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Meth and Stolen Scrap Leads Back to Ranchos Home

Sheriff John Anderson announced on Thursday, Feb. 21 the arrest of two Madera residents and a Fresno man all believed to be connected to a case involving crystal meth and stolen metal. A fourth suspect has avoided custody.

Deputy Luis Padgett and Ag Crimes Detective Adam McEwen took 35-year-old Buryl Patrick Acosta and 24-year-old Sabrina Marie Smith into custody at a recycling yard Wednesday, Feb. 20. Both suspects are from Madera. Smith is accused of selling nearly 5,000 pounds of stolen metal, reaping more than \$500 before she and Acosta were captured.

With help from Sergeant Mark Stritzel, a third suspect, 38-year-old Clint Serrage of Fresno was captured Thursday, Feb. 21 and taken into custody at a home located on Manon Avenue near Road 35 in the Madera Ranchos while a fourth suspect, 26-year-old Michael Anthony Luna remains on the loose.

In their search to find Luna, Deputies hit a number of homes overnight, including one in the Madera Ranchos the morning of Thursday, Feb. 21. That's where they found numerous bags of crystal meth, marijuana, drug paraphernalia and cash. Deputies discovered Clint Serrage had been staying at this home for about a week before his arrest. Sheriff Anderson said theft and meth go hand in hand and it's not impacting just Madera County. He says the entire Valley is affected by it. In fact, a Fresno woman wanted in Fresno on a \$50,000 felony drug warrant was found hiding under a car parked on the Manon Ave. property.

According to the scrap metal victim several pieces of metal equipment started disappearing from his work shop located on Avenue 10 near Road 35. Roughly two weeks after the theft, the victim stumbled upon his stolen property at a recycling yard in Madera. The scrapper, identified as Smith, claimed it came from her "Grandpa's Farm."

The victim and the suspect are NOT

related.

Sabrina Smith, remains behind bars, booked on suspicion of receiving stolen property with her bail set at \$10,000. Buryl Patrick Acosta, who is currently on felony drug probation, was also booked on the same criminal complaint, and is being held without bail. Clint Serrage, who is on felony drug probation out of Fresno, reportedly with two pending court cases, was booked on suspicion of possession for sales. He sits behinds bars with bail set at \$10,000.

Michael Luna is wanted for possession and transporting stolen property. He stands 5 feet 10 inches tall, weighs roughly 175 pounds, has black hair, brown eyes and sports a mole on his cheek, just to the left of his nose. Tattooed across his forearm, is the word, "Crossroads."

Anyone with information is urged to call the Madera County Sheriff's Office at 559-675-7770 or CRIME STOPPERS at 498-STOP. An anonymous tip that leads to Luna's arrest is worth up to \$1,000.









Sabrina Marie Smith, 24, and Buryl Patrick Acosta, 35, were taken into custody at a recycling yard Wednesday, Feb. 20 trying to sell 5,000 pounds of allegedly stolen scrap metal. Their arrest led to the capture of 38-year-old Clint Serrage of Fresno the next day at a home located on Manon Avenue near Road 35 in the Madera Ranchos. The final suspect, 26-year-old Michael Anthony Luna, is still on the loose. He can be identified by a large tattoo on his right forearm that says "crossroads."

Area Child Predator Behind Bars Now



High Risk Sex Offender Was Wearing Ankle Monitor

Frank Charles Reddell, a 38-year-old Madera resident and convicted sex offender who was out on parole, is back behind bars accused of possessing child pornography and manufacturing child pornography, even with an electronic monitor strapped to his ankle

Arresting Reddell was the result of a joint investigation with Homeland Security, Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation Parole, Madera Police, Madera County Sheriff's Office and the Central California Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force, said Madera County Sheriff John Anderson. "Authorities have, in large part, the electric monitor to thank," Anderson said.

While electronic monitors are designed to capture a parolee's every move, it's up to parole agents to keep vigilant as to what those who wear the monitors are up to at each location.

One day after Christmas, Reddell was seen sitting in his car viewing images on his laptop while parked outside a Starbucks in Madera. He was reportedly in plain view of those who patronize the place, including his agent, who was keeping tabs on him. According to reports, when parole agent John Hagler walked up to the car he could see sexually explicit images of children on the suspect's computer screen. He confronted Reddell and attempted to take the computer, but Reddell resisted and tried to put his car into gear to take off. Agent Hagler jumped into the car to keep Reddell from fleeing and Reddell physically attacked Hagler.

Madera Police showed up to assist Ha-

gler and they took Reddell into custody, and booked him into Madera County Department of Corrections on suspicion of Battery on a Peace Officer, Resisting Arrest, Obstruction and Parole Violation. Parole agents seized the computer and a search warrant was written. It was then that Madera Police contacted Lt. Tyson Pogue, the Madera County Sheriff's Task Force representative with Internet Crimes Against Children, to help with the investigation. The investigation, which began on Dec. 26, 2012, has resulted in additional

felony complaints filed against Reddell.

During the course of that investigation, Pogue has discovered thousands of sexually explicit images of children and in addition to images found on Reddell's computer, Pogue also found equally disturbing images on the suspect's cell phone. It is alleged that the suspect was not only downloading child pornography on his computer, but capturing explicit images of children on his cell phone as well. Reddell, who works as a heavy equipment operator for Cal Trans, based in Fresno, was also moonlighting as a handyman doing repair work at homes in Madera. Using ad-

vanced forensic techniques, investigators were able to extract information from the photographs leading authorities to places where he was hired to conduct handyman work.

Reddell is currently listed on California's Megan's Law Website as a registered sex offender, convicted in 2004 of lewd or lascivious acts with a child under 14 years of age. At the bottom of that same screen, it reads, "The registrant may have subsequently relocated."

He has.

Frank Charles Reddell remains jailed

without bail, facing additional felony charges, which include possession of child pornography and manufacturing child pornography. Based on evidence gathered by authorities so far, they believe there may be more victims.

Because the case originated in the city of Madera, the Madera Police Department is the lead investigating agency. They ask that anyone in the Ranchos who may have possibly had work done by Reddell and who might have additional information should call Detective Brent Cederquist with the Madera Police Department at 559-675-4244.

As Rahm Emanuel stated when Chief of Staff for Obama, "Never let a good crisis go to waste!"

While the massacre of the innocents in Connecticut is horrendous, the gun control advocates are out in force with specious and egregious lies, deceptions, and outright Marxist politics. Obama has failed to address the Fort Hood massacre of our soldiers or the 500 plus American citizens gunned down in his hometown of Chicago just this year. These murders and acts of terrorism do not figure into the Marx-

ist agenda of gun confiscation as the precursor to total government control. Hitler, Mao, Stalin, Mussolini and all other dictators involved in attempting full government control over their citizens knew that the nullification of the citizen's

right to bear arms in case the government turned rogue was a priority. So, let's take a hard look at the problem by the numbers.

1. Assault Rifles

What is the legal definition of an assault rifle? The word "assault" in military or law enforcement parlance is the breaching of a defensive position to achieve possession of it. Several generations ago specific rifles were designed to achieve this. The requirement was that they be light, shorter for close quarters than main battle function of the assault rifle was that it had to be able to fire like a machine gun in fully automatic fire – hold the trigger rearward and the rifle would continue to fire until you released the trigger or you ran out of ammunition. Google the St. Valentine's Day Massacre back in Chicago 80 years ago and you will find the gangsters using Thompson sub-machine guns that fired the .45ACP cartridge. They used detachable cartridge drums that held lots of rounds, much more than any magazine. During WWII the Thompson was a premier assault rifle used to breach defensive positions. It was also modified to use a 30-round magazine instead of the drum, which was subject to failing.

In 1965 the U.S. began to issue M16 fullauto assault rifles for use in Vietnam. The M16 replaced the M14 and was in use once the M1 (eight rounds in a clip loaded from the top of the receiver, and not full-auto) was phased out in the

> late 1950s. The M14 was a main battle rifle using nearly the same powerful long-range cartridge as the M1, but the M14 was able to fire full-auto. It was magazine fed at the base of the receiver. The M16 was designed specifically as an assault rifle used in

close quarters of the Vietnam jungle. It was short and light using small powerful .223 ammunition, the bullet being nearly equal to the normal .22LR used in target rifles and pistols. The .22 cartridge equals 22 thousandths of an inch, or nearly \frac{1}{4} inch in diameter, but the .223 cartridge used in the M16 and the M4 carbine, a shorter version of the M16. is more powerful, but basically the same bullet.

Most assault rifles have a selector lever on the receiver that designates what rate of fire the user wishes such as Auto (continues to fire like

President Obama's Re-Founding

For the left, this is what winning looks like. President Barack Obama gave a second inaugural address that just as easily could have been delivered by progressive darling Elizabeth Warren.

If the president didn't repeat the phrase that Republicans threw back at him so often during the 2012 campaign -- "you didn't build that" -- the speech was a meditation on the same theme of the limits of individual action. The address was a paean to collectivism, swaddled in the rhetoric of individual liberty and of fidelity to the founding.

He began and ended with the Founding Fathers and threaded the Declaration of Independence throughout. This gave the speech a conservative sheen. He used the words "timeless," "ancient," "lasting" and "enduring." He sounded like Republican Sen. Marco Rubio in invoking "what makes us exceptional," namely "our allegiance to an idea, articulated in a declaration made more than two centuries ago."

But this framing of the speech only served to amplify the ambition of President Obama's larger political project. He hopes to reorient the American mainstream and locate conservatives outside it. He wants to take the founders from the right and baptize the unreconstructed entitlement state and the progressive agenda in the American creed.

In Obama's telling, the high points of our national life are found in collective action, in the growth of government, in teachers trained and roads built. "Now, more than ever," he declared, "we must do these things together, as one nation and one people."

He presented his agenda as the logical consequence of the Declaration of Independence's enunciation of the equality of all men and our right to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. For Obama, that means equal-pay legislation, gay marriage and amnesty for illegal immigrants. He included a long passage on the necessity of fighting climate change with transformative energy policies. "That's what will lend meaning," he said, "to the creed our fathers once declared." (One wonders what Thomas Jefferson would have made of the argument that his handiwork is meaningless absent federal subsidies for the likes of Solyndra.)


According to President Obama, entitlements like Medicare and Social Security don't merely represent a necessary safety net for the vulnerable. "They free us to take the risks that make this country great," he maintained, in a highly imaginative interpretation of these programs

All of his bows to modesty were formalistic. He mentioned "outworn programs," without even promising to eliminate any. He said we have always had a suspicion of central authority, but of course he didn't endorse it. He said we don't have to settle the debate over the size of government once and for all, while insisting that we keep expanding it on his own terms.

All in all, it was a brazen performance, as audacious in intent as it was banal in its expression. He used the founders' authority to advance an expansive conception of American government that would have been unrecognizable to them. Amid the pomp and the circumstances, Republicans should have heard a direct challenge. The president did them, and everyone else, the favor of enunciating the battle lines and the stakes of the fights to come.

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




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

wasn't much to say, so I simply


smiled at her. It looks like the





Whether you find satisfaction in putting away warm towels fresh from the dryer, and clean, neatly folding T-shirts or your clean laundry stays in piles that look very similar to your dirty piles (but smell better), laundry is a necessary part of each of our lives. Here are a few tips to make your laundry experience even better, or if you're of the second category, just a little more bearable.

First, make your laundry room or area of the garage a pleasant place. Paint it a fun color, and add some cute decorations. For ideas go to

Google Images and search "cute laundry rooms."

Get the basics (detergent, fabric softener or sheets, bleach, etc.) off the dryer-top or floor and create a home for them. Since we're more likely to put stuff away if it's easy, I recommend an open shelf just

above the washer and dryer. If you prefer it hidden, a cabinet with doors works too.

with it.

I refill a medium size detergent bottle with my Costco-size supply and keep the smaller one on my shelf and the refill in the garage. It's easier to handle and fits nicely on the shelf. I also have a small basket for my fabric softener sheets and keep the big box in the cabinet above.

Your supply shelf is a good place for a small container for the ChapSticks, hair accessories, coins and bills retrieved from pockets prior to washing. (Remember – finder's keepers!)

Create a boundary for storing single socks. This might be another container placed on the shelf or in the cabinet. A cute Pinterest idea is tacking a two-foot string to the laundry room wall and clothes-pinning the single socks there. That way family members can easily see and retrieve them. Stenciled on the wall above string it read "Department of Missing Socks" and underneath "no sock left behind."

If single sock prevention is your goal,

consider "sock locks" or use large safety pins to secure socks together. An even better idea is giving each family member his/her own labeled, zippered mesh laundry bag, like those used for delicates. Each person's socks run through the washer and dryer in his/her own bag. Eliminates extra sorting too.

If you have front loading machines, consider placing a countertop over them. This makes a great folding station, portable ironing station and workspace for school or home projects.

To air-dry delicate clothes consider a retractable drying rack that mounts to the wall, or a retractable clothesline. If your shelf extends beyond your washer and dryer, mount a bath towel bar underneath the shelf to hang clothes. For extended hanging space install a closet hanging rod wall to wall, or if the space is small, a shower curtain rod will work. Placing a row of hooks on the wall also provides a place for hanging clothes and saves space because they hang flat against the wall.

Fortunately we're not living in the age of ironing sheets and tea towels, but there are still times when an iron and board are useful. The over-the-door fold-down ironing board simplifies the process. I have mine on the closet

door since I first like to give our clothes a chance to reach a "good enough" state hanging on their own. Keep your iron and any other ironing supplies within reach of your board.

Another cool online idea is the "laundry basket dresser." This stores

three laundry baskets like drawers so you can sort your laundry and not take up a lot of floor space. You can find pictures and how-to instructions at

Finally, set a laundry schedule. Some prefer a laundry day or days so there are days when they don't have to think about laundry at all. Others prefer the routine of doing a load a day. Figure out what works best for you and stick with it.

To ensure that the clean laundry is put away, place everyone's on their beds and make putting it away part of the bedtime routine, rather than a separate chore.

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

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School Safety Review at Golden Valley Unified

The Nation has been shaken with the recent Connecticut school shooting and, more recently, the incident at Taft High School near Bakersfield. High profile acts of violence, particularly in schools, can confuse and frighten children who may feel in danger or worry that their friends or loved-ones are at risk. They will look to adults for information and guidance on how to react. Parents and school personnel can help children feel safe by establishing a sense of normalcy and security and talking with them about their fears.

With the swell of media attention, we all struggle to understand why these events happen and, more importantly, how they can be prevented. Be assured, the schools in our community are very pro-active in regards to dealing with school safety and crisis prevention issues. A regular review of communication systems within the school district and with community responders is conducted.

The National Association of School Psychologists indicates the importance of emphasizing that our schools are very safe. Recent trends have found that school violence nationwide is declining. Statistically, less than one percent of violent acts are "school associated." It is reassuring to know that the schools in Golden Valley are very safe.

Some suggested points to emphasize when talking to children may include:

- 1. School staff work with parents and public safety providers (local police and fire departments, emergency responders, etc.) to keep you safe.
- 2. Drills are conducted regularly at all of the school sites to prepare for emergency situations.
- 3. School safety policies and crisis prevention efforts are annually updated and reviewed by school safety committees which include parents, district administration, the School Board and the leaders of local response agencies.
- 4. We all play a role in school safety. It is important to be observant and let an adult know if you see or hear something that makes you feel uncomfortable, nervous or frightened.
- 5. There is a difference between reporting, tattling or gossiping. You can provide important information that may prevent harm either directly or anonymously by telling a trusted adult what you know or hear.
- 6. Don't dwell on the worst possibilities. Although there is no absolute guarantee that something bad will never happen, it is important to understand the difference between the possibility of something happening and the probability that it will affect our schools.
- 7. Senseless violence is hard for everyone to understand. Doing things that you enjoy, sticking to your normal routine, and being with friends and family help make us feel better and keep us from worrying about the event.
- 8. Limit television viewing of these events. Developmentally inappropriate information can cause anxiety or confusion, particularly in young children. Adults need to be mindful of the context of conversations that they have with each other in front of children, even teenagers, and limit their exposure to vengeful,

hateful, and angry comments that might be misunderstood.

Below are selections of prevention activities currently taking place and regularly reviewed in our schools:

- 1. Limited access to school building (designated entrance with all other access points locked from the exterior).
- 2. Monitoring and supervision of people entering and leaving campus.
- 3. Strong partnership with the local law enforcement.
- 4. Monitoring of school guests (report to main office, sign in, wear badges, report unfamiliar people to school office).
- 5. Crisis plans and preparedness training (regular review of plans and simulation drills; training teachers and other staff in how to respond to students' questions, crisis awareness).
- 6. Creating a safe, supportive school climate that provides school-wide behavioral expectations, caring school climate programs, positive interventions, counseling support, and violence prevention programs (bully-proofing, social skill development, conflict mediation).
- 7. Threat assessment and risk-assessment meetings conducted with the local law enforcement and agencies.
- 8. Regularly scheduled school preparedness drills (lock down, duck and cover and fire).

Open communication between home and school is critical to the safety and well-being of the students and your children. Be assured that our number one priority is the safety of your children. Let us know if you have concerns, questions, or suggestions about school policies or your child's safety.

At this time, our goal is to reassure students that although there is always a possibility of violence occurring in a school, the probability of a school experiencing a high profile violent act is extremely low. It is important that we focus on maintaining our normal routines and activities. Keeping to regular schedule can be reassuring and promote physical health.

trigger is pulled rearward one at a time), and Safe (that prevents the rifle from firing at all).

The two most used assault rifles ever produced are the Russian AK47 and the American M16/M4. Because of their military popularity the manufacturers decided to produce civilian versions that are not full-auto or burst as the military versions are. They only appear cosmetically to the full-auto military versions. In the U.S. you may not own or purchase any full-auto firearm without a specific license issued by the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms (BATF), and these licenses are highly controlled and supervised. Civilians cannot purchase full-auto firearms, including assault rifles, without a license

2. Civilian rifles cosmetically appearing to be Assault Rifles

There are several civilian copies of military assault rifles. One of these is referred to generically as the AR15. The AR stands for the Armalite Company who produced the first M16 rifle issued to our troops in Vietnam back in 1965. Once it was approved, Colt purchased the rights and produced the majority. However, the AR15 is a civilian version of the M16 military model, but with a significant difference: it is not fullauto! There is a firing selector lever on the receiver, but it has only two positions: fire and safe. In all other respects it cosmetically mirrors the military model. In the fire position the rifle will only fire one round each time the trigger is pulled. This is identical to many other rifles in use today as well as shotguns. They are termed semi-auto because it requires the pull of the trigger for each shot. Most law enforcement pistols are also semiauto such as the Sig-Sauer, Glock, H&K, etc. Semi-auto only means that each time the trigger

is pulled it fires a bullet until the ammunition is completely depleted. Therefore, an AR15 rifle is not an assault rifle.

You can modify AR15 rifles in various ways such as adding a flashlight, a laser aiming light, scopes of varying types, but the only modification you can't legally perform is a modification that allows it to fire full-auto. That is a felony.

So, what did the Assault Weapons Ban issued under Clinton in 1994 really accomplish? Nothing. It expired in 2004 with no great fanfare. In California we still have an Assault Weapons Law codified in the Penal Code. It has achieved nothing with respect to controlling true assault rifles that are controlled by federal law. If you actually read the penal code sections they all refer to cosmetic differences except for high-capacity magazines, which will be discussed shortly. The California Penal Code section 12276.1(a) defines "Generic Characteristics Defining Assault Weapons." It exempts AR15 rifles unless they have installed any one of these listed "characteristics" such as a "pistol grip," a "thumbhole stock," a "folding or telescoping stock," a "flash suppressor," or a "forward pistol grip" to name just a few. If you compare the AR15 to an M16/M4 cosmetically they are identical in appearance. The main difference again is the M16/M4 is full-auto while the AR15 is not by federal law. There are several semi-auto rifles, .223 caliber, that do not fall under this California law such as the Ruger Mini-14. This rifle has a normal rifle stock without any of these listed features. It fires the same .223 cartridge, operates in an identical manner, but it just isn't scary looking.

If you purchase an AR15 with any of the above-described installed characteristics, then the law states you MUST have to use a tool to push the detachable magazine release button. There appears on the right side of the receiver a normal-looking release button, but it has a hole in

the center of it. That hole is where you must insert the tool to depress the interior spring releasing the magazine. If you just push on the button itself nothing happens. The idea is that if it takes a tool it requires more time to change magazines and therefore gives more time for law enforcement to arrive and prevent the shooter from inserting a new magazine.

In short, the idea is ridiculous.

This button has been referred to from the outset as the "Bullet Button" because you can use the pointed nose of the .223 cartridge by inserting it into the hole in the button and push the release.

Reviewing the "Generic Characteristics Defining Assault Weapons" in California, it is very simple to modify an AR15 from one with the described features and a "Bullet Button" to one not requiring the "Bullet Button." All you need to do is remove the pistol grip, unscrew the flash suppressor and change the folding or telescoping stock to the fixed M15 stock, etc. If you do all this, about \$125 in parts, you can removed the "Bullet Button" and install a regular springloaded magazine release button that can be pushed without using a tool. You have now converted your scary-looking AR15 into a simple rifle not covered in the law.

3. High-capacity magazines

California Penal Code section 12020 prohibits anyone person from using any firearm, rifles, pistols, and shotguns, having an ammunition capacity of more than 10 rounds. What is most interesting is that the code states, "Possession of large capacity magazines ... by private citizens is not (emphasis in the code) controlled." The code merely states that a person is prohibited from "manufacturing, importation into the state, offering for sale, keeping for sale, exposing for sale, giving, and lending of a large capacity magazine." In other words, you may possess a large capacity

magazine, but don't try to lend it or sell it to someone else. It would appear that, if you modified your AR15 to remove any scary features, and you possessed a high-capacity magazine, you could use it. (Check with an attorney first).

In conclusion, an assault rifle is one that is capable of firing full-auto. The AR15, by federal law, is not capable of firing full-auto and therefore does not meet the definition of an assault rifle. It is high time to discuss problems using the truth.



Yes – because without his faithfulness in me I would have given into the world a long time ago.


Psalms 84:5 says, "Blessed are those whose strength is in you, who have set their hearts on pilgrimage."


And for that, I am THANKFUL.
