"Road Wars" Sides Being Drawn: Ranchos Wants Ave. 9; Co. says No

Almost 70 Members of the Ranchos community met with representatives of Madera County's various governmental arms on Wednesday, Feb. 13 at the Ranchos Pizza Factory to discuss possible solutions for the onslaught of traffic that planners say is heading straight for the Ranchos.

"You're going to see a whole lot of traffic on Avenue 12," said Ray Beach, manager of Madera County's Resource Management Agency. "Growth is going to occur but it doesn't have to destroy the Ranchos."

Although Ollia Ridge, president of the Golden Valley Chamber of Commerce that sponsored the Town Hall meeting, called for civility at the beginning of the meeting, several community members raised their voices, interrupted and spoke over other

people at the meeting who were trying to get their questions answered. A contentious air hung over the course of the meeting.

" W e have created the problem on Avenue

Avenue 12 Becomes a Limited Expressway

12," said District 1 Supervisor Frank Bigelow. "By closing down Nees-Palm [on the Fresno side of the San Joaquin River], Fresno had plans to bring the road across the river but we shut it down."

The mood changed quickly as community members became adamant about keeping Avenue 12 a two-lane road through the heart of the Ranchos.

"Why can't we start Avenue 9?" asked Velvet Car Wash owner Chet Selmon. His question was the overwhelming consensus of the night. Speaker after speaker stressed that if Avenue 9 were developed into a major east-west corridor of at least six lanes, the traffic on Avenue 12 would disappear. Most drivers from Fresno looking for a fast access to Highway 99 are using Avenue 9 now, although it's not designed to handle such heavy traffic.

"Avenue 9 is not happening," said Bigelow, much to the disappointment of the crowd. Bigelow explained that the only money available for the development of Avenue 9 would have to come from matching funds from development. "Have you seen any development on Avenue 9?" he asked.

At present, from a myriad of sources, there is money for the development of Avenue 12 at Highway 41 from Castle & Cooke and for development of Avenue 12 at Highway 99 from state funds. Bigelow also said there were funds to begin work in

the Ranchos on a bypass.

What has many community members concerned is that according to the General Plan that was created in 1995 for the Ranchos, the

county has the right to make Avenue 12 a four lane tomorrow and a six lane after acquiring additional property to which the county lays claim.

"It's going to be about 18 months before we move on any of this," Ray Beach said. Beach further stressed that he wants to hear from the residents of the Ranchos before the county takes final


Additional Town Hall meetings are planned for the future.

Greg Parker, Principal Planner with PG&E, addressed a group of approximately 60 people including a number of PG&E representatives and concerned Ranchos citizens at the Ranchos Pizza Factory on the afternoon of Feb. 20. The meeting addressed potential expansion of PG&E's electrical transmission infrastructure to meet customers' growing demand but was also a response to residents who said they knew nothing of PG&E's plans.

After a member of PG&E's legal staff commented that they had "... reached out to this group and the community by having this meeting," landowner Igal Treibatch took exception to the comment. "PG&E did not reach out to me!" Treibatch said. "The effort of this group is the direct result of one letter I received. I'm not inclined to wait until the recommendation has been made and it's too late to have input on the issue so I put pressure on PG&E to have this meeting." Treibatch went on to say that those present were fully aware of how harshly some Madera Ranchos residents have been treated in past dealings with the PG&E decision making process. "Hard working people have been taken advantage of by PG&E," he

Representatives from PG&E insisted they worked from property ownership records, however Greg Parker offered to meet personally with any landowner who would like a private analysis of how their property could be affected by this proposal. He can be reached at (800) 422-0841. PG&E states they began notifying property owners of this project by mail in October 2007. They estimate they've sent out 2,500 notifications to property owners and to others within a quarter mile to a half mile of the project corridor. This struck a nerve with many attendees who insisted they'd only heard about this project and meeting only by word of mouth within our community. Attendees requested a copy of property owners and others within the corridor so that those who'd been missed could be advised of future meetings. PG&E declined to release such a list, citing confidentiality concerns.

Attendees also questioned the accuracy

of planning maps PG&E displayed at the meeting. It was pointed out that there are several filed development plans in the Ranchos that are not outlined on their planning maps. This includes the proposed total bypass of Avenue 12. PG&E insists they'd worked directly with the planning commission but that any omissions need to be brought to their attention. This brought the discussion full circle since there are no maps of PG&E's proposed route available to the public.

The Western route proposed by PG&E would directly affect residents and property values in the Madera Ranchos. This route is estimated to be 170 miles long and passes near Harris Ranch, crossing Avenue 7 and the San Joaquin River then hooks up to the existing Helms Gregg substation. This project includes two 500 kilovolt transmission towers that would stand between 10-16 stories high and is expected to cost between \$800 Million to \$1 Billion. Costs will vary depending on the route chosen and costs associated with the potential corridors.

Questions to PG&E regarding any known health hazards with these very powerful power 500v lines went unanswered.

"This is real early in the process and residents shouldn't be too concerned about their opportunity to voice their concerns," said Jeff Smith, spokesman for PG&E. Although PG&E will be making their recommendation to the CPUC in April 2008, the PUC will have public hearings before finalizing their decision. They may accept the recommendation or they may offer an alternative one.

Although informative, the meeting left the group with more questions than answers.

"Take us with a grain of salt, but take us seriously as this group will get larger and stronger," Treibatch said. He warned that if this project is placed in the Ranchos "... a community vastly different that what we have today will be created".



Board of Supervisors. Interesting Board meeting.

The consent calendar once again was used as the Trojan Horse to smuggle the goodies by the citizens.

Item "D" was a letter from the Board giving their

support to the choice of the sixth street location for the new Courthouse. I got myself in trouble for misquoting Chairman Dominici so I will just paraphrase instead of quoting. This is what I got from the meeting:

The Board claimed the "Committee" only gave them three locations to pick from.

I wonder how that happened. The Committee was made up of Dominici (from the City), a city councilman, (the same one that made the pitch that got our \$3.2 million last year), someone from the city's redevelopment agency, two judges, three people from the Court administration office that were here from out of town to get suggestions and the County CAO.

Let's see how this figures out: Two unbiased Judges; Two out of town Court admin people; One representative from the County and three from Madera city. Gee I wonder why all three sites were in Madera city? Out voted again!

Then several Supervisors: "If we (the Board) don't send this letter in support of the sixth street location the courts will think we don't want it and give the money to somebody else."

That one reminds me of a scam a used car salesman used on me. BUT what the heck it is a lot like is the story that two of the supervisors sucked up about how the cities were going to take their trash to Fresno if we didn't lower the prices for them. Max Rodriguez at least had the integrity to say he thought the location next to the jail seemed like the logical choice but he would vote for the sixth street location because it would help the city's downtown.

It looks like the city will get the Courthouse downtown (the elevator) and the County will get the bill for security and transporting prisoners back and forth from the county jail forever (the shaft). I am starting to see a pattern here.

Losing the battle to put the courthouse in the most logical spot bothers me. What is however most troubling is the appearance that there was this obvious behind the scenes planning and maneuvering to come up with the prearranged position. It is truly amazing how skillful some in our government have become at letting us see, and hear only what they believe is good for us to see or hear. Permitting us to think we are participating in decisions, after and only after the issue has been maneuvered to a position where there is only one choice.

It looks like it was out of our hands all along from the selection of the committee, through the selection of the three site choices, through it passing at the meetings, up to and including the Board's decision to send the support letter. When Supervisor Dominici was put on the Committee back in September I asked him for contact information and if the meetings were public and I was told that it was not subject to the Brown Act and not public.

This is what I think happened:

The committee was first stacked with members from the City of Madera. Three sites were put forward. Two were in areas with obvious plans to be developed as lucrative commercial enterprises and the third was an area that the city wants to invigorate (drive out the folks that are there). The meetings were held. Property owners from the three sites and selected individuals were invited.

Here is where the big surprise comes in.

The folks that were from the two rejected sites put up an organized and logical objection to the selection of their property.

What a marvelous show it must have been for the two judges and the three representatives from the Courts administration Office.

Let's pick door number three! The Sixth Street site.

Like the landfill fee issues, this only became open to the public after all

I am writing to tell you how grateful I am to live in a community that is more than willing to give to people in need. Last May I discovered a needy family living almost in my own back yard that I was completely unaware of. My children had occasionally mentioned them to me, but I guess I wasn't paying attention caught up in my own hamed world of raising eight children.

Speaking of eight children, it just so happened that this family also had eight children.

But as I got to know them better and their situation, I realized how much they needed help. Especially for the children. Some of them had been in trouble and I really didn't want that trickling down to the younger ones, who made up the largest part of the family.

At first I ran home and told my children to go gather up what they didn't use in their closets. I'll never forget how the nine year old boy hugged those clothes when we delivered them. I knew we couldn't afford to help this family on our own so I turned to my friends. Twenty-two families agreed to donate used and new school items. I drive an Excursion and delivered four huge loads to this family just for school.

In the course of my visits I discovered a 15-year-old boy who wasn't going to school. I asked him why and he explained the circumstances. His mother showed me his GP.A. when he had attended school, and just so you know, the boy is smaaaaammt. So I began driving him to school. From September to December he received straight A's and had a 3.83 GP.A. In the meantime, I discovered the family hadn't had hot water for two years. A kind neighbor fixed it for them. Three of their windows are broken, which makes it very cold in the winter and we are still working on how to solve that problem.

Then I found out they had never had a Christmas tree and I knew all of those children would wake up to nothing on Christmas day. I didn't want to place the burden on the same people's shoulders over and over, so I thought a classified ad might do the trick.

I put the first ad in the Ranchos Independent in October. One sweet lady called right away and had all of her Christmas gifts bought, wrapped and delivered. She knows who she is and may God bless her forever and ever.

Then I heard nothing. I was beginning to get nervous that there would only be the one donation. But it wasn't! In December things really started jump-

ing and when the sparkle and glitter of generosity settled a husband and wife had donated a beautiful live fresh Christmas tree and even came and set it up for them. And many people donated nine cases overflowing with canned food, a turkey, a harn and large gifts for each individual. There were large family gifts, candy and oranges for stocking stuffers, and \$705 to buy additional gifts.

The pile just kept getting bigger and bigger, and my little children's eyes kept getting bigger and bigger as more and more things were delivered to our home for this family. They asked why they couldn't have some of those toys too. I wanted them to learn what it felt like to give instead of receiving all of the time, but a twinge of sadness pricked my heart, because I knew this year my own children would wake up to nothing on Christmas day. Some things had come up unexpectedly and so I had warned the older kids there would be no Christmas. We've always had nice Christmases, so this announcement startled and surprised them.

I whispered to my five year old, "How would you like to be Santa this year?" and he smiled in delightful agreement. So silently we went on Christmas Eve tip toeing into the living room of this family's house and carefully placing each gift in a pile for each person. Their stocking with name attached left sitting nicely in front. Then we quickly, silently slipped away back to our house.

You are probably wondering if my own children woke up to nothing on Christmas day, and the answer to that is no! A few days before Christmas a miracle occurred. One of the people donating came by to bring a turkey they were donating, which was in addition to the money they had already donated. I wasn't home, but when I arrived my husband informed me this person had brought two turkeys and said one was for us. And that she brought a Christmas card she said I was to open alone when I got home.

So I went and sat alone in my room and opened the card. It said the gift inside was only for the beautiful children in my home and there inside was \$400. Alone I wept, for the depths of my soul had been touched by the spirit of more Christ on Christmas. A spirit which continued to fan the dying embers of my faith back to light.

Many times in my quiet contemplations I have pondered over the series of events that have transpired


KIWANIS KORNER

Book Recommendations







During this "month of love" I want to share with you a few fast facts about expressing love to your kids. Moms usually do this more naturally than dads, so Dads pay attention and be a man. Learn how to express love to your kids and make it a regular part of their life.

Fast Facts about showing love to your kids

The first five minutes you spend with your child are always the most important. Those focused moments together can set the tone for the rest of the morning, afternoon or evening. Smile, give your child a word of encouragement and a hug. Slow down and don't multi-task for that brief period of time.

The National Longitudinal Study of Adolescent Health surveyed 11,572 teenagers and discovered that the four most important times of the day for parents to interact with their children are:

early morning

after school

dinnertime

bed time

Find ways to connect with your kids as a family during those times.

The same researchers discovered that the three most important feelings for moms and dads to convey to their children (in order to protect them from unhealthy emotional pressure) are:

warmth

love

caring

If your son or daughter feels a deep sense of connection and bonding with you, you've made a world of difference in his or her life!

During the month of February and every other month, focus on showing love to your kids. Many adolescent problems can be navigated well with heavy doses of love from mom and dad. Love much and live well. Remember, because God has loved us greatly we can love others greatly. It begins at home.







The 45 day clock is ticking since Governor Schwarzenegger declared a "fiscal emergency" in California in January 2008. The Governor's Budget reflects a deterioration in current-year revenues and a weakening California economy for 2008-09. In addition, the state has failed to close its structural

The Best Way to Weather California's Fiscal Crisis? Plan for the Worst, but Always Hope for the Best

Budget gap, compounding the fiscal challenges for the 2008-09 Budget. The Governor's Budget proposed numerous reductions to current-year expenditures, including reducing funding under Proposition 98 by \$400 million.

What is Proposition 98?

- Voters passed Prop. 98 almost 20 years ago to ensure our students and schools have a minimum funding guarantee and reaffirmed their support during the 2005 special election. Any proposal to suspend Prop. 98 undermines the will of the voters to fund our schools.
- A state budget proposal that cuts funding to schools is not a real solution because it does not address California's underlying problem of inadequate and unstable revenue sources. Prop. 98 was designed to protect our students from instability so they have the reliable resources they need to learn and succeed.

The 2008-09 proposed budget cuts

for California schools total \$4.8 billion reduction is no longer funded in grades which would severely damage the quality of education in our state, forcing school districts to lay off teachers and support staff already working in overcrowded classrooms in some districts.

Statewide statistics show that a \$4.8 billion budget cut is equivalent to the following:

- Laying off more than 107,000 teachers
- Cutting more than \$24,000 per classroom
- · Reducing per-student spending by more than \$800
- Laying off over 137,000 bus drivers, janitors, food service workers, maintenance workers and other education support professionals
- Increasing class sizes statewide by as much as 35%

What could these proposed budget cuts force Golden Valley Unified to do?

• Issue layoff notices to some teachers in the event that class size K-3. Class sizes in these grades could increase up to 34 students.

- Reduce support staff
- Reduce per student spending by approximately \$200/student
- Reduce school and district operating budgets by approximately

Our hope is that the proposed budget cuts for education will be seriously and thoughtfully reviewed before any legislative action is taken. Our students did not create this budget crisis and their education should not be ransomed to save it with proposals that don't just mortgage their academic futures, but amount to a foreclosure of hope for generations of families. We will do our best to weather this storm, planning for the worst but hoping for the best. Your voices as concerned parents and community members could make a difference.

What can we do to have our voices hear in Sacramento? Call on our Governor and Legislators to notify them that California should put our students first. Reject the across-the-board cuts that would damage our public schools and protect the voter-approved minimum school funding law, Proposition 98. Following is a format for a sample letter if you are interested in writing to our Legislators:

Dear (LEGISLATOR),

I'm a (PARENT) of a student at (SCHOOL NAME) here in (CITY NAME), and I'm very concerned about how the Governor's proposed \$4.8 billion education funding cuts will impact our local schools. These cuts are equivalent to \$24,000 less for every classroom, or increasing class sizes by more than a third.

I know first-hand how important class sizes are to improving student learning, and I don't want to see us turn back the clock on our kids' education. Smaller classes have helped my child excel in math and reading, and to deny that opportunity to other students would be a terrible mistake.

Voters passed Proposition 98 twenty years ago to ensure a minimum funding guarantee for our schools. Over the years, we've reaffirmed our support for this law. It's time for the politicians to listen to the voters and stop trying to siphon money away from our students.

I want to urge the Legislature to reject the Governor's proposed budget cuts for education and invest in California's future.







of the debates and decisions were already made. Yesterday the Board said we have to do this or we will lose the money. Then we were permitted our right to comment.

I don't think this is the voice our founding fathers had in mind.

I don't think this is the public comment the writers of the Brown Act and our state constitution had in mind either.

I believe the intent of the writers was to have our comments actually be a part of the decision making process rather than a formality at the end of a forgone conclusion.

Further Items

Item "H" isn't very interesting by itself, but if you want to see what county employees make there are 99 pages of backup that gives the salaries. Some are very interesting reading.

Item "5" was Appropriating Unanticipated Revenue of \$900,000. One might be confused about how you don't anticipate that much revenue, until you read a bit deeper and find out it is a loan.

Item "6" is the beginnings of developing a Habitat Conservation Bank Committee. This one is going to be a bit hard to explain, and may be even harder to live with. Let's say you are building a road. It needs to go through a vernal pool (mud puddle). To be able to pave over your mud puddle you need to buy another one (mud puddle) someplace else and promises to keep it safe and happy forever (conserve). Or you can pay somebody that

For every tree we cut down we need to plant three to replace it someplace else where they can grow and be happy.

I am not sure where all of this will stop. When will mold become a protected organism? If you have moldy cheese in your fridge you will have to either let it be or you can throw it away if you pay someone that maintains a mold conservation bank to keep a mold colony just like yours to make up for the one you removed.

We have set aside millions of acres of public lands, wilderness areas, parks. None of that counts. We have to create the conservation banks on private lands. At what point will there be no private land left, or is that the real goal? Or could it be some enterprising opportunists finding a new way to fill the old pork barrel with money from these new and ridiculous regulations?
