LHS Wins Academic Super Quiz

For the first time, Liberty High School earned first place honors in the Academic Decathlon Super Quiz. They also had the highest medal count with a total of 42 medals and will receive first place Super Quiz rosette ribbons.

Seven schools competed on Feb. 5 in this 10-event competition, answering questions based on the topic "Water: A Most Essential Resource." "We are proud of all of our student decathletes for changing their plans and participating virtually this year. Their dedication and determination to succeed is inspiring," said Dr. Cecilia Massetti, Madera County Superintendent of Schools.

Glacier High School Charter earned a score of 28,824.9 to win the Academic Decathlon and will advance to the California Academic Decathlon in mid-March. This is Glacier's first win.

Liberty High School came in second place with a score of 26,253.1 and Madera South High School placed third. Chawanakee Academy Charter, Chowchilla Union High School, Madera High School and Matilda Torres High School also competed in this 10-event competition.

The Super Quiz is the only team event where students work together to answer questions as a team. It is also the only event open to the public. The Super Quiz was held through Zoom this year. Students competed from their campus and connected to Zoom while Dr. Massetti read the questions on Zoom. Family, friends and supporters were invited to watch the Super Quiz live on YouTube.

Decathlon teams are comprised of up to 25 members competing in three levels of competition: Honor, Scholastic and Varsity students. Competition levels are based on the students' grade point average.

All tests were held online, including the speech and interview competitions. Community members volunteered to judge this year's competition via Zoom. Students entered individual breakout rooms and delivered speeches and interviewed for competition.

A total of 118 medals were handed out at the awards ceremony. With the highest medal count, Liberty High was awarded 42 of those medals: seven gold, 18 silver and 17 bronze.

The top scoring senior from each

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school will receive a Pacific Gas & Electric Top Senior Scholarship for \$250. For Liberty High, that award went to Izaya Blancett. The nine decathletes who participated in the Super Quiz from Liberty High include Andrew Armstrong, Aubrey Bilskey, Izaya Blancett, Emily Boatwright, Oscar Briceno, Nicholas Cabezut, Arlene Garcia, Nolan Sewell and Omar Zarate. The team of 24 decathletes is led by coach Mike Erickson who has been coaching Liberty's team since 2013.

This year marks the 40thAnniversary of the competition. Liberty has participated since 2004.

The Madera County Academic Decathlon is funded by donations from local businesses and community members. The Madera County Schools Foundation proudly supports the event.

Madera County Auditor-Controller Resigns Term 10 Months Early

The Madera County Auditor-Controller Todd E. Miller submitted his resignation this week, effective Feb. 28, according to county documents, with 10 months remaining on his elected term in office. The short-term filling of the vacant position was discussed in the open session by the Board of Supervisors at the Feb. 1 meeting. The elected office pays approximately \$150,000 per year and will then be up for the county-wide primary election in June of 2022

Miller, a CPA, had come under scrutiny after allegedly selling his residence in Oakhurst in June, reportedly purchasing another home in Battleground, Wash. and relocating his household there.

The Board of Supervisors, County Administrative Officer Jay Varney and Miller all refused to answer any questions posed in mid-December, and again in mid-January, regarding Miller's state of residency or other allegations made by current and former employees. Residents said they were concerned if Miller was no longer a

legal resident of California if he would be unable to effectively fulfill his elected position or work in the best interests of Madera County, and the relocation could be a vi-

olation of state law. O t h e r

employees y from multiple

county departments also alleged significant payroll reporting inaccuracies over multiple years, including the overreporting of wages for Social Security and Medicare and that they were never notified of the

discrepancies, or of a possible employee data breach that may have resulted in employees' in-

curacy of the full Transient Occupancy Tax, which includes a separate Tourism Business Improvement District Tax collected on the many popular and pricey vacation rentals in mountain communities. One North Fork resident, Kris Hamilton, described Miller as hostile and unhelpful and said she wanted to know if the essential department had the appropriate checks and balances in place or had ever been forensically audited by an independent agency. Hamilton went on to ask, "Who is ensuring the many millions of our taxpayers' dollars are being appropriately used and accounted for?'

Miller, 70, was first elected in 2014 and also has an Oakhurst CPA practice. He did not give a reason for his early resignation, answer any questions or respond to employee allegations but said in an undated statement to the Board of Supervisors that he had been asked by Supervisor Tom Wheeler multiple times to run "... to help straighten out the Auditor-Controller's office" and Miller "... now felt he had fulfilled that challenge and it was time for new blood to take over." Miller went on to make the recommendation of appointing David Richstone, a CPA and an existing Certified Internal Auditor in the office, to fill his remaining term.

WWII Bombs Lurking in Ranchos? Yes ...

If you live between Road 36 and Road 38, and Avenue 15 and Highway 145, the U.S. Army would like you to know that you live on a former military bombing range. No kidding.

From 1942 to 1946, this area of the Madera Ranchos was known as Fresno Air Base Bombing Range. It served the U.S. Army Air Forces for practicing airto-ground gunnery and bombing practice. In 1944 the U.S. Navy added targets for rocket and RADAR training. According to the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, this area of the Ranchos has been, "... identified through historical research and site visits as having potential explosive hazards." Those explosive "suspects" appear to be rockets, practice rockets, practice bombs with spotting charges and small arms ammunition.

The government has created the "FUDS" program under the Department of Defense with the U.S. Army administering it. FUDS stands for Fornerly Used Defense Sites Program. At this time there are over 5,400 similar sites throughout the country in basically the same situation as the Ranchos.

A letter from the Department of the Army has been mailed out to homes in the affected area. The gist of the letter is that by and large munitions that have been here for over 80 years are more than likely buried deep underground. But it is possible that, with time, some may have become partially or completely exposed and they can pose an explosion risk.

The information provided is threefold: First it stresses the "3Rs" Safety Guide. Second it recommends calling local police if you discover something so they can dispose of it properly. Finally they offer a toll-free number and website to reach FUDS directly.

The 3Rs can be found at 3Rs.mil and FUDS' toll-free number is 1-855-765-FUDS.



Dear Editor:

At first, I thought the people who bought homes in the new Riverstone subdivision with balconies overlooking Avenue 12 were crazy, but now I see why. It's like having a circus in your back yard every day. A mini-series of vehicular stupidity, raging tempers and extreme danger, and it's all available at no extra charge.

Rarely is there a time that I pass through that area that I don't witness idiocy in motion, and usually at high speed. The area is notoriously dangerous, from the bottleneck on Highway 41 that is a constant cause of frustration and road rage, to the intersections leading into the Riverstone community. 
is simple: Whatever he promises won't cost you or me one red cent.

As if that wasn't annoying enough, he then proceeded to spend the remainder of the hour-long module raising his hand and saying "scenario"


every few minutes, followed by the most ridiculous examples of what is least likely to happen in a client's home as a caregiver.



How to Win Points with your Future Son or Daughter-in-law

If you have a teen who's keeping a tidy room, you have a rare find. Yes, there are some who are born with the clean gene, but even my own neatnik son had a messy room in high school. Kids have a lot on their plates these days and making time to find their bedroom floor isn't high on the list.

If you're tempted to close the door and post skull and crossbones, there are other options to consider with benefits for you, your teen and his or her future spouse. The current benefit to your teen may not be as obvious as the benefit to you, but consider the stress your student faces when he has to dig through piles to find

his homework or sport's uniform.

A messy room can also contribute to anxiety and a feeling of not being in control of his environment. It can cause an inability to concentrate on homework and other tasks. It's important to give teens the freedom of expression in their own space while equipping them with the tools they need to maintain a peaceful and productive environment.

Decide what's necessary. Before approaching your teen, consider realistic expectations. Model home status isn't the goal, but picking up laundry

off the floor and bringing dirty glasses and dishes to the kitchen might be. You may want to add some incentive — if the basket of dirty clothes is in the laundry room by Saturday morning, you'll wash them. If not, she's on her own. Or a negative consequence — if

there are still dirty dishes in the bedroom on Saturday, no leaving for social events until the task is done.

Be clear on the standard you expect. Make sure it's not higher than what you're modeling in your own space or more than what you're willing to regulate. For example, the

or if needed, the help of a Professional Organizer. Ensure that if your teen chooses a friend, it's someone with an affinity for tidiness. Even if you're not the one helping, be sure to check in on the progress and provide break times.

Supplies: Trash and recycle bags, laundry basket for dirty laundry, hangers for clean laundry, box for dishes, food, etc. to be relocated, and a box/bag for items to be donated. Label sticky notes and tape them to each container.

Steps: 1. Turn on the lights and open the blinds and window, if needed

2. Make the bed

3. Bag all the trash/recycle 4. Hang/fold clean clothes and put dirty laundry into basket

5. Sort contents from floor and other surfaces into categories - relocate, donate, electronics, school supplies, accessories, keepsakes, sports, etc. (Use the made bed to sort on; first cover with a sheet if necessary.)

6. Put collected categories of items where they belong. If there isn't a home for them create one. (See below.)

7. Vacuum, dust and clean

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Cheese It!

(February 2012)

Editor's Note: With the passing of Aunt Jean, I have decided to bring you a "Best Of" of her recipes over the past 10 years. Good recipes are timeless and I hope you enjoy them all over again.

I've been trying to think of a food that can be used from an appetizer (you thought I couldn't spell hors d'oeuvre, didn't you? The word is French meaning, "Outside the Meal") to a dessert.

I concentrated on appetizers and desserts that use the same kind of foods and then it dawned on me -– cheese!

there?

I never dreamed there were so many of kinds cheese, nor so many countries that make cheese. If you want to get educated about cheese, go on the website

Cheese.com. It lists more than 50 countries that make cheese and you can click on the individual countries to find out how many different varieties of cheese that country makes. The United States makes more than 35 different varieties. A few of the cheeses that I had never heard of were Cougar Gold, made of cow's milk by Washington State University, that is packed in a can; Humboldt Fog Cheese, made from goat milk in Arcata, Calif., and Idaho Goatster, which is a hard cheese made from goat milk. And so many different kinds of milk used: buffalo, camel, ewe, reindeer and mare (in Turkey). Oh, and believe it or not, a chef in New York is making cheese from human female milk – I kid you not!

There is an alphabetical list of kinds of different cheeses. I didn't count them but the list includes about 150 to 200 names from Abbaye de Belloc to Zanette Parmigiano Reggiano and all kinds toss cheese with flour. Gradually

I love cheese. What is a hamburger, or a bologna, or ham or even a tuna sandwich, without cheese? Or a toasted cinnamon raisin bagel without cream cheese? Or cottage cheese, how can you go wrong there? Or on a cold night, how about a grilled cheese sandwich and a cup of tomato soup? Or a burrito or taco without cheese? So you see, there are so many good reasons to use cheese.

A real simple appetizer is to cube two or three kinds of cheese

> and serve them with some sliced meats like salami, ham and/or turkey with two or three kinds of crackers.

Or how about a cheese fondue? A fondue is a fun and informal way to gather friends and family together. A fondue can be used for an appetizer or

a main course, depending on the cheese, or what you serve with it. Think about putting a platter of cooked, shelled, deveined shrimp or ham chunks, or raw vegetables or even apple slices in addition to the chunks of French bread.

Cheese Fondue

2 C Half and Half

1 T Worcestershire Sauce

2 tsp. Dry Mustard 1 Garlic Clove, Peeled and

Halved 1 ¹/₂ lbs. Shredded Cheddar

Cheese (About 6 C)

- 3 T Flour
- Salt

About 30 minutes before serving, in a fondue pot or saucepan (recipe recommends not using an aluminum pan as mixture may turn dark) over low heat, heat milk, Worcestershire sauce, mustard and garlic, stirring until hot but not boiling. Discard garlic.

Meanwhile, in medium bowl,

stir cheese into hot mixture with a fork or wire whisk. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until cheese is melted and mixture is smooth and bubbling. Add salt if needed. Keep hot over very low heat in fondue pot.

I went through my Mom's recipe cards hoping to find her recipe for macaroni and cheese but like so much of what she cooked, she didn't write it down. But I remember it being gooey and crunchy on top. I found this recipe on the internet and it sounds a lot like hers.


Classic Baked Macaroni and Cheese

- 1-8 oz. Package Macaroni
- 4 T Flour
- 4 T Butter
- 1 C Milk
- 1 C Cream
- ¹/₂ tsp. Salt

Black Pepper to Taste 2 C Shredded Cheddar Cheese 1 C Buttered Bread Crumbs Preheat Oven to 400

Cook and drain macaroni according to package directions and set aside. In a large sauce pan, melt butter. Add flour mixed with the salt and pepper, using a wire whisk to stir until blended. Pour milk and cream in gradually, stirring constantly. Bring to boiling point and boil 2 minutes (stirring constantly to avoid burning). Reduce heat and cook (stirring constantly) 10 minutes. Add shredded cheese a little at a time and simmer an additional 5 minutes until cheese melts. Turn off fire. Add macaroni to the saucepan and toss to coat with the cheese sauce. Pour mixture

into buttered baking dish. Sprinkle with bread crumbs Bake for about 20 minutes or until top is golden together all the crepe ingredients brown and casserole is bubbly.

Do you use the "blue box" for mac & cheese instead of making it from scratch? Try making it from scratch for your family and see how much better they will like it. I'll admit I used to keep the blue boxes. When I took care of the girls and had to fix their dinner because mom and dad were working late, I would open a blue box for them - they loved it. I remember one time I was cooking it and my niece Carolyn (she was about six or seven years old) was watching me. When I was finishing and added a little pepper to it, she said she really liked my mac & cheese and I asked her why? She said, "Because you put pepper in it." Wow! By the way, if you are reading this on the 28th of February that little girl turned 17 years old. Where does the time go? (Editor's note: This year she turns 27.)

Have you ever thought of or had a cheese blintz? I always thought they were a crepe filled with whipped cream - sort of like a cream puff. In doing some research, I found out they can be made with mashed potatoes and served as a main course.

Cheese Blintz Crepes: 1 ¹/₂ C Flour 2 C Milk 3 T Butter, Melted 2 T Granulated Sugar 2 Eggs ¹/₂ tsp. Vanilla 1/2 tsp. Baking Powder ¹/₂ tsp. Salt Additional Butter (for pan) Filling: 1 C Cottage Cheese

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Softened Cream Cheese ¹/₄ C Powdered Sugar ¹/₄ tsp. Vanilla

Using an electric mixer, blend (except the butter for the pan) in a large bowl. Blend just until smooth. The batter will be very thin.

Combine the filling ingredient in a medium bowl and mix by hand. Set aside.

Preheat a 10 inch crepe pan (or frying pan) over medium heat. When the pan is hot, add about $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. butter. When the butter has melted, pour 1/3 C batter into pan. Swirl the batter so that it entirely covers the bottom of the pan. Cook for 1 ¹/₂ to 2 minutes or until golden brown on bottom. Slip a spatula under the crepe and using your fingers, flip the crepe over, and cook for another 1 1/2 minutes until not quite as brown as the other side. Repeat this until all batter is used. Stack the crepes on top of each other to keep them warm.

Heat the cheese filling in the microwave for a minute or two or until hot. Place each crepe on a plate. Pour 2 or 3 T of cheese filling across the center of the crepe. Fold the sides in and turn the entire blintz over (seam side down) onto a serving plate. Serve with a dollop of sour cream and a spoon of strawberry preserves. Sprinkle with powdered sugar.

I warned him, however, that using that excuse even once would trigger a full investigation including verifying the client's medical records. He seemed a tad disappointed. I can already tell he's going to be really easy to catch, so there's the silver lining.

has spent the last few nights on a drinking binge with her friends and tells you that she's too hung over for you to work for her today, can you clock in anyway? There's a lot of things to unpack from that question, especially given that his client is his own mother. 

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

For inspiration, Ronald Reagan's 1984 D-Day speech on YouTube is awe inspiring and a great mini education for young people who don't know any details of World War II.

For kids and teens, the Tuttle Twins books at TuttleTwins.com are outstanding at teaching the values of a free society and free enterprise. The books are so excellently written and cleverly illustrated that this old grandma enjoys them without reservation, especially the one in which the twins and their own grandma start a business. The authors state that it is "critical that we empower children to understand time-tested principles so that they can recognize and reject the brainwashing they will be bombarded with in the world." Their books and curriculum materials support family values and teach students the benefits of a free society, and the book sets make excellent gifts that will last a lifetime.

For quick information and insight, you might watch any of the five-minute videos on PragerU.com. They are interesting, intelligent, thought provoking and lightning fast. They deliver on their promise to offer pro-America content with messages of truth, reason and hope.

For some rare, factual COVID information, you might watch an interview of Dr. Scott Atlas by searching "Allie Stuckey Scott Atlas interview".

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
