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


LHS Plays in Div. V Championship

Ranchos Fire Shows Strain on System

A house fire on the morning of Dec. 7 at 35221 John Albert Drive in the Ranchos served to illustrate how thinly stretched fire services are for Southeastern Madera County.

Less than an hour earlier a house fire in Madera near Highway 99 and Avenue 17 was reported and was being fought when the call for the Ranchos fire came in. Although two Ranchos volunteers arrived on the scene within minutes of the call, since there was only one person manning each of the fire engines they were unable to aggressively attack the fire. A valuable water tender that was being used at the first fire couldn't be released to go to the Ranchos fire until the first fire was under control and, as a result, firefighters had to wait for a water tender to arrive from Coarsegold. In addition, firefighters had to pump water from neighboring swimming pools to try to control the Ranchos fire.

Resident Carrie Der Garabedian was not hurt in the fire.

Fire Safety: What's Hot, What's Not

Cal Fire wishes you and your family a safe holiday season and to enjoy the holiday season during the winter months, Cal Fire Madera/Mariposa/Merced Unit Chief Dale Hutchinson would like to remind you to be cautious with trees, lights, candles, ornaments, fireplaces and wood stoves. During this hectic time of year remember fire knows no holiday.

Do not dispose of fireplace and wood stove ashes until they are dead out. Heat can stay in ashes or coals for 3-7 days after your fire is out. Never place ashes or coals into paper bags or plastic containers. Always use a metal container to transport the ashes or coals to a safe place. Never place ashes or coals into a dumpster or trash can for disposal. They can and do start fires. If a dumpster stored under the eaves of your home or

near your apartment caught fire it could spell disaster for you and your family. The same could happen if your waste disposal truck caught fire in your neighborhood. Please use caution when disposing of hot ashes and coals.

Remember a dry Christmas tree will burn like a torch. Make sure your tree is fresh, re-cut the trunk at least one inch above the old cut as soon as you get it home. Keep the fresh cut end of the tree trunk in water. Never place your tree near a heat source. Check the water level in the Christmas tree stand daily. Never use old or frayed electrical cords on or near your tree. Never place candles on a Christmas tree. Promptly remove your tree after the holiday and dispose of properly.

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THE D.O.G. HOUSE DEMAND OPEN GOVERNMENT BY DALE DROZEN

I missed the Board meeting yesterday, Dec. 15, but popped in to watch a couple of issues online today. I saw Dan Francouer of Ahwahnee present the Board with a petition signed by 1,100 citizens asking the Board to replace the funding for Raymond and Ahwahnee winter fire protection.

I do not think it goes far enough.

All five Board members voted to cut the fire protection budget during the budget hearings. We should not simply be attempting to fund Raymond and Ahwahnee at the expense of another area. I believe Madera Ranchos was number two on the list of cuts, and with the current level of funding would see their staffing eliminated. It is time to end this B.S. of pitting citizens against citizens, fighting for their very lives. The problem was created when all five Board members voted to cut the Fire protection budget – that is where the solution must be found.

One of the issues on the agenda was a couple of Board members trying to block the rescinding of the vote to cut funding for Raymond and Ahwahnee winter fire protection.

This is typical of our Board's reaction to an issue.

A vote to rescind a previous vote requires a majority of the Board to vote for it. Rather than putting it on the agenda and allowing public scrutiny and comment the Board decided to change Robert's Rules of Order eliminating the Board's ability to correct a bad decision when a majority of the Board feels they made the wrong decision.

I received comments on a possible way to save money in our budget: Why not combine the Madera County Sheriff and the Madera County Corrections Departments? First some history.

Back in the 70's, when Ed Bates was Sheriff, he fought continually and publicly with the Board. As a result, in order to punish him, they took away the jail and created the Department of Corrections. This amounted to taking away more than 50 percent of the resources and budget of the Sheriff. They showed him!

I am told a statewide bill was passed soon after, preventing other than the existing Counties – Lake, Santa Clara and now Madera – from having this separation. It seems logical to have law enforcement and corrections under one roof and would surely eliminate some duplication in overhead and/or management services. It is well past time for the Board to get over their tantrum and put it back the way it should be. I hope this would include juvenile and the Probation Departments as well.

Unfortunately this would create two issues our Board would most likely object to. It would consolidate law enforcement under an elected official (the Sheriff) accountable to the citizens of Madera County rather than individual department heads serving at the pleasure of the Board. The other issue is that cuts would likely be in the area of management and overhead positions. To this point nearly all budget cuts implemented by the Board of Supervisors have targeted "boots on the ground" employees actually providing services to us taxpayers, sparing management and administrative functions.

Every now and then a DOG just needs to bark a bit.

This week [of Dec. 6] at the Board of Supervisors meeting the "Chair" decided, "We are not going to have public comment on this matter," just after the Board had appointed our new Auditor-Controller. California's open government laws require the public be given an opportunity to comment before or during the consideration of any issue.




The biggest thanks go out to you, the people of the Ranchos who have supported this little paper over the last five years. I really cannot thank you enough nor could I have done it without

Dear Editor:

Native American tribes face many obstacles in overcoming centuries of poverty, political disenfranchisement, and loss of traditional lands. But perhaps the most unfair barrier we face comes from wealthy gaming tribes using their political and financial powers to crush the economic aspirations of tribes such as ours in order to protect their own narrow economic inter-

Why are some wealthy tribes doing this? They don't want competition. In a pattern repeated across the nation, wealthy tribes are lining up against newcomer tribes to stall or derail legitimate gaming projects. Their tactics include media attack ads, strong-arming community groups to oppose new projects, and, of course, back room lobbying and political payoffs.

Recent attacks by the Chukchansi Economic Development Authority against the proposed North Fork Rancheria destination hotel and casino resort continue this trend. These inaccurate attacks jeopardize desperately needed local jobs, business opportunity, and community investment and perpetuate misinformation about tribes and tribal projects.

Chukchansi ads and direct mailers have twisted the history of the North Fork project beyond recognition. For instance, Chukchansi claims that our developer bought land in Madera and then "recruited" our tribe. In fact, our Tribe selected our developer—not the other way around—and then authorized them to secure an option for our proposed site.

Chukchansi would have you think we're ignoring an opportunity to build a casino on our own land or elsewhere in North Fork. This ignores the fact that our reservation is small, remote and owned by individuals and not by our Tribe. The Governor, the County, and the local community all agree that the tiny town of North Fork is not suited for commercial development of a casino and we therefore cannot acquire new land for gaming there.

Chukchansi also claims that our Tribe is somehow skirting the law. We aren't. Instead, we are following the precise process that Congress established in 1988 to provide tribes without a land base, such as North Fork, the same opportunity to engage in tribal governmental gaming that Chukchansi was afforded. This process is the only way left to us to develop economically so that we, like Chukchansi, can take care of our citizens and community at large.

Chukchansi's claim that allowing our project to proceed will open the floodgates

to off-reservation gaming does not square with the facts. Over the past two decades, only four of the roughly 325 tribes who operate casinos nationwide have qualified under the same process that we are following. Ours is only one of two such projects pending nationwide where the Governor has allowed the project to move forward by entering into a compact with the Tribe.

As we near final approval, you will hear other attacks by special interests desperate to maintain their economic advantage at any cost. These attacks may come directly from tribes or through hired local proxies or "independent" advocates receiving financial or political benefits from gaming tribes.

Such tactics undermine the economic prospects for our Tribe, Madera County, and consumers who fare better with more competition. They also tend to drown out more legitimate issues that may exist and stain the image of tribal gaming that has brought many benefits to tribes and local communities. We're confident that the people of Madera County will understand the source and motive behind such selfserving and counter-productive attacks.

The North Fork tribe has been and will remain good neighbors and citizens of Madera County. Our project is a result of careful planning with the local community, the County, and the State and will result in a project that will benefit us all without serious harm to Chukchansi or any other tribe's economic interest. Our mitigation steps will address any significant potential impacts of the project or legitimate concerns of our neighbors. If you look at the facts and beyond the distortions, we think you will agree with us and continue the unprecedented support of our project.

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Have you ever heard "It's sandwich weather" or "It's dessert weather"? I haven't either, but you probably have heard, "It's soup weather." It got below freezing a couple of nights and it has been raining off and on now for the past week, so it is definitely "soup weather."

Soup can be made with or without meat and just about any kind of vegetables. It can be made with water, stock or milk. Putting all that together, the possibilities are limitless.

After Thanksgiving there is always turkey soup, but you don't have to wait until the turkey is devoured and only the ugly bones are left. I'm not fond of cooking the carcass for soup anyway - it is just too much work. I'm always afraid of those little bones getting into the broth so we take as much meat off the bones as possible, toss the carcass and freeze the meat until time to make soup. If I were to use the bones, I would definitely strain the broth before using it.

This is my favorite way to make turkey soup without using the stock from the turkey carcass.

Turkey Soup

2 cans chicken stock 1 can (14.5 oz) diced tomatoes 1 16 oz. pkg. frozen mixed vegetables

Half medium onion – chopped 1 cup diced carrots

Couple of potatoes peeled and diced

½ cup alphabet or star macaroni 1 can cream style corn

Half small head of cabbage sliced & chopped

Leftover turkey pulled into small

Salt and pepper to taste

pieces

Pour the stock into a large soup pot. Add the tomatoes and mixed vegetables and the chopped onion. Add enough water to cover vegetables well. Add salt and pepper to taste. Bring to a boil and turn burner down to simmer for about 25 minutes. Add the carrots and simmer another 10 minutes before adding the potatoes. Taste to see if more salt &

pepper is needed. Add more water (or another can of stock) as you go to cover the vegetables well. Let this simmer until the tomatoes have broken down and the frozen vegetables have softened - this should take about 45 minutes to an hour. Turn the heat up to a low boil and add the macaroni. You should stir this because the macaroni tends to stick to the bottom of the pot. As soon as the macaroni is done, turn the fire back down to a simmer and add the cream corn, and the cabbage. When all this is cooked, add the turkey and simmer until the meat is hot.

I know you could throw everything into the pot all at once, but I feel it just tastes better cooked in layers. And remember, this is my recipe so I want you to personalize it as you like. I love cooked carrots, that's why I add additional carrots. If you or your family doesn't like something I have listed, don't use it. If you like something else - put it in. Another thing, if you don't have any leftover turkey use a couple of boiled chicken breasts. If you boil chicken for the soup, be sure to use that liquid in your soup instead of water.

We also had a ham for Thanksgiving. When most of the meat was trimmed off, I got the bone to make split pea soup. One of the simplest soups to make except you have to watch it closer than most as the peas have a tendency to stick.

Split Pea Soup

Ham Bone 1 lb. bag split peas Chopped Onion Chopped carrots Chopped, peeled potato Salt & Pepper

In a large pot boil the ham bone in plenty of water to cover. As it cooks, foam will form on the surface of the liquid; just spoon it off and discard. In another pot I put the peas that have been rinsed and picked through to take out any small rocks. I cover the peas with enough water to cover well and cook on a medium flame. Do not season at this point but be careful as they will stick if cooked too fast. When the ham bone has cooked for about 30 minutes take it out of the water and trim what meat may be left on the bone. Discard the bone and set aside the meat. In the

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

Spoonful of Ranchos Water Reality

A thousand mile march begins with one step!

It is as true a statement as anyone can make. But, if you are not prepared for it, your last step will not be at the end of a thousand miles, it may be into an ambulance on the way there.

The march I'm talking about is the march we "must" embark on, a march toward a spring with crystal clear water, a spring that will not stop flowing and will keep on giving, and a march to self preservation. As of today, we in the Ranchos are using more ground water than we have available. The ground water cannot be replaced fast enough and the ground water table is dropping. The ground water aquifer is just not sustainable at the current rate we are using it.

We, all of us, in an area I will describe as "The Ranchos," that is: the Madera Ranchos, Bonadelle Ranchos, Rolling Hills and people occupying the general proximity of Southeast Madera west of highway 41.

We are allowing the march to begin without us. "We are not ready!" We are not prepared.

Yes, we have enough headaches with today's economy and you don't need my preaching a sermon about things going from bad to worse. I'm not here to spread doom and gloom, today I'm dishing just "a spoonful of reality."

Well, friends and neighbors, I do have some very good news. It is not too late.

With just a little bit of energy, together we can do something about it and improve the Ranchos. But we need to do it together and we need to do it now.

The Situation

Let me explain what I'm talking about and the situation as it is. No politics, just a spoonful of reality. All of Madera's supervisors are hard at work. Personally do not envy any of them at all. I respect each and every one of them for the commitment they have taken upon themselves, enduring hours poring over details, discussions, arguments and listening to our complains, all the while knowing that sometimes it can be a thankless job because one can never do it all for

every person.

I'm talking about the IRWMP (Integrated Regional Water Management Plan). If you read my articles in the past, I promised you that you will hear that phrase over and over again because that is one of the doors to the preservation of the Ranchos - our preservation.

The program is run by the State as a carrot and a stick to try and help indirectly to create better water resources management. The carrot: Money, for improvement projects if you work toward regional water management integration and; The stick: No Money, if you don't! Leaving you in a worse state. The thought is to bring water management under more state control in my opinion, since you have to meet their criteria, but through the IRWMP we may be able to start correcting the folly of our water prob-

When I found out about the process that could provide the Ranchos with some state grant money and could help us with some of our problems I got excited and joined the IRWMP formation subcommittee. No one asked me, I just realized the need. That was the time when a spoonful of reality hit me between the eyes.

I was the only one in the room speaking on behalf of the Ranchos. The "Integrated Regional Water Management Plan" did not include, or Integrate, the "Ranchos Region." Why you might ask? Because we are not a part of a representing body that can qualify as a signatory to the agreement which would allow us to stand in line and submit a plan for the preservation of the Ranchos correcting some of our lingering problems. An individual is not able to represent a community; only through a community's representing body can that be achieved.

Yes, we are a part of Madera County and Madera County will be a signatory to the agreement, but there are other Madera communities which also need help and who do you help first? And where do you get the money to go through the needed process in a budget cutting environment?



One Solution



One way of controlling our destiny is by beginning the process and creating an organization, representing the different parts of the Ranchos to carry on the torch of self preservation. This body would be able to become a signatory to the IRWMP agreement now ready to be signed by several water management districts, community representing bodies, City of Madera, City of Chowchilla and Madera County. Signing the agreement will mean that if we have a potential solution for a water related problem in our area, we could submit it for a review and apply for a grant to implement it. We would still have to get in line along the other projects submitted, but we will have an opportunity we do not have now.

As a matter of fact, we already have the beginnings of it through a framework of such a structure. We are in the process of identifying individuals who live in the Ranchos that would be willing to become a part of the effort and help improve the future of our community. It is a process which must come out of and through our community. We have to elect a board of directors of people from our community. Divine Opportunities Grow Out of a Divine Birth and a Divine Life

This is how the birth of Jesus Christ came about: His mother Mary was pledged to be married to Joseph, but before they came together, she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Because Joseph her husband was a righteous man and did not want to expose her to public disgrace, he had in mind to divorce her quietly. But after he had considered this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because what is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins." All this took place to fulfill what the Lord had said through the prophet: "The virgin will be with child and will give birth to a son, and they will call him Immanuel" --which means, "God with us." When Joseph woke up, he did what the angel of the Lord had commanded him and took Mary home as his wife. -- Matthew 1:18-

Taking advantage of the opportunities that God gives us to change the world can sometimes be challenging. In our Christmas story the bible reports that Joseph's fiancé, the Virgin Mary, was with child. It is not reported how Mary broke the news to Joseph. Can you imagine the difficulty Joseph was facing? Perhaps there are some who can understand the resistance that Joseph must have been experiencing. Joseph had a predicament on his hands and his first inclination is to send Mary away quietly. But Joseph's God had a different idea. In the middle of a difficult situation God gives Joseph a chance to serve the Gospel of Jesus

The angel tells Joseph in effect, "Go ahead and take this God-given opportunity to take Mary as your wife." I wonder how many people in ancient Israel or even in our times would be able to say "yes" to God over an issue as personal and difficult as this issue confronting Joseph.

My family and I have a very dear friend who is an ex-bank robber. Many years ago, our friend was arrested for robbing a bank. He robbed it the old fashioned way with a gun – not like today where banks seemed to be robbed by risky investments. Anyway, he was quickly arrested and then convicted and sentenced to a long incarceration. In his first days in prison he was struggling with selfcentered fear and anger. Through a series of prison experiences he felt called to become part of a prison ministry at his institution. He reported that everything in him resisted that call and he fought the feeling to turn his life over to the care of God. He had lived a "selfwilled run riot" way of life that did not include serving Jesus as Lord and Savior. God had given him an unwelcome opportunity through his prison sentence to say "yes" to God. His "yes" to God's opportunity changed his life and many other people's lives. Since his release from prison long ago, he has served God in powerful ways with his Christian ministry to at-risk youth and to adults suffering from alcoholism and drug addiction. His "yes" to God didn't feel good at first, but it was a divine opportunity that changed many lives.

The gospel says that Jesus was born in a manger because there was no place for his parents to stay. How many inns and how many places did Mary and Joseph go to before they ended up in the manger? Can you imagine missing an opportunity of giving the Son of God a place to be born? Every time we walk away from an opportunity that God gives us, we are holding not only ourselves back, but also we are resisting the Kingdom of God. Perhaps you can think back to the time when you said "no" to an opportunity God gave you. Was it with a ministry in the church? Were you afraid that God didn't give you enough skills to do the job? Was it with a relationship? Did you think that positive relationships in life weren't possible? Joseph was given a divine opportunity and he took advantage of it. Maybe Joseph was afraid, or angry or maybe he was tired, but he put that aside, and took advantage of the opportunity God gave him.

One of the lessons of this Gospel of Jesus Christ is that divine opportunities don't always feel good. But every time we say "yes" to opportunities that God gives us, the Kingdom of God advances. We live in a land of opportunities. But we also live in a universe of divine opportunities and we have a God of unlimited opportunities. Unlimited opportunities to serve the Gospel of Jesus, just like Joseph. For those who follow Christ or for those who are looking into the idea of Jesus Christ, there are at least three divine opportunities to take advantage of right now: 1.) Make a commitment to the community gathered around Jesus. Get involved with your faith community. Your faith community is one of the places where Jesus Christ is alive and has form. 2.) Take personal responsibility in the stewardship of life in the kingdom of death by honoring your baptism. If you are not baptized, seek baptism in the Name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. As followers of Christ, we have an opportunity to carry a message of Hope. Share your blessings! 3.) Take advantage of every opportunity to love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and to love your neighbor as yourself.

This Christmas season, I propose that all of us take advantage of the opportunities God gives us. We should learn from Joseph. It seemed counterintuitive to him at first, but taking advantage of the opportunity God gave him was his best move. Make your move this Christmas: say "yes" to God's opportunities in your life!

broth from the ham, put the onion, carrots and potato and a little salt and pepper. Cook only until the vegetables are done. As soon as the peas are soft, drain any excess water and pour the peas into the pot with the vegetables and add the ham. Simmer until peas are completely softened and soup is thick. Check for seasoning. I've read that you shouldn't salt the peas when they are first cooking as it will make them tough. Don't know how true that is, but I've always waited until they are cooked to add salt just in case it is true.

Don't Forget Dessert

What would a soup dinner be without dessert? I'm leaving you with one of our family's favorite. When my niece Eryn, who lives in southern California, is planning to come for a visit she will call my sister and in the conversation will say, "Grandma, will there be Republican Dessert?" Well of course there will be. We asked one time why they call it Republican Dessert – the answer was "It's so rich, the Democrats can't afford it."

Republican Dessert

1 C flour

1 stick margarine – softened ½ C Chopped nuts

Mix together like pie dough and press into bottom of 9x13 pan. Bake for 10 minutes in preheated 350 oven.

18 oz. pkg. cream cheese

1 C. Powdered sugar

1 large container Cool Whip

Cream together the cream cheese and powdered sugar. Fold in the container of cool whip. Put on top of cooled crust and freeze.

2 small pkgs. Instant chocolate pudding mix.

2½ C milk

Mix pudding mix and milk as directed on package but do not add any more milk. Spread over second layer and freeze.

1 small container Cool Whip

Spread this over the pudding layer and freeze. If desired, toasted coconut can be sprinkled over the top.

GVUSD Bus Route Changes

Due to the State of California budget crisis, public schools are sustaining drastic cuts in funding that should be allocated by the state. Golden Valley Unified School District has been assessing the impacts of reduced funding district wide and is making every effort to minimize the affects to the classroom. One of the areas directly affected is "Home-To-School" transportation. Historically, transportation costs have encroached on the "General Fund," meaning the allotment provided by the state does not cover the costs of



operation. In addition, transportation funding recently received an additional 20 percent reduction in state funding.

In an effort to provide the best service possible for our students, Golden Valley Unified is implementing the revised board policy regarding "Home-To-School" transportation effective Jan. 11, 2010. The new route design allows for more efficient routes and less ride-time for students. Bus stops will now be geographically located to accommodate new walking distances;





Then a few get up to speak, either at the time for open public comment of during the Board's deliberation on an agenda item, but more often than not they decide to just listen. As citizens leave I try to thank them for coming down to participate, and ask them to come back to future meetings, unfortunately their response is often:

"Why?"

"It's a waste of time."

"What we say doesn't matter."

"They are not even listening to us."

I wish the camera would show the Board instead of the speakers during comments. There is seldom a time when at least one of the Board members are not reading something or shuffling papers as the citizens comment. Frequently a majority of the Board are reading, shuffling papers, texting, answering emails, or searching the internet as a debate is in progress, while testimony or comments are being presented. Occasionally supervisors will even leave the room in the middle of comment or testimony, then return and vote on issues based on only the portion of the testimony they were actually listening to.

Each supervisor has a "button" on their computer screen they push when they want to be called on or be recognized by the chair. I can't remember a meeting where at least once a supervisor wasn't recognized by the chair because he had pushed the button on his commuter

screen, only to respond with, "I am prepared to make the motion when you are ready." This statement usually comes in the middle of debate or even before "PUBLIC COMMENT" has even begun. He might as well have stood up and thumbed his nose at the citizens gathered to speak.

Imagine if a juror was to stand up in the middle of a trial and announce they were ready to vote before all testimony was heard or while witnesses were speaking.

The proceedings would end. A mistrial would be declared instantly. What message is sent when a supervisor says he is not only ready to vote but is prepared to make the motion before citizens have had an opportunity to even be heard on the matter?

The most recent issue to compel citizens to exercise their constitutional rights to participate in their government has been the de-staffing of the Raymond and Ahwahnee Fire Stations this winter. These people are pleading to have their lives and property protected. Many of the speakers had driven for over an hour to get to the meeting, only to be insulted by the indifference and inattention of some of the Board members in response to their concerns.

This is not simply a matter of poor manners or hurt feelings; the issue has already been heard by the courts and decided. Rulings by governing bodies have been set aside because they were not truly listening to testimony. It has been decided by the courts that the intent of open government laws are in fact not only so we have the right to speak but also that we have the right to actually be listened to; we have the right to actually have the attention of the Board as we exercise our right to comment.
