

Deciphering the Lines on Avenue 12

Now that we've got a totally new look on Avenue 12, what exactly do those lines mean, how do you drive them and what about things like parking a car or truck on Avenue 12, garbage service and mail trucks? And what's that stuff all over Avenue 12 now? Let's take a look at these.

1. What do those lines mean? How do we drive them? - According to the California DMV Online Driver's Handbook (www.cal-driver-ed.com /dmv-handbook /21.htmCenter Left Turn Lane) we now have a Center Left Turn Lane. The handbook says:

If a street has a center left turn lane, you must use it when you turn left (VC §21460.5[c]). You may only drive for 200 feet in the center left turn lane. This lane is not a regular traffic lane or a passing lane.

To turn left, signal and drive completely inside the center left turn lane. Don't stop part way into the lane, with the back of your vehicle blocking traffic. Make sure the lane is clear in both directions and then turn only when it is safe. Look for vehicles coming toward you in the same lane as they start to

Lexi Delgado of the Madera Ranchos is a high-spirited young lady who loves Pink and Hello Kitty and who always has a radiant smile on her face. Lexi and her battle with Leukemia have been embraced by the Madera Ranchos Community. On July 23, 2010 Lexi was diagnosed with "Acute Myelogenous Leukemia" (AML) at Children's

Hospital in Madera. AML is an aggressive, rare form of leukemia in children. Lexi has spent the past 11 months in one hospital or another coming home only for a few days at a time in between chemotherapy sessions. When Lexi's family heard the diagnosis every- two of her friends from the Ranchos, sisters one pitched in however they could to do whatever they

could to help. They raised money and they raised awareness for the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society. A car wash was held in the Ranchos last September and friends and family participated as "Team Lexi" in the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society's Annual "Light the Night" fundraiser at the Cobb Ranch. "Team Lexi" was honored to win the 3rd place award for raising money in the Friends and Family Division, having raised over \$3,000 for the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society. The family also plans on participating again this year and raising even more

"Operation Love for Lexi" was launched by local business owners in February. News of the event spread like wild fire and in just six hours the Madera Ranchos community opened its hearts and its wallets to raise over\$12,000 to help the Delgado family with expenses so they could be in Stanford near Lexi following her bone marrow transplant. The community donated over 100 pints of blood in Lexi's name and just as importantly 56 people signed up to be tested

> for the National Bone Marrow Registry.

Lexi underwent three rounds of chemotherapy while she was at Children's Hospital in Madera. Doctors were pleased with her progress and had told the family that after Lexi completed her fourth round of chemo she would be considered to be "in remission."

Unfortunately, just before she completed this last round of chemo doctors discovered the Leukemia had returned. Since Lexi had relapsed during treatment her new course of treatment would require a bone marrow transplant. As Lexi celebrated her 13th birthday in February, the search was on to find a matching bone marrow donor.

She wasn't yet aware of what an extraordinary gift she was about to be given.

Since none of Lexi's family was a "match" they turned to the National Bone

Book Recommendations





Adult Fiction: *Vision in White* by Nora Roberts. This is the perfect romance novel for summer vacation. The story begins


with four longtime friends who turned their favorite childhood game, "let's play wedding," into a unique wedding business generating a good return financially as well as respect

The Party that Forgot About Jobs

John Boehner's constant refrain in advance of the 2010 elections was, "Where are the jobs?"

It was a simple question pertinent to the concern far and away foremost in the public mind -- the state of the economy. Since the election, the question for the GOP has become, "Where is your concern about jobs?"

The unemployment rate is still at 9 percent. According to Gallup, 35 percent of people say the economy is their top concern, and 22 percent say jobs. Just 12 percent cite the federal deficit and debt. Republicans have taken the top concern of roughly 1/8th of the public and made now. Like Cortes in Mexico, Republiit their existential cause. On top of that, they have taken a subset of the debt issue, the long-term fiscal sustainability of Medicare, and made it their calling

If you are worried about the security of your job, if your personal income is stagnant, if the value of your home is still declining, and if you are paying more for food and fuel, the perilous state of a government program that you know, one way or the other, will never be permitted to go bankrupt is not a subject of proverbial kitchen-table conversation.

The special election in New York's 26th District served as an early, albeit imperfect, referendum on the Republicans' new calling card. Democrats made

the Republican plan to transition Medicare to a premium-support program the overwhelming issue. It worked. Henry Olsen of the American Enterprise Institute points out that blue-collar independents and Democrats who swung the GOP's way in 2010 swung against them this year. The Republican candidate Jane Corwin even bled blue-collar Republicans to a bogus "tea party" candidate.

These voters are especially sensitive to economic conditions and especially chary of changes to government programs they will come to depend on. They also are absolutely essential to Republican hopes in 2012.

Retreat on Medicare isn't an option cans have disabled their ships behind them. With Senate Republicans voting overwhelmingly in favor of the Ryan budget during a Democratic-engineered show vote, all but nine Republicans on Capitol Hill are on record for Paul Ryan's reforms. They'll have to fight it out, and, as Abraham Lincoln advised Ulysses S. Grant, "hold on with a bulldog grip, and chew and choke as much as possible."


But even the shrewdest Medicare messaging will not suffice. For a party obsessed with the legacy of Ronald Regan, post-2010 Republicans have been quick to forget the absolute pride of place he gave to economic growth.

House Republicans just released a growth plan. Sen. Rob Portman of Ohio has been evangelizing for a growth agenda since his election last year. The elements are familiar -- cutting taxes and reforming the tax code, reining in regulation, increasing energy production, passing free-trade agreements. It doesn't have much chance of getting signed into law, but neither does Ryan's Medicare

All of it is an exemplary exercise setting out a vision counter to President Barack Obama's and demonstrating that Republicans still know the most important question in American politics: "Where are the jobs?"





Rice, Rice Baby!

Before we started studying rice in school, I thought rice was only grown in China. I found out differently when I was in about the fifth grade. Our dad took us kids to Los Banos to see rice fields. What a surprise! Vast fields of water with little plants peeping through. I called the Los Banos Chamber of Commerce today to see if the rice fields were still there and the man I spoke to said there weren't any there anymore, however he thought there were some out near Firebaugh and northeast of Merced. With the water shortage we are having I was wondering how they are surviving. According to what I read on the internet, the fields are flooded to slow the weed growth. They can irrigate by rows, but it is more economical to flood the fields because that way they don't have to take care of the weeds separately.

Rice has been grown in the southern United States since the mid-19th century. Rice cultivation began in California during the California Gold Rush, when Chinese laborers immigrated to the state and grew small amounts for their own use. Commercial production began in 1912 in Butte County. By 2006, California produced the second largest rice crop in the United States only behind Arkansas. Most of California's rice is grown in six counties north of Sacramento. The United States provides about 12 percent of the world rice trade. Of the rice grown in the United States, 58 percent is for direct food use, 16 percent is used in processed food, 16 percent for beer and 10 percent for pet food.

Growing up, we had rice more than pasta. I don't remember having spaghetti too often, but we did have rice. I remember mama's yummy rice pudding. I went through her recipe cards and not surprisingly, I didn't find one. A lot of her cooking she would just put things together and it would come out delicious. So I went online and with the many recipes I read, this one sounds the closest to hers. I know she did not put it in the oven; it was cooked on top of the stove. Hope you enjoy.

Rice Pudding

3/4 C Uncooked White Rice 2 C Milk, Divided 1/3 C White Sugar 1/4 tsp Salt



1 Egg, Beaten ²/₃ C Raisins 1 T Butter ½ tsp Vanilla

In a medium saucepan, bring 1½ C water to a boil, add rice and stir. Reduce heat, cover and simmer for 20 minutes.

In another saucepan, combine 1½ C cooked rice, 1½ C milk, sugar and salt. Cook over medium heat until thick and creamy, 15 to 20 minutes. Stir in remaining ½ C milk, the beaten egg and raisins. Cook 2 minutes longer, stirring constantly (if you don't stir, it might scorch). Remove from heat and stir in butter and vanilla.

I've told you before about the mini truck farm my mom had every summer in our back yard. Every year we had zucchini "coming out our ears." Mama would always try to get them picked when they were small, but once in a while one would hide and grow to be too large for regular cooking. But she wouldn't let it go to waste. When she'd bring one of these monstrous squash into the house, we knew what we were going to have for dinner:

Zucchini Stuffed Spanish Rice

1 Large Zucchini

1 Can Chopped Tomatoes

1 C Uncooked Rice

1 T Butter

2 T Oil

½ C Chopped Onion

1 Clove Garlic - Crushed

1 tsp Salt

1/4 tsp Black Pepper


Preheat oven – 350


Wash zucchini and cut off stem end. Cut in half length wise. Scoop out and discard seeds. Set aside.

one cup.

In saucepan, combine tomato liquid, rice and butter and bring to a boil. Turn heat down and simmer covered 5 minutes. Set aside.

In skillet heat oil, sauté onions and garlic until golden, about 5 minutes. (Sometimes mama would add a pound of hamburger here, breaking it up with a fork and browning it). Add reserved tomatoes, rice mixture, salt and pepper. Heat until heated through, takes about 5 minutes.

Fill zucchini halves with mixture, dividing evenly.

Arrange zucchini halves in 13x9 baking pan. Pour ½ C water in bottom of pan.

Cover tightly with foil. Bake 1 hour or until zucchini is tender.

My favorite rice recipe I got from a girl that worked in our office. I gave it to my mother and she took it to several potlucks. I know Campbell's has a

recipe similar to this one and only cooks in half the time, but believe me it is not as good. This recipe calls for a whole chicken but not every family likes all the parts. When I've cooked it for the family, I like thighs and wings, and most all the rest of the family prefer breasts – so use whatever your family prefer.

1 Fryer – Cut Up

1 Can Cream of Chicken Soup

1 Can Cream of Mushroom Soup ²/₃ Can Milk

1 Pkg. Lipton Onion Soup Mix 1¹/₄ C Uncooked Rice

Paprika

Preheat oven 325

Mix cream soups and milk. Add uncooked rice. Pour in bottom of 13x9 baking pan. Lay chicken parts on top of rice mixture. Sprinkle onion soup mix on top of chicken and rice. Sprinkle with paprika. Cover pan tightly with foil. Place in heated oven for 2 hours.

Flex Your Power this July 4th (and Every Day) when You Buy American

In the global trade battle, you cast a vote every time you open your wallet. The decision? Whether you spend your money on products made in America or overseas.

In 1960, foreign goods made up just 8 percent of American purchases; today nearly 60 percent of everything we buy is made overseas. In the U.S.A., manufacturing employment peaked in 1979 and has been on a downward trajectory ever since. For some time, factory jobs have been moving to lower wage countries. Most recently, high-speed Internet connections have allowed clerical and white collar jobs to be done much cheaper in places like India, and even high-skilled jobs like reading X-rays have started to be done by low-wage doctors outside the U.S.

Is buying American-made more expensive? What staples are no longer manufactured in the U.S.? What difference would it make if we in America promise to buy American made products?

Manufacturing still has a major impact on our economy and on the nation's work force. Today, the United States has fewer manufacturing jobs than it did in 1941. On Feb. 28 of this year, ABC World News launched its Made in America challenge. The program stated that if every American spent just \$64 more than normal on U.S.A.made items this year it would create 200,000 new jobs. For example, when buying food at Wal-Mart, check the labels of the products you're considering. Some of the products will show that they were made in China or some other foreign country. A can of Chinese Mandarin oranges could be replaced for a few more cents with the same product with the Liberty Gold or Dole brand made right here in California.

It's a shame that our government and big business have forsaken us.

"We the people." Do it yourself America. Simply look on the bottom of every product you buy and if it states it is made in China or PRC, which now includes Hong Kong, or any other foreign country, simply choose another product or none at all. You will be amazed how dependent you are on Chinese and foreign products and you will be amazed at what you can do without. For example, for Easter instead of plastic eggs, use real eggs and benefit some American farmer. Think about this: if 200 million Americans refuse to buy just \$20 in foreign goods each year, that's a billion dollar trade

imbalance in our favor.

Besides focusing on the consumer, we need to focus on our government and big business.

Government – In the 2012 election it is up to "We the People" to change it. As seniors it is our duty to save our country for grandchildren.

Big Business – Let's pick on Disney products, whose reliance on cheap labor is well documented. Checking the Internet, Disney products are made mainly in China, rarely in the USA, and the on the official Disney website the first 40 products were all imported. Another is Wal-Mart, where we buy cheap. Instead, look for items that are made in America. Check the Internet for "Made in America." You buy from the website and ship it to the stores for pick up without having to pay shipping.

There are other reasons to buy American. Foreign labor standards allow unsafe worker conditions, child labor, poisonous levels of lead and many brands sold here are produced in countries using dangerous, heavy polluting processes and have no environmental pollution controls. In the canned foods we consume, do foreign countries have the same food and drug standards required as in the U.S.A.? Are the factories inspected and kept clean with no rodents running around and are the workers free from disease and maintain hygiene requirements?

The growing lack of the U.S.A.'s ability to manufacture many products is strategically unsound. Factories and money are shifting to countries not friendly to the U.S.A. When you void imported goods in favor of American-made items; you help ensure that the United States does not find its access to vital goods impacted by political conflict. Jobs shipped abroad almost never return, but when you buy goods made in the U.S.A. you help keep the American economy growing. As we allow U.S. manufacturing ability to fade, future generations of U.S. citizens will be unable to find relevant jobs. Buy American and help keep your family, friends, neighbors and even yourself earning a living wage.

The Fourth of July represents our country's independence; let's not give it away. A challenge is out there to save our country: Pledge to buy American.

Dale was a kind, generous man who always made us laugh with his witty jokes and anecdotes, often bringing us to tears. He always seemed the happiest when he was doing something for others as his life clearly reflected. Dale was a highly decorated war hero and former Green Beret who served an exemplary 23 year military career, moving up the ranks as a Private and emerging as a Major in the U.S. Army. As a young Sergeant in Vietnam, Dale risked his life on numerous occasions to render first aid to troops wounded in combat, carrying many of them to safety in the middle of cross fire. Undoubtedly, many soldiers lived because of Dale's unselfish acts of bravery. Dale was an underwater diver, a mountaineer specializing in extreme cold weather operations, and served multiple tours of duty in Vietnam with his last tour as a Cobra helicopter pilot with over 2,000 hours of combat flying time. His illustrious military career made him uniquely qualified to write three published books. His uncommon valor was the topic of several military magazine articles and an autobiography was in the works, proving that his life's accomplishments would not just fill pages but, volumes. After his retirement, Dale was recalled to serve in the United States Volunteers Joint Service Honor Command where he earned the rank of Major General. He worked tirelessly with the

Dale passed away on Memorial Day, Monday, May 30 - a day befitting of the heroic man he was, not just in his military career but in his personal life as well. 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

"Downsizing" Myth Busters

Myth #4 – "When it comes to paper, it's better to be safe than sorry." Buster: Actually it's possible to be safe *AND* sorry. Sheriff Warns About Collection Scam

A New Debt Collector Scam Has Surfaced in Madera County

Madera County Sheriff John Anderson today issued a fraud alert to citizens throughout Central California regarding a new debt collector scam that has surfaced in Madera County.

People masquerading as debt collectors are contacting consumers via cell phone, land lines and in one case a message was left on a victim's work phone.

Victims have received calls from people posing as a Steve Clark, a James Watson, and an Eric Watson. The person calling claims to be a debt collector representing a law firm called "Neal & Richardson" and/or "Neil Richardson As-

sociates," with a telephone number 559-838-0290.

The premise of the call is to inform the victim that they are in default of a loan; and if the victim does not have legal representation an arrest is imminent. However, the matter can be resolved, claims the caller, by paying a said amount of money within 30 days. The tone is usually threatening in nature, but at some point some of the alleged scammers invoke God into the conversation ending with a phrase, "God Bless and Good Luck"

Sheriff Anderson says that if you get such a call, hang up and notify authorities.

Complaints can be filed with the FTC (Federal Trade Commission), Better Business Bureau and the State Attorney General's Office.

make their left turns.

When turning left from a side street or driveway, signal and wait until it is safe. Then drive into the center left turn lane. Enter traffic only when it is safe.

You may drive across a center left turn lane.

So the bottom line is the days of passing cars on the right as they wait at an intersection on Avenue 12 are gone. Left turning cars will be sitting in their own lanes and you can just scoot on by. Please note: This is NOT a passing lane. That will probably pretty much guarantee a ticket on the new Avenue 12.

2. Can I park my car or truck on Avenue 12? - No. There is simply no place to put either type of vehicle now. An ongoing complaint about Avenue 12 was big rigs parked up and down the street, effectively blocking your view if you tried to pull out of a business driveway onto 12. Often you

would have to commit the entire front end of your car just to get out far enough to see if there was any oncoming traffic. That is now a thing of the past, but the trade off is no street parking. Six of one and half a dozen of the other.

3. How will this affect my garbage pickup on Avenue 12? - I talked to District 1 Supervisor Frank Bigelow and he said the County is looking at different alternatives. What the County is planning initially is looking at having the garbage trucks begin at an earlier time when traffic is lightest and see if that doesn't alleviate any potential problems with garbage service. If that doesn't work? Back to the drawing board.

4. How will this affect mail delivery on Avenue 12? - Mail trucks are considerably smaller than garbage trucks, but Bigelow said the County was also looking at asking the Post Office to deliver the mail earlier at lower traffic volume times. The County is pretty much looking at mail deliver through the same lens as garbage pickup, the only

problem is garbage is once a week; the letter carriers are out there six days a week.

5. What's that stuff all over Avenue 12 now? - What you're seeing on Avenue 12 is called "chipseal." It's a product that breathes new life into older asphalt roads at a greatly reduced price (up to 40 percent less than re-asphalting), but it extends the life of the road for about another 10 years, according to Frank Bigelow. The advantages are that it's virtually maintenance free, never needs a sealcoat and offers better traction. It also provides a cooler surface since it doesn't absorb heat like blacktop does. Who knew?

The bottom line to our new Avenue 12 is that, as so often happens, in an attempt to fix one problem, a whole slew of new ones pop up. We need, as a community, to be aware of the laws regulating our newly striped thoroughfare, follow the rules and let's see what happens. Remember, painting stripes is a lot cheaper than building a new road.



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
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Peeling the Layers of Alcoholism

Hi, my name is Mike and I'm an Alcoholic.

Last time I wrote just a little to the behind the scenes nature of the normal alcoholic; the tip of the iceberg so to speak. It is a very complicated disease, that complicated people have, and there is not a cure. If the idea that there is not a cure sounds a little harsh or crass, keep reading and hopefully the light will come on.

You see, we deal with alcohol - cunning, baffling and powerful. It is the only disease that continually tells you that you do not have it. A few of you may have a problem with the fact that we use the word disease. We understand that it is not cancer, polio or diabetes. If you look at the word disease,

break it up and it looks like this "Dis-Ease," which means "not at ease." Believe me. when you are in the middle of your battle with alcohol you are as far away from ease as you can possibly get. Now that we understand it truly is a disease I will continue.

I read parts of two books daily: the Holy Bible and the Big Book of AA. The Bible tells me in the book of Jeremiah, "The heart is deceitful above all things, and there is no cure." The Big Book tells me that there is no cure for alcoholism. What that tells me and that I finally get is I need to continually, every day, work on my heart, my soul and my mind. Every day I have to put God first and sobriety second. If I do this everything else will fall into place. When I first got out of rehab, I wanted everything back. When things did not go as I had planned, self- pity and depression overtook me and I got drunk. Now, I finally realize turning my will over to a Higher Power every day. God will give me what I need, when I need it. Not what I want but what I need, that is the key. Keep God first and the minutia of life

will never, ever get you down. He will never leave you or forsake you.

While you as an alcoholic are wrapping your mind around the fact that you can never drink like a gentleman or lady, you start to understand that alcoholism is a disease of a two-fold nature: an allergy of the body and an obsession of the mind. This will clear up a number of questions. The allergy we could do nothing about. Somehow our bodies had reached the point where we could no longer absorb alcohol in our systems. The "why" is not important; the fact is that one drink will set up a reaction in our system that requires more; that one drink is too much and a hundred drinks are not enough.

The obsession of the mind is a little harder to understand, and yet everyone has obsessions of various kinds. The alcoholic has them to an exaggerated degree. Over a

> period of time we have built up selfpity and resentments toward anyone or anything that interferes with our drink-Dishonest thinking, prejudice, ego, antagonism toward anyone and everyone who dares to cross us, vanity and a critical attitude are character defects

that gradually creep in and become a part of our lives. Living with fear and tension inevitably results in wanting to ease that tension, which alcohol seems to do temporarily. It took me some time to realize that the Twelve Steps of A.A. were designed to help correct these defects of character and so help remove the obsession to drink. The Twelve Steps, which to me are truly God inspired, are a spiritual way of living. It meant to me a way of life that had to have honest thinking, not wishful thinking; open-mindedness, a willingness to try and a faith to accept. These are a must: patience, tolerance and humility, and above all, the belief that a power greater than ourselves could and would help if we

Marrow Registry for help. According to Dr. Jeffrey Chell, the chief executive officer of the National Marrow Donor Program, "Each year, thousands of people with different forms of cancer turn to the National Bone Marrow Registry for transplants. Seven million people are listed on the registry, however only a very small percentage of them are from minority groups. That's unfortunate," Chell said, "your background, your heritage is absolutely critical in finding a match. Currently only 9 percent of people on the registry are Hispanic. That's not enough."

Chell said they have a registry of millions, but they still do not have matched bone marrow donors for all patients. They need more people to join the registry, especially those from racially and ethnically diverse communities. "Any one person has a 1 in 20,000 chance of matching a stranger. By becoming a bone marrow donor you are giving someone a chance of a Lifetime." For more information about being a bone marrow donor you can visit www.marrow.org.

"We don't know how many donors they went through to find a match. All we know is that we only had 1 good match," said Lexi's Aunt, Alicia Delgado. This was certainly the news that Lexi's family and friends were waiting for. Lexi was admitted to Lucille Packard Children's Hospital at Stanford on March 18 where she was given intensive radiation and chemotherapy prior to the bone marrow transplant. On March 25 she received the transplant,

which is similar to receiving a blood transfusion. Two days after the transfusion Alicia posted to Facebook: "Lexi has been doing well and continues to smile as always. Where there is hope there can be faith; where there is faith, Miracles can occur."

Lexi suffered little side effects from her treatments and doctors were pleased that she did so well. The hope is that the donor cells continue to grow and create new healthy cells for Lexi's body. A primary concern after bone marrow transplant is "Graft vs. Host Disease," which means that the body is rejecting the new cells. This can happen within months or even years of a transplant. Lexi takes medication that helps prevent getting this disease. Lexi was in isolation during her stay at Stanford and she couldn't leave her room. To pass the time she would draw, paint, do crafts and played

her iPod Touch. Lexi also has a mini nail salon so she loved to paint her nails. "Once word got out that she did nails, nurses would come in and ask for their nails to be done," said Alicia



By Lexi's side the entire time, Alex Delgado has been with his daughter throughout the whole ordeal and looks forward to the day that she can come

of cancer so Lexi is able to interact with other children to whom she can relate. Lexi also goes to school for four hours a day at the hospital so that she doesn't fall behind on her school work. This way, she can resume classes with the rest

of her friends when she is able.

Lexi had a wonderful surprise recently when two of her best friends from the Ranchos school showed up to visit. Mikayla and Savannah Mosier made the trip to surprise Lexi and she was thrilled to see them and to show them around. Lexi will be sharing an address with Ronald McDonald until the end of June or early July when she may be released back to Children's Hospital in Madera.

"Throughout it all, Lexi has continued to keep a smile on her face and a positive attitude. Her body has been through so much, but she has been able to stay strong and not let the bad days get her down for long," said Alicia.

Lexi enjoys keeping in touch with her friends through Facebook, where her journey back to health has been journaled by Lexi, her family and her friends. "I can't wait to get back home to be with my family and my friends. The thing I miss most about being at home is sleeping in my own bed!" Lexi is also looking forward to going back to Children's Hospital in Madera to see all of her beloved doctors and nurses again. She wants to thank everyone for all of their love and support.

Because of privacy laws, the Delgados were given very little information about the bone marrow donor. After a year, if the donor agrees, then Lexi and her family can make contact with the donor. Both Lexi and her father Alex look forward to the day that they'll be able to meet the donor and thank this person for their gift of life and for allowing Lexi the chance to get better.
