Dog Death Stuns Ranchos/Aug. • Sometime in the night between July 31 and Aug. 1, a well-cared-for Border Collie was hanged in a tree on the outskirts of the Ranchos. To date there have been no leads, no clues, no suspects, no reliable tips - nothing. And no owner has ever come forward looking for a missing, well-cared-for Border Collie. Why?

Superintendent Shepherd Quits/Dec. • After only 3 1/2 years at the helm of the Golden Valley Unified School District and without warning, Dr. Marilyn Shepherd announced she was taking a similar position with Monterey Unified on the coast. She said they came looking for her and we wish her the best ... but she could have said "no."

Measure "S" Passes/Jun. • A \$70 million school bond measure was added to every homeowner's plate with the passage of "S". Needing 55 percent of the vote to pass, 57 percent said "yes" to create the funding to complete projects within the Golden Valley School District. There were detractors to the bond measure but ultimately 1,193 voters was all it took to pass.

LHS Ends "Dream" Season/Nov. • After battling all season and losing only one game to Firebaugh, the Liberty High Hawks dominated other teams as they rolled on to a nearly perfect season. As fate would have it in the playoffs, the only team that stood between them and a shot at the Division V Championship was Firebaugh, who awoke in the second half and stunned everyone.

Teddy to the Rescue!/Jun. • Right out of a Lassie script, the Williams' family dog Teddy knew something wasn't right that night on June 6. He started acting like the house was on fire ... because it was. He alerted the whole family to the danger and everyone got safely out of the house. Good timing too because in a matter of minutes the heavy tile roof came down, crushing everything in the house.

Rock Quarry Approved/Sep. • After some contentious meetings involving neighbors to the project at Road 209 and 406 just northeast of the Ranchos, the Madera County Planning Commission voted unanimously in favor of the Madera Ranch rock quarry. Next up will be the Board of Supervisors for approval. With the heavy "not in my backyard" sentiment of the opposition, it is still not a done deal.

Ranchos Molester Charged/Jan. • A convicted child molester and registered sex offender was found with a 14-year-old girl from Fresno in his Ranchos home and was promptly brought up on charges. It brought into focus that we're not 100 percent safe anywhere, not even in our beloved Ranchos. The story made me (and others) hug our kids a little tighter and increase our vigilance.

Ranchos Drug Raid/Apr. • After the child molester how could it get worse? Try a drug raid at a Bonadelle home that netted methamphetamine, marijuana and a weapon. Most startling was the house's location: centered almost exactly equidistant from all four of our local schools. What a convenient location that I'm sure was purely coincidental. 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GVUSD Selects Interim Superintendent

Retired Firebaugh District Superintendent Temporarily Fills Shepherd Vacancy

To fill the vacuum created by the sudden departure of Golden Valley Unified School District Superintendent Dr. Marilyn Shepherd, the GVUSD Board of Trustees has moved to hire an Interim Superintendent. After multiple candidate interviews, the Board has selected Violet Chuck to serve while the Board searches for the next Superintendent. An executive search firm will be selected by the Board in February to recruit for the position.

"She is very excited to serve in this role," said Shepherd. "Her experience and strong leadership qualities will be a real asset to Golden Valley during this time while the Board searches for the next Superintendent."

Chuck is already in the District and is working through a transition plan developed by her and Shepherd, timed to coincide with Shepherd's departure on

Chuck spent 36 years in education in California, ultimately retiring from the Firebaugh – Las Deltas Unified School District as the District Superintendent. It was after her retirement that she formed the non-profit Educare Services, Inc. with two other educators to provide state-subsidized preschool programs to families in the Central Valley who couldn't afford fee-based preschools. Her organization now operates 10 preschool sites in Fresno and Kings County.

River Restoration Bill Reintroduced

Historic Legislation Reintroduced on First Day of Legislation, Demonstrates Enthusiasm among Members of Congress

Bipartisan legislation was reintroduced in both houses of Congress on Jan. 4, the first day of the legislative session, authorizing the U.S. Department of the Interior to implement an historic agreement to restore water flows on the

San Joaquin River below Friant Dam. The legislation, which was initially introduced on Dec. 6, 2006, did not

come to a vote in either house in the last session but was quickly reintroduced on the 4th in virtually the same language.

Identical versions of the "San Joaquin River Restoration Settlement Act" were introduced in the Senate and House by California Senators Dianne Feinstein and Barbara Boxer, and Representatives George Radanovich, Grace Napolitano, Dennis

> Cardoza, Jim Costa and George Miller. The bills' sponsorship shows overwhelming bipartisan support for undertak-

ing one of the West's largest river restoration efforts, according to the Natural Resources Defense Council (NRDC) and Friant Water Users Authority (FWUA). The legislation Please see **RIVER** on P. 9

School Board Stumbles with "Pro"

requirements of just "good P.R." The projects that these guys build are world-class. Go on the Internet and check some of them out. Go visit the Bakersfield property and talk to people down there an see what they have to say about Castle & Cooke.

They're not only world-class, they're

They don't do things that reflect negatively on the communities that they build that's *not* a good selling point.

So for 12 years we've had this good neighbor who's been open and above board about what they do and how they do it. Eight years ago they helped get Golden Valley Unified School District off the ground because they believed local ownership of the schools made for better stewardship of the schools. 
great prizes, great fun ... the whole thing's, well, GREAT! If you need more info call Bob Munier at 645-7226.



only one song, "Daddy Won't Buy Me a Bow-Wow," and folks quickly grew tired of listening to it. The band was down to a drummer who had misplaced his hearing aid and either played so loudly he all but drove us out of the room or so softly nobody could hear him.


Tony took care of the entire situation, his fee was very reasonable and to us he was Santa Claus for sure and indeed a Good Samaritan.



New Adult fiction: For One More Day written by Mitch Albom. "Have you ever lost someone you love and wanted



Benetto who after years of regret, alcohol abuse, and attempted sui-



At first he assumes he is just hallucinating, but as he begins to talk to his mother and actually hugs her, he realizes it is something greater. This is an opportunity to talk with her as he was never able to do before. What a wonderful story with all the drama and poignancy of real life. This author also wrote The Five People You Meet in Heaven and Tuesdays With Morrie.

Adult non-fiction: A Walk in the Woods by Bill Bryson. If you enjoy a good laugh while you are learning a little about nature, history, politics and real life events, then I highly recommend this book. Bryson and his friend Stephen Katz set out to walk the entire Appalachian Trail – all 2100 miles of it. It's been done before

by a significant number of people, with some hiking in segments and some hiking all in one trek. Most hikers however l e a v e REPRESENTATION OF THE APPLICATION THAT the trail after a short way usually say-

ing something like, "It wasn't like I thought it would be," often because they were ill prepared or uninformed about the difficulties of the trail. 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
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January 2007 **Senior Property Tax Rebates** Can be Researched for Free

Sheriff John Anderson is issuing The letter targets not only seniors but an immediate warning to senior citizens about a potentially misleading solicitation that offers to file forms on the senior citizen's behalf (for a fee of course) to find out IF that senior citizen qualifies for a property tax rebate.

The Sheriff's Department was tipped off by a Madera County resident who received a letter from an agency calling itself the Senior Advisory Center. The organization is located in our State Capitol, but this is NOT a government agency.

In a nutshell, the letter claims the agency will (for a fee of \$36) help senior citizens submit the necessary paperwork to find out IF they are eligible to receive a property tax rebate.

anyone with disabilities who may qualify for a homeowner assistance claim which may entitle them to up to \$472.60 in the form of a property tax

Seniors as well as those on disability should know the process can be done for free.

To find out more about property tax rebates, senior citizens can contact the State Franchise Tax Board and request the Homeowners and Renter Assistance Claim Booklet. The toll free number to call is 1-800-338-0505 or you can visit www.ftb.ca.gov and type "hra" in the search field at the top of the page and download the necessary forms online.

Warrant Scam Targeting Maderans

Sheriff John Anderson has just issued a new warning about another trick to rob Madera County residents of their identity - this time it concerns alleged warrants, liens and judgments.

Unwitting residents may receive a call from someone claiming to represent Madera County Superior Court. The caller will claim to be investigating a possible warrant that will be issued for that citizen's arrest because that resident failed to appear in court. The caller's intention is to push the citizen into a state of panic so that when the caller asks for specific pieces of personal information to verify the person's identity to "... make sure who answered the phone is really the person the caller needed to contact regarding the bogus criminal investigation," the citizen will comply. The persistent caller may also

insist that "the records show" the intended victim has violated the law and the caller simply wants to get to the bottom of the problem to help that citizen avoid jail

Sheriff Anderson has been advised that complaints to Superior Court alerted officials to the latest scam but he adds, "What concerns us - should anyone receive a call like this – is that a person, out of genuine fear, may oblige the caller and give out personal information. The Madera County Superior Court does NOT make house calls."

The county NEVER asks anyone to divulge any sensitive identification information - that includes bank statements, credit card numbers and social security numbers - or anything else that contains personal and sensitive information.

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Mistletoe: The Vampire Plant

Anyone driving around the Madera Ranchos might notice large bundles of green growth in otherwise bare trees. The spindly green clumps frequently identified as mistletoe are especially visible after deciduous trees drop their leaves.

Mistletoe is a broadleaf evergreen parasitic plant whose berries attract feeding birds that digest the pulp and excrete a seed that sticks when it lands on a branch.

Mistletoe feeds on the tree, absorbing both water and nutrients. Healthy trees tolerate a few clumps, but are eventually weakened. Ash, alder, birch, boxelder, cottonwoods, locusts, oaks, silver maples, walnuts and zelkovas are particularsusceptible. 1y Bradford pear, Chinese pistache, crape myrtle, eucalyptus, ginkgo, goldenrain, liquid ambar, persim mon and sycamore trees are less susceptible and even resist-

ant.

University The of California Cooperative Extension (UCCE) recommends pruning mistletoe out completely as soon as possible. Infected branches need to be removed from the tree by cutting at least one foot below the point of mistletoe attachment. Simply removing the mistletoe clumps (without pruning the tree branches) is better than doing nothing, though it will likely resprout. Its spread, however, will be reduced since it takes several years before it flowers and forms new seed.

Mistletoe that has attacked a major branch of the trunk that is difficult to prune may be controlled by cutting off the mistletoe flush with the limb or trunk, then wrapping the area with a few layers of wide, black polyethylene to exclude light. Use twine or tape to

secure the plastic to the limb, but do not wrap too tightly or the branch may be damaged. In some tree species, callus tissue will form under the plastic, further weakening the limb. Broadleaf mistletoe requires light and will die within a couple of years without it. It may be necessary to repeat this treatment, especially if the wrapping becomes detached or if the mistletoe does not die. A chemical spray (ethephon) can be applied to mistletoe foliage


when trees are dormant, but it too only provides short-term control before the mistletoe resprout. To be effective, the mistletoe must also be dormant and the spray must thoroughly wet the mistletoe foliage. Mistletoe comes out of dormancy before most trees, so the ideal time to treat is now until early February. An effective mistletoe control program requires a community effort. The long term benefit of mistletoe control will be healthier trees with an improved appearance.



The only problem was that the man she mentioned was well known by the deputy and the deputy knew he didn't live next door.

Padgett next talked to the driver, who identified herself as 25-year-old Charline Blair, also of Madera. Padgett ran her name and discovered she was wanted on a \$3,000 misdemeanor warrant for being an unlicensed driver.

The front passenger told the deputy A run on that name came back clear but after a search of the vehicle deputies found and seized two methamphetamine smoking pipes with white residue. All three denied ownership and all three were taken into custody and transported to the Madera County Department of Corrections where both Castro and Blair posted their respective bails. As for Aguinaga, fingerprints never lie. A life scan revealed Aguinaga's real name was Jose Diaz Real, 43, of Madera, who was wanted on two no-bail warrants for probation violation for drug possession. Once his true identity was discovered, he was booked on the two outstanding warrants for possession of drug paraphernalia and providing false information to a Peace Officer.

HAPPY NEW YEAR! Yes, the new 2007 year has started with lots of exciting changes coming our way. You probably know by now that Dr. Marilyn Shepherd is leaving Golden Valley Unified for a new job at Monterey Unified. She will be leaving the first part of February. We are all sorry to see her go. She has helped Golden Valley come a long way in a short three and one half years that she has been our leader. I wish her all of the best in her new job.

Never fear, the school board has already selected an interim superintendent who will start work on Feb. 1, 2007. Her name is Mrs. Violet Chuck. Superintendent Shepherd is introducing Violet to the staff and the district so she will know her way around. Mrs. Chuck is a retired superintendent from Firebaugh Unified and very good with budgets. This is important as we work to put the 2007-2008 budget together for next year. It has to be ready by June 30 of this year.

The board is hiring a company who will search for people interested in becoming the Golden Valley Unified's next superintendent. This is a process and we hope to have a new superintendent hired before – or at least by – July 1, 2007. That is when the new school calendar year starts. The recruitment plan includes a state- and nation-wide search. Golden Valley School Board members want a high quality pool of people from which to select.

Golden Valley Unified has been a school district for eight years. When the people of the area voted to separate from Madera Unified in June of 1998, Dr. Sally Frazier, the Madera County Superintendent, became our interim superintendent for the first four months. Ed Costa became our first full time superintendent and was given nine months to create a school district from scratch, which he did. Ed Costa was here for two years and in that time he made sure that there were teachers in the classrooms, buses running, food for our students, etc. The area passed our first school bond, and Ed Costa started the process to build Liberty High. Ed Dorn was our second superintendent and he also served Golden Valley for two years. Liberty High was finished while Ed Dorn was superintendent. Golden Valley's third superintendent was Dr. Marilyn Shepherd and she has been with us for three and one half years. Dr. Shepherd watched the first four-year senior class graduate from through the process of North Bonadelle area and Sierra View Elementary school

joining Golden Valley Unified. Last June 6, 2006 Golden Valley passed the second school bond to finish the second phase of Liberty High and build a permanent Middle School and modernize both Webster and Sierra View elementary schools. During Dr Shepherd's time here she has worked through a variety of problems with good results. The API scores at all Golden Valley schools are up. Webster Elementary has become a California Distinguished School and both Ranchos Middle School and Liberty High are eligible to become California Distinguished Schools. represents intent of several California Congressional representatives to see through a Settlement agreement ending an 18-year legal dispute between NRDC, FWUA and the federal government over the Bureau of Reclamation's operation of Friant Dam near Fresno, California. The Settlement legislation also enjoys strong support from state officials and numerous water districts around the San Joaquin Valley.

In addition to approving river channel and water flow improvements, the reintroduction of salmon and water management opportunities for current water users, as agreed to in the Settlement, the bill authorizes \$250 million in new federal appropriations to help pay for the project. Additional funding will come from Friant water user payments and at least \$100 million from the Proposition 84 water and parks bond that was approved in November by California

Under the proposed legislation, authorization would be given to the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation - which administers the Central Valley Project, Friant Dam and the Friant Division (along the southern San Joaquin Valley's East Side) - and other federal agencies to implement the Settlement. The legislation reflects historic San Joaquin River restoration and water management activities detailed in the Settlement as well as third party protections. Along with approving and

authorizing the Settlement, the bill includes a number of funding mechanisms. Those include a new \$250 million federal appropriation and Friant Division financial support through Friant water users' Restoration Fund payments under the 1992 Central Valley Project Improvement Act.

The bill has been expanded in the wake of approvals by California voters last November of two possible state funding vehicles, Propositions 84 and 1-E, and declares the federal government's intent to work closely and cooperatively with the state.

Authorization is provided to the Secretary of the Interior to design and construct the extensive list of San Joaquin River improvement projects contained within the Settlement, and implement the agreement. Interior would also be authorized to reintroduce California Central Valley spring-run Chinook salmon and avoid reductions in water supply for or imposition of costs on third-party water contractors while approving Friant Dam operational changes to restore downstream flows at levels specified in the settlement.

Other sections would authorize Settlement provisions needed to implement its important water management goal. Those provisions would permit programs and activities of water recapture recirculation, reuse, exchanges or transfers to minimize impacts on Friant Division contractors and the 15,000 mostly small-family farmers on approximately one million acres.









"Anyone who knows the Congressman knows how strongly he feels about the importance of family, and his family obviously is his top priority during this difficult time. As a result, the Congressman missed some floor votes. He has resumed a limited work schedule, but much of his attention will continue to be focused on helping Ethie during her recovery."

further Maness stated Congressman Radanovich and his family were dealing with a health issue that, unfortunately, many other families throughout the country are also dealing.

"Congressman Radanovich under-

stands his position as a public figure, but he respectfully requests that he and his family be allowed to deal with this situation in a private manner," Maness said. He added that Radanovich thanks his friends and supporters for keeping Ethie and the Radanovich family in their thoughts and prayers.

National Ovarian Cancer Coalition estimates that one woman in 58 will develop ovarian cancer during her lifetime, and the American Cancer Society estimates that there are some 20,180 new cases of ovarian cancer diagnosed each year. Because of those alarming statistics, the Congressman is urging women to talk to their doctors about ovarian cancer, particularly because its symptoms are subtle and hard to pinpoint.

Ovarian Cancer Symptoms

Survival rates for ovarian cancer are significantly increased when diagnosed early, yet it is difficult to diagnose because it often has mild or no symptoms during this period. Also, routine gynecological examinations and Pap smears cannot diagnose this

The most common symptom is back pain, sometimes accompanied by:

- Fatigue
- Bloating
- Constipation
- · Abdominal pain

- Urgent need to urinate In more advanced stages symptoms may include:
- · Swelling of the abdomen for a prolonged period (due to fluid accumulation or a mass)
 - · Abdominal cramping
 - Abnormal vaginal bleeding
 - Leg pain

It is important to note that many of these symptoms can be caused by other, less serious disorders, so contact your gynecologist if you are having these or other symptoms.




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
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


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
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
