Voters Denied Opportunity to Vote on Taxpayer Protection Act

On Thursday, June 20, the majority Democrat-appointed judges on the California Supreme Court silenced the 1.43 million Californians who signed and placed the Taxpayer Protection Act on the November ballot. The Taxpayer Protection and Government Accountability Act (TPA) is an initiative aimed at making it more challenging to raise taxes in California, by requiring the legislature to seek approval from the voters for any new or higher state tax.

The TPA campaign issued the following statement from Rob Lapsley, president of the California Business Roundtable, Jon Coupal, president of the Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Association and Matthew Hargrove, president and CEO of the California Business Properties Association:


"Today's ruling is the greatest threat to democracy California has faced in recent memory. Governor Newsom has effectively erased the voice of 1.43 million voters who signed the petition to qualify the Taxpayer Protection Act for the November ballot. Most importantly, the governor has cynically terminated Californians' rights to engage in direct democracy despite his many claims that he

is a defender of individual rights and democracy. Evidently, the governor wants to protect democracy and individual rights in other states, but not for all Californians.

"We are disappointed that the California Supreme Court has put politics ahead of the Constitution, disregarding long-standing precedent that they should not intervene in an election before voters decide qualified initiatives.

"Direct democracy and our initiative process are now at risk with this decision, showing California is firmly a one-party state where the governor and Legislature can politically influence courts to block ballot measures that threaten their ability to increase spending and raise taxes. Using the courts to block voters' voices is the latest effort from the Democrats' supermajority to remove any accountability measures that interfere with their agenda – a failed agenda that continues to drive up

Drivers Get Ready: Mileage Tax is Here

Since California is mandating that all new cars be electric by 2035, one of the primary sources of money for the ongoing repair of public roads is being greatly curtailed – the gas tax.

The gas tax was incorporated instead of making California's roads all toll roads. Covering the cost of road repairs by the people using the roads just made good sense, but with the advent of electric cars, gas tax money will disappear. California has addressed this to a small degree by building toll roads throughout the state, but the reality is that California has already begun to lose millions in gas tax revenue and needs to make up for it.

The plan that the state is going forward with involves tracking drivers with GPS monitors installed in their cars. According to Caltrans, under the new plan mileage will be tracked by plugging an electronic device into a vehicle or using the vehicle's tracking system. Initially, the state is looking at a tax of 3 cents per mile, but there is no upper limit at this time.

In addition to placing another tax on Californians, civil libertarians are also concerned with the powers such a move could give the government, including potentially limiting driving in the future.

Supreme Court's Vote Reasoning

The California Supreme Court sided with Gov. Gavin Newsom and Democratic leaders in the Legislature on the constitutionality of a sweeping anti-tax measure, ruling today that it cannot go before voters in November.

The, known as the Taxpayer Protection and Government Accountability Act, broadly aimed to make it more challenging to raise taxes in California, including by requiring the Legislature to seek approval from the voters for any new or higher state tax.

In a unanimous decision, the Supreme Court agreed, ordering Secretary of State Shirley Weber to refrain from taking any steps to place the initiative on the Nov. 5 ballot.

The proposed changes "are within the electorate's prerogative to enact," Justice Goodwin Liu wrote, "but because those changes would substantially alter our basic plan of government, the proposal cannot be enacted by initiative. It is instead governed by the procedures for revising our Constitution" — whereby proposed revisions must be submitted to voters by a supermajority of the Legislature or a constitutional convention.

The decision marks the first time in more than two decades that the court has struck an initiative from the ballot. In 1999 it struck a measure that sought to restrict state officers' pay and transfer redistricting power out of the Legislature.

the cost of living with little accountability and few results.

"This ruling sends a damning message to businesses in California and across the country that it is politically perilous to invest and grow jobs for the future.

"In light of this ruling and the state's large budget deficit, a huge amount of tax increases are on the way that are sure to make California's cost of living even higher.

"We will continue to explore our legal options and fight for the people's right to hold their government accountable through direct democracy."

Also weighing in on the California Supreme Court decision to remove the Taxpayer Protection Act from this November's ballot is Assembly Republican Leader James Gallagher (Yuba City), who said:

"This decision is an outrageous abuse of power by seven Justices who think they know better than the 40 million people of California. The Court is supposed to look out for the people, not rubber stamp the anti-democratic schemes of politicians hell-bent on protecting their power. Today, the Court silenced the voices of Californians and shredded its credibility in the process."

Also commenting was Assemblyman Bill Essayli (R-Riverside):

"California is a fallen republic. When the California Supreme Court can block the people from voting on a ballot initiative, we have devolved from a constitutional to a banana republic. This decision is outrageous, and I hope voters will make their voices heard in November by voting out every incumbent democrat who supported this attack on our democracy."

And Assemblyman Tom Lackey (R-Palmdale):

"Californians have been denied their fundamental right. Residents now cannot protect themselves against a growing government that wants more of their precious dollars.

"It is outrageous that the California Supreme Court is silencing the voice of 1.43 million Californians.

"The California Supreme Court's role is to 'maintain uniformity in the law,' yet today, they chose partisan interests and a bloated government over everyday Californians."

Fox News personality Steve Hilton, star of The Next Revolution with Steve Hilton, also weighed in:

"Today we saw the beginning of the end of Democrat rule in California. The

removal of the Taxpayer Protection and Government Accountability Act from the ballot, along with Sacramento Democrats' attempts to kill the citizens' initiative to reform Proposition 47, will be a turning point in California's politics. We now see clearly that an arrogant, morally bankrupt ruling elite in Sacramento, drunk on their own power, cannot stand the slightest challenge to their extreme ideology, a farleft experiment that has led to failure on every front.

"When citizens rise up to demand common sense, reasonable reform, they are thwarted with cynical schemes designed to perpetuate Democrat political monopoly by undermining democracy. First on crime, now on taxes; how dare these out of touch, utterly corrupted politicians treat Californians with such contemp. It is time to fight back and I look forward to leading the charge."

The Los Angeles County Taxpayers Association Chairman Aidan Chaospoke out on behalf of its Board following Thursday's Supreme Court Ruling:

"Today, California's Supreme Court has ruled in favor of a grave assault on voters by Governor Newsom, organized labor, special interest groups and the state legislature. By removing the Taxpayer Protection and Government Accountability Act from November's ballot, the Governor has stripped the ability of California residents' sacred direct democratic process. Furthermore, he denied over 527,000 Angelenos their say in direct democracy he claims he defends by invalidating their signatures to qualify this initiative.

"While the Los Angeles County Taxpayers Association is incredibly disappointed in the activist Court and the politicization of Californians' quality of life, we will never stop advocating for the rights of taxpayers and holding our lawmakers accountable for their tax-andspend agendas.

"The Taxpayer Protection Act was California's most significant opportunity to protect Proposition 13 and strengthen voters' and businesses' stakes in the future of our state. This ruling sends a message that California is no longer welcome to businesses or those who desire a sustainable, affordable life.

"Following today's unfortunate ruling, we will decide in short time our subsequent actions as coalition partners and continue defending Angelenos from government overreach and over-taxation."



What's Wrong With People of Color?

The progressive journalist Thomas Frank wrote a much-discussed book in 2004 titled What's the Matter with Kansas? Right now, some other likeminded journalist might be thinking of writing a book called What's the Matter with People of Color?

For Democrats, the presidential polling among Latinos and African Americans ranges from concerning to extremely disturbing, as President Joe Biden sheds support to Donald Trump.

The Republican was so bold as to hold a campaign rally that drew thousands in the South Bronx, a heavily Hispanic and Black area where Republicans may be rumored to exist but are rarely actually

Trump "the blue-collar billionaire" probably has more in common with the average Latino working-class male than any member of the (exclusively Democratic) Congressional Hispanic Caucus.

A New York Times poll in March had Trump beating Biden among Hispanic voters 46-40, while a Wall Street Journal poll last month found that 30% of African-American males say they are definitely or probably going to vote for Trump. Other surveys show less stark results, but something is going on, especially with Hispanic voters.

If nothing else, we are seeing the

foolhardiness of Democrats believing that all minorities -- with a dizzying array of national backgrounds and socioeconomic and demographic characteristics -- could be lumped together as "people of color" and corralled into the Democratic coalition with woke political appeals. That might work on college campuses; it doesn't work in the rest of the country.

The problem for Biden is that Hispanics are too much like the rest of America. In Cygnal polling, 69% of Americans say the country is on the

wrong track, and 72% of Hispanics think the same. Hispanics care about the economy as much as -- in fact, more than -- anyone else. Whereas 30% of the country says inflation and the economy is the top issue, 42% of

Hispanics say it is.

All of this means that only 37% of Hispanics view Biden favorably, essentially the same percentage as among whites.


Changing Hispanic attitudes toward immigration is a big part of the picture. A CBS poll in Arizona found that 52% of all voters think recent immigrants have made life worse. What outrageous xenophobia, you say? Well, 40% of Hispanic voters think they've made life worse, too (a slim plurality, 42%, say they've made it better).

While the Left thought that Hispanics would enjoy getting called "Latinx" and seamlessly fit into its victim-industrial-complex, Trump "the blue-collar billionaire" probably has more in common with the average Latino working-class male than any member of the (exclusively Democratic) Congressional Hispanic Caucus.

The division of the electorate among class lines, long evident among whites, now appears to be showing up among Hispanics. Ruy Teixeira of the American Enterprise Institute cites a YouGov poll that found Biden leading by 1 point among working-class Hispanics and 39 points among college-





Be a Zucchini Houdini

(June 2014)

Editor's Note: With the passing of Aunt Jean, I have decided to bring you a "Best Of" of her recipes over the past 10 years. Good recipes are timeless and I hope you enjoy them all over again.

For those of you that have a summer garden, I imagine the zucchini has just about taken over. Your friends, relatives and neighbors are almost tired of seeing you arrive with a bag of the stuff. So what to do with it?

For one thing, you can freeze them but you must plan on doing it the day they are picked, or no later than the next day. Have everything ready before you start as it should be done as quickly as possible. This can be done with any summer squash.

Begin by washing the squash thoroughly and slicing it the way they will

be cooked next winter — length wise into "spears," into rounds or chunks, but be sure they are all the same size so they will blanch and freeze in the same

Put a large pot house your kids will want to of water on to boil. Have a large bowl of ice water ready and a colander ready for draining. Get a slotted spoon, a large cookie sheet and several zip-lock

Add the squash to the boiling water (do NOT salt the water, as that will break down the enzymes and cause the squash to be soggy when thawed). Only leave in the boiling water until they are crunchy "al dente" - about two minutes, but start testing after a minute.

where.

As soon as the squash is blanched, spoon into the ice water, then into the colander. Drain well before storing in the freezer bags. If you have a large freezer, you can put the squash on the cookie sheet (lined with parchment paper makes it easier) and put it in the freezer until all is frozen then put it into freezer bags. This way the squash is frozen individually and you can take



out only what you will need rather than using the whole bag when everything is frozen together.

I was looking for different ways to use zucchini than steaming, frying or baking with Spanish rice. My favorite way is using a nonstick frying pan, put about a teaspoon of butter in the pan and add sliced zucchini and some chopped onion. Put a lid on it and on medium heat only cook until just done. Do not overcook because then you have mush - ugh!

Zucchini Cake

2 C. Flour

2 tsp. cinnamon

2 tsp. baking soda

1 tsp. salt

California Table Grape Growers Give Scholarship to Liberty Grad



Liberty High Graduate Madison Jackson earned a \$25,000 Agriculture Scholarship from the California Table Grape Growers.

Seven students from the table grape growing regions of California, including one from Liberty High School in the Madera Ranchos, have earned scholarships awarded by California table grape growers. Growers awarded two \$25,000 field worker scholarships to students attending a four-year college or university and two \$14,500 field worker bridge scholarships were awarded to students attending two years of community college and transferring to a four-year college or university. In order to be eligible for a field worker scholarship, applicants or a parent or guardian must work in the California table grape harvest.

Three \$25,000 agriculture scholarships were awarded to students attending a four-year California college or university and planning to pursue an undergraduate degree in a field of study pertinent to the table grape industry. Since 1985, California table grape growers have awarded more than 200 scholarships to help students in the grape growing regions of California attend college.

Liberty High Graduate Madison Jackson earned a \$25,000 Agriculture Scholarship from the California Table Grape Growers. She graduated from Liberty High with a 4.1 GPA and will attend California State University, Chico to study agriculture education and environmental science. Madison was deeply involved in FFA, serving in several FFA leadership positions, attending numerous FFA conferences and helping her grapevine pruning team place fifth in the state finals. Madison is passionate about the future of agriculture and plans to become an agriculture teacher after college to help future students understand the importance of agriculture and environmental stewardship.

educated Hispanics. Working-class Hispanics tend to be more moderate or conservative than their college-educated counterparts and are more pessimistic about the economy and concerned about inflation. As Teixeira notes, about 78% of Hispanic voters are working class, and even higher percentages in Arizona and Nevada, states where Trump is leading.

There appears to be a trend among Hispanic voters. Hillary Clinton won them by nearly 40 points in 2016, while Biden carried them by 23 points in 2020 and could go lower this year. The move among Black voters is more provisional and less pronounced, but still real and obviously worrying to Democrats given their investment in advertising directed

at these voters and Biden's recent fevered commencement address at Morehouse College.

It's best to think of the Latino and Black voters telling pollsters that they support Trump as very much potential voters -- Trump will have to continue to make his case, and the Republican National Committee find ways to reach them and turn them out. But, as the Republican political analyst Patrick Ruffini points out, if culturally conservative non-whites break away from the Democratic coalition it would be a boon for the GOP.

What's wrong with people of color? This year they could prove too politically independent-minded.



Madera County Sheriffs' Office Arrests Man for Suspected Lewd Acts with Minors

The Madera County Sheriff's Office Investigations Division was contacted by two victims who reported being molested by Jesus Cortes-Padilla. As a result of their disclosures, an investigation was initiated. During the course of their investigation, Detectives identified additional victims, both juvenile and adult, who reported sexual harassment, solicitation of sexual favors, and inappropriate conduct by Cortes-Padilla.

On June 4, Madera County Sheriff's Detectives arrested 35-year-old Madera resident Jesus Cortes-Padilla for numerous charges including attempted lewd and lascivious acts with a child under 14, molestation of a child under 18 and solicitation of prostitution. He is currently being held at the Madera County Jail. On June 5, Detectives applied for and were granted a non-release order and bail enhancement motion.


The Madera County Sheriff's Department believes Jesus Cortes-Padilla has potentially victimized more individuals in our community. If you are a victim, or believe you know someone who is, they are encouraging you to reach out to their office at 559-675-7770.

Madera County Sheriff Tyson Pogue said, "Our detectives have worked tirelessly on this case for quite some time. They see a pattern of behavior in Cortes-Padilla, and know he attempts to lure girls and women with promises of money. Many of these victims are reluctant to come forward, for fear they will be charged with crimes or he will seek revenge. We are asking each of them to step forward and allow us to seek justice on their behalf."

1947: Cake mixes from Betty Crocker and Pillsbury make their debut. The first mix is for a single layer ginger cake.


