## MADERA COUNTY PROSECUTES VOTER FRAUD



A San Diego resident tried to vote with her deceased mother's ballot from Madera County.

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The Madera County Registrar of Voters announced that last month, Elizabeth Gale, a resident of San Diego, pled guilty to committing voter fraud in the 2021 California Gubernatorial Recall Election.

"Ms. Gale made the unfortunate mistake of believing that though her mother had recently passed, that she could get away with voting her ballot, forging her signature, and claiming to have witnessed her mother signing the ballot," stated Rebecca Martinez, the Madera County Registrar of Voters. "Fortunately for the people of Madera County, we have safeguards in place to detect these types of illegal activities, so Ms. Gale's poor decision was discovered, and she was prosecuted."

In August of 2021, the Registrar issued ballots to all Madera County voters for the Sept. 14, 2021, Statewide Gubernatorial Election. Within just a few days, the Registrar's office was notified that the Defendant's mother had passed away earlier in the year. The deceased voter's ballot was immediately voided, making it non-voteable. On Sept. 10, the deceased voter's ballot was mailed back to the Registrar's Office with what was determined to be an invalid signature of the voter.

Martinez notified Madera County District Attorney Sally Moreno of the suspected criminal act and an investigation was initiated. After a thorough investigation, the deceased voter's daughter was charged with felony violations of the California Elections Code. Gale eventually pled guilty to a felony charge. As a result of her plea, a Madera County Superior Court judge sentenced Gale to two years of felony probation. The terms of her sentence required that Gale be booked into the Madera County jail and released, that she report to a probation officer, that she maintain gainful employment, not change her addresses or travel outside of California without prior consent, pay court fines and fees, submit to search and seizure and may not own or possess a firearm.

District Attorney Sally Moreno said, "Processes put in place by [Rebecca Martinez] for her office easily detected this fraud which was stopped before the vote was counted."

"I take the responsibility of protecting our elections seriously," Martinez said. "Madera County elections are fair, transparent and accurate. Ms. Gale attempted to cheat us all and I refuse to allow anyone to do that."

who discovered the attempted fraud, the District Attorney's Investigations Bureau that tracked down Ms. Gale in Southern California, the Deputy District Attorneys who ensured that she was held accountable and justice was served," Martinez said.


"This should serve as a reminder to those who think they can compromise democracy, you will not get away with it. Not on our watch," Martinez and Moreno said in a joint statement.

## Parents: Avoid Idling at Schools

As schools reopen for the fall session, air quality officials are asking parents across the San Joaquin Valley to consider student health and turn off their engines when waiting to pick up their children at the end of the school day. Limiting vehicle idling at schools will help to reduce air pollution and student exposure to vehicle emissions.

With school now back in session, increased vehicle traffic contributes to the formation of ground-level ozone. Parents can help reduce emissions and protect public health by incorporating some of the following practices:

- Coordinate a carpool or rideshare to get kids to and from school.
- Driving less
- Look for ways to leave your gasoline vehicle home more often by linking your trips.

## Liberty High Grad Newest CHP

A 2017 graduate of Liberty High School is the California Highway Patrol's newest peace officer.

Bernavet Mendez Padilla of Madera completed cadet training at the California Highway Patrol Academy on Aug. 5. The new officer has been assigned to duty at the CHP's San Jose Area office.

Padilla graduated from Liberty High School in 2017 and went on to earn a Bachelor of Science degree in criminal justice at California State University, Fresno. In addition, Padilla served four years in the United States Marine Corp.

Prior to attending the CHP Academy, Padilla was a reserve deputy for the Fresno County Sheriff's Office.

At the CHP Academy, cadet training starts with Nobility in Policing, a concept that stresses, "... greatness of character and high ethical qualities or ideals that serve a cause greater than self; faithfulness to a

higher calling or purpose." Further, policing is taught as one of the most noble professions because officers, "... are the entrusted guardians of peace, justice and democracy."

Also taught at the academy is leadership, professionalism and ethics, and cultural diversity. Cadets receive instruction on mental illness response and crisis intervention techniques. The training covers vehicle patrol, crash investigation, first aid, and the apprehension of suspected violators, including drivers under the influence of alcohol or drugs.

The cadets receive training in traffic control, re-




The California Highway Patrol's newest officer is Bernavet Mendez Padilla who graduated from Liberty High in 2017.

port writing, recovery of stolen vehicles, assisting the motoring public, issuing citations, emergency scene management and knowledge of the California vehicle code, penal code and health and safety code.

The mission of the CHP is to provide the highest level of safety, service and security.

day, please do not idle.

"Protecting the health of children is one of our greatest priorities," said Samir Sheikh, the District's Executive Director/Air Pollution Control Officer. "We urge the public to be mindful of their impact on air quality during this critical Back-to-School window and throughout the school year."

The Valley has seen significant reductions in ozone, specifically in the summertime pollution levels over the past two decades. However, with the increase in wildfire activity over the last several years, it is more important than ever that parents and schools take steps to reduce students' exposure to poor air quality while also reducing the creation of additional air pollution. The increase in severe wildfires over the past few years has resulted in smoke infiltrating the San Joaquin Valley at times during the late summer and fall. Smoke contains particulate matter and other pollution that can trigger asthma attacks, aggravate chronic bronchitis, and increase the risk of heart attack and stroke. Those with existing res-

piratory conditions are especially susceptible to the adverse health effects of this form of pollution.

To help ensure continued progress and minimize pollution associated with school site vehicle idling, the District has partnered with hundreds of Valley schools through the Healthy Air Living Schools program, providing "no-idling" signs and other resources that remind parents to turn off their vehicle's engine when picking up or dropping off students. Healthy Air Living Schools also includes training for school staff on using the District's Real-time Air Advisory Network, which displays hourly air quality data, and corresponding outdoor activity recommendations to protect student health.

Dear Editor:

I don't think widespread mail-in voting is a good thing for three reasons.

The first is an uneasiness of having an agency of the Federal government handing ballots before they arrive at our county election officials. In the past, all ballots were cast locally and handled only by local election officials. The ballot went from my hand to a secured county-controlled container. Now, if mailed, it goes from my hand to a USPS office to be mixed with bulk flyers and PG&E bills, then is sorted and delivered to county officials. That extra step where USPS, a Federal agency, has their hands on the ballot worries me. It allows the Federal government direct control of ballots for some period of time. If the majority of "mail-in" ballots were only placed in drop boxes instead of via USPS, I would not have this problem. But in the last primary election I monitored the ballot flow using information posted on the Vote Madera website. In the race I was monitoring (5th District Supervisor) the morning after election day, there were a total of 5,243 votes cast, and only 526 were direct votes. Four days later an additional 854 ballots were counted. Those had to have been USPS delivered mail-in ballots because why would it take four days to count only 854 drop box ballots from election day? At the one week mark, the USPS ballots added only another 526 votes. Then it got weird. Ten days after election day a huge surge of 2,575 ballots came in from USPS. That was 1/3 of all the ballots cast for that race. Did 1/3 of the 5th District voters collectively de-

cide to all go to Nome Alaska to mail their ballots? What was USPS doing with those ballots for 10 days? I hope you can understand my suspicion.

That brings me to the second reason for disliking mail-in voting: The concept of secret ballot. Previously there was no way a local official, let alone a Federal official, could find out how I voted. Now, every ballot I cast comes with my name on the envelope with my signature. Do I trust that no Federal official has recorded my votes with my name? Not if the USPS has 10 days to deliver ballots out of view of the County election monitors I don't.

My last objection to mail-in voting is, strangely, that it is too easy. So easy that people who normally would have no time or interest in casting a vote *do* vote. This is especially troublesome in down-ballot local elections decided during high interest election cycles. People with no interest in local matters will cast coin flip votes just to fill out the ballot resulting in best-sounding-name-wins. Do we want that? I don't.


My hope is that Madera County will move away from all mailed ballots back to the previous election day-only voting with the rare absentee ballots. Remember, Madera County went to all-mailed ballots before COVID hit, so let's declare the mailed ballot experiment a failure and go back to election day voting, and more importantly, stable day after election result counts.

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

### What Is A Woman? Or a Cat?

This really is a movie about answers that can't be questioned. Those



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
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# Bat-ting One Thousand



### Nail the Landing

I was never more thankful for air traffic controllers than when visiting our son and family while they lived near LAX. It's fun watching the huge airliners make their approach, knowing they have an exact spot assigned. Imagine if landing planes was a willy-nilly activity without an intentional system. As the plane descends, the pilot chooses the first flat surface he sees and says, "I'll just put this here, for now."

Sound a little familiar? Flat surfaces around our homes beg for things to be placed on them and we, willy-nilly, comply often thinking it's "just for now." While the results may not be a matter of life or death, it's often a matter of peace or chaos.

**Clutter breeds clutter.** The first couple "just for now" things don't seem like much. Then, since there's already stuff on it, why not? Before you know it, the counter, table, bed, nightstand – any or every flat surface – has a pile.

*Clutter causes stress.* First

**Editor's Note:** With the passing of Aunt Jean, I have decided to bring you a "Best Of" of her recipes over the past 10 years. Good recipes are timeless and I hope you enjoy them all over again.

For those of you that read my article last month concerning my complaining about the apricots not being picked in the orchard belonging to Fresno State, I found the answer.

According to Mike Mosinski, Fresno State interim farm manager, "Back in March, when we had the storms come through, this particular orchard did get the hail damage." An insurance adjuster came out and found 80% of the crop was damaged. "We are getting an insurance claim on the damaged fruit. And then at that point economically, to try to go through and pick only what looks good just wasn't a good business decision for us. So basically the fruit had to fall to the ground."

Allowing people to come in and pick the apricots wasn't possible because of a host of liability issues and university officials said that the price of apricots has dropped so much that this will probably be the last crop they grow with the orchard probably being pulled out by this fall.

What a shame.

Also in my last month's article, I said I had never heard of grilled artichokes. I was talking to my sister-in-law later, and she told me that at different family dinners both of her daughters brought grilled artichokes, each with a different sauce on them, but both delicious. So, I stand corrected and am anxious to try grilled artichokes.

### A Reader's Suggestion

One of our readers came into the office to ask me to do an article on cooking for one or two. She said her son is getting all the leftovers. I don't even know these people, but I don't want the son to be upset with me because his leftovers may stop because I answered her request.

Following a recipe for one or two servings is somewhat foreign to me. Ever since I started cooking beside my mom and learning what to do, there has always been a large family for which to cook. When I was in high school, since both my folks worked, it was my job to come home from school and get dinner started. There were seven in the family, so we didn't just cook a couple of potatoes or a thigh and wing of a chicken.

When I started living alone and doing my own cooking, I had to adjust the way I cooked. I am not that fond of some leftovers and never more than a day or two and then that is enough for me. I have learned to cook just what I will need for the day or two. However I do still make a whole pot of spaghetti sauce but I put it in two or three Ziploc bags and freeze it until I want to make spaghetti for dinner again. I only cook one or two pork chops or a couple of pieces of chicken at a time. I do buy frozen vegetables in the one pound bag and use what I need for each meal, and fold the bag up and hold it with a rubber band in the freezer until I need it again. The little boxes are fine for one or two, but I find the bags a lot more economical.

Do you use margarine, cottage cheese or even cream cheese in the tubs? Don't throw them away yet. Wash them out and store until you can use them again. Be sure to let them dry completely before stacking. They make perfect containers for leftovers. When you go to a family dinner and know there might be leftovers to bring home (like Thanksgiving dinner), have your cleaned out containers ready. Or the last time I made spaghetti sauce I used two of the containers to freeze the sauce until I would use it. But listen to the voice of experience, they DO NOT microwave! If you don't put them into the refrigerator to defrost, put them in a little warm water until the food

can slip out into a pan to heat.

After this reader asked me to do this article, I went online and found some recipes she might use. The first one is for chicken pot pie that makes three – of course, that depends on how much you eat.

### Easy Chicken Pot Pie

½ C canned cream of chicken soup  
¼ C milk  
1 C frozen mixed vegetables  
½ C cut up, cooked chicken breast  
½ C Bisquick  
¼ C milk

Heat oven to 400. In ungreased 1-quart casserole, stir together soup and ¼ C milk, stir

in vegetables and chicken. Microwave uncovered on high 3 minutes, stir.

In small bowl, stir remaining ingredients until blended. Pour over chicken mixture. Bake uncovered about 20 minutes, or until crust is golden brown.

Bake 18 to 20 minutes on a cookie sheet in oven. Or grill 10 to 12 minutes in covered grill.

**Baked Chicken and Potato Dinner for Two**

2 boneless skinless chicken breast halves  
2 T Dijon Mustard  
½ C Bisquick  
¾ pound small red potatoes cut into fourths  
1 small red or green bell pepper, cut into ½ inch pieces  
1 small onion, cut into 8

wedges

Cooking spray  
2 T grated Parmesan cheese, if desired.  
½ tsp. paprika

Heat oven to 400. Spray 13x9x2 inch baking dish with cooking spray.

Brush chicken with 1 T of the mustard, then coat with the Bisquick mix. Place 1 chicken breast half in each corner of pan. Place potatoes, bell pepper and onion in center of pan, brush vegetables with remaining mustard. Spray chicken and vegetables with cooking spray; sprinkle evenly with cheese and paprika. Bake 35 to 40 minutes, stirring vegetables after 20 minutes, until potatoes are tender and juice from the chicken is no longer pink when centers of thickest pieces are cut.

folders that identify the action needed — Bills to Pay, Calls to Make, Checks to Deposit, Events, etc. This is also where mail can temporarily reside, but if at any point the bin is full, then it's time to get busy and process mail and papers. Now, you have ONE PLACE to look for all the papers that need action. The rest—shred, recycle or file in a file cabinet.

**Projects:** Label another bin "Projects." Place only the projects from your piles that will fit comfortably in the bin and that you plan to do within the month. Make a list of too large and overflow projects. Place the list in the bin with a note saying where they are being stored. Relocate the overflow projects to the designated closet or cabinet. Now, you have a

manageable project load and just TWO PLACES to look when searching for a project.

**In 'n Out:** The third temporary home is for items coming and going — purses, wallets, backpacks, keys, etc. Install hooks near the door for the items that can hang. For others, use another open-topped bin. Be careful to use it only for "In 'n Out" items. Those may be sunglasses, library books, dry cleaning, things to return to stores or take to the office. Place it near the door. Now you have ONE AREA to look for your "In 'n Out" items.

Celebrate each time you nail a landing. You've earned it.

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**Senior Report****Scout Garden at Senior Center**

The Ranchos/Hills Senior Center has quite a history since it was established in 1989 within the Madera Ranchos Community. The many working parts within the Senior Center serve the good of the community and older adults living in the surrounding area.

In the back area of the Senior Center property, next to the Treasure House, we have the Scout Garden. The previous owner of the property owned a nursery, so it seemed a natural transition to develop a nonprofit plant center. In the 1990s, local members Olan and Norma Williams developed the garden space to house and sell donated plants to the community. With help from Nina Lackey, they developed a network of companies who donated plants to the Center and in the past the garden area housed hundreds of potted plants and local nurseries and their owners were generous with plant donations as well.

Then the laws changed, and large companies could not donate their unwanted plant inventory to the Senior Center anymore. Now, the Center relies solely on donations from family-owned nurseries, Senior Center members and the community.

When the garden space needed to be remodeled, local Boy Scout Troop 118 stepped up to help. Under the leadership of Scout Master Loren Lee, the first three Eagle Scout projects were completed at the Ranchos/Hills Senior Center in 2014. The garden area was cleared of old debris and new decomposed granite was laid down by Eagle Scout Henry

Coulthard. The solid foundation bed of granite allowed our team of gardeners safe walking paths to water and work with donated plants.

The next Eagle Scout project was to build repotting tables, courtesy of Eagle Scout Garrett Lee and a third Eagle Scout project was to build a support structure and shade covers over plants to protect them from direct sunlight. Eagle Scout Jacob Little welded the steel supports and set them in the ground.

Finally, in 2019, Eagle Scout Gregory Reitz designed a beautifully crafted solid wood sign for the Ranchos/Hills Senior Center.

The Senior Center was very grateful for the hard work and dedication of the Eagle Scouts and their troop leaders. It was decided by the Senior Center members to name it the Scout Garden after Boy Scout Troop 118.

The Ranchos/Hills Senior Center hosts the Annual Home and Garden Show every April where plants are showcased for sale in the Scout Garden. Gardening supplies for the Scout Garden, like potting soil, fertilizer, pots, plants with roots and gardening tools, are always needed and encouraged to be donated.

# SEMCU speaks

## Applying for Grants for the Benefit of Our Community.

There are always community projects that we all want to see brought to fruition. Some examples may be a park, more help for the library, school staff and educational support and sports projects. Other examples include traffic and safety projects and projects thought of by you, our community. These projects keep our young focused, interested in learning and progressing themselves.

SEMCU is a nonprofit organization working for the benefit of our community. It has a mission and an obligation to our people. Donations

are always helpful, but nonprofits can't always depend on the generosity of others. As the famous saying goes, "You can't always wait for the rain." SEMCU's commitment to the community means we must be proactive and seek other means to cover the community's needs and challenges. This is a time in which grants have been helping us along the way. As a nonprofit, SEMCU has opportunities to reach out and apply for grants on behalf of our community. SEMCU offers to pay the tuition for any person willing to take a course in grant writing offered by a university, college, or legitimate entity for the use of helping Southeast Madera County.

Most Federal and State grants have a management fee budgeted into the grant. This could be as much as 20 percent of the grant awarded. That means a \$200,000 grant may have a \$40,000 management fee available to the grant manager. This is a great incentive for a person to look at helping our community while making

money. This type of collaboration is beneficial all the way around.


Grant projects generally may address any community needs and come in all sizes. They can be for \$1,000 or \$10 million. The difficult part is identifying which organizations offer the grants and how to qualify for them. Grants are written in a persuasive method that tells a story and highlights statistics that support the need expressed. A grant is only a part of a proposed solution. There must also be a budget showing the way the money is to be spent and description of expected outcomes. The most difficult part is to submit all the requirements that are important to the Grantor. That is where the grant writing skills are valuable. Understanding the intent of the grantor will help direct the grant application to its approval and funding. Once the project is awarded the grant, the work begins. Next, regular administrative documentation and financial statements are often required. Many grants include a budget for administrative charges by the grant manager/administrator, as mentioned earlier.

If you are interested in taking a grant class, check with us. After approval of the class, you may bring the completion certificate and SEMCU will reimburse you for the tuition paid.

We at SEMCU invite you all to come up with ideas for projects that our community needs and let us know your thoughts. We would love to help our people in any way we can.

The California Air Resources Board has granted Valley Air District funds to replace heavy-duty trucks with the cleanest technologies

On Aug. 18, the Valley Air District Governing Board unanimously voted to accept \$12.9 million in additional California Air Resources Board funding to replace heavy-duty trucks through the Valley Air District's highly successful grant program.



"Grant funds such as these recognize the importance of partnerships to expedite emission reductions in the San Joaquin Valley," stated Samir Sheikh, Executive Director and Air Pollution Control Officer of the San Joaquin Valley Air Pollution Control District. "With these funds the State is acknowledging the Valley's unique challenges, and we appreciate these much-needed resources."

Reducing emissions from mobile sources is key to the San Joaquin Valley meeting federal ambient air quality standards. Heavy-duty trucks, like the ones targeted under this funding, are the single largest source of Nitrogen oxides and diesel particulate matter in the Valley, and are critical to ensuring that goods are moved throughout the State and nation. Emissions from heavy-duty vehicles are primarily under the regulatory jurisdiction of state and federal government, and voluntary incentive programs are critical to transitioning fleets to the next generation of cleaner technologies and achieving reductions needed to meet air quality standards.

The District's successful truck incentive programs have repowered, retrofitted, or replaced over 7,300 heavy-duty trucks with cleaner alternatives. This is the second book in a solid re-read of the *Mistborn* series for me. This series is one of


my all-time favorites and in preparation for the new book coming in November I decided that I needed to read through the entire series (just like I did
