The latest accident to hit Southeast Madera County happened at the main entrance into the Madera Ranchos and Riverstone communities. Thankfully there were no major injuries, but the pile up did involve six vehicles in a chain reaction that tied up the busy intersection for hours.

At approximately 7:30 on the morning of Aug. 27, a trac-no mention of any controlled substances being involved.

tor pulling two trailers was traveling northbound on Highway 41 approaching the Avenue 12 intersection. According to the California Highway Patrol, the 57-year-old semi driver was attempting to stop but all indications were that he misjudged the situation and was unable to stop in time.

The first car that was struck was a white Honda Accord from the rear. The force of that impact sent the Honda and its 21-yearold male driver flying into a Volkswagen that was being driven by a 39-year-old woman from Fresno. But they weren't done yet.

The Volkswagen then became a projectile and was hurled into a Nissan being driven by a 30-year-old woman visiting from Italy that then caromed into the rear end of a Chevy pickup complete with its male 72-year-old Fresno driver. There was still enough force left over to hurtle the Chevy into a Lexus and its 20-year-old driver.

In all, this missed stop resulted in six vehicles crashing into one another. And yet amazingly, the injuries were considered "minor to moderate." Four of the people involved went to local hospitals and police said there was a possibility the Honda driver may have suffered a concussion. Possibly the most fortuitous outcome was that the Honda, which took the brunt of the initial impact from behind, destroying the back half of the car, had no passenger in the back seat of his car on that day.

The investigation is ongoing but at this time, the police made no mention of any controlled substances being involved.

Last Minute Cal Bill Fights

As they culled about one-third of 830 bills, legislative committees killed one that aimed to prohibit broadband providers from charging more or offering slower Internet service in low-income areas, and another to bar law enforcement agencies from relying solely on facial recognition to arrest or search suspects.

The committees also held several Republican crime bills, including one aimed at adding stricter reviews before the state releases sexually violent predators. That prompted the author, Senate GOP leader Brian Jones of San Diego, to state that Assembly Democratic leaders are "now complicit in helping the Newsom Administration protect these predators over families."

Also held were two crime bills from the newest Senate Republican, Marie Alvarado-Gil of Modesto: one to increase the severity of the crime for making threats at schools or places of worship, and one that makes it a felony to have fentanyl while armed.

But other high-profile bills survived today's hearings — much to the relief of some advocates who have spent years fighting for their causes.

The suspense file hurdle happens twice a year, as the two appropriations committees go through hundreds of bills with a price tag (\$50,000 or more from the general fund, \$150,000 or more from a special fund), with no discussion and few recorded votes. Besides weeding out costly bills, it's also a notorious way for legislators to kill politically dicey bills.

Today, each committee decided the fate of bills passed by the other chamber. The Senate committee held 174 of 515 Assembly bills, and the Assembly panel held about 100 of 313 Senate bills — a total of 33 percent held.

That's similar to the 32 percent held of the 1,009 bills in the May suspense file hearings. But it's higher than the 25 percent average over the last decade, according to lobbyist Chris Micheli.

Here Come the California Grapes!

With school back in session and fall weather approaching, the California table-grape industry is preparing to move the majority of its volume; every year roughly 65 percent of the crop ships after Sept. 1.

"September through December is an exciting and productive time of year, as nearly 80 different varieties are harvested, promotions expand, and the majority of the

crop ships to California grape-loving consumers around the world," said Kathleen Nave, president of the California Table Grape Commission. "A robust global marketing campaign to promote California grapes throughout the fall and early winter tied to an amazing selection of varieties, great quality and promotable volume creates strong demand." In terms of crop size,

Nave says the industry comes together three times a year to estimate the crop, and has been doing so with a high degree of accuracy for decades. "Individual viewpoints often circulate in the fall with a frequent favorite being talk of a short California grape crop. Whether coming from inside or outside the California industry, these individual narratives often masquerade as news." Nave suggests being careful about putting too much weight on them. With a

harvest that will continue well into December, Nave said that fall and early winter bring great opportunities for retailers to stock California grapes, offering customers a great-tasting, healthy option for back-to-school lunches or fall and winter celebrations. "With promising weather ahead, great demand, and promotional activities scheduled in the U.S. and 21 export markets through December, the California table grape industry is on the move!"

Dear Editor:



What will bringing back Roe v Wade accomplish if no America is left after eight years of Harris?


Just like Harris' policies, the re-establishment of Roe v Wade will not pay the rent, provide safer streets, close the border, or bring down the high cost of living.

vorite duty. I've been trying to get one of my positions filled for about three months now. One might think perhaps holdup was because I'm not

getting enough applicants, or that I am dragging my feet interviewing people. One would be incorrect; it's the red tape. The blasted red tape.

When the position first became vacant, I had to complete a form in order to fill it. This form had to go to my supervisor and the deputy director of my division's division. Ok, not unreasonable. Then it goes to the finance director to ensure the position is in the budget. It is, because someone just vacated it, but budgets change so you have to check, I can live with that. Finally, the form is reviewed by the department's director. Once she signs it, it comes back to me to send to HR. At this point I would have thought that was it. That was the process. The third one stays in HR and is used to create the job posting, once the other two redundant forms are returned. For funsies, I asked if they



process.



statements, staff meetings and standard operating procedures. Classrooms have Grade Level Objectives, designated teaching times and routines that provide order and structure. Families have ... well?

In his book The 3 Big Questions for a Frantic Family, Patrick Lencioni says, "... most of us go about leading and managing our families with almost no formal context. We don't take time to explicitly decide who we are, what we stand for, what we want and how we're going to go about succeeding and thriving as a family."

He says families don't often think about the need for planning and strategy and don't consider the cost of chaos. It's impossible to inoculate your family from every challenge, but like well-managed companies and classrooms, families that plan are more successful than those that fly by the seat of their pants. For your family to succeed in the things that really matter, you need three things.

KNOW WHAT REALLY MATTERS: This is for you to decide. What type of young adults are you hoping to launch down the road? What are the most important character traits and abilities you want them to have? What values does your family hold in high regard? What do you want them to take with them — good memories, skills, faith, etc.?

COMMUNICATE WHAT RE-ALLY MATTERS: We are intentional about teaching our children many things — walking and talking, riding a bike, chewing with their mouths closed. Don't rely on the im-

portant things being caught and not taught. Have a designated family time on a regular basis. Make it fun and meaningful with

activities, snacks and time to talk about what really matters.

BUILD ROUTINES AROUND WHAT REALLY MATTERS: Create morning, after school and evening routines that include time for chores, rest, homework, prep for the next day, etc. Be as specific as necessary with start/stop times and family mealtimes. Download some family conversation starters to use at dinner. Family dinners are a huge challenge to schedule these days, but also reap some of the greatest rewards.

Well, school has started where did the time go? Vacation is over, but summer won't be over until Sept. 23. It is still hot - I think if was 101 today. As I've said so many times, the best thing about summer is I know winter is on its way. Yes, I like the fog and rain.

For you families with school children that are up in the morning trying to get them fed and lunches fixed, I have seen the menu for the local cafeterias and some of them look quite tasty. For those days your child doesn't want to eat in

the cafeteria, there is always the box lunch home. from When we were in school, most everyone ate in cafeteria. the The food was excellent. It was cooked on the premises and almost like home you sliced at home and it had cooking. only time I remember taking my lunch was the three years we

lived in San Francisco during WWII. I can still remember my mom's bologna sandwiches. I don't know what was so special about them, but I loved them. Thinking back it just may have been the bologna that we bought at a meat market. It was a stick that you sliced at home and it had a wrapping on it that you had to peel off before eating it. We didn't have the plastic wrap or the sandwich bags we have today. Everything was wrapped in wax paper, even potato chips and cookies. And did you get an orange in your lunch? Mama always "scored" it (run the tip of a paring knife in a circle around the top and strips down the sides) so it



would be easier to peel.

Be a lost pet ally

DEAR PAW'S CORNER: My brother and I saw a dog that matched the photo of a

lost dog on flyers around the neighborhood. We tried calling him, but he ran off. So we told our mom what happened and she called the number on the flyer. I don't know if the owners found the dog. We're wondering if we did the right thing. Why did the dog run away? — Brian and Sarah in Cincinnati

DEAR BRIAN AND SARAH: You did the right thing by telling your mom so that she could call the owners and tell them where you spotted the lost dog. Don't feel bad about the dog run-ning away: Lost dogs

are often shy of strangers. Some will not even come when their owners call. But, by telling them the location, the owners have a much better chance of recovering their dog. Here's how you can support owners who are searching for a lost pet: — Take a photo of a lost pet flyer with your smartphone. You can instantly refer back to it if you see a pet matching the description. — Don't call or chase a dog or cat if you spot it. Contact the owner as soon as possible and give them the location where you spotted the pet. —

If the pet approaches you calmly, try to keep them in place by petting or giving them treats, until you can put a leash on them and bring them to a safe containment area. Contact the owner or local shelter. If the pet appears to be ill or injured, carefully approach and wrap them in an old blanket before attempting to pick them up. — If the pet is being aggressive, contact animal control. Check the *Senior Blue Book* (seniors-bluebook.com) for a whole library of information. Whether it's articles or video, use the dropdown menus to look for information on healthy aging, elder law and so much more. All of us have words we've never been certain how to pronounce. Again, pull up a search engine and type in the word you want and "pronounce."

And if you need translations from a foreign language? Type into the search box "translate [name of foreign language]

to English." Then copy and paste the foreign words into the box. English will appear in the box next to it.

Look at *ThirdAge* (thirdage.com) for a collection of information on fitness, family, food, health and more.

If you want to beef up your internet skills, start with *Seniors Guide to Computers* (seniorsguidetocomputers.com) for good information on the basics, doing email, online security and saving your data. The site includes links to 300 YouTube how-to videos and is run by a guy with 40 years of computer experience.

Bookmark several different search engines on your computer: Google, Duck-DuckGo and Bing are well known ones that you can trust. Once you get used to looking up information, you'll be all set for any question that comes up.
