John Anderson to issue a public warning about an increase in residential burglaries where the victims have been at home when the crimes occurred.

Thieves are targeting homes either during the day or overnight and burglars have become very brazen. In a number of recent cases, residents have reported two suspects, a middle-aged woman and an older man, driving a white, late model truck. However, both the vehicle description as well as the description of the individuals often varies. The woman knocks at the front door – presumably to find out if anyone is at home – while the male suspect sits out front in the truck. If someone answers the door the woman will go into a sob story about how her car had broken down and how she needs to use the phone to call for help. If she's let into the home she has the opportunity to scout what valuables you have and the best way to get into the home. If nobody answers the door they presume that nobody is home and they then usually enter through the back yard. They've been very successful at getting past "guard dogs" usually with a handful of "Jerky Treats." They gain entry by either breaking a window or removing a sliding glass door. In one reported case, the owner refused to answer the door thinking whoever was at the door would leave. As a result, the suspects gained entry, thinking the house was unoccupied, only to run when they came face to face with the resident. In another particularly frightening incident, older children had been left at home alone and had been told by their parents not to answer the door to strangers. The suspects entered the home and came face to face with the children before quickly leaving. Ranchos residents have re-





Juvenile Picture Book: Tony Baloney by Pam Munoz Ryan and Edwin Fotheringham. Tony Baloney is a penguin who wears blue and white checkered high tops. He is a middle child with a bossy older sister and twin baby siblings. His best buddy is his stuffed animal named Dandelion. Tony tries to behave most of the time, except when Dandelion becomes mischievous, then Tony gets in trouble and hides in "his hidey-space for maybe a year, or twenty minutes," until his mom and dad have a chat with him. 


So, What <u>ARE</u> You Going to Do?




Costco: Adult Disneyland

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Dump Cake Anyone?

I received more comments from that article than any other - except maybe the Rice article a few months ago. Maybe by the time I have to write the next article I'll have my computer again. Until then, enjoy!

Do you have company coming for dinner and need a quick dessert? Are the kids old enough that they can start helping with dinner? Grandma and Grandpa - do you have grandkids visiting for the summer and they are "BORED!" Well, I have the answer so simple, you can have a delicious cake and only dirty a can opener, a knife to cut some butter, a fork or rubber spatula and the pan the cake is cooked in! No bowls, no measuring cups or no beaters to wash and all you need is a couple cans of canned fruit, a dry cake mix, some butter and maybe some chopped nuts.

A Dump Cake.

Yes, dump! Just dump the ingredients into the baking pan and bake. One of the recipes I read said this can be made by a child or a tired mom.

The first Dump Cake I ate was made with fruit cocktail. I've made a few of these:

Fruit Cocktail Dump Cake

1 Large Can (16 oz.) Fruit Cocktail

Box Yellow Cake Mix
 Cube Butter

In a 9x13 greased pan; dump the fruit cocktail, including the juice. Dump the cake mix. Dot with butter. Bake at 325 degrees for 45 minutes or until brown.

Cherry Dump Cake

2 Cans Cherry Pie filling (21 oz. ea.)

1 Box Chocolate Cake Mix 2 Sticks Butter – sliced into 12 pieces each

Chopped pecans (optional) 1/8 C Granulated Sugar

In 9x13 baking pan dump the two cans pie filling evenly. Sprinkle dry cake mix over top of cherries. Place



butter slices over dry cake mix and sprinkle nuts and sugar evenly over top. Bake 35-45 minutes in a 350 degree oven and serve warm.

One of my favorite cakes is a pineapple upside down cake (made with crushed pineapple instead of sliced). When I saw this recipe I thought about my upside down cake. I'm going to make this one, but add just a little brown sugar and see how close it comes to the upside down cake.

Pineapple Dump Cake

Box Pineapple Cake Mix
 Stick Butter, sliced into pats
 Large Can Crushed Pineapple
 Chopped Nuts (optional)

In 9x13 pan, pour pineapple, juice and all. Shake dry cake mix on top and spread evenly. Then place butter and nuts on top and bake at 350 degrees until golden brown.

When I saw the following recipe, I thought of a peach cobbler.

Peach Dump Cake

- 1 Lg. Can Sliced Peaches
- 1 Box Butter Pecan Cake Mix
- 1 Cube Melted Butter

In 9x13 pan pour in peaches and juice. Sprinkle cake mix over top to cover evenly. Pour melted butter over top. Bake at 350 degrees for 50 minutes. Let cool 5 minutes, serve warm in bowls.

Peach and Pineapple Dump Cake

- 1 Can Sliced Peaches
- 1 Can Crushed Pineapple
- 1 Box Yellow Cake Mix
- 1 Cube Butter melted

Lightly grease the bottom only of a 9x13 baking pan. Pour canned fruit, including juice, in bottom of pan. Sprinkle dry cake mix on top of fruit. Pour melted butter over cake mix. Bake for 45 minutes to an hour in 350 oven.



With all due respect to your editorial in the latest Ranchos Independent, WE have all done our homework, for 35 years (never mind the web and document searches of "Liberty Groves Project").

Case in point ... the new project is NOT in our GVUSD so not a cent of collected taxes will go to our schools, if there should be any tax generated. I would like to know (question unanswered by document research) who is out there to buy 7,000 homes and at what price (since every fifth home in suburban America is in foreclosure at this moment)? The day I drove out here to purchase my home, 35 years ago, the thought crossed my mind: "Am I going to have to commute this trip everyday of my working life from here on?" Hardly a working day goes by on my commute that I don't think of the \$30 per







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day I spend on my commute (never mind the time) to get to work. I'm not exactly on the lowest end of the pay scale, but commuting costs alone could easily equal a half a day's labor. My research did not show ANY reference to a daily bus system to both/either city (Fresno and/or Madera).

1. "Our water depleted." None of us has our original well. In my research, I did not find ANY reference to an ongoing maintenance of public wells. I did not find any comparison between the draw of water which the ag fields take compared to the draw of water 7,000 homes will take. When the ag pumps come on line (1/4 mile away) my water draw is SERI-OUSLY compromised. By the way, we are all conserving water in our own way -- did you bother to research that?

2. "Over crowded schools ..." A bit of redundancy there in the article, though I did find in my research that LGP would

2, which GVUSD says will still happen, having awarded a contract to a company to make the repairs.

Dave Baughman, manager of Maintenance and Operations for GVUSD pointed out that the thieves stole the wiring while the system was "hot," meaning that they used either insulated equipment or gloves to complete their crime. In one interview Baughman said that without those precautions the district would probably have been looking at a dead body at the scene of the crime.

Part of the problem with copper theft is recyclers who don't require a whole lot of verification for the scrap they receive. And, according to Monreal, it goes beyond

ported losing jewelry, guns and electronics.

"There were 223 calls for service from residents countywide between May and mid-August," said Sheriff's Department spokesperson Erica Stuart. Unfortunately, a new computer system at the Sheriff's Office no longer enables them to separate calls for the Ranchos from calls for the total county.

"In light of the similarities of these cases, [the Sheriff's Department] is issuing a warning to the public and believes it prudent to provide citizens basic but critical tips on how to keep their homes and themselves safe," said Sheriff Anderson. There are simple security measures folks should take, such as motion detectors, alarm systems, and keeping all doors and windows secured. But the obvious action, Anderson says, is the same advice we provide our children. "Never open your door to a stranger. If that person who you do not know claims they need help, let that individual on the other side of the door know that you're going to assist them by calling 911 so that authorities can better handle their needs," he said. Anderson also urges residents to not just say you're going to call 911, but do it. "If the stranger outside really needs assistance, they'll be grateful you made that call. But if it turns out to be a ruse, you'll be glad that you called 911."

The reason many live in the Ranchos is the value of privacy. Neighbors don't live so close that we can hear their private conversathat. When asked why the police don't just post someone at area recyclers and wait for the stadium's contraband to show up, he said that copper thieves that make a big score, like from Liberty High's stadium, will drive to Los Angeles or the Bay Area to sell their stolen property. "Thieves are not hitting the local recyclers," Monreal said. "They're going to LA or up north where the trail gets faint."

When asked what the district's plans are for the future to help secure the rewired stadium, Monreal said they were looking at different options. "Cameras and increased security," he said. When asked if the increased security might include razor wire, machine gun turrets and Rottweilers, Monreal laughed and said, "No. Not at this time."

tions or know what they're watching on TV each night, however this privacy has also made all of us susceptible to burglaries, especially during the day when many people are at work. In many cases burglars know our neighborhoods comings and goings better than we do.

After hearing that both a friend and a neighbor had their homes broken into in broad daylight, Ranchos resident Leann Bauer decided to take action. She set up a private Facebook page called "Keeping the Ranchos Safe." The response from the Ranchos community has been overwhelming: in just one month over 600 members have been added to this ongoing private discussion. "This group is designed to keep residents informed of suspicious activity in our area. There has been so much crime out here lately that we need a place to keep track of things," Bauer said. "We don't always know what's going on with our neighbors. Crimes are happening right under our noses. If you see or hear something, I'm hoping this will be a place to discreetly share it with our friends and neighbors. We need to look out for each other and take back our sense of security and community!"





Sheriff John Anderson is issuing a scam alert after an 84-year-old North Fork woman was conned out of nearly \$8,000.

Earlier this month the victim said she received a call from a young man she assumed was her grandson. The caller told her that he was vacationing in Mexico with some college pals, got into a jam and needed money. He said they crashed into a pole in Mexico City and while the Embassy was helping them he still needed money prior to his court appearance scheduled for the next day. The caller asked her to wire him \$5,500 and begged her not to call his parents. second call. The voice at the other end said his court date went well but now needed bond money in order to leave Mexico. This time he asked her to wire him more than \$4,000. It wasn't until she reached her grandson nearly a week later that she realized that she had been scammed.

"We've received complaints about calls from Canada and now from Mexico," Anderson said. Although the "tall-tale" varies, "The message is the same, 'Send money and please don't tell my parents.""

how long to cook, these recipes don't have to be followed exactly. Change the fruit - maybe your family likes pears instead of fruit cocktail, or how about spice cake instead of yellow with the peaches or add a little cinnamon. I even saw one recipe that added a little coconut. This is definitely one on which you can use your imagination. One other suggestion I would have if you were using peaches or pears is to cut them up. You don't have to do it in a separate bowl, just dump the fruit in the bottom of the baking pan and before you pour the cake mix on cut the slices into smaller pieces. These cakes will seem wet and uncooked but once cooked they are delicious – almost like a cobbler. And they are especially good served warm with a scoop of ice cream.

When I told Randy about Dump Cakes he mistakenly thought I was saying "Bundt cakes." When I explained them to him he went home and tried his hand at a Dump Cake. His entire family loved it and loved how simple it was to make. These things are so simple, here's a recipe he made up that he is still raving about.

Apple Spice Dump Cake

- 2 Cans Apple Pie Filling
- 1 Box Spice Cake Mix

1 ¹/₂ Cubes of Butter, cut into pats

Spray the bottom of a 9x13 baking pan with Pam or any cooking spray. Pour the entire contents of the two cans of pie filling into the bottom of the pan. Sprinkle entire dry cake mix on top of filling and flatten it out with a fork. Place the pats of butter over the entire surface of the cake mix, completely covering it. Bake for 35 minutes in a 350 oven. When you pull it out let it rest for 30 minutes before you cut into it. Randy says it is one of the best – and easiest – desserts he and his family have ever had.




