


onadelle Ranchos Residents in a home in the 15000 block of Monreal Road were startled awake by the sound of breaking glass about 3:15 Friday morning on Jan. 5 as an unknown male intruder kicked in the glass of their back door and entered their home, shouting, "Let me in or they are going to kill me!" according to Sheriff's Office reports.

Commander Bill Ward of the Madera County Sheriff's Department said the incident was isolated and unusual, and remains under investigation as a home invasion, a potential burglary and as a homicide.

"The female resident called 911 and stayed on the line as the male resident, 52, physically struggled to subdue and contain the intruder," Ward said. "At some point in the struggle, the suspect became unconscious. When deputies arrived, they attempted CPR and other lifesaving measures but the suspect was deceased. The cause of death is unknown at this point, and toxicology and autopsy reports are pending. No weapons were used by either party in the incident or the struggle," Ward said.

The motive for the break-in was unusual and unknown, Ward said, and men-

tal health issues and/or illegal drug use by the suspect were also under investigation. No charges have been filed against the resident of the home in the normally quiet residential area of Monreal Road near Avenue 15, east of Road

Authorities identified the deceased intruder as 37-year-old Daniel Alexander Avila. Investigators believe Avila may have been living somewhere in the Ranchos area, may have been on foot that evening and may have randomly selected the home to enter. He reportedly had no known connection to the residents on Monreal Road, Local arrest records indicate Avila had two prior arrests for DUI in 2022 but no other significant criminal history. He was 5'11", 230 pounds with brown hair and brown eyes.

Cal Bill Would Make All New Cars Limit Speed to 10 MPH Over Limit

California State Senator Scott Wiener says the bill requiring 'speed governors' would cut down on road deaths

A California Democratic lawmaker has introduced a bill he calls "groundbreaking" that would require all new cars sold in the Golden State to be equipped with a device preventing them from traveling more than 10 miles per hour over the speed limit.

State Sen. Scott Wiener, a Democrat from San Francisco, introduced the Speeding and Fatality Emergency Reduction on California Streets Package

this week that includes a provision that would require "new vehicles sold in California" to "install speed governors, smart devices that automatically limit the vehicle's speed to 10 miles above the legal limit."

"These changes are a head-on attempt to tackle vehicle fatalities, which are surging across the U.S. — and especially in California — amid a rise in reckless driving since the onset of the pandemic," a press release from Wiener's office explained. "A recent report from TRIP, a national transportation research group, found that traffic fatalities in California have increased by 22 percent from 2019 to 2022, compared to 19 percent for the U.S. overall. In 2022, 4,400 Californians died in car crashes."

The bill package also "requires side

underride guards on trucks, to reduce the risk of cars and bikes being pulled underneath the truck during a crash" and "physical improvements like new crosswalks and curb extensions on stateowned surface streets to better accommodate pedestrians, cyclists, the disability community and transit users."

The press release argues that these changes are meant to "slash" the "California road deaths epidemic."

"The alarming surge in road deaths is unbearable and demands an urgent response," Wiener said. "There is no reason for anyone to be going over 100 miles per hour on a public road, yet in 2020, California Highway Patrol issued over 3,000 tickets for just that offense. Preventing reckless speeding is a commonsense approach to prevent these utterly needless and heartbreaking crashes."

Not everyone is on board with the legislation, including social media users who expressed frustration with the plan.

"Imagine an empty highway in the middle of the night and you can only go 65," author Richard Hanania posted on

"Just when you thought California couldn't possibly get any crazier," former San Diego County Board of Supervisors candidate Amy Reichert posted on X.

A spokesperson for the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration told Fox News Digital the agency "does not comment on pending legislation."

Martin Luther King's Widow Fought Pro-Illegal Immigration

Coretta Scott King, the wife of Martin Luther King, Jr., once helped successfully quash legislation from Republicans and Democrats in the early 1990s that would have eliminated fines for United States employers hiring illegal aliens over Americans.

In 1991, former Sen. Orrin Hatch (R-UT) led an effort in Congress to pass legislation that would have thrown out the ability of the federal government to fine American employers for hiring illegal aliens — the leading magnet for illegal immigration to the nation for decades.

Former Sens. John McCain (R-AZ), Ted Kennedy (D-MA), Arlen Specter (R-PA), and Jeff Bingaman (D-NM) were co-sponsors of Hatch's legislation, while in the House Rep. Nancy Pelosi (D-CA) and then-Reps. Barbara Boxer (D-CA) and John Lewis (D-GA) were among the co-sponsors of an identical bill from former Rep. Edward Roybal (D-CA).

When Scott King got wind of Hatch's legislation, she authored a letter with other Civil Rights leaders detailing how illegal immigration diminishes wages, living standards, quality of life and employment opportunities for America's working class and, specifically, black Americans who are most likely to compete against illegal aliens for jobs.

"We are concerned, Senator Hatch, that your proposed ... elimination of employer sanctions will cause another problem — the revival of pre-1986 discrimination against black and brown U.S. and documented workers, in favor of cheap labor — the undocumented workers," Scott King wrote in

1991. "This would undoubtedly exacerbate an already severe economic crisis in communities where there are large numbers of new immigrants.

"Finally, we are concerned that some who support the repeal of employer sanctions are using "discrimination" as a guise for their desire to abuse undocumented workers and to introduce cheap labor into the U.S. workforce. America does not have a labor shortage. With roughly seven million people unemployed, and double that number discouraged from seeking work, the removal of employer sanctions threatens to add U.S. workers to the rolls of the unemployed.

"Additionally, it would add to the competition for scarce jobs and drive down wages. Moreover, the repeal of employer sanctions will inevitably add to our social problems and place an unfair burden on the poor in the cities in which most new immigrants cluster — cities which are already suffering housing shortages and insufficient human needs services."

According to Scott King, fining U.S. employers for hiring illegal aliens over Americans is a "necessary means of stopping the exploitation of vulnerable workers and the undercutting of American jobs and living standards."

Those who signed the letter with Scott King included William Lucy of the Coalition of Black Trade Unionists, Norman Hill with the A. Phillip Randolph Institute and Dr. Ramona Edelin of the National Urban Coalition, among others.

Thanks in part to Scott King's opposition, Hatch's bill failed in the House and Senate.

Many of us in the "older but perhaps wiser" generation wonder whether today's students are learning about and appreciating America's history and its founders' insistence on individual liberty. With that in mind, quoted below is our nation's Bill of Rights, one of America's three founding documents, to be shared with youngsters as well as any older folks who could use a refresher course.

According to the Bill of Rights Institute website, "The Constitution lacked limits on government power. Federalists advocated for a strong national government. They believed the people and states automatically kept any powers not given to the federal government. Anti-Federalists wanted power to remain with state and local governments and favored a bill of rights to safeguard individual liberty.

"The first 10 amendments to the Constitution make up the Bill of Rights. James Madison wrote the amendments as a solution to limit government power and protect individual liberties through the Constitution. For example, the Founders saw the ability to speak and worship freely as a natural right protected by the First Amendment. Congress is prohibited from making laws establishing religion or abridging freedom of speech. The Fourth Amendment safeguards citizens' right to be free from unreasonable government intrusion in their homes through the requirement of a warrant."

The Bill of Rights

First Amendment: Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment

of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the government for a redress of grievances.

Second Amendment: A well-regulated militia, being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms, shall not be infringed.

Third Amendment: No soldier shall, in time of peace be quartered in any house, without the consent of the owner, nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

Fourth Amendment: The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

Fifth Amendment: No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a grand jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the militia, when in actual






The ruling class has given us \$35 trillion in national debt; an under funded,



The Audacity of Audaciousness



aged to get them to shut up, sit down, and start watching the video with a promise that I would double-check our records, which I did. It was no



SEMCU is a non-profit organization, and donations can be an asset to the donor. A SEMCU dona-



service in time of war or public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offense to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use, without just compensation.

Sixth Amendment: In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the state and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his

favor, and to have the assistance of counsel for his defense.

Seventh Amendment: In suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed 20 dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by a jury, shall be otherwise re-examined in any court of the United States, than according to the rules of the common law.

Eighth Amendment: Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted.

Ninth Amendment: The enumeration in the Constitution, of certain rights, shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

Tenth Amendment: The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the states, are reserved to the states respectively, or to the people.
