California has an overwhelmingly Democratic delegation in Congress. Gov. Newsom's plan could give his party five *more* seats and offset a Texas gerrymander.

The fight over redistricting is about to hit overdrive in California.

As the Legislature returned to Sacramento last week for the final month of session, Democrats are racing to finish a plan that could tilt the state's congressional map in their favor — and thrust California into another confrontation with President Donald Trump.

Republicans, who stand to lose more than half their seats in the state, decry the scheme as a self-serving power grab. But supporters, led by Gov. Gavin Newsom, contend they are "saving democracy" by stopping Trump from "rigging" the outcome of the 2026 midterms. Ultimately, California voters will likely decide in a special election this November.

Newsom is leading the charge for the Democratic response in a burgeoning partisan showdown that could effectively deter-

mine control of the U.S. House of Representatives before a single vote is cast next November. This kicked off thousands of miles away from Sacramento - in Texas. Earlier this year, Trump began pressuring Republican leaders there to redraw its congressional lines to shore up the GOP's narrow majority in the House. As his approval rating sinks, the president is worried Democrats could win back Congress in the 2026 election and disrupt the final two years of his term. Even as dozens of Democratic members have fled the state in protest, the Texas Legislature is advancing a new map that could flip five Democratic House seats to Republican control. Other conservative states, including Ohio, Missouri, Indiana and Florida, are considering similar actions.

So, channeling the anger of Democratic voters, Newsom has launched California into a retaliatory redistricting that would offset the Texas map with five new Democratic-leaning seats.

"Donald Trump, you have poked the bear and we will punch back," Newsom said during a rally last week formally kicking off the campaign. "Don't mess with the great Golden State."

Unlike Texas, where the Legislature determines congressional lines, California voters in 2010 gave that power to a bipartisan citizen commission. The commission draws a new map once each decade, after the U.S. Census, to ensure each congressional district has roughly an equal number of people. It last did so in 2021.

Newsom is proposing to temporarily override the commission and create districts more favorable to Democrats until after the 2030 Census. That requires going to the voters for their approval. Democratic officials already drew a new map in secret, which they finally shared publicly two weeks ago. The Legislature, where three-quarters of members are Democrats, plans to vote before the end of this week to put that map on the ballot in a statewide special election on Nov. 4.

"Voters will see the maps and have the final say," Assembly Speaker Robert Rivas, a Salinas Democrat, said in a statement.

But why the rush? California's primary election is in June, so work backward from there. The deadline for candidates to declare is in early March. Those who want to collect signatures to qualify, instead of paying a filing fee, can start in December. That means new congressional lines need to be in place by the end of the year, so candidates actually know which voters they need to reach.

Newsom is eyeing Nov. 4 for the special election to consolidate it with municipal elections across the state that day. State law requires elections officials to mail a ballot to every voter starting 29 days before the election, and to military and overseas voters 45 days before, which means ballots must be ready by late September. The secretary of state's office has said the Legislature must act by Friday to leave enough time for local elections officials to meet those deadlines for a Nov. 4 election. Even then, the next month will be extremely busy for them.

The state has promised to cover the expenses counties incur running this unexpected election, which won't be cheap. The

last state special election, an unsuccessful recall of Newsom in September 2021, cost about \$200 million. Newsom has said consolidating the election with already scheduled local elections on Nov. 4 could save money, but early estimates from counties — up to \$4 million in Fresno and up to \$16 million in Riverside — are higher than they were for the recall.

"No price tag for democracy," Newsom told reporters last week following the kickoff rally.

Democrats feel good about their chances, but it's a heavy lift. A Politico poll found that nearly two-thirds of California voters prefer retaining the state's independent redistricting commission over returning authority to the Legislature to draw congressional lines. That is not exactly what Newsom's plan would do, however. His messaging has emphasized that the commission would only be sidelined temporarily, because of what he calls a "Trump-induced political emergency." It's reflected in the name of the measure: the Election Rigging Response Act. Internal polling shared with lawmakers put support, when framed along those lines, at 52 percent.

While that's enough to win in November, it may not be enough to withstand an intense campaign this fall that is expected to draw hundreds of millions of dollars in spending. Charles Munger, Jr., the longtime Republican donor who poured more than \$12 million into the campaign to pass independent redistricting, has said he will open up his wallet again to defend it.

"Citizens, not politicians or partisan party insiders, should not only hold the power at the ballot box but also the power to draw the lines," Amy Thoma Tan, a spokesperson for Munger's campaign committee, said in a statement. The National Republican Congressional Committee said in a statement that it was prepared to "fight Gavin Newsom's illegal power grab in the courts and at the ballot box."

Hilton, a former advisor to British

This is not about Texas. It's about Newsom's presidential ambitions. I will not let it happen. Next week I will be laying out a plan to stop Newsom.

"It is illegal, it is unconstitutional. My

friend [Congressman] Tom McClintock, who endorsed me for Governor, is exactly right there," Hilton said on Fox News Sunday. "But here's what's going on. Everyone across the country needs to understand this. Gavin Newsom is planning to steal five Republican House seats next year by holding a special election this year to overturn the California constitution and illegally grab power and make this state even more gerrymandered in Democrats' favor.

"And right now Republicans have 40 percent of the vote in California, but only 17 percent of the House seats. Gavin Newsom wants another five. That will give us for 40 percent of the vote only 7 percent of the House seats in California because Gavin Newsom wants to show that he is the guy fighting President Trump, winning the House majority for Democrats so that they can impeach President Trump. I'm not going to let that happen."



Our 25th Anniversary was in November while Joy was in the hospital. We were going to Celebrate when he got home, but God had another plan and called him home.



Carol Maxine Briner
June 30, 1939 — November 9, 2024

Maxine Briner was born to Gladys and Orville Briner on Friday, June 30, 1939 in Merced, California. Originally named Naomi Maxine Briner, her parents changed her name to Carol Maxine Briner when she was five years old.

As a child, Maxine lived with her parents and siblings at Grandma Drinnen's home, Gladys' mother, in the farmlands of Chowchilla. They later moved to the Briner family home at 301 Alameda in Chowchilla, where she lived until she eventually moved away as a young adult. The exception was a brief stay in San Francisco during WWII where her dad, Grandpa Briner, worked as a welder in the shipyards.

While living in Chowchilla she attended school and ultimately graduated from Chowchilla High School in 1957. While there, she was a saxophone player with the Chowchilla High Redskin Band.

After graduating from high school, she got her first – and only – job with the phone company in 1957. She started working for Pacific Bell as an operator in Los Angeles in 1957 and then two years later in 1959 transferred to Merced where she worked for the next 38 years. She also worked briefly out of the Fresno office before she retired.

Although she never married, there were two loves in her life. In the 70s when she lived in Merced, it was Joe Reynoso. Later, when she moved to Fresno, it was Don Dahlstrom. She and Don, whom she met at the phone company, were a couple for 25 years, right up until Don passed away.

It was through Don that Maxine developed her love for boating and the ocean, with the California coastal community of Trinidad becoming her favorite vacation site where they would spend weeks at a time at Don's boat. It was here that her tradition of buying freshly caught tuna from local fishing boats in Eureka would be taken home, canned, and then given to loved ones.

U.S. Congressional Medal of Honor recipient Kyle Carpenter said, "Be kind and help others. Let the ones you love know you love them." This quote embodied Maxine's view on life. She was kind and helpful to friends and family and everyone in her world knew that they were loved by her. They knew it by her words and her actions. If you talk to enough people who knew her, you will again and again hear stories of helping out and going beyond what was expected. It was just the way she was "wired."

Maxine leaves behind her brother George and sister-in-law JoRene, and a multitude of nieces and nephews and great nieces and nephews, as well as extended family and friends who loved her and miss her. During the last few years of her life she actively attended New Covenant Community Church in Fresno with family members. She loved country music, traditional church hymns and conservative talk radio and TV shows

As we reflect on the passing of Maxine, some words from author Shel Silverstein come to mind:

"There are no happy endings. Endings are the saddest part. Just give me a happy middle, and a very happy start."

Maxine did that.



## Trump's New Census -- in 2030

A change that Trump wanted

in the 2020 census was the in-

clusion, once again, of a citizen-

ship question. This is highly

relevant information that it's en-

tirely appropriate to ask.

Trump wants a new census. If, by this, he means a snap-census before the scheduled 2030 survey, he's demanding that the federal government undertake a gargantuan task with minimal planning and no discernible source of funding. In statistical terms, it'd be like launching D-Day after a month's preparation.

If the White Queen believes six impossible things before breakfast, that the Census Bureau could pull this off would qualify as one of them. The

agency couldn't even competently conduct the last regularly scheduled census in 2020.

Given that conducting the census is a core function of the federal government -- indeed,

mandated by the Constitution -- it is outrageous that the last survey missed so badly. It undercounted Florida and a handful of other Red states (as well as Illinois) and overcounted New York and a number of Blue states (plus Ohio and Utah).

Because the apportionment of congressional seats depends on population

as determined by the census, these were highly consequential errors that can't be allowed to happen again. There's no legal mechanism for fixing it, though. We just have to do better in 2030. Trump is also, understandably, chagrined that illegal immigrants are included in the census and declares that, going forward, they "WILL NOT BE COUNTED." Here he's going to run smack into the relevant legal texts.

Article 1, Section 2 of the Constitution refers to "the Whole Number of free Persons," while the 14th Amendment says "the whole number of per-

sons in each State." In a similar fashion, the U.S. code calls for a "tabulation of total population by States."

So it's hard to see how illegal immigrants can be excluded from the count. As it hap-

pens, they don't seem to have much of an effect on the partisan breakdown of congressional seats one way or the other. Although the highest number of illegal immigrants live in California, they are spread around the country, and there are also large numbers in Texas and Florida.


A change that Trump wanted in the 2020 census was the inclusion, once again, of a citizenship question. This is highly relevant information that it's entirely appropriate to ask.

There was a long period from the 19th century through 1950 when the survey had a citizenship question. Then, it was relegated to the so-called "long form." Finally, the long form itself was axed after 2000.

Now, it's considered a scandal to even think about reviving the question. Trump's proposal to ask the question on the 2020 census encountered stiff resistance and the Supreme Court squashed it.

By the way, non-citizens do have a notable impact on congressional apportionment. Recent research by the Center for Immigration Studies found that all immigrants (naturalized citizens as well as all other categories of immigrants) shifted 14 congressional

I guess the CEO woke up one morn-



Non-citizens also distort the composition of congressional districts. According to the study, there are the same number of citizens in the 13 congressional districts with the highest share of non-citizens as in the 9 districts with the lowest share of non-citizens. In other words, the citizens in those 9 lowimmigration districts get 4 fewer representatives than the citizens in the 13 high-immigration districts. It's one man, one vote -- with an asterisk.

To take an example from Texas, the Democratic-held 33rd district, where non-citizens are nearly 30% of the population, has 208,000 fewer voting-age

citizens than the Texas 21st district. So the citizens in the 33rd district have marginally more clout and representation, thanks to a population tilted toward those who can't vote.

Ultimately, the way to diminish these effects is to reduce the level of immigration. Early indications are that there has been a large exodus of illegal immigrants since Trump's election, and the U.S. will have net negative migration for the first time in half a century. If Trump wants to fully capture the changes he's effecting in immigration policy, he should indeed want a new census -- in 2030.
