

Ex Trustee Offers Budget Solution

Former Golden Valley Unified School District Trustee Steven Lewis has proposed a solution to the ongoing budget crisis the District is facing, that has the potential to save jobs and programs at Golden Valley schools.

At present, the solutions being considered entail laying off teachers, eliminating programs and even possibly closing school sites to satisfy a \$2.9 million budget shortfall over the next two years. In an email sent to District trustees and administrators, Lewis suggests that they are possibly considering, "... 'Just make the necessary cuts to meet the budget shortfall, hoping next year will somehow bring relief.' With no budget relief in sight, in another year, you will most likely be faced with another set of cuts that will go deeper than ever."

What Lewis is suggesting is the following: "I suggest an across the board percentage pay cut to EVERYONE for the next two years. The percentage target amount will be left in Jimmy's [Monreal] hand, but I would guess between 5 percent to 10 percent will be necessary. This would take the place of furloughs, layoffs and the cut of programs and site closures. I recommend coming up with two different percentages: One if the state budget does pass and one if not. You will only be

setting yourself up for a battle if you tackle this one year at a time. I would also recommend this percentage cut does NOT become a debt that must be repaid ... that will be too heavy of a financial burden for the district. When funding increases to target levels, then the percentage pay cut can be restored."

Lewis goes further: "At the last board meeting, I heard suggestions of: Eliminate one Assist Sup. Position; close a school site; close down our reading labs; let more teachers go and place more students in each class room; close before/after school programs ... the list goes on and on. These suggestions were not shared by the Board, but it was certainly discussed in the audience. As the discussions goes deeper on what to cut, you will begin to see the lobbying and fighting between staff members and more importantly the community ... all with the focus of what each stakeholder group feels should be cut."

At present the Board is considering an 8 percent cut for one year, which Lewis thinks is not effective. In a second email Lewis said, "An 8 percent cut is only a band-aid. The right move is to make one cut that will remain in place year after year until the state begins to increase the funding to education. This plan would require a percentage cut of 15 percent across the board from ALL employees."

Time will tell.

County Water, Water Everywhere



Eastside Acres, located on the Madera County side of the San Joaquin River east of the City of Firebaugh near Avenue 7, is usually a trickle. Spring rains have pushed it to the limit.

The excessive spring rains have caused flooding and road closures throughout Madera County. At press time on Monday, March 28, the following roads on the Valley floor are officially closed:

Road 10 @ Ave. 24 Ave. 9 between Road 21 & Road 22 Road 25 between Ave. 9 & Ave. 11 Ave. 10 between Road 21 & Road 24 1/2 Ave. 10 1/2 @ Road 23 Ave. 23 1/2 between Road 15 3/4 & Road 15 Road 20 between Ave. 23 & Ave. 23 1/2 Road 10 between Ave. 24 & Ave. 25 Ave. 13 between Road 29 & Road 30

At the same time, there have also been power outages throughout the County, most recently at press time there were 55 outages affecting between 500 to 4999 estimated customers and the cause was unknown and was waiting assessment by PG&E.

Finally, the amount of water being released from Friant dam as of 8 a.m. on Monday, March 28 is clocked at 6,590 cubic feet per second and at Highway 41 the San Joaquin River Water outflow is travelling at 6,700 cubic feet per second.

Rolling Hills AM/PM Robbed

The Madera County Sheriff's Department is investigating an armed robbery that took place Sunday, Feb. 27 at the AM/PM located off Highway 41 and Road 10 ½ in Rolling Hills.

According to reports, Deputies were dispatched to the store just before 9:30 p.m. Sunday night. Two armed men wearing white masks demanded cash from the clerk and before the left they reportedly stole the ATM machine and vandalized the shop's video surveillance equipment. Both men fled the store taking off in what was described as a full sized red pick-up, heading toward Children's Hospital or possibly Fresno.

The first suspect is described as being Hispanic, standing just over 6 feet tall with a

slim build and wearing a blue button up long sleeve shirt and blue jeans. He also sported a lipstick tattoo on his neck.

The second suspect, also Hispanic, stood just under 6 feet tall, wearing a white, long-sleeved t-shirt and brown gloves.

Both men were reportedly wearing white hockey type masks, similar to the mask worn by "Jason" in the Friday the 13th movie, and black beanies.

Anyone with information about this robbery is asked to call either the Madera County Sheriff's Department at 559-675-7770 or CRIME STOPPERS at 498-STOP. Any anonymous tip to CRIME STOPPERS that can help identify these two men could be worth up to \$1,000.

A second work by Sawall, titled "I See It Rising," received a 3rd place award in the mixed media category. Adult Fiction: The Girl Who Kicked the Hornet's Nest by Steig Larsson. In this third book of this best selling trilogy, Lisbeth Salander is seriously wounded, hospital-bound but still fixated on survival and revenge. 




Walking the Walk

My Mom, Faye Bailey, passed away on March 8, 2011. I presented the following at her Memorial Service on March 18, 2011 at Faith Community Church of the Nazarene in Clovis, Calif.

Several people have come up to me recently and have expressed their condolences and my family and I are grateful for that. Usually, they follow that up with, "Your Mom was a good woman." That's what I'd like to talk about today.

I want you to understand what kind of a woman Faye Bailey was and understand that calling her a "good woman" is grossly inadequate. It is insufficient on so many levels.

Someone who is nice to her neighbor could be characterized as a "good woman" even though the depth of that goodness could very well cease the moment she turned around and walked back into her house. Someone could be viewed as being a "good woman" if she just made pleasant, non-offensive conversation at the church picnic, only to curse at every car that got in her way during the drive home. Anymore, someone could be confused with being a "good woman" by just talking the talk but I have a question for you: How many of them go that crucial step further and actually "walk the walk"?

Faye Bailey walked the walk.

In my mother's life she was guided


by key elements that can make anyone a great person. But for her, these elements weren't concepts that she slipped on like a pair of slippers whenever it was convenient, or took off whenever it was difficult and didn't quite fit her plans. These elements went to her core and were always tempered with a simple guiding principle: Do the right thing. Oklahoma congressman J.C. Watts said that character is doing the right thing, even when no one is looking. With my Mom, even the most unannounced, unexpected, surprise visit would always yield the same result: Mom doing the right thing. To do otherwise was unfathomable to her. On more than one occasion I would tell her the way the world was doing something and her simple answer was always the same: "Well, it shouldn't be like that."

With this as her foundation, Mom conducted her life with three guiding principles: compassion; forgiveness; and unconditional love.

Mom understood compassion. She felt the deep sympathy and sorrow for anyone stricken by misfortune, but what separated her from those just "talking the talk" was her accompanying strong desire to alleviate that suffering. Usually that meant opening her home to others until they could get back on their feet, and in the extreme it included giving someone who had no place else to go a place where she could live out her final days with peace, dignity and love. To Mom, all she was doing was giving a little of her time and of herself to do the right thing and she couldn't understand why others couldn't easily do the same.

Mahatma Gandhi said, "The weak can never forgive. Forgiveness is the attribute of the strong." Mom's strength came through her forgiveness. In the course of her short life, unbelievable amounts of mental and physical debris were piled upon her delicate shoulders, but through the power of her forgiveness she knocked the wind out of those who would harm her by rendering them impotent. Luke 6:37 was the bedrock of Mom's view of the world. "Do not judge, and you will not be judged. Do not condemn, and you will not be condemned. Forgive, and you will be forgiven." I'm here to ask you


Always Listen to My Grandma

My Grandma has always been many things to me, the keeper of the Hershey's Kisses, the only woman brave enough to let me play with crystal stemware, and most importantly, the dispenser of infinite pearls of wisdom. She has said many things to me over the years, none more than "Eryn, stop biting your nails," which regrettably never stuck, but the advice I remember most usually had to do with driving skills and road etiquette.

My Grams always took driving very seriously and would constantly tell me she would not have a member of her family driving like an idiot, an old person, or a girl. The last of which always concerned me because I had been under the apparently mistaken impression that she was in fact, a girl. Questionable gender identity aside, as an adult I have come to realize that her motor vehicle advice was not only spot-on, but timeless.

Often I think of my Grams, and her rants from behind the wheel, especially when I am driving down the interstate and suddenly some jerk in an over-sized, clearly over-compensating vehicle merges onto the freeway going about ten miles an hour slower than the rest of us. In between slamming on my brakes and veering into the adjacent lane, I get a flashback of my Grandmother gripping her steering wheel with her jaw locked and teeth clenched, she would always say to me, "Eryn, when you get older and start driving remember, when merging onto the freeway, merge with the flow of traffic!" The last words of which were usually bellowed through the windshield in the direction of the offender that prompted her little tirade in the first place.

For the longest time, I was concerned that this was a rule she had just concocted in her own head, until I began driver's education and found out that Grams wasn't a crazy old lady with a serious case of road rage, on the contrary, she was right again. Drivers are responsible for getting onto the freeway safely, and WITH the flow of traffic. Go figure. Which means, although I will make every effort to merge and allow you room to do the same, you need to hit your gas and get your four-wheeled, gas-guzzling hunk of metal onto the freeway without making the rest of us hit our brakes or swerve out of your way. I am truly stunned by how many ignore that little



guideline all together, living in their own little bubble where they are the center of the universe and everyone around them will just have to find some way to avoid a collision even if it means spontaneously sprouting wings.

Another of my Grandmother's pet peeves was the fast-lane cruiser. I was reminded the other day of her irritation with someone cruising in the fast lane when I pulled up behind such a motorist, cruise control clearly set at the speed limit, just sauntering along while a parade of cars passed by her, horns blowing, inappropriate hand gestures flying, car after car had to change lanes and pass this little twit on the right. Clearly observation was not a gift she possessed, because she didn't seem to notice what had been happening. I fought the urge to pull in front of her and slam on my brakes as visions of how my Grandma might have handled this situation flooded over me, but I figured a five-car pileup certainly wouldn't have improved the traffic situation she had already caused, and so I took the high road and just went around like everyone before me.

I didn't blow my horn though, I think that would have disappointed Grams had she been riding shotgun. Grams used to say to me, "That little circle in the center of your steering wheel is not just to interject a little musical tone to break-up the monotony. Don't just give a toot, lay on that thing when you need to get someone's attention, maybe they need a little jolt to wake them up." My father may have physically taught me to drive, but whenever I am behind the wheel and I encounter a driver that clearly wasn't lucky enough to have a Grams like mine, it's her words I hear and her attitude I channel as I roll down my window and proceed to scream a driving lesson at them while traveling 70 miles per hour, after all, they might not listen to their own Grandmother, but they were certainly going to listen to mine.

Before I start my article this month I want to take the opportunity to thank everyone for their kind expressions of sympathy for our loss last week with the passing of my sister, Randy's mom, Faye Bailey. Since Easter is my favorite holiday of the year, either Christian or secular, I couldn't let it slide by without writing about it. We celebrate Easter Sunday because Jesus was crucified for our sins (John 3:16) died on the cross on Friday, was buried and rose from death on Sunday (Mark 16:6). The resurrection of Jesus Christ is one of the fundamental principles and beliefs of Christianity. It's why we say, "Christ is Risen - He is Risen Indeed!"

Egg Dying Time

In our families, Saturday before Easter is egg dying day. Each family

with children begins with two or three dozen eggs but don't always end up with that many. There are when the chorus is sung, "Up the one or two eggs that crack during the boiling, and invariably there are always the ones "accidenthat tally" hit the floor.

On Easter Sunday when we

get home from church, there is always egg hunts for the kids - seems like every year there is one egg that just can't be found (until about July). Eggs are a traditional symbol of new life. According to the book Festivals and Celebrations by Rowland Purton, eggs were dyed in ancient times by the Egyptians and Persians who exchanged them with their friends. "It was in Mesopotamia that Christians first gave eggs to their friends at Easter to remind them of the resurrection of Jesus," Purton wrote.



Our Easter Feast is real simple -Baked Ham, Scalloped Potatoes, green beans, green salad, rolls and desserts. Oh, and deviled eggs. NOT the ones that were up in a tree, behind a lawn chair or stepped on a couple of times earlier that day.

I start the eggs (I usually boil about two or three dozen) in cold water, and after they start boiling, turn the fire down and cook at a light boil for about 10 minutes. After the 10 minutes I usually test one to make sure it is done then IMMEDIATELY drain the hot water into the sink and turn the cold water onto the eggs. I let the cold water run on the eggs until you can pick up an egg easily then crack and peel them, leaving them whole. I have found this method the easiest to peel the egg without tearing it up. I have read of other methods but this one works best for me - if you have a method you have used, then by

all means use it. After you have peeled them and they have cooled enough that you can handle them, cut them in half from top to bottom with a sharp paring knife, putting the yolks into a bowl and the whites on a flat surface. I have a Tupperware cake saver that I use. If you


aren't going to finish deviling them at this point be sure to put them in the refrigerator.

When the eggs have been separated, put the whites in the fridge until you have the yolks ready. All I do is smash the yolks with a fork until they are kind of like corn meal. Add enough mayonnaise or Miracle Whip (I prefer Miracle Whip for most things, but in these eggs, I use half mayonnaise and half Miracle Whip) to make them moist, but not runny. If you aren't used to doing this, start

with only a couple of tablespoons, and add a little at a time until you get the consistency you want. Add a squirt of mustard (not too much) and salt and pepper to taste. Last year I added just a couple of tablespoons of sweet pickle juice. After you have the yolks tasting the way you want, put them in the whites and refrigerate until ready to serve. I use a teaspoon to fill my whites, but a pastry bag with a pretty tip would make them more festive.

The Easter Ham

As far as the ham goes, I think everyone has their favorite glaze — and some people don't like any — but it is entirely whatever your family prefers. We drain the juice from a can of pineapple chunks into a bowl; add enough brown sugar to make a paste — not real thick — and a squirt of mustard. When the ham is almost done (about 30 minutes before it is ready) take it out of the oven and score the outside (not real deep) in diamond shapes. With toothpicks put the pineapple chunks on the ham and spoon the juice mixture over that. Put back in the oven until it is

When it comes to the potatoes we really cheat here! We have found that the boxed ones are good, and a lot less trouble. With our gang, usually between 15 and 20, we usually use 10 to 12 boxes. Can you imagine

peeling that many potatoes? You'd feel like you were on KP duty in the Army. We use about four disposable aluminum baking pans, cooking two pans at a time.

The balance of the meal is simple, and just whatever your family likes

Like so many of our meals (we have seven households coming together) there are always a lot of desserts. My sister usually makes a coconut cake, I make a pineapple upside down cake (probably won't this year as my oven is on the fritz, and doubt if I can get it replaced before Easter), Adam will bring a couple of his apple pies and there will probably be a banana pudding (I can remember my grandma always made one for Thanksgiving dinner. But she made real pudding, not the boxed ones we use today).

It Takes a Team

What's wrong with this picture? You walk into a fast-food restaurant and join a long line of people waiting to order while the manager runs from the counter, to the grill, to wipe tables and take drive-through orders. You're thinking, "This place isn't managed well." And yet in many families, the same thing is happening. The person who manages the affairs of the household (often times the mom), is trying to do it all. Newsflash – no one can do it all!

It takes a team. If you're raising a family here in the Ranchos, chances are your kids participate on one or more teams – sports, music, drama, academic, dance, cheer, etc. As responsible parents we make sure they practice, show up on time, come prepared with uniforms and equipment, obey their coaches and give their all for the success of the team. But somehow, when we arrive at home and the sports gear is tossed on the floor, the dirty uniform is left in the bathroom and dinner is expected on the table, the idea of teamwork is often left on the field.

If you think your kids are too busy to contribute at home, they're probably too busy. As parents we need to be working ourselves out of a job. We start with little, helpless babies and the goal is to equip them to someday walk out the door as capable, responsible young men and women. Not only should we desire their success in future occupations, we should be training them for success in their own homes and families. Modeling and expecting family teamwork will go a long way to promote success in every area of your child's life.

There are many facets to family teamwork besides chores, but let's tackle that one first. One of the tools I use in my Family Manager® coaching is called "Who's Responsible for What?" (You can request a copy by emailing me at info@organizedbychoice.com) It breaks down the many duties that keep a household running into departments like Time & Scheduling, Home & Property, Food, Family & Friends, Finances, and Special Events. The list effectively demonstrates that there are more responsibilities than one person can possibly handle effectively and provides a starting point for

distributing duties among the team members. Recognizing that everyone is needed to keep a household running smoothly is the first step toward building teamwork.

If you have a partner, sit down together and determine how the adult duties will be shared. When my husband and I first married we were both working fulltime and living in an apartment. We came from very traditional families and while there wasn't the traditional yard care role for him to play, there was more than plenty cooking, cleaning, and laundry for me to do. It wasn't long before we had a "discussion" and adjusted our roles to correspond to the amount of time we each had to contribute.

Once that is established, move on to determine age-appropriate chores for your children. If you need some help, there are lots of resources on the internet; just search "age appropriate chores." Even little ones can begin putting away their clean clothes and older ones can help with laundry, general cleaning, meal preparation and clean up. Create a chore chart (www.mykimbo.com, www.chorecharts.com) so that everyone can clearly see what's expected of them.

If assigned chores is a new step for your family, or even if you're just boosting your expectations, sit down together and take time to talk about how your family is a team. Engage them in sharing about how other teams they're involved in work, and help them see how vital each person is on the family team. Don't expect overwhelming enthusiasm, but do expect them to feel valued as they realize their important role. Make sure they view chores as a necessary part of a successful home and family rather than a punishment.

Just like the french fry guy needs to know how to dip the fries, your kids need training for each of the chores you expect them to do. Demonstrate and then check their work. Encourage them and show them that you value their participation on the family team.

Finally, be consistent. As the Family Manager it's your job to make sure each one is doing his or her part. Follow through with the rewards and/or consequences you establish. Yes, I'm a parent and I know how hard that is, but it is so essential.

Success in this area is a mixed blessing. When your kids grow up and move out, you suddenly have a lot more jobs to do around the house. I sure do miss my kids!

ing in the event, there will be a silent auction and 100 percent of all the proceeds will be disbursed to all of the charities/organizations.



State of the State's Budget: Its Impact on Golden Valley Schools, Part II

On March 24, 2011, Governor Brown signed the budget bills passed by the Legislature the previous week for a total of \$11.2 billion in budget solutions. This means the education budget and trailer bills are now law. However, the budget remains \$12.6 billion out of balance.

While the negotiations are continuing for placing tax extensions on a June special election ballot, Governor Brown indicated that there is "still a week or two" before a late June ballot date is lost. The parties appear to be negotiating in good faith but still are apart on the major issues of redevelopment, regulation reform/repeal, public employee pension changes and tax extensions.

Many school district superintendents have asked what happens if the Legislature does not act to put taxes on the ballot for June 2011. Some people speculate that we may be facing an all cuts budget and possibly a later, November 2011, special election with revenue initiatives.

Regardless of what happens in the next few months, school districts are faced with statutory timelines to take certain actions to balance their budgets for the current year and the next two fiscal years. The first deadline has come and gone. March 15th is the statutory deadline to notify teachers and certificated administrators of possible reductions in particular kinds of services due to budget reductions. These notices are also known as "pink slips" or layoff notices. The deadline for finalizing a teacher layoff is May 15th. Between now and then the hope is that the district may find other ways to close the funding gap without losing critical staff.

Another statutory deadline is for noticing classified staff of potential layoffs. The date set by Education Code is 45 days before the end of the school year, which could all be in jeopardy in this scenario. places the notification window no later than April 30th. Unfortunately, the state will most likely not have an answer for school districts by this time, even though school districts must adopt a balanced budget with a minimum 3% reserve no later than June 30th.

The impact of the state's indecision on how to close the remaining \$12.6 billion dollar gap leaves districts in a position for planning for the worse case scenario. What is Golden Valley's worse case scenario for 2011-12? Faced with approximately \$360 less per student if the tax extensions do not pass will incur a deficit of approximately \$450,000 on the district. This is approximately a 3% reduction in our overall \$14 million dollar budget. Closing this gap will be painful, but possible, through continued analysis of maximizing efficiencies in operations and through the ongoing collaboration with our employees.

The more devastating outlook if the tax initiatives do not pass is the 2012-13 school year. Public education will be faced with exponential budget deficits. The impact on Golden Valley could be another \$2 million loss in revenue or another 15% reduction. District and school operations, the length of the school year, class sizes, extracurricular activities, elective offerings

What can we do as citizens of this state? We need to continue to lobby our local and state legislators to implore them to not reduce education funding further and to eventually start to restore the \$14 billion to education that has already been reduced over the past three years. We need to inform and educate our neighbors and friends regarding the impact on our schools if the tax extensions do not pass in June and encourage them to go to the polls in June.

Our students deserve no less than the best. Our goal is to continue to provide the highest quality education within the limitations that are placed upon us. We thank our community for their ongoing support of helping Golden Valley "grow a district of excellence".



First Transit will provide free public transportation to the Madera County Transportation Commission offices. Call Doug Thompson at 559-661-7435 before 5:00 pm, April 12, 2011 to make a reservation. A Spanish language interpreter will be available during the public hearing for those who wish to testify before the Commission in Spanish. If you would like to testify in a language other than Spanish and English or require other special accommodations in order to testify, please contact the Commission by April 12, 2011.

Under the California Transportation Development Act (TDA), this hearing opportunity is provided annually to take testimony on potential unmet transit needs within the region. The Commission must, subsequent to the hearing, make a determination whether the needs presented are "reasonable" to meet. After all "reasonable" needs have been met through the expansion of existing services, or the creation of new transit systems, the Commission may release remaining TDA funds for street and road purposes (repair, reconstruction, etc.).

Members of the public, interested agencies, and civic groups are encouraged to appear and testify to any transportation needs not being met by the current system. Testimony should be as specific as possible with regard to those citizens, or groups of citizens, not currently served by transit, the requested type and amount of transit service, the geographic area in which service is needed, and any other supporting evidence of information, which will help in the evaluation of the "reasonableness" of the requested service.

A request to speak need not be scheduled, individuals may simply appear at the hearing and request to be recognized, however a scheduled appearance is encouraged to help organize the testimony. today: Do you understand forgiveness? Do you understand its importance? Do you understand its power? Its strength? Jesus stressed that forgiveness is crucial. In Matthew he said, "For if you forgive men when they sin against you, your heavenly Father will also forgive you. But if you do not forgive men their sins, your Father will not forgive your sins." Mom understood this. She lived it. It was one of the things that characterized her. It was the second area where her walk eclipsed her talk.

There's an old joke that if someone you know is particularly annoying, when you look up "annoying" in the dictionary you'll find a picture of that person. You can do something similar in the Bible. If you want to define "unconditional love," simply go to 1 Corinthians 13 "Love is patient. love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres." If you cut to the end of the chapter you find, "And now these three remain: faith, hope and love. But the greatest of these is love."

You have just seen a picture of Faye Bailey.

For her five sons who had the honor of growing up with her as their Mom, they knew her patience. They knew her kindness. And although she always wanted a better life for her boys, they never saw her envious of others. Mom didn't express her love through arrogant boasting or pride. We never saw her dishonor others and she didn't get easily angered, which, with five sons, was a miracle in itself. But at the heart of Mom's unconditional love was that her love for us, and others, kept no record of wrongs. She loved us because she loved

us. She could conceive of nothing else. Her love for us was not based on what we did for her today or what we could do for her in the future or what we had done for her in the past. Her love was the purest form of love known: totally, completely and wholly unconditional. Her love always protected us, was always based on trust, was always full of hope and always persevered to the end, usually way beyond wherever my brothers and I were.

I hope you can see now that Faye Bailey was indeed a "good woman," but she was much, much more than that. And now that she has passed on to glory, the question remains: What shall her legacy be? Forget about the death of Faye Bailey – what can we learn from the life of Faye Bailey? How can we – each and every one of us – honor the memory of Faye Bailey?

The answer is simple and begins by taking stock of where you are right now. Do you do the right thing to the exclusion of all else? Do you do it even when no one is looking? If not, you need to start now.

Are you compassionate? Do you understand compassion? Do you get it when Jesus said, "Then the King will say to those on his right, 'Come, you who are blessed by my Father; take your inheritance, the kingdom prepared for you since the creation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me.'

Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you something to drink? When did we see you a stranger and invite you in, or needing clothes and clothe you? When did we see you sick or in prison and go to visit you?'

The King will reply, 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of

these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me."

Do you show compassion to the exclusion of all else? Do you show compassion even when no one is looking? If not, you need to start now.

Are you forgiving? Do the words of Jesus in Matthew resonate with you? "For if you forgive men when they sin against you, your heavenly Father will also forgive you. But if you do not forgive men their sins, your Father will not forgive your sins." Do you show forgiveness to the exclusion of all else? Are you forgiving even when no one else is looking? If not, you need to start now.

Do you put conditions on your love to others? Do you love them "if" they do something for you? Do you love them only "when" they do something for you? Do you love them only by "how" they do something for you first? Can you fully – even partially – wrap your mind around the concept that true unconditional love keeps no record of wrongs or that it always protects, always trusts, always hopes and always perseveres? Do you express unconditional love to the exclusion of all else? Is your love unconditional even when no one else is looking? If not, you need to start now.

The passing of my mom, if it shows us nothing else, points out the grim reality that if she can go immediately without warning, any of us can go immediately without warning. In that twinkling of eye will you next hear, "Well done, good and faithful servant!" or "I don't know you or where you come from."? If you don't know which you will hear, you need to start now. Do the right thing. Be compassionate. Forgive others. Make sure your love is unconditional. If we can all do these things, Faye's legacy will burn brightly in all of us and we will all be the best we can be and humanity will be better off for it.


