n a special City Council meeting in Madera on the evening of Valentine's Day, the Madera City Council made history by becoming the first Central Valley town to call for a ceasefire in the violence occurring in Gaza between

Israel and the Palestinians.

The vote passed unanimously by the seven council members in attendance – Anita Evans, Cece Gallegos, Jose Rodriguez, Steve Montes, Elsa Mejia, Artemio Villegas and Mayor Santos Garcia - and very quickly, as if the outcome was a pre-determined conclusion. The special meeting had been called specifically to discuss the vote.

The vote was for a resolution that read, in part, to call on members of Congress to "... demand an immediate, permanent ceasefire; release of all hostages due to this conflict ... and the unrestricted entry of humanitarian assistance into Gaza." The plan is to send the unanimous resolution to other city councils in the San Joaquin Valley and then on to state and federal legislators and ultimately President Biden himself.

Although hostilities between Israel and Palestinians seem to go back to biblical times, the current violence started in October of last year. On Oct. 7, the Palestinian group Hamas staged an attack on Israeli civilians and soldiers at a music festival that killed over 1,000 people and took huge numbers of hostages. Stories began to circulate that death and being taken prisoner were only part of what Hamas was doing on this day of horror, and that rape and beheadings were also part of the mix; even to infants. Israel wasted no time reacting to the attack and to date, the United Nations estimates that since Oct. 8, Israel has killed approximately 28,000 Palestinians, an amount equal to about half the population of Madera.

By Jan. 31, Reuters News Organization reported that just under 50 American cities had passed ceasefire resolutions for Gaza while another 20 had passed resolutions condemning Hamas' attack that started it all.

MCH Salvation Gets Convoluted

Just when it looks like there might be a light at the end of the tunnel to reopen Madera's vacant Community Hospital, complications seem to arise and throw a monkey wrench in the plans.

On Thursday, Feb. 8 representatives from both Adventist Health and UCSF presented a plan that together would allow them to reopen MCH. UCSF officials said they were going to enter the bidding process with Adventist Health to buy the property, getting involved in the existing bankruptcy proceedings with the hospital and then submit a bid, along with Madera County, to the bankruptcy court.

But here comes the monkey wrench: Another company is already in the process of doing the same thing.

American Advanced Management said in a statement that they were mere days away from receiving court approval to purchase the hospital. "In the seven weeks since our proposal was selected by the debtor, AAM has made substantial progress with the support of many government agencies, including the Attorney General's office," the statement said.

After closing its doors in December of 2022, the hospital sat shuttered until July of 2023 when Adventist Health entered into an agreement to manage the hospital. But by November, the deal fell apart when Adventist Health figured their resources were inadequate. With the addition of UCSF, that changed.

American Advanced Management said they are still committed to reopening the hospital and that it would welcome UCSF's support as well.

California's Presidential Primary Election Day is just around the corner: March 5. In the "good ol' days," every legally registered voter could go to his or her designated polling place, which was manned by both Democrats and Republicans, receive a blank ballot, mark it in a private booth, and drop it in the secure receptacle. At the end of the day, all votes were counted and the results announced, usually soon thereafter. Easy-peasy. Absentee ballots were available for those who could not physically get to their polling location, so no voter was left out.

Hello, election *month!* There is no longer an election "day." There is an election "eternity."

For this election, ballots were mailed to eligible registered voters 29 days prior

to election day. Can *anyone* who gets his or her hands on a ballot during that time, mark it – with or without the registered voter's approval – forge the voter's signature which is the only identification required, and return the ballot to be counted? Marked ballots can be mailed in by *anyone*. They can be deposited in drop boxes by *anyone*. They can be returned to a vote center by *anyone*.

Signature verification, either electronically or by a real human being, is far



fully supported by Republican Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger. Remember: Putting an "R" after your name in politics makes you no more a Republican than putting



And if the campus alone wasn't enough to make me never want to leave, the people on the whole were quite



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A Pox on Pots and Pans

(February 2014)

Editor's Note: With the passing of Aunt Jean, I have decided to bring you a "Best Of" of her recipes over the past 10 years. Good recipes are timeless and I hope you enjoy them all over again.

This article was written before Superbowl XLVIII in 2014 between the Seahawks and Broncos.

Do you hate scrubbing dirty, baked on gook in pots and pans as much as I do? You can't (or shouldn't) put them in the dishwasher so there is no other alternative but to wash and dry them by hand. I hate it so badly I've often said I wish I had a larger freezer so I could buy frozen dinners to avoid the pots and pans. I guess I began that attitude early in my life. the late 19th century into the 20th century. Tin foil was replaced by aluminum foil in 1910 in Switzerland. The first use of aluminum foil in the United States was in 1913 for wrapping Life Savers, gum and candy bars.

Foil is used in cooking other than tenting the roasting turkey during the holidays. Ever thought of folding a sheet of foil to fit the brownie baking pan? Fold a length of foil to fit the bottom of the baking pan with a few inches left over on each side. Do this both ways, and pour in the batter and bake. When the brownies are done and cooled a bit, pull up on the "cuffs" and the brownies come out and you have a pan with no baked-on crust. Or when you take something out of the oven

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



from foolproof. But, it is all that is required to verify a legally executed ballot, according to the Secretary of State's website, which states: "In the event ... the technology rejects the signature, the elections official shall ... manually compare the signature.

"The comparison of a signature shall begin with the basic presumption that the signature on the petition or ballot envelope is the voter's signature.

"Exact matches are not required for an elections official to confirm a valid signature.

And the most absurd test for comparison is: "Similar characteristics between a signature being compared and any signature in the voter's registration record are sufficient to determine a signature is valid.'

Digest that. All a forger needs to do is make the signature look "similar," and the ballot must be accepted. And the rightful voter's vote is stolen.

Good news! You can track your ballot online. You can sign up at WheresMyBallot.sos.ca.gov to see if your ballot is listed as received. This is an excellent service for those of us who question the convoluted voting process and breathe a sigh of relief upon hearing that our vote has been counted.

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Growing black pepper


This plant is native to South India and is widely cultivated in tropical
