### Cal Gas Tax Will Drop by \$6B

As the state battles climate change and Californians drive fewer gas-powered cars, tax revenue will drop substantially, according to a new state analysis. EV fees will make up only part of the transportation shortfall, so lawmakers need new funding options.

California's funding from gas taxes will drop by nearly \$6 billion in the next decade due to the state's electric car rules and other climate programs, "likely re-

sulting in a decline in highway conditions for drivers," according to a new state analysis released today.

As California phases major policies aimed at reducing greenhouse gas emissions - such

as the mandates for zero-emission cars and trucks — consumers buy less gasoline and diesel, and consequently pay less taxes.

Those declines in tax dollars will be partially offset by the state's road improvement fee, which drivers pay when they register their electric cars. But the Legislative Analyst's Office stressed that overall, the state will still see a \$4.4 billion drop in funding, a 31 percent decline, over a decade, so the Legislature and governor must come up with substantial new funding sources.

Unless the drop is accounted for with new fees or other funding, there

would be substantially less money for highway programs as well as local road maintenance, the analysts wrote. Work supporting buses, trains and other public transit options across the state also would face drops in funding.

"As the state tries to meet its ambitious climate goals through the adoption of zero emission vehicles, and greater fuel efficiency within conventional vehicles, the report finds that we'll see a decline in fuel tax revenues," said Frank Jimenez, a senior fiscal and policy analyst with the office.

Electric cars could make our roads worse. ing for transportation. The report projects declines of \$5 billion, or 64 percent, in the state's gasoline excise tax, \$290 million, or 20 percent, in the diesel excise tax and \$420 million, or 20 percent, in the diesel sales

tax, over the next decade. Highway maintenance is funded primarily by the fuel taxes "and therefore will face significant funding declines," the report says. "... We project funding for these programs will drop by roughly \$1.5 billion (26 percent) over the next decade, from \$5.7 billion to \$4.2 billion."

### They're Coming for Your Pool

California is trying to electrify everything to reduce fossil fuel emissions, and it's also trying to reduce power usage in the evenings when the state uses the most natural gas. The California Energy Commission has voted to require residential pools to be able to shut off their electricity when the grid tells them to.

There are 1.25 million residential pools in California, and the new pumps are ex-

pected to reduce the state's total greenhouse gas emissions by a half percent. By 2033, the state could gain more than 500 megawatts of power by shutting off pool pumps — enough to power about a half million homes.

Household appliances use lots of power and swill need to be electrified to earn money by signing up to have their pumps reach net zero emissions by 2045. The shut off when electricity demand is high. CEC, which has authority over appliances'

energy use, is starting with pool pumps because they're relatively convenient to update. Starting in September 2025, all pool pumps sold in California will have to be able to connect to the internet and operate by default from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. The smart pumps cost about \$70 more than regular ones, but users are expected to save \$100 a month by buying power during the day, when it's cheaper. They'll also be able to

Pool manufacturers asked the com-

mission to phase in the rule over four to five years, instead of two, but regulators said no. "There has been quite a bit of projection that this was coming, so I'm for now comfortable with where it's landed," said Andrew McAllister, the commissioner in charge of the rulemaking.

Expect pools to be the first of many consumer goods to be made more flexible. McAllister said the agency would next tackle water heaters, residential batteries and potentially electric vehicle chargers.

"You may have already noticed the large number of stray and homeless animals roaming nearly everywhere in the Madera area," Becker said. "These ani-

A volunteer group has established the mals are continuing to reproduce, only adding to the problem. Shelters and rescue groups are overwhelmed. Many area residents can also no longer find or afford even basic veterinary care for their

> pets. Simply put it's a crisis. We know people care and we are hoping the public can help." said Becker. "We also pledge to use every dollar of your donation responsibly.

"If all of our local

animal lovers could contribute just \$10 or \$15 we would be well on our way. 

He was truly sorry and kept


saying he didn't know how it happened and I helped him by saying, "It happened because you didn't take it out."



what amused me more, that she sounded more exasperated than worried, or the fact that she referred to the missing kid as six rather than a





- ½ C sunflower nuts\*
- ½ C dry roasted peanuts
- 34 C packed brown sugar
- ½ C corn syrup
- 1/4 C peanut butter
- 1 tsp. vanilla

Spray 13x9 inch pan with cooking spray. In large bowl, mix snack mix ingredients, set aside.

In 2 quart saucepan, mix all syrup ingredients except vanilla. Heat to boiling over mediumhigh heat, stirring constantly. Boil 1 minute. Remove from heat, stir in vanilla. Pour syrup over snack mix, stirring until evenly coated. Press mixture firmly in pan. Cool completely at least 30 minutes. Cut into 9 rows by 4 rows, making 36 bars. Store lightly covered.

\*If you can't find the dried tropical fruit, use whatever dried

fruit you like - apricots, dates, pineapple, but be sure to chop them 1 C dried tropical three-fruit to bite size. Same for the sunflower nuts - if you don't like them, use chopped toasted almonds, pistachios or even cashews.

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

### Ex-Dodger/Padre All Star Steve Garvey: The Republican Wild Card

Since January, almost all the coverage of the 2024 U.S. Senate race has been on three major candidates: Congresswoman Barbara Lee (D-CA), Congresswoman Katie Porter (D-CA), and Congressman Adam Schiff (D-CA) . They have been by far the top candidates in terms of donations, endorsements, and where they place in polls. Other Democrats have occasionally made headlines, such as former tech executive Lexi Reese who has been a masterful fundraiser, but in polls they generally don't go above 2 or 3 percent.

For the first three quarters of the year, GOP candidates didn't do much better than those tertiary Democrats. Lawyer Eric Early did have an impressive early poll lead in the double digits, but has since settled in to single digit territory. He also has by far the most endorsements amongst any Republican, albeit with most coming from

County Republican organization. Businessman James Bradley also made waves by moving ahead of Early in some polls, but

as they have each gotten an average of between 3 and 7 points in every poll since June, it's not saying all that much. While both are good candidates, the GOP needed a name candidate who could fundraise and go the distance against the top three Democrats.

While often rumored as a candidate, it wasn't until early last month that

the GOP got a candidate who could potentially scuttle the all-Democrat path ahead -

former Los Angeles Dodger and San Diego Padre all-star Steve Garvey. While not as big a name as other celebrity California Re-

publican politicians of the past like Arnold Schwarzenegger and Sonny Bono, Garvey came in with dedicated bases of support in LA and San Diego, as well as more offbeat blocs of support, such as those from baseball fans, that could reach beyond party lines and attract the coveted independent and undecided voters.

Many Democrats dismissed Garvey as just another Republican entering the race be reckoned with, Democrats have now begun shifting rhetoric away from each other and back towards the GOP. However, either way is going to prove harmful to the Democrats in the long-term.

#### Garvey and the GOP

"Either way, Democrats are going to lose face here," added Stephanie Lewis, a pollster in Southern California. "They get two Dem candidates in, and those two are going to waste tens of millions going after each other through most of 2024 and show just how divided Democrats are. If it is one Democrat against Garvey, yeah they still

last month. According to some experts the Globe talked with on Wednesday, Democrats saw him as just another minor dent in the number of votes going to someone other than Porter, Schiff, or Lee.

"He was seen as just another Early or Bradley, but with maybe another point or two in the polls because of his fundraising experience," said said Matt Saunders, a political consultant who helps advise candidates from entertainment and athletic fields, to the Globe.

However, in the last month, Garvey has quickly not only become the top Republican in the race, but one of the top candidates period. The last two major polls have shown Garvey in third place with 10% of the vote, now ahead of Lee, one of the three major Democrats. As of the latest poll, he is only six points behind Schiff and three points, the margin-of-error, behind

With Garvey now a bona fide force to get the seat unless something crazy happens, but they are hurt because they beat out a few of their golden candidates. Oh, and if [Garvey] does well enough, it could show the Democrats losing ground overall."

For the GOP, the next few months are critical in the lead up to the March primary. While a win in November 2024 is extremely difficult, a win in March is becoming more and more likely. And there are several signs to watch for.

"One is the polls," continued Saunders.

"Gotta keep an eye on them. Garvey has been moving up, and if he starts getting into that second place territory, both Schiff and Porter, who have sunk a ton of money and their future political careers into this, are not going to be happy.

Two is fundraising. New SEC totals for the quarter will come out in December, and where Garvey stands with money will be critical. To be competitive he needs at least as much as Lee, so we are talking at least a million dollars. Schiff and Porter have a bunch more, but he can also easily rack up more donations as needed. He just needs that threshold and a big number to draw in support.

"Speaking of, three is bringing in more support. Getting more from the GOP is good, but he needs more branching out to independents, undecideds, and maybe some one the fence baseball fans. You said getting former teammates involved could help, and yeah, it can. If he can reach out to Latinos especially, he can get a solid boost

of support. Female voters are big for him too to get, and there he can work in his non-profit experience to draw more in.

"Four is policy, as he needs a more clear vision as well as good counters to arguments that the Democrats have thrown out. And five is to bring together a unified Republican front. Again, Early and Bradley are great, and in any other year, they would be going for that outside shot of getting one of the primary spots. But Garvey is winning a lot of Republicans over. If both throw their support behind him, that is at least another easy five points for Garvey. Plus the GOP can claim a unified candidate, something which the Democrats are very much fractured on right now. A GOP unified Garvey could potentially start leading in the polls. In fact, that is very likely. Democrats would be humiliated and the GOP would get some good

"You said it. He is a wild card in the election as the top Republican. And right now, he is the only Republican these Democratic candidates fear."

Caltrans, declined to comment. "Caltrans is reviewing the report but does not comment on potential legislative proposals," a spokesperson said.

Lawmakers could make up for the shortfalls in many of these programs by spending less on transportation, but that would likely mean worsening roads and highways, and also some public mass transit cuts. They might also consider further increasing gas taxes or vehicle fees. But that might have an outsized impact on the state's lower-income communities, who are expected to adopt zero-emission vehicles more slowly as middle- or higher-income Californians.

Lawmakers also could consider using


other state funds for transportation or implementing a road charge, which would tax people based on the number of miles they drive.

The report comes as California is bracing for a projected \$68 billion budget deficit next year. Gov. Gavin Newsom's Finance Department on Tuesday ordered departments and agencies across government to rein in spending on everything from travel to office supplies.


