Page 2 **Bigelow, Patterson Request Audit**

Assemblyman Jim Patterson (R-Fresno) and Assemblyman Frank Bigelow (R-Madera) announced they have submitted a request to the Joint Legislative Audit Committee asking them to review the process by which the California High Speed Rail Authority is acquiring privately owned land.

On Jan. 14, the California State Public Works Board authorized the Authority to begin acquiring 356 parcels of prime farm land in Fresno and Madera Counties. The acquisition of right-of-way is a critical prerequisite before the Authority initiates the largest state public works project in the nation's history. Specifically, the request asks whether the Authority has specific policies and procedures in place that would allow landowners to appeal appraisal values prior to the initiation of eminent domain proceedings and what safeguards are in place to ensure fair and reasonable offers. Bigelow and Patterson noted that effective oversight is needed to protect private property owners and to ensure that no landowners are unnecessarily displaced.

"California agriculture is one of the state's premier industries and in order to

protect hundreds of acres of the most productive agricultural lands in the world, it's important we know the process for such acquisition," Bigelow said. "Our Valley's farmland and citizen-owned private property can't be replaced, so we have to make sure we get it right the first time because there is no going back."

A previous audit request for the rightof-way information was submitted to the Joint Legislative Audit Committee in March of this year but was rejected after Authority officials stated they could provide the information within a "few days." To date, that information has not been provided.

"We cannot allow the Authority to continue a reckless, headlong pursuit of high speed rail that results in taking as much property as they can for the least amount of compensation. Private property owners need to be treated fairly and adequately compensated for the loss of their land and businesses," said Patterson.


The audit request will be reviewed by the Committee and the Bureau of State Audits before it is heard later this month.

MC-ALERT for Free County Alerts

In light of a fire that threatened hundreds of homes in Oakhurst in early August, Sheriff John Anderson is urging residents and property owners throughout Madera County to register for free emergency alerts by signing up with MC-ALERT.

"We were lucky, this time," Anderson said, referencing a 20-acre blaze that threatened hundreds of homes and property in the area of John West Road and Road 426.

The MC-Alert Emergency Warning System is used to deliver alerts when there is a threat to the health safety of or Madera County



As fire crews battled the blaze on Aug. 11, the Madera County Sheriff's Office issued 3,822 emergency alerts, notifying homeowners, renters and property owners about a possible evacuation. Unfortunately, records show that only 233 confirmed they received the notification, and out of those 233 confirmations, it appears only 110 confirmations came from those who had signed up with MC-Alert.

Anderson explained how an Oakhurst couple signed up with MC-Alert were on vacation in Colorado when the blaze broke out. As soon as they got word, they called

neighbors their back home asking them to handle immediate affairs on their behalf. Fortunately, no action had to be taken as they later received

an all-clear notification.

There is no cost to register. MC-Alert is a free service provided by the Madera County Sheriff's Office of Emergency Services in cooperation with the Picayune Rancheria of Chukchansi Indians and participating cities.

Madera County is issuing critical warnings to citizens county-wide, but you have to be signed up to receive them. For those who need help signing up they can call Erica Stuart, Public Information Officer, at 559-675-7976, or you can visit the website at www.mcalert.org.

Salvador's Hat in Sheriff's Ring

Posting the value notices online allows the Assessor to make Assessed Values available for all properties while saving tens of thousands of dollars in printing and mailing costs.

the County website can obtain a printed value notice by calling 559-675-7710, or by visiting the Assessor's Office or sending a written request to: Madera County Assessor's Office, 200 W. 4th Street, Madera, CA 93637.

Burglars Take Advantage of Grieving Family; Use Newspaper, Online

A warning to residents: Be careful of what you post in newspapers and online

Madera County Sheriff John Anderson is warning citizens to be careful about sharing information in newspapers and online. Something as personal as a viewing for a deceased loved one can turn into a crime of opportunity for thieves. Recently, while a Madera family attended a visitation, burglars made their move, broke into the family's home, ransacked it and stole their valuable possessions.

Sheriff Anderson called the break-in a crime of exploitation because those behind the burglary are suspected to have been aware of the family's loss, as the time and place of viewing were widely publicized in newspapers and on the internet.

There's no doubt that the internet is the

fastest and most effective way to reach a large body of people in a short amount of time, but, he says, with the advent of rapid technology, we have to be vigilant as well. "Be mindful of what you share and how you share it. Whether we like it or not, thieves are accessing our every move by simply following us in posts placed in the newspaper and on Social Media," Anderson said.

He says the public should try to avoid the temptation of :

• Announcing planned events – thieves will know when you won't be home.

• Sharing information while on vacation – thieves back home will know you're not at home.

• Posting seemingly innocuous pictures that give thieves a bird's eye view of you, your habits, and when you're not at home.

Thieves are getting smarter and they're wasting no time in seizing an opportunity to exploit you.

I had not heard that writing paper, envelopes and stamps had gone out of style. There are still some of us who thrill when we get a birthday card or Christmas card in the mail box. Some of us don't trust the computer as much as you do, Eryn. I still pay my bills by check and put them in an envelope with a stamp. It is my way of keeping track of my life. I don't trust the computer to care as much about my finances as I do. If we are not teaching our children what an envelope is or how to address it and where to put a stamp on it, it is our fault not theirs. Yes, I use email even at my age but I don't use it as my mail service. A computer is a wonderful machine if and when it works. Letters sent by mail has been the way people in America have communicated for hundreds of years. I hope it never stops. Small towns and large cities all over America rely on the U.S. Postal Service. The U.S. Postal Service provides thousands of jobs all over America. With jobs so hard to find, do you really want to put thousands more out of work?

For years I have taken it for granted that when I walk to the mail box to either mail a letter or pick up my mail that it would be there. I never thought about the person whose responsibility it was to put it in my box. I never thought about how many hands a piece of mail goes though before it is delivered to me. I know all of the jokes about "SNAIL MAIL" and it not being as fast as computers but an email just isn't the same as getting a hand-written letter or a card that someone has spent time picking out special for you. It isn't magic when you find a card or letter in your mail box. My daughter is a mailperson and her husband is a mail handler at the central office in Fresno. Both jobs have been hard on their bodies as they are very physical jobs. They have been able to raise a family and maintain a home in the Ranchos by having jobs with the U.S. Postal Service.

I am so glad that I don't have any children attending California public schools anymore.



The Madera County Schools' Superintendent, Sally Frazier, helped us through the system to become recognized. It was 30 days later before Sally could certify the members of the first Golden Valley Unified School District School Board. Sally acted as the first interim superintendent for

Golden Valley Unified School District. Ed said it would work fine and on Nov. 1, 1989 Golden Valley Unified had an address and phone number and we were ready to do business, all because of Ethel Pronin's gift of one of her storefront buildings.

On Tuesday, Aug. 13 the Golden Valley Unified School Board presented Ethel Pronin with a thank you plaque for her generous gift to Golden Valley of that first district office building. It was where we started to put together the many pieces of a brand new school district and passed our first school bond so that we could build our beautiful Liberty High School. Many of Ethel Pronin's Ranchos/Hills Seniors friends were at the presentation. Ethel has

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resentation. Ethel has done a lot for this community. Her business is Eddings Realtors at 37144 Ave. 12 Suite 102 in the Ranchos. Drop



Summer isn't over yet, so be careful not to be out in the sun too long. Wear sunscreen and keep the water handy.






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A Heartfelt Farewell



Pass the Pigskin

I was surprised at the paraphernalia they have to take to get their food on the table. An ice chest of course is a must, but a barbecue is another necessity. These days it isn't just hamburgers and hot dogs – there is tri-tip, chicken, ribs or sausages to choose from. Then there are all the salads – macaroni, potato,



pasta, and how about baked beans (don't you dare just open a can of pork and beans). And of course dessert – cobblers, pies, cakes. What you end up with is a backyard barbecue that you take with you to the football game.

What party is worth having that doesn't include some kind of chicken wings? You can make everything from hot wings, to the sweet and sour wings. How about:

Sweet and Spicy Chipotle Chicken Wings

1 (15 ounces) can tomato sauce

- ½ C honey
- $^{1}\!\!\!/_{4}$ C chipotle-flavored hot sauce

1 T grated lime rind (about 3 limes)

- 3 T fresh lime juice
- ¹/₄ tsp. ground red pepper 4 to 5 pounds chicken wings
- 1 T salt
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. pepper
- 1 C all-purpose flour
- Peanut or vegetable oil

Heat tomato sauce and butter in a small saucepan over medium heat, stirring until butter melts. Stir in honey and next four ingredients and bring to a boil. Reduce heat, and simmer, stirring often, 5 minutes. Set sauce aside. Cut wingtips off and discard.

Cut wings in half at joint.

Sprinkle wings with salt and pepper; dredge lightly in flour, shaking off excess.

Pour oil into large skillet or Dutch oven to a depth of $1 \frac{1}{2}$ " and heat to 375 degrees.

Fry wings in batches for about 8 minutes per batch or until golden and crispy. Using a slotted spoon, remove wings to drain on paper towels. Be sure to allow oil to heat up again before starting the next batch.

Place wings in a large bowl. Drizzle with the tomato sauce

mixture, tossing well to coat. Let stand 5 minutes before serving or packing up to take to the tailgate party.

Or how about some meatballs on your table? This recipe gives the ingredients to make your own meatballs, but if you didn't have the time to make those little meatballs, how about cheating and get a bag of frozen meatballs at the grocery store?

> Sweet and Sour Meatballs ³/₄ pound lean ground beef

³⁄₄ pound ground turkey 1 small onion, minced

1 egg

 $\frac{1}{2}$ C Italian-seasoned breadcrumbs

- 3/4 C Ketchup
- 1/3 C white vinegar
- ¹/₄ C Worcestershire sauce
- 3 T Sugar

2 tsp. dry mustard

Combine first five ingredients, shape mixture into 1 inch balls. Brown meatballs in batches in a

Remove meatballs from skillet, and wipe skillet clean. Stir together ketchup and next four ingredients in skillet, bring to a boil. Add meatballs, reduce heat, and simmer 5 minutes or until meatballs are no longer pink. Makes about 40 meatballs.

While your tri-tip is on the barbecue, you may want to serve your guests an appetizer. In addition to the usual dips and chips, jalapeño poppers would be fun. This recipe might take some time but the end results would be worth it. It is highly recommended that you wear gloves while preparing the peppers; remember the oils in the peppers can burn your skin.

Jalapeño Poppers

30 jalapeño peppers

2 8oz. packages of cream cheese, soften to room temperature

12 ounces shredded Cheddar cheese

1 C. milk

1 C. flour

¼ tsp. salt

¹/₄ tsp. black pepper

1/8 tsp. paprika

1/8 tsp. chili powder

1/8 tsp. garlic powder

1 C. seasoned bread crumbs

1 quart oil for frying

With your gloves on, slice peppers in half lengthwise. Use a spoon to scrape out the pith and seeds inside the peppers. The seeds and the pith are where the intense heat is so you need to discard the heat.

In a bowl combine cream cheese and cheddar cheese, stir until well blended. Use a spoon to fill each pepper half with the mixture.

Place flour in a small shallow bowl. Add salt, pepper, paprika, chili powder and garlic powder to the flour. Blend spices into flour until a uniform appearance. Place milk into a separate shallow bowl. Dip stuffed peppers in milk, and then roll into the seasoned flour mixture. Place floured peppers on a baking sheet with a rack. Let the peppers dry for about 10 minutes. This step is crucial for the peppers. The flour layer will help the stuffing remain inside the pepper, and give the bread crumbs something to hold onto.

Pour the bread crumbs into a

Fry peppers one or two at a time until golden brown. This will only take a minute or two. Remove from oil and drain on baking rack.



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

As a parent volunteer in her classroom, "station time" wiped me out and I always wondered how Mrs. King lasted all day, enda McElroy every day. I think a key to her success was being

well organized.

In the fashion of Robert Fulghum's All I Really Need to Know I Learned in Kindergarten, I'd like to share some organizing tips from the Kindergarten model that will help you last all day, every day too.

Create a place for everything, and keep everything in its place. How much time have you spent looking for your keys? Why not start with that?

Divide your space into sections or themes keeping like things together and everything you need to complete specific tasks. If wrapping a gift is the task, store the gift bags/wrap, bows/ribbon, scissors, tape, cards, and a pen for signing the card, together.

Use labeled containers to store your stuff and stack them neatly on shelves. Batteries, light bulbs, extension cords, and candles are just a few of the things that if containerized and labeled, can be accessed much more easily.

Cleanup after yourself throughout each day so that there's no major mess to deal with at day or week's end. Make a habit of putting everything back in its place when you're finished getting ready in the morning, making dinner, paying bills, etc.

Make cleanup a team effort with everyone participating in age and skill-appropriate tasks. Rotate chores or work as a team to ensure everyone claims responsibility for common use areas.

Clearly define expectations. When you have established #1 (a place for everything) it's much easier to explain to your child what "clean your room" means.

Be consistent and follow through with consequences. With your kids, once you've defined your expectations (household chores, being ready on time, completing homework, etc.), clearly define the consequences of not meeting those expectations and then follow through. You might even want to teach them to respond like they did in Mrs. King's classroom, "Thank you for reminding me of the rules."

Establish routines with lots of practice and affirmation so that each one can eventually accomplish what's expected without being asked or reminded. Watching Mrs. King's Kindergarteners going through the motions of their daily routines helped me realize what all of us (even our young children) are capable of.

Follow a schedule and have time boundaries for each activity: work, play, reading, etc. If it seems like you never have time for _____, try scheduling it!

Make quiet time a daily occurrence. Five year olds aren't the only ones that need rest. You will "last longer" when you give your mind and body a break during the day.

Thank you, Mrs. King, for the many years you invested in the families of the Ranchos.

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

We live in an area of open space and share the land with different animals that we often do not take kindly to, like mice, and we welcome the homeless cats to keep them away. We feed them and they in return keep the mice away from our property. We at the Senior Center share our stories about the wild cats. We have all heard the story of "Tom Catting" and we end up with litters of cute little kittens. Did you know that one female cat and her off-

spring could multiply into hundreds of cats in just a couple of years? Friends of Madera Animal Shelter has a cat spay/neuter program, but funding for this program is limited. There is an effective and humane alternative way to reduce

the area's cat population by trapping the cats and then altering and returning the wild-cats to their original habitats. It has proven to be effective in reducing the feral cat population. The law states that after you feed feral cats for 30 days or more, you can claim ownership and then can take them to the animal shelter where you will be charged \$20 per cat for altering the cats. You can also call 311 and the Friends of Madera Animal Shelter will pick up wild kittens or cats. Or you can make a difference and volunteer.
