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# Page 2 December 2007 The Mortgage Industry in the Ranchos: Following the Nation's Lead

A steep rise in the rate of Subprime mortgage foreclosures has contributed to the failure of more than 200 mortgage lenders since 2006. California, Florida, Michigan and Nevada have been hardest hit and the Ranchos is no exception. Subprime lending is the practice of making loans to borrowers who don't qualify for standard loans because of poor credit history, some self-employed borrowers, or loans on investment property that cannot be sold on the primary market. Because of the nature of these loans they're very risky to both lenders and borrowers. It's estimated that since 2004, 20 percent of mortgages originated in the US are considered Subprime loans

As the industry struggles to recover from the "Subprime meltdown" lenders are moving back to basics, carefully reviewing the viability of all loan programs. Gone are the days of the Stated Income, No Document, Pick a Payment, 103 percent "Loan to Value" types of loans. "Because of market conditions, many loan programs previously offered in California are no longer available or have increased down payment and credit requirements," said David and dusting off the time tested "Three C's of Credit."

They are Capacity, Collateral and Character. Lenders consider each of these factors in any loan request. Capacity means how you are going to repay the loan, what is your monthly income and what are

your expenses. One of the most important considerations is your debt to income ratio. Collateral means what assets you have other than your income. This includes bank accounts, investments and the value of property. Creditors feel more secure if you have collateral that can be liquidated if you fall into financial difficulties. Finally, character. This includes your credit history and your credit score or "FICO" score.

A FICO score is a mathematical calculation created from data in your credit report. FICO scores have become the "magic number" in mortgage lending with scores ranging from a low of 300 to a perfect score of 850 with a national average of 723, the higher the number, the better your chance at getting a loan.

"Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac recently

announced increased fees for borrowers with less than a 680 FICO score," Schilling said. "These new loan price adjustments could mean thousands of dollars or higher interest rates to those who previously qualified for the lowest rates. Mortgage insurance companies are also raising the premiums for those with less than a 3 percent down payment. Each change made by one of the major players in the lending industry removes another group of potential buyers from the market, forcing sellers to further lower prices to attract an offer."

Patty Grissom, Branch Manager of Ranchos Mortgage, says, "FHA currently offers a program called FHASecure to assist homeowners who are in default on their existing mortgage." It allows a refinance into a 30 year fixed loan guaranteed by the Federal Housing Administration. The maximum FHA loan amount for Madera County is \$323,000. The median sales price for the City of Madera is \$219,000 while it's \$349,000 in the Madera Ranchos and Rolling Hills.

Multiple Listing Service records for Madera Ranchos and Rolling Hills indicate that between June and December, 2007, there were 83 active listings under Single Family Home Sales Activity with 13 pending sales and 29 sales closed. Single Family Home Activity in Foreclosure or Bankruptcy status showed nine active listings, five pending sales and three

# THE D.O.G. HOUSE

The Board of Supervisors had its last meeting of the year! I have learned a lot this past year watching the Board in action and have seen a few changes. I have to give Chairman Moss credit for guiding many of the changes. When I started DOGging the Board it



wasn't easy to get a chance to speak your mind on issues being deliberated by the Board, now public comment is allowed at least twice during deliberations and votes. Additions to the agenda now have to go through the County Council before being added, the biggest change, however, after many years of speeches and hand wringing, the Board has finally taken an on-the-record stand: No General Fund money will be used to subsidize special districts and all districtcaused expenses, direct or indirect costs, will be billed to the districts. This gets a half a million dollar a year monkey off of our backs.

### Next Year's Issues

We get our day in court: In March, over the Brown act violation that moved the \$3.2 million from eastern Madera to the City of Madera for their Ellis street overpass.

*Fire mitigation fund issues:* Should be fully investigated and either set-tled/corrected or a lawsuit filed.

Integrated Regional Water Management Plan (IRWMPP): I anticipate a battle over the "plan" in the IRWMP, with almost no public input I am afraid it will not be our plan but Boyle Engineering and the RMA's idea of what is best for us instead. It will either be a very important document guiding the future of Madera County or it will be a very expensive dust collector that supported a lot of people that made their livings doing grant studies.

The IRWMP is being created from the study that we just spent hundreds of thousands of our tax dollars financing. Public input into the "plan" was minimal during the study. As the plan is being created, input on the draft was to be taken in November, after we had a chance to look at the draft report. The final plan was to be distributed in December (none of that input has been allowed) and the Board will vote it into law in January. The study is a work in progress, lots more to do, and it appears that the plan is being written to accomplish goals rather than being a document that truly interprets the water study and provides options. Could we have possibly missed a step in the process?

*Special Districts:* Will be an ongoing fight. It is hard for some politicians to make the hard choices when it may cost them votes. We need to stay on top of every hearing or they will be allowed to continue to feed at the public pork trough called the General Fund.

**Follow through:** Another big battle will be to make sure the Board's direction is followed. Much of what the Board tells staff to do seems to be with a wink and a nod. Votes have been taken, direction has been given and then nothing happens. Anyone demanding action is pacified at the meeting but then nothing happens.

Paid Call Firefighters (PCFs) pay: The PCFs that respond in the fire engines or in their personal cars when you dial 911 are not being treated fairly. They are not paid for in-house medical aids. When you dial 911 because you had a heart attack, or fell, or any other medical emergency, they drop what they are doing, abandon their families, burn their gas getting there and the county doesn't think they should be paid for their time. It seems like every year PCFs are being asked to spend more of their time training and being certified to serve us better and again the county does not feel they deserve to be paid for their time. Every year the number of PCFs is declining. This may be a good thing for Calfire (we may need to add more highly paid career firefighters) but it is not good thing for the citizens of Madera County.

Are they even listening: Another issue that may pop up relates to those computer screens in front of everybody behind the Board's pulpit. The idea behind the computers was to have all of the backup documents on them rather than a 3-inch binder for each of the supervisors. It has evolved into something else. Supervisors sending instant messages back and forth (secret communications during meetings); Supervisors "multitasking"; SURFING the web while citizens are pleading their case on an issue before the Board. Not listening to

feature to the conceptual plan is that whatever is ultimately built will be designed, constructed, owned, and operated by the community and not Madera County. A Special District will be formed to create the revenue for community ownership to take place. Probably the most likely new district structure that would be utilized is a Community Services District or CSD. Hundreds of communities throughout California that are similar to the Ranchos have formed CSD's to build and operate such community facilities. CSD's are governed by boards of directors that are elected from residents that live within the boundaries of the proposed new district. This is as close to local government that our community can get. A CSD could even be a "precursor" to the ultimate formation and incorporation of a new city for our area.

I am grateful for and respect the individual citizens that step up and give their time to be on the Grand Jury. The Grand Jury is supposed to be the watchdog for the rest of the citizens. In past years our Grand Jury has written fluff reports (they are

When you read a Grand Jury report there should be no doubt that it is impartial and that the facts have been checked.

Water Advisory Commission: There are Commissioners that may not be suited for the task ahead. I am being told that not all understand what they are reading and may not have (or may not be willing to invest) enough time in the Commission to understand the issues. I am very disappointed with the Commission as a whole that they are only willing to invest one meeting a month to get started.

Adult Non-Fiction: The Elephant in the Playroom by Denise Brody.

As many will testify, parenting is not for the faint-hearted. For parents of special needs children it takes so much more. The author is a mother of a child who suffers from sensory integration dysfunction. She researched and gathered first-hand experiences from other parents of special needs kids. Often feeling isolated and misunderstood, the parents struggle to have a normal family life while trying to cope with a child who appears perfectly normal but doesn't respond to his or her surroundings as most children do. Many have tried expensive medication, counseling and therapy only to eventually discover what works best for their individual child isn't written in a book or a program. This is an eye-opening book that will give most people a large dose of compassion for parents who face

this challenge every day.

# The Olde Cowboy by Woody Laughnan

The phone rang after midnight alarming even my cat Lady Bug who all but knocked the receiver from the stand jumping from the bed to hide in the closet.

It was from a young man I had not seen or heard from in years, the youngest son of my long-time friend George who, on learning of the death of my dear wife Pat and knowing me well enough to realize the depth of my grief, had hitched a ride out to my place to keep me company.

And no way did he spout the usual and meaningless "You'll see her again in heaven," "She's gone to her reward" and "God called her home" chatter. Rather, he set a tattered old satchel holding his meager earthly belongings on the floor, gave me a hug and we sat on the floor and cried until falling asleep sometime before daylight. O1d George was that way, over-emotional and melancholy, traits that I fully shared which must in some strange way have brought us together when we were both on the juice back in the 1960s.

Anyhow, the midnight caller told me that George had died, during a chilly and lonely night out on the street where he had been living on and off for the past several years. Once the owner of a small hamburger stand, beer and marijuana and I-don't-know-what-all had brought him down.

He'd live on the streets for a time, then sober up and work odd jobs before falling back on the bottle, Rescue Mission, Poverello House and eventually the street with the police telling him to "move on" a hundred times if they told him once.

The family wanted me to come to the funeral – I assumed to be a pallbearer – but I explained that I did not drive any-more and that at 84, was too old to carry my fair share of the casket and would likely breakdown and be an embarrassment.

"None of that matters," said the son, "and we'll pick you up and drive you home."

Of course I'd go, I said. old George was my true-blue and longtime friend.

I thought a lot about George while he stayed with me a day and a night. For one thing, I remember he was so hungry he ate six eggs, as many slices of toast and a dozen slices of bacon for breakfast. And he was in dire need of a shower, shave and toenail trim and had a couple of what appeared to be knife cuts that needed peroxide, Neosporin and bandaging.

George looked around the living room at my antiques – a Victor "His Master's Voice" wind-up phonograph, Regulator wall clock and old brass bird cage – with mild interest, but seemed enthralled standing in front of my book-case.

"Have you read all of these books?" he asked.

"Many I have, and others are for reference in my writing."

"Read me some poems," he said. "I haven't read or heard a poem since I was a kid."

I looked through my sparse collection and pulled out something I thought would interest him – "The Complete Poems of Robert W. Service" – and settled on "The Lone Trail" and "The Cremation of Sam McGee."

Actually, there's not much I'd rather do than read poems aloud. In fact, I do so often but rarely to an audience. People as a rule, I think, slough poetry off as oldhat stuff. Presently however, I reached for Robert Frost and read him "The Road Not Taken."

Old George looked at me and wept when I bellowed out the last verse in my best Garrigus manner:

I shall be telling this with a sigh Somewhere ages and ages hence; Two roads diverged in a wood, and I-I took the one less traveled by And that has made the difference. "I should have taken the other road," George admonished himself.

Well, it turned out that his family didn't want me to be pallbearer as I'd first thought, which had worried me because I've always been one to carry my fair share of a load. Rather, they wanted me to sit with the family and I probably wept as much or more as any of them.

As I watched Old George's casket lowered into the ground, I suddenly thought of Robert Frost's poem again and the line about "... two roads diverged in a wood ..." that so enthralled him. I'd never thought of it before, but either way, old George would have ended up here anyhow because the two roads eventually came to the same end.

And then it occurred to me that this is also that "on" place that police are continually telling street people to move to – but they won't be telling Old George that anymore.

# Grinch *Right* About Christmas?

"That's what it's all about, isn't it? That's what it's always been about! Gifts, gifts, gifts, gifts, gifts, gifts! You wanna' know what happens to your gifts? They all come to me – in your garbage. I could hang myself with all the bad Christmas neckties I found at the dump. And the avarice – the avarice never ends! 'I want golf clubs. I want diamonds. I want a pony so I can ride it twice, get bored and sell it to make glue!' Look, I don't wanna' make waves, but this whole Christmas season is stupid, stupid, stupid!" – the Grinch

None of us are as cynical as the Grinch but most of us do realize the absurdity of the commercialism that has become the "Christmas season." CNN reports that 54 per-

cent of Americans would like to spend less money than they did last year. CNN Money reports that it will take the average family until May to pay off holiday credit card debt. What should be the season where we stop and remember what is truly important, we more often get caught up in the commercialism of it instead. Gallup poles report that "... although

Christmas is among the holiest dates on the Christian calendar, there appears to be no relationship between one's depth of religious commitment and one's Christmas budget."

sales closed.

Carole White, Mortgage Consultant for California Home Loans and Ranchos resident expects, "Current market conditions will likely last another 6-12 months," White said. "Unfortunately this appears to be the tip of the iceberg as many people have gotten into some pretty bad loans over the past few years." Carole advises people to do their homework and shop for the right loan. The teaser rates advertised are rarely the best deals available and nobody can give you an accurate quote without knowing your particular situation and needs. "Check with family, friends or associates for referrals from people who've been satisfied with their lender," White said.

She also specializes in Reverse Mortgages which are gaining in popularity. "Under the right circumstances, these loans work beautifully," she said. White has many satisfied customers in these programs.

Congress recently passed legislation to create a standardized, Nationwide Mortgage Licensing System and Registry. The Mortgage Reform and Anti Predatory Lending Act of 2007 will standardize mortgage licensing requirements and will require additional educational requirements, criminal background checks and FBI fingerprint clearance for all licensees.

The Bush administration just announced a plan for a five-year freeze on mortgage rates for borrowers facing the threat of default on subprime mortgages. Many of these loans had initial rates of 7-8 percent and are scheduled to reset at much higher rates of up to 11 percent. This could add \$350 to the typical monthly payment of \$1,200. Under this

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freeze, rates would remain at the lower introductory rate for five years.

According to the framework, loans eligible for streamlined refinancing or modification such as an interest rate freeze must be an owner-occupied home with an adjustable rate mortgage loan that was originated between Jan. 1, 2005 and July 31, 2007, with an initial interest rate reset between Jan. 1, 2008 and July 31, 2010. Under the guidelines, only borrowers with FICO scores less than 660 facing an increase in monthly payments greater than 10 percent will be eligible for fast-track loan modifications. Borrowers who don't meet the "FICO test" may qualify for loan modifications after individual reviews of their current income and debt obligations.

"This is not a 'silver bullet' solution for all homeowners, but will help reduce the impact of the housing downtum on the economy and communities affected by foreclosures," said Treasury Secretary Henry Paulson.

Hopes are this plan will buy time for homeowners about to be forced out of their homes and as the housing market stabilizes and sales and prices rebound, homeowners with these frozen mortgage rates will have time to refinance into more affordable fixed loan rates.

Whether you qualify for this plan or not it's important to contact your lender immediately if you're having problems paying your mortgage to see what options you might have. Do not ignore the situation hoping it will get better or go away.

"This market is totally different than anything we've ever seen. It's definitely a buyer's market and a great time for first time homebuyers to purchase their first home," said Patty Grissom. "Interest rates are down so many people who may not have qualified for a loan earlier may very well qualify now."

# Asking Santa for an HD Big Screen? Right Questions Mean Right Choices

Pity the TV owner whose tube finally blows after 20 years. When he or she goes into the electronic superstore to replace the set, a whole new generation of shapes and sizes, not to mention a bewildering array of technologies from Plasma to LCD to DLP awaits. Terms that did not exist just a few years ago, such as HDMI, response time and full HD will be everywhere and a wall of TV's will cause the jaw to drop leaving nothing less than a feeling of being overwhelmed. Even veteran HDTV owners are sometimes a bit perplexed by the numbers and specs coming from the different marketers. Unfortunately, that is to the detriment of consumers who are confused over what they are actually getting.

LCD refers to Liquid Crystal Display, Plasma is a gas injected screen and DLP means Digital Light projection. Which one works best for you will be determined by the amount and type of lighting in your home and the size of your budget. The size of screen that will work best should be determined by the viewing distance. It is recommended that 2-3 times the width of the screen should be the distance back. As an example, if you have a 50-inch wide screen the seating should be at least 100 inches or almost 8  $\frac{1}{2}$  feet away from the TV.

The latest, must-have feature is 1080"p" which stands for "progressive" or the way the image is delivered in one fell swoop in 1/60th of a second. An "interlaced" image (as in 1080 "i") is painted as every other line each 1/30th of a second. Simply put, 1080p is better than 1080i. Just remember that a TV picture is only as good as the signal coming into it. The content providers – satellite, cable, or your own DVD player – all provide some sort of a signal into your TV. If you do some research and do not hesitate to ask some pointed questions you can get many years of enjoyment from your new HDTV.

One other thing, the picture you get is only half of the experience; sound quality is the other ... but that is a *whole* other matter.

The holidays have started and Christmas is just a few days away. What a busy year this has been! 2007 started with a shock, when our Superintendent Marilyn Shepherd decided to quit Golden Valley and move to Monterey Unified School District the first of the year. Golden Valley Unified was right in the middle of so many projects that I was worried but we hired an interim Superintendent named Vi Chuck who picked up the pieces and held us together until we were able to hire a new superintendent and I am pleased to say Sarah Koligian is doing a great job.

One of our biggest challenges this year was to finish negotiations with Castle and Cooke to build four elementary schools in their large development which will bring over 5,000 new students to Golden Valley. It only took 11 months of blood, sweat and tears to come to an agreement with them.

For my birthday this year my son Bob invited the family to come to his home in Carpinteria, a cute little beach town next to the Pacific Ocean. 4. Get out of the "Automatic Mode." It is easy for a majority of us to fall into this category. We get up at the same time, we do the same things and

I recently attended the California School Board Association's annual educational conference in San Diego with our Governing Board Members. The theme of the conference was appropriately titled, "Courageous Conversations and Our Community." It was an excellent conference with more workshop sessions offered than one could possibly attend. There were conference workshop strands covering several different strands such as Effective Governance, Finance and Facilities, Parent Involvement, Student Achievement, Student Wellness and Technology, just to name a few. Each day was filled with a myriad of educational topics that school districts, both small and large, are facing today in California. The conference was attended by approximately

3,000 school board members and superintendents throughout the state which made it a perfect venue for networking with others.

One of the highlights of the conference for me was listening to best-selling author, speaker, and teacher, Mark Salzman, who addressed us during the General Session. His presentation focused on his recently published book, True Notebooks - A Writer's Year at Juvenile Hall. Mr. Salzman's story focused on his experience as a volunteer writing teacher at L.A.'s Central Juvenile Hall, a lockup facility for violent teenage offenders, many of them charged with murder. What he found so moved and astonished him that he began to teach there regularly. The stories in his book captured the thoughts and emotions that these youth had experienced through their lives of crime and their lives behind bars. Through their verbal and written narratives, they expressed how they came to terms with their crime-ridden pasts and how they searched for a reason to believe in their future selves. The stories were insightful, comic, honest and tragic, but they were truly an example of how these youth were able to learn from their pasts through the redemptive power of writing.

One of the stories Mr. Salzman shared was of a young man by the name of Kevin. It really hit home with me as an educator and as a parent. Mr. Salzman frequently kept in touch with his students, even after they left the juvenile detention facility. Sometimes he heard back from them and sometimes he did not. In the case of Kevin, he had not heard from him for two years after he left the facility, until one day Kevin responded to him by sending Mr. Salzman the following poem, titled Dear Friend.

"Hello there old friend, at the moment I'm kind of down.

It seems as though this is the end. I haven't had the chance to see you around. I've been sitting here bereft, alone,

locked down.

But now I have a window and I see you every night.

Times are hard, but I'll be all right. Gun towers, barbed wire is all I see, no matter how far I travel, I glance up,

And there you'll be.

It's good to have a friend like you. At times you help me shine through.

I still have a long journey to go, But I'll be free again. I'll use the time to grow.

In not just one way, but all, There's a lot for me to learn. So I'm gonna start like a baby, with a crawl.

Though the road may seem long and far, eventually I'll make it, dear old friend, North Star."

The power of these words got me thinking about how we can make or break someone's world just through random acts of kindness, a thoughtful word, a friendly smile, a caring touch, or a listening ear. As educators, parents, grandparents and volunteers, we have a wealth of opportunities to make a difference and to positively impact children's lives by acting as that "North Star" for them. As we make our New Year's resolutions for 2008, I challenge you to think about how you can become a "North Star" in a child's life.

5. Change it up. Remember that often the criminal element studies their target very carefully and for some time. Take a different route, a different street; stop at a different coffee shop, etc. By changing your daily routine, you not only become unpredictable, you become a harder target and may even view the world in a different more refreshing and interesting way.

6. Look outside before you exit your house, auto or place of work.

7. Make sure house, office and car doors are LOCKED.

8. Be sure you have a cell phone in hand before leaving to a different location and that it's fully charged and in proper working order.

9. Contact someone and update them on your plans before leaving to a different location.

10. Make sure your car and home alarm systems are in good working order.

11. Walk with confidence, look around and make eye contact.

12. Be prepared to defend yourself.

13. Enroll in a REALISTICT selfdefense training program. HINT! HINT! DON'T WAIT UNTIL SOME-THING HAPPENS!
