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# New Development Announced for Madera Ranchos

A new housing development called Liberty Groves is being proposed through Greenleaf Orchards, Pegasus Orchards and Silverdust and is planned for the land that at present is being farmed just west and south of Liberty High School.

A comprehensive plan for the long-range development of the 1,393 acres has begun and will comprise a master planned, mixed use community. The developers say that Liberty Groves will serve as a logical expansion of the Madera Ranchos community and will have a guiding plan that will ensure that Liberty Groves is unique in providing a sense of community for its residents, visitors and the surrounding neighbors.

A preliminary project application has been submitted to the County to start the multiple year entitlement process, however, they have engaged experts in land planning, infrastructure, water resources, transportation and natural resources. This team is hoping to develop a creative and sustainable plan for our community, respecting neighbors and the heritage of the Madera Ranchos. The developers are asking the community to become engaged in a dia-



logue throughout the process to ensure transparency.

Madera County has experienced significant growth, evidenced by a 40 percent increase in population between 1990 and 2000, compared to 14 percent for all of California. This has required Madera County to reassess its future.

The development partners have farmed in the Madera Ranchos area for over 20 years and the local residents and businesses are their long-time neighbors, to whom they have expressed a deep commitment.

"We have a vested interest in this community and therefore share a common desire to preserve its well-being," said Igal Treibatch, one of the partners.

Due to the length of time a project like this involves, the developers will still be planting trees and anticipate farming the

# Water Without Boarders Update

You may remember we sponsored a visit by a group of water-related scientists and engineers from Israel to the Central Valley in March. Many of you had the chance to meet and hear from them and other local experts at the Town Hall meeting that took place at the Liberty High School auditorium on March 19.

The main point of bringing the Israelis to the Valley was to establish a working relationship that will allow for an exchange of knowledge, experience and technology and to find projects of common interest to work on. To help the Israelis understand the Valley's problems and challenges, we travelled to visit areas which manifest the type of prevailing problems in the Valley so the delegation can assess the conditions here and meet with our own experts.

We did not look just at problems, we visited cutting-edge projects such as the joint project of the Orange County Water District and the Orange County Sanitation District, which filters and treats sewage and returns it to the groundwater aquifer where it can be later pumped out as drinking water.

We ended our visit in Sacramento, meeting with several Assembly members who sit on water-related committees, including Mike Villines, and had some frank discussion about the observations of the visitors.


One of the most striking facts that came out of this visit:


- In the U.S. we "reuse" LESS THAN 2 percent of our current water.
- As number one in the world, Israel, due to their advanced technology, "reuse" OVER 75 percent of their water.
- Within 5 to 10 years, virtually all of Israel's drinking water supplies will come from desalination, either of sea water or of brackish (mineral and salt laden) groundwater.

The visitors, who represent Mekorot, the Israeli national water company, invited our experts and politicians to a reciprocal visit in Israel so our people can assess for themselves the conditions, challenges and solutions found by the Israelis and thereafter decide how to proceed with enhancing the relationship.

Several of us, will be traveling to Israel in mid-June. We will tour a number of the Israeli water supply and treatment facilities, and have the opportunity to meet with experts in all aspects of water supply, groundwater recharge, irrigation and most importantly "management." Our delegation will include staff from the California Water Institute at Fresno State, a representative from Assembly member Mike Villines' office, a member of the Regional


### Incompetent Evil in Charge

Item 5: Quarterly Report by Water Advisory Commission Chairman Ed McIntyre on activities of the Water Advisory Commission. (09600)

I am hopeful we can finally have an open and honest debate about what the Water Commission is allowed to do and what they are doing and have a discussion about what the new Integrated Water Management Group will have the authority to do and who will be represented by the members.

My concerns are: In the instance of the subcommittee to form/create/develop, the name of the subcommittee has been changed several times in an effort to split some legal hairs. When "We the People" spoke to our Board of Supervisors during the creation of the Water Advisory Commission, they seemed to listen. The Water Advisory Commission (WAC) morphed from a 13-person panel heavily favoring special interests of the water purveyors in the Valley to a five-member panel representing the entire county. One provision stressed over and over was the absolute limitation holding the WAC's power/authority and mission to advising the Board of Supervisors. As I understand it, when the subcommittee's activities are complete they will have created the Integrated Water Management Group. The IRWPG at this point in the process is slated to have the authority to: 1) Amend the Integrated Water Management Plan covering all areas and citizens of Madera County; 2) Create a priority list of and be the only avenue to apply for grants through the Department of Water Resources, the tax dollars collected from all areas and citizens of Madera County.

And in one version of the proposed Memo Of Understanding the panel was proposed to have 13 members with the majority being from groups representing special interests of the water purveyors in the Valley.

No one ever applies for a loan, or interviews for a job and starts the process by saying, "I am not worthy." Can you imagine trying to sell a luxury car with a sales strategy based on humility? Look at some of the past marketing slogans of luxury cars that have recently suffered such a drastic setback in standing.

"... the new measurement of greatness."

" ... universal symbol of excellence."

World's ity that argues against the idea Best Synonym for Quality!"

"It's a 'Who's Who' of Highway!"

"More Eloquent Than Words!"

"Those who want the finest want - the Standard of the World!"

These luxury cars were the standard of greatness and the symbol of status and class. One thing that they did not advertise for was an option for humility as a desired feature.

I propose to you today that humility opens the door to accepting the Grace of God. In story after story in our book of faith, we have heard how humility brought strength out of weakness. The humility of Mary the mother of Jesus who said with an unshakable conviction, (Luke 1:38) "Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to thy word."

The humility of the Son of God born as a baby in a manger and announced by angels to the shepherds, (Luke 2:12) "And this shall be a sign unto you; Ye shall find the babe wrapped in swaddling clothes,

lying in a manger."

The humility of Son of God who said, (Mat 8:20) "Foxes have holes, and birds of the air have nests; but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head."

The humility of Jesus' obedience to God and the humility that comes from being betrayed by your friends when Jesus said to Peter before he was arrested, (Mark 14:37) "Simon, are you still asleep? Could you not keep awake with me for just one hour?"

The humility of human trauma and distress when Jesus said, (Mark 14:34)"My soul is overwhelmed with sorrow to the point of death. Abba, Father, everything is possible for you. Take this cup from me. Yet not what I will, but what you will."



### **Book Recommendations**

**Juvenile Fiction:** The Graveyard Book by Neil Gaiman. As the winner of this year's Newbery Medal, this very interesting but somewhat dark book is sure to capture the hearts of readers of all ages with the exception of the very young. The beginning



is rather gruesome with the murder of an entire family ... all but the baby. This little boy, a toddler, miraculously wanders out of the house and up the hill to a cemetery where he is taken in by the ghosts just in time before the killer tracks him down. After much consultation among the ghosts, it is decided that the Owens, a childless ghost couple from the mid 1700's, will raise the boy as their own. The task of obtaining food for the child is taken on by Silas, who is neither living nor dead, and who offers to be the boy's guardian. From then on the boy is named Nobody Owens, Bod for short. He has the protection of the cemetery but is not allowed to leave as long as the killer lies in wait. Bod enjoys a somewhat classical education from those who made or at least lived what we only know as history. But as Bod grows up and begins to explore outside the cemetery gates, danger and mystery follow close behind. What appears to be an innocent friendship has

2 Tbs. Flour

3/4 C Sugar

2 Eggs – beaten

Mix together all ingredients in pan and cook until thick - stirring constantly, not letting the mixture scorch. Let cool before spreading on the Cool Whip layer. Sprinkle with 1/4 C chopped nuts.

The following recipe is a variation of the above salad, but thought I might include it as it sounds good. It's just labeled:

### Marguerite's Jell-O Salad

In the first layer, replace the lime Combine all ingredients in a pint Jell-o with any flavor Jell-o your family likes. 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

might have to add more water, but just a little at a time.

Back to salads. I knew that the word "slaw" meant salad but I thought it was German. Tonight I looked it up on the internet and found it is Dutch. It said: "The word 'cole slaw' comes from the Dutch 'koolsla,' which means 'cabbage salad.' The name for the salad doesn't give a clue about what, besides cabbage, goes into cole slaw." It goes on to say you can have any variation of dressings, from mayonnaise or vinegar or both. Other recipes can call for yogurt and/or citrus juice in lieu of mayonnaise and/or vinegar. And, in addition to the shredded cabbage, there can be an array of other ingredients, such as almonds, apples, grated carrots, chunk or crushed pineapple, and even one recipe I saw called for toasted ramen noodles. My mom made the best cole slaw but I can't find any recipe. I know she made a dressing of Miracle Whip, a little milk to make it creamy, apple cider vinegar, salt and pepper and a little sugar. It was yummy!

Several years ago, I went on a weekend retreat with some ladies from my church. Another group of ladies from the church did all the cooking and, as they say about church women, could they cook! At the end of the retreat as we were leaving, we were each given a bundle of 3x5 cards with all the recipes that were cooked over the week-end. One was for salad they served called:

### Overnight Salad

Layer in glass salad bowl:

1 head Iceberg Lettuce, torn into bite size pieces

½ C chopped Celery

½ C chopped Bell Pepper

1 pkg. Baby Peas (thawed and

drained)

1 can Sliced Water Chestnuts drained

Optional: Grated cheddar cheese, grated carrot, sliced radish. ½ small red onion chopped

Spread one cup mayonnaise over top, sealing completely. Sprinkle ½ cup parmesan cheese and ½ cup bacon bits over top. Cover bowl with Saran Wrap and refrigerate overnight or 24 hours. Toss just before serving.

For the last salad recipe, I've asked our editor Randy Bailey to give you his recipe for Broccoli Salad:

### Broccoli Salad

2 Bunches of Broccoli (raw, washed)

1/2 c. Red Onion, chopped

1/2 c. Raisins

1 Jar Bacon Bits

### **Broccoli Salad Dressing**


1 c. Mayonnaise

1/2 c. Sugar

2 tsp. Rice Vinegar

Break up the broccoli into bitesize pieces. Mix together with the chopped red onions, raisins and bacon bits. Add the Broccoli Salad dressing and gently mix it all together. IMPORTANT: You've got to refrigerate this before you serve it, at least for 30 minutes.

# Madera DA Knows Law, People

It's funny the directions a life can take. One of those times you should have "zigged" and the next thing you know you're "zagging" into something else that changes everything.

Michael Keitz, Madera County's present District Attorney, graduated from Cal Poly San Luis Obispo back in 1978 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Animal Science, so he went out and did what any other graduate with just such a degree would do; became an assistant Vice President at Bank

of America. For the next 13 years it was budgets and risk management and loans and foreclosures – typical banker duties.

But in 1980 Keitz got the opportunity to become a Madera County Reserve Deputy Sheriff. He volunteered for approximately 20 hours per month and a "Batman" lifestyle began to exist: By day he was the quiet bank executive; at night he was face to face with the

dregs of society. He must have liked it because he remained a Reserve Deputy for the next 19 years.

So here's where the zigging and zagging come together. At the bank he's increasingly working with the legal problems bank contracts can generate. As a Reserve he's getting the opportunity to work with the law where it's not a theory in a book but real, in-your-face decisions that can mean safety or harm to innocent citizens. Round about 1987 he puts the two together and enrolls at San Joaquin College of Law and by 1991 he's graduating with a Juris Doctor degree and the

following year he passes the California State Bar. In June of 1992, same month he passes the bar, he applies and gets hired by the Madera County District Attorney's office.

And the rest, as they say, is history.

After 16 years with the department and obtaining the position of Senior Deputy District Attorney, in October of 2008 Keitz was selected by the Madera County Board of Supervisors to take over the position of District Attorney that was being vacated by the election of former District Attorney Ernie LiCalsi to the position of judge with the Madera County Superior Court. Keitz was selected

from among a group of four contenders for the position — including former Fresno County District Attorney Ed Hunt — and was voted in by a vote of 4 to 1.

One of the best aspects of Keitz is that he lives in Madera and has since 1979. He actually said in an interview that he had decided he would never live anywhere else.

Good for us.

What else that's good for us is his track record. He's got an 89

percent conviction rate, was named "Prosecutor of the Year" by the Madera Elks Lodge, has indicted 32 defendants through the Madera Grand Jury and has gotten assets from druggies equalling nearly a quarter of a million dollars.

Are we getting our money's worth or what?

I don't know where he finds the time but he also belongs to Kiwanis, is a Cub Scout leader and is a judge for academic decathlons and mock trials.

If you get a chance, get to know our District Attorney, Michael Keitz.

area for the next 20 years or more.

A very positive sign for the Ranchos is the development group's proactive work on water issues that will impact the Ranchos in addition to their project. It is their group that has made contact with the Israeli Department of Agriculture and have created a core group of Israeli and Central Valley scientists to exchange information and work together on problems common to both regions. Through this exchange both groups can learn about cutting-edge technology and find ways to implement techniques to

overcome the water problems that we are facing and address the problems of recharge, salinity and reuse of treated wastewater.

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

On June 4 the Senior Class from Liberty High School will join a collection of Americans that hold a High School diploma. They should feel a sense of accomplishment that so many other High School Seniors will feel in the month of June. No doubt there will be plenty of laughs, some tears and many handshakes, but for one lucky senior at Liberty High it will also mean new transportation.

The Liberty High Sober Grad program this year, like others in the past, will encourage seniors to have fun on graduation night without the risk of alcohol and the consequences that so many times have turned a night of celebration into a night of DUI's, and in a worst case scenario, death. Thanks to local businessman Tim Grizzell, one lucky senior will win a 1996 Saturn SC2. This isn't some throwaway, 13-year-old clunker. 

dented massive multi-faceted assault on all things American.



Water Quality Board and a member of the California Department of Water Resources, as well as the engineer for our Liberty Groves project.

We expect this ongoing relationship to result in new ideas and opportunities for different ways to extend our precious water supply here in Madera County.

Recent weeks have been exciting times for us as we stay progressive and work to develop water resources for Southeast Madera County.

Last week, after reviewing the concept with Madera County staff, we received permission to begin preliminary study and design of a new water recharge facility for Southeast Madera county. The purpose of this project is to start mitigating the over-drafting which is tak-

ing place in the area by all of us who work and live around Southeast Madera. This project (if it gets final approval) will be a collaborative between Madera County and several of the landowners, ourselves included. There's not a lot to say about this project yet, as it has not been designed, but it will allow the County to recharge water for the benefit of southeast Madera County as it becomes available. We will be consulting with the Israelis from Mekorot, Fresno State and others in order to maximize the positive effects.

Lastly, the County announced completion of its Integrated Regional Water Management Plan about a year ago. This broadly-scoped document looks at many aspects of groundwater and recharge throughout the County and identifies possible ways to enhance the situation, but stops

short of recommending individual projects or planning a schedule of improvements. That level of detail is left to future work. Part of that future work is the establishment of a governing board and gaining approval of the Integrated Regional Water Management Plan (IRWMP) from the state.

A board has to be selected and I believe it must have within it a member which will represent the needs and interest of the Madera Ranchos, Bonadelle Ranchos, Rolling Hills and other stakeholders representing the large population in the immediate area.

Although the County has proposed and suggested a panel for the board, the members must be selected by a subcommittee which is working at present on establishing the Governing Board.

Now we wait to see if the state will approve

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the regional plan, or if there is more work to be done to gain a more "regional" perspective by including other agencies. In any case, there is work to be done to plan projects and begin taking real steps toward improving the groundwater situation in our area.

So there is much being done, and even more to do. As there is more to report we will provide additional articles right here, and will set up additional Town-Hall Meetings as they make sense to get feed-back from the community.

For now, we in Southeast Madera must be vigilant about our future and if we don't look after our water needs obligations and rights, NO ONE ELSE WILL! GET INVOLVED!




