Page 2 Murder-Suicide and Armed Robbers in the Ranchos? Believe it or Not

n a four-day period, the typically peace-I ful Madera Ranchos experienced a murder-suicide and a group of armed robbers moving throughout the Bonnadelle Ranchos.

On Tuesday, Dec. 6, Madera County Sheriff's deputies were called to a

home on Avenue 12 near Road 33 around 1:25 p.m. to perform a "welfare check." Also known as a "wellness check," the process is carried out when law enforcement stops by a person's home to make sure they are okay. Usually

requested by friends, family and neighbors, they are typically sought

when someone unexpectedly stops answering his or her phone or becomes incapable of being contacted. When the deputies arrived, they found a man and a woman dead inside the house.

On Wednesday, the Madera County Sheriff's Office identified the victims as Monty Bounds, 60, and his wife Julie Bounds, 58. They further said that each person suffered a single gunshot wound, however they did not know how long the couple

had been dead before they were found by deputies. Madera County Sheriff Tyson Pogue confirmed that the deaths appeared to be the result of continuous domestic violence that spiraled rapidly into a murdersuicide. In a news conference, Sheriff Pogue said neither the confiscating of

Monty Bounds' guns or the emergency protective order Julie Bounds had obtained prevented the tragedy. In their case, law enforcement issued an emergency protective

order against Monty Bounds on Oct. 30 following his arrest. He was arrested again the next day on Oct. 31 and deputies were given a "non-release" order and a bail enhancement to keep him away from Julie Bounds. Monty Bounds fought with deputies during one of his arrests and had to be tased. After all of this, he was released on Nov. 4 by a Madera County Judge, complete with a "no-contact" order and an order banning him from having any guns. Sadly,

he was still able to get a gun – that wasn't registered to him – and killed his wife.

The couple had been married for 10 vears.

Just four days later, on Saturday, Dec. 10, people in the Bonnadelle Ranchos neighborhood around Road 37 and Avenue 16 heard something rarely heard in the Ranchos: Police helicopters overhead looking

In December of 2003, a business partner and myself bought the Ranchos Independent. She and I had just been let go from Western Ag Publishing in Fresno and she wanted to go find a job. I told her that combined, she and I had been running the publishing company we were working at for the last five years. Why not do it for ourselves? The word had gotten to us that the owner of the Ranchos Independent was looking to sell and after some negotiations, we bought it.

Even though I had a degree in Journalism from Fresno State, the vast part of my adult working life had been spent in sales. Her background was in design and layout so combined we had just about everythings you needed to run a publication. We worked together for the next few years but there came a point where we just needed to go our separate ways. We split up our holdings and I got the Ranchos Independent. Today she has a government job up in Washington state.

As I've written in the past, its hard to believe that 19 years later we're still plugging away at it here at the Ranchos Independent.

In the movie "Roadhouse" (my alltime favorite *BAD* movie), the recur-



ring joke is people telling Dalton, the lead bouncer at a miserable bar played by Patrick Swayze, "I thought you'd be bigger." To which Dalton responds, "Gee, I've never heard that before."

That's my headline. Almost from the beginning, wellwishers (?) told me that they were glad to see that the paper was being bought, but they didn't really expect to see it last. The Fresno Bee was downsizing, newspapers across the country were closing down, this new thing called "the internet" seemed to be taking the place of physical newspapers ... blah, blah, blah.

As I've said before, I did my research (AFTER I bought the paper ... gulp!) and I found out "they" were right about the L.A. Times and the San Francisco papers and the Fresno Bee. Right on the money. But what my research also showed me and "they' missed over and over again, was that small town newspapers mostly were doing great. Making people rich? I'm not a Luddite, I just don't believe it's the end-all, be-all to everything.

I love quoting Tommy Lee Jones in the fugitive. When the Ranchos Independent goes out once per month, at that moment we're in every "... warehouse, farmhouse, henhouse, outhouse and doghouse ..." in the Ranchos. All with a local angle.

Get buckled in for the next 19 years. We'll be here.

Chewy Peanut Bars

4 C Wheaties cereal

1/3 C lightly salted dryroasted peanuts, coarsely chopped

- ¹/₂ C light corn syrup
- 1/3 C packed brown sugar
- ¹/₄ C peanut butter
- 3 T semisweet chocolate chips

Spray 9 inch square pan with cooking spray. In large bowl, mix cereal and peanuts. In a 2 quart saucepan, heat corn syrup, brown sugar and peanut butter to boiling over medium heat, stirring constantly. Boil and stir 1 minute. Pour over cereal mixture, stirring to coat entire mixture. Press in pan, using your fingers. If mix is too sticky, dampen your fingers with water.

In a small microwaveable bowl, microwave chocolate chips uncovered on high 30 seconds, stir. Continue microwaving 10 seconds at a time, stirring after each time, until smooth. Drizzle over bars. Refrigerate about 30 minutes or until chocolate has hardened. Makes 16 bars.

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Biden's Extreme Recklessness

Joe Biden 2024 is a bad idea whose time has come.

If Democrats had gotten the shellacking that seemed to be coming their way in the midterms, Biden might have been wounded enough for elements of the Democratic establishment to begin to try to shoulder him into retirement.

Instead, the Democratic overperformance has Biden looking revitalized. Gov. Gavin Newsom of California told the president on election night that he's not running against him (not that Biden was ever likely to face a direct primary challenge). Press coverage has emphasized Biden's vindication. The shot in the arm is understandable given what his party was able to pull off, yet it doesn't make Biden a day younger -- in fact, he just turned 80 and every day of his presidency is an experiment in whether an unprecedentedly aged president can perform at the level demanded of the office.

Democrats consider Biden the safe choice in 2024, since he's the incumbent and surrounded by flawed alternatives, yet he is actually an enormous risk. Nominating him again would be extremely reckless, both for the party and for the country.

It may well be that Biden, even in his enfeebled state, is the best matchup against Donald Trump. He beat him once before, after all, and used him as an effective foil during the midterms. It is to Biden's advantage that it has proven difficult for anyone to work up a passionate hatred of him, rather than a low-intensity sense of pity or contempt. And he still has a relatively moderate affect and profile -there are limits to how "woke" an 80something, silver-haired creature of the Democratic establishment can appear, no matter how far left his policies are.

for fleeing armed robbers.

At around 3:30 p.m., the Madera County Sheriff's Office got a request from the Fresno County Sheriff's Department requesting help corralling a group of three armed robbers who had robbed a marijuana dispensary up in Friant. The suspects had stolen a vehicle and were seen driving toward Madera County.

A Madera County Deputy found the stolen vehicle on Highway 145 near Island Drive and a suspect in the car "leg bailed" and was caught. At this time, deputies also found an abandoned car at Road 37 and AvThere's no guarantee, though, that Biden will get the former president as his opponent. If he doesn't, then he'll be denied the dynamic of one old guy whose record is terrible running against another old guy who frightens people.

If Trump can't secure the GOP nomination, everything changes. Ron DeSantis is 44. Ted Cruz is 51. Mike Pompeo is 58. Tim Scott is 47. Basically, any Republican nominee besides Trump would instantly be bequeathed a powerful pastvs.-future theme (age aside, Trump will unavoidably and perhaps explicitly be running a campaign of restoration).

There's another risk for Democrats, as well -- namely that Biden will experience some age-related meltdown in public during a general-election campaign that will make his struggles undeniable even to well-wishers determined to look the other way.

Aging is a progressive condition. Biden isn't getting any younger or more capable. The good news is that today, right now, he is as fit as he'll ever be to perform his duties; the bad news is that there are a lot of days between now and 2024 when he'll be less fit, whether by a tiny increment or by a lot.

The public is already unsettled. According to the exit polls, 58% of voters said Biden does not have the acuity to serve effectively as president.

If Democrats get their way, this is just the beginning. They propose to reelect a man who will be 82 on Inauguration Day, and 86 by the end of his second term.

The actuarial tables and the realities of aging being what they are, this creates considerable risk of putting the country through the trauma of having a president who is incapable of carrying out his entire

This well-seasoned writer has seen many Christmases come and go, starting in a rural area where the roads were dirt, the "restroom" was an outhouse 20 yards from the back door, the "bathroom" was a galvanized washtub sitting on the back porch, and electricity and running water weren't available. Water came from a well accessed by a bucket on a rope. Santa's gifts came by mail, chosen from among the least expensive items in Sears & Roebuck's or Montgomery Ward's catalogs; or they were handmade by Dad with his few tools or sewn by Mom on the old treadle (foot powered) sewing machine – or they came not at all.

Phones, when they became available, were frustrating 10-party lines, and the word "cellular" referred only to human body cells. The terms "climate change," "climate crisis" and "global warming" had not yet been invented to frighten and direct the populace to "acceptable" behavior. Little did we know that the world was going to end by the year 2012!

Then, as now, parents' fervent prayers included pleas for their children's health and safety – safety from the likes of natural disasters, accidents, illnesses and, yes, "bad guys." But then they had no reason to envision today's reality: acceptance of wanton violence and destruction, proliferation of deadly narcotics, chaos in society and schools, rampant crime without punishment, or the breakdown of the family structure.

Back then, as now, loving parents worked and scrimped so that "Santa" could bring the best possible gifts to their children.

Obviously our world has witnessed drastic changes – some good, and some disastrous but unfortunately accepted – like homeless street encampments strewn with drug paraphernalia and filth, legalized shoplifting, government-caused food, gas and consumer goods shortages, an influx from our southern border of deadly fentanyl, needy migrants, terrorists and assorted criminals, schools indoctrinating rather than educating and in some cities the purposeful elimination of police protection from increasingly dangerous streets.

While their parents and four other siblings escaped, no sign of the remaining five children has ever been found, despite decades-long publicity and numerous investigations by both law enforcement and amateur sleuths.

• On Dec. 22, 1956, a baby western gorilla named Colo debuted on the world stage at the Columbus Zoo and Aquarium in Ohio, where she would spend her entire life, becoming the first-ever gorilla born in captivity. Upon her death in 2017, she was also the oldest known gorilla in the world.

• On Dec. 20, 1957, Elvis Presley received his Army draft notice while spending the holiday season at his newly purchased mansion, Graceland. Distraught fans sent thousands of letters to the Army asking for him to be spared, but Elvis himself had no hesitation about entering, though he did receive a deferment that allowed him to finish work on the movie "King Creole."

• On Dec. 21, 2006, rebel monks at the centuries-old Esphigmenou Monastery in Thessaloniki, Greece, took up crowbars and fire extinguishers to repel church-appointed monks with sledgehammers attempting to break in. The rebels vehemently opposed efforts by the Orthodox church to improve relations with the Vatican.

• On Dec. 25, 2013, military defense forces discovered a professionally designed but incomplete 40-meter tunnel connecting Hong King to China that included rail tracks, hanging lamps, ventilators and a small transport cart. Authorities believed the tunnel, which cost an estimated \$494,000, was created with the intention of smuggling goods into Hong Kong to avoid tariffs.

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Were You Stationed at Fort Ord?

I remember Fort Ord as a beautiful place to live, with perfect weather and the ocean right over the sand dunes. It was idyllic. But now over a thousand veterans have developed cancer after having served at Fort Ord. The likely culprit: chemicals in the drinking water, 40 of them, with trichloroethylene, or TCE, being most notable for causing different

types of cancer. And once again, leaking tanks allowed chemicals to leach into the water supply.

The EPA labeled Fort Ord as a Super Fund site in 1990 because of leaking underground petroleum tanks, a landfill, a motor pool, a target range, a burn pit for drums of chemicals and other culprits. The base closed in 1994, but the housing was still used until 1997. Veterans who have become ill after serving at Fort Ord have gone to the VA for care and have been told there's no service connection between their illnesses and Fort Ord.

evitably wrenching 25th Amendment crisis, or we have to deal with the legitimacy issues around an unelected president.

Why even consider going down this route? In part, because Biden made an identity politics choice for vice president, and not a good one. It is understandable that the prospect of Vice President Kamala Harris makes Democrats want to cling to their nurse for fear of something worse. But the country deserves a better idea.
