Ranchos Home Invasion Ends in Death/January

One of the great things about living in Southeast Madera County is safety. But sometimes, things happen that remind you it's still a dangerous world. A Ranchos home got broken into and the homeowner was armed. The burglar didn't make it.

Pile Up on Highway 41/ August • People started noticing an increase in traffic - and accidents - on area roads. In August, there was quite a pile up on Highway 41 at Avenue 12 that involved six vehicles in a chain reaction. Fortunately no one was killed, but it ignited concern.

Riverstone Water Treatment/April • Everyone knows that water is a precious commodity and when that commodity comes out of the faucet brown, there's a problem. The Riverstone Development agreed to a \$25 million water treatment facility that'll be online by the end of 2025.

LHS Wall of Honor/No**vember** • And speaking of good news, Liberty High has a "Wall of Honor" for graduates that have gone into military service. Principal Kandace Osborn put out a call to the community to make sure that everyone who is or has served is recognized. Good job.

Merced Judge Releases Child Molester to Madera County/May • A Merced Su-

perior Court Judge released a convicted child molester, deeming him "no longer a threat." He was released to Madera because he had family here. Multiple psychologists disagreed with the judge.

Flatlanders Returns/April After being gone for a year for different reasons — including Covid — the Flatlanders Day Parade returned to the Ranchos. There was a new route, a craft fair and seemingly a new spirit of cooperation that doesn't want to lose it again.

Road Changes Coming for Area Roads/September •

After the multi-car pile up in August, the County announced plans to start safety measures in 2025 that will result in increased traffic signals, increased number of lanes and an increased police presence by the CHP. About time.

Virginia Vick Lifetime **Achievement/October •** It's not always bad news. Longtime resident Virginia Vick was honored with a Lifetime Achievement Award by the Madera Chamber for nearly half a century of good works in the Ranchos. Way to go, Virginia.

Biden Bows Out/July • Although not specific to Southeast Madera County, when a sitting president opts out of running for reelection, it's news. Biden decided to not run, throwing the Democrats into a frenzy. With no primary election, he threw his support behind V.P. Harris and the election was on.

Madera Community Hospital/February-April • After closing its doors in 2023, and leav-

ing Madera without a hospital, it looked like it was getting close to re-opening its doors ... but then at the last minute everything changed. A month later it was back on. Then it was off. As of today, it is still closed.

\$130K CHP Grant for Our Area

The California Highway Patrol has received a grant of \$130,000 specifically to help make the highways of southeast Madera County safer. The CHP estimates that between 2020 and 2023 there were 106 deaths on the highways and approximately 2,600 other injuries.

The program is called FREE, standing for Fatal Reduction for Education and Enforcement grant. The grant is being funded by the California Office of Traffic Safety. One of the most promising aspects of the FREE program is that it will provide extra CHP officers to police Highway 41 and 145, and Highways 99 and 152. It will also include unincorporated roads in rural areas. Along with additional officers on the road, the money can also be used for community outreach programs for educating local citizens.

Twenty Years Later

Do you know the story of the Ranchos Independent? December is our anniversary month because in December of 2004 my partner and I bought the paper from its second owner, the late Bill Bell. Last year I did a pretty good history of our acquiring the paper so I thought I would share some highlights from it.

"... I know it's getting to be a tired old joke, but hey — I only tell it once a year. Every December when I wake up and see I'm still putting out the Ranchos Independent, I always think to myself, '... and they said it wouldn't last ...' For more emphasis I always say it very slowly, barely above a whisper, with my eyes squinted. The way I imagine Clint Eastwood would say it.

"Twenty years ago, I had a business partner named Kim Allison and she and I had started a couponing magazine for Madera called the Super Clipper. That publication was added to an ag magazine we were producing that was seriously struggling. Although I had Walter Mitty delusions of being William Randolph Hurst, it can be hard to go for the gusto when you only have two publications and one is failing. It's like being a runner with a bad leg.

"Our couponing magazine was doing well and one day while we

were out selling ad space for it, someone told us that there was a paper for sale in the Ranchos, where I lived. And I was familiar with the Ranchos Independent and its then owner, Bill Bell. You see, I had written a letter to the editor about the formation of what was to be the Golden Valley Unified School District and like all TRUE letter writers, I included my name and address and phone number so if Bill wanted to verify anything, he would have a way to do so. Real letter writers eschew 'anonymous.'

"You can imagine my delight when my letter got published for all of the Ranchos — and the world — to see my thought process on this important issue ... complete with my name, home address and telephone number published at the end.

"Needless to say, I paid Mr. Bill Bell a visit. Immediately.


"He was truly sorry and kept saying he didn't know how it happened, and I helped him by saying, 'It happened because you didn't take it out.

"It was a few months later that I heard the paper was for sale; of course, what I didn't know was how sick he was from cancer. I bought the paper in December of 2004 and by St. Patrick's Day he was gone.

"When I bought the paper, I saw no need to fundamentally change it. I did computerize everything — no more literally 'pasting up' the paper with hot wax and transporting full-size layout sheets to the printer like I did on my high school paper in the 70s. I stuck to my guns of only distributing to 93636, which we still do to this day — 100 percent distribution. Every mailbox gets the Independent."

In 2023 I did make one big change. I changed the name from the Ranchos Independent to simply the Independent. When I bought the paper, the Ranchos was pretty much the only game in town, but that is not the case anymore. There was no Riverstone or Tesoro Viejo. It occurred to me that most people refer to the paper as "The Independent," so after 19 years I thought I'd get with the program.

Who knows what the next 20 years will hold? I'm just hoping to be a part of as many of them as possible. Thanks for being there.



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


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Ants in the Angel

Holiday Snacking

Editor's Note: With the passing of Aunt Jean, I have decided to bring you a "Best Of" of her recipes over the past 10 years. Good recipes are timeless and I hope you enjoy them all over again.

Thanksgiving is over for another year, all the leftovers are gone and it is time to think about Christmas and New Year's. Will it be beef, ham, turkey or pork? I know a family that doesn't fix a big dinner on Christmas. After all the gifts are unwrapped, they fix a big breakfast and spend the afternoon visiting with family and friends that can't get out. Then it is sandwiches and snacks in the afternoon.

rate. I can remember as a kid my (2 or 3 cans) grandmother always having a bowl of sugared walnuts on the table. This is her recipe

afternoon.

Sugared Walnuts

1 C sugar

7 T milk

Boil 4 minutes and pour over 2 or 3 cups of walnuts. Pour onto a pan that has been covered with wax paper. Let cool and break into bite size pieces.

Or my mom would always have a bowl of almonds. You can do these two different ways, either with the hulls on or off the almonds. If you have kids, they can help you take the hulls off the almonds, however you will probably have almonds all over the kitchen as I remember we did. Put whatever amount of almonds you are going to toast in boiling water for just a minute or two and this will loosen



the hulls. Put them in cool water so they are easy to handle. With a gentle push the hull should come right off, or if the kids are "helping" they can squirt the almond meat out of the hull. Let the almonds dry completely.

In a frying pan, heat enough oil to cover the bottom of the pan. Pour in the dried almonds and stirring until they are browned and crisp. With a slotted spoon, remove almonds from pan onto paper towel lined baking sheet and sprinkle with salt while they are still hot.

One of my all-time favorites is the Seven Layer dip. I don't know why they call it seven layers because it is more than seven. When I make it, I

usually use a large cookie sheet, but you can use any flat plate or platter or cookie sheet, depending on the amount you want make. The quantities in parentheses are the amount I use – sandwiches and snacks in the you use whatever you need.

8 large flour tortillas


In large bowl mix together cream cheese, sour cream, and dry ranch dip mix. Beat until smooth. Spread a thin layer of mix on each tortilla. Top with layer of deli meat. Roll each tortilla up tightly and wrap with plastic wrap. Refrigerate until ready to serve. When ready to serve, cut each roll into 3/4- to 1-inch slices. Place on serving platter.

a need to tax in the first place – or we vote for men willing to actually – not rhetorically – fight for meaningful change and real results.

Make no mistake, there is money and there is a way to apply pressure resulting in a much quicker long-term solution, but there is not a will to spend tax dollars appropriately, just as there is not a will to hold bureaucrats responsible. This problem will not be fixed anytime soon, I know; but we must follow these steps now and in the future to correct the current traffic crisis:

- 1. Vote out people who are nothing more than weak-willed politicians who prefer excuses to rough and tumble engagement.
- 2. Vote in no-nonsense people who won't be corrupted by political shenanigans and know when to bring scissors to a red-

tape fight.

- 3. Demand at every meeting even meetings that have nothing to do with roads that radical change must occur.
- 4. Ensure that you vote for people that have the virtues of tenacity, diligence, perseverance and a commitment to serve constituents, not a commitment to gain power and paychecks.

Residents of Tesoro Viejo and Riverstone did not sign up for this nonsense and Ranchos residents certainly did not either. But many of us contributed by not holding politicians, agencies, elected officials and others accountable. Madera County is still a preferred county in California, and we can do something about keeping it that way. Let's make Southeast Madera County drivable again.

Using a serrated knife is helpful.

If you don't want to go to the trouble of making an appetizer, go to the produce department and buy a variety of vegetables to be eaten raw – broccoli, carrots, celery, cucumber, zucchini and cherry tomatoes. 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

Dig a hole the same size as the seedling's container; gently loosen the roots if the soil is impacted, then place the seedling and soil in the hole. Gently fill in and pat down where needed. Water it weekly in its first year; after that, only water Grow the tree during dry months or during a drought. your own After the first two to three years you can start to Christmas prune and shear it. Harvest time will depend on tree what tree you've decided to grow, but it's best to cut it down in late fall when it is full of moisture. This ensures your tree stays as green as possible during the holidays. - Brenda Weaver


It was almost dark when the painter picked up his easel and left. And the little fir was tired and cross from all his preening and posing.
