On the morning of July 4, a caravan of bikers and veterans joined volunteers, friends and family on the northeast corner of Avenue 12 and Freeway 41 to watch a heartwarming flag raising ceremony. Veterans who were instrumental in organizing, working on and overseeing the restoration of the "Old Glory" flag barn felt the installation of a flag pole and the flying of an American flag was an appropriate finishing touch to the corner on which the flag barn sits. They chose the 4th of July to raise the flag for the first time. It was a very simple but extremely heartfelt ceremony.

"Ready! Salute! I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America ..."

Within moments the flag was fluttering in the wind. Horns honked and people waved from every direction in appreciation of the new addition to the property and to show their appreciation and thanks as travelers made their way up the hill to enjoy the holiday.

Just a few months ago the flag barn was a mess after being hit by high winds last winter. After being touched by a story he read here in the Ranchos Independent, resident and Vietnam Veteran Tom Baum took it upon himself to contact the McCaffreys, the owners of the property and the barn, to see how he could help. After a few meetings to work out the details Baum was given permission to begin restoring the barn. With each day that passed more people arrived to help. Countless veterans and

volunteers generously gave their time and talents. Baum was joined by McCaffrey Homes, their trade contractors and vendors who all generously helped. While many companies donated supplies and materials, two notable donations came from Borga Steel Buildings and Components and Home Depot. Individuals even stopped to offer cash donations which were designated to go to the Wounded Warrior Fund.

"It was our hope to have the flag barn restored by the Fourth of July and we are so pleased to see the job completed," said Robert McCaffrey. "We extend our appreciation to the community members and the veteran volunteers who helped with the ef-

Local Craigslist Job Scam Found

Sheriff John Anderson is warning job seekers to beware of a scam that has surfaced on Craigslist.

An Oakhurst woman, looking for employment as an in-home caregiver, found herself dialoguing with a man who almost duped her out of nearly \$3,000 in

After answering the ad, and advised that she had been hired, she received a check in the mail in the amount of \$2,650. She was to deposit the check, keep \$600 as her first salary and send the rest back to a "realtor" in Florida who would then send her the key to the home she would be visiting. When she attempted to deposit the check in her local bank, the teller of that bank warned her that it appeared to be a scam.

In response the potential victim notified the Sheriff's Office.

Meth Trafficker gets Conviction

Manual Miranda is looking at

On Thursday, July 5 a Superior Court On Nov. 3, 2011, they commenced surveiljury convicted 32-year-old Firebaugh resident, Manuel Miranda, of two felony counts

for trafficking methamphetamine in Madera, according to Michael R. Keitz, District Attorney for Madera County. Miranda was charged with conspiring to methamphetamine possession of it for sale, transportation of more than one kilogram, and an additional misdemeanor count for possession of a vehicle with a false compartment.

During the trial, Deputy District Attorney 11 years in prison for trafficking Mary Thornton introduced meth in Madera County evidence that the Madera

County Narcotics Enforcement Team and the California Department of Justice, Bureau of Investigation received a tip that Miranda was involved in narcotics trafficking.

lance of Miranda in Firebaugh and followed him to Bakersfield. When he was there, he

picked up a car with a false compartment and 7 ½ pounds of methamphetamine and drove it to Madera. The officers then obtained search warrants recovered and methamphetamine, \$7,500 in cash and a scale used to weigh large quantities of drugs.

Following the jury verdict, sentencing for Miranda was set for August 2, 2012 in Madera Superior Court Department 1. Because he has previously suffered a robbery conviction under

California's Three Strikes Law, and because of the large quantity of methamphetamine in his possession, he could receive more than 11 years in state prison.

Kieran Devere, a teenager from the Madera Ranchos, was very busy this spring training and racing her bike, mainly competing in triathlons. But she decided to branch out and started racing her bike more, primarily to help develop and enhance her cycling skills for the bike portion of many of the triathlons she competes in annually. Her bike racing led her to Santa Rosa in northern California on May 28 where she competed in the United States Cycling Federation's California State Junior Criterium Championships. The Junior State Criterium Championships were an ancillary lead up event for the Amgen Tour of California.

The Criterium is a bike race that pits riders against each other on a closed circuit course which usually is under a mile in length and cyclists are required to do a designated num-

Stolen Credit Card Linked to Central California Identity Theft Ring

The Madera County Sheriff's office believes a stolen credit card used to rent a room in Oakhurst may be connected to an identity theft ring operating in Central California.

The Sheriff's Office believes there may be as many as half a dozen suspects connected to this case, one of whom is believed to be 31-year-old Corey James Smith, AKA Corey James Sahagian-Smith, of Fresno. He has brown hair, blue eyes, weighs about 180

pounds and stands 6 feet tall.

Early on the morning of July 9, a hotel clerk in Oakhurst rented a room to a man and a woman. The woman was described as being in her mid-30's, dark skinned (possibly Hispanic), medium build, standing roughly 5 feet 7 inches tall with short dark hair and tattoos on her arms. The man was described as being in his mid-30's, white, standing about 6 feet tall and weighing between 180 and 200 pounds. He had light

colored, wavy shoulder-length hair and was unshaven.

Starting at around 6:30 a.m., witnesses in the area started to see people entering and leaving the hotel room. Two males were seen delivering property to the room. The same two males were also seen driving in an older black truck with California license plate 7Z99808. The driver of that truck was

First, Do No Harm: Good Advice

Oh, the wisdom of Hippocrates.

How was it that he understood ethics in a way that today's liberal politicians, media and academics are unable to comprehend?

Are You Better Off?

Larry Sabato is the director of the University of Virginia's Center for Politics and is one of the nation's most respected and accurate election predictors. He has a website called Sabato's Crystal Ball where this week he published an analysis of the upcoming election by Alan Abramowitz, an Emory University professor and Crystal Ball senior columnist. Abramowitz uses something he's created called the "Time for Change" forecasting model which concludes, according to Sabato, "... the changes to more evidence that at this point the presidential election's outcome is very much in doubt." Ultimately, Abramowitz says victory will depend on which party does a better job of mobilizing its supporters and appealing to a small group of swing voters in a handful of battleground

The "Time for Change" model is based on three key areas: 1. President Obama's final June Gallup Poll approval rate; 2. The change in real second quarter GDP in this election year and; 3. The advantage given to an incumbent president. This model has successfully predicted the winner of the popular vote in the last five presidential elections.

There's something new that Abramowitz has had to factor in this time around, and he's calling it the "po-

larization effect," which is an unwillingness to cross party lines to vote for a candidate from the opposing party. This cuts Obama's "incumbency advantage" in half and ...

Wait a minute.


Are you kidding me?

Is it easier for you to go and buy things in the stores than it was four years ago? Is there more or less unemployment in the country than there was four years ago? Is America as respected throughout the world as it was? Do you feel that our security is as safe, that we're as strong as we were four years ago? And if you answer all of those questions 'yes,' why then, I think your choice is very obvious as to whom you will vote for. If you don't agree, if you don't think that this course that we've been on for the last four years is what you would like to see us follow for the next four, then I could suggest another choice that you have." A reflective voting populace stopped, thought about it and basically said, "Hell no!" and Reagan won by a landslide.

George Santayana said, "Those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it." Just How Independent are You?





housing and feeding her rather than the citizens of the state, just couldn't understand how I had the audacity to dispute her claim of independence. To which I responded, "Do you get the money to pay your rent from a job?"

No

"Do you get the money for the food you put in your kitchen from a job?"

No.

"Do you get the money to pay the babysitter from a job?"

No.

Incidentally, she wouldn't need the babysitter if she took advantage of the daycare program offered through the community college she attends, with the tuition paid by the state. Instead, the state gets to pay twice because she prefers to send her son to the babysitter around the corner so she doesn't have to wake up too early in the morning. Add that all up and there is not a shred of independence to be found. This, of course, fell on deaf ears.

Again, this is not a comment on her level of need or whether or not I feel she deserves assistance; this is about being self-aware. If you need help, that is what the programs are there for, and as long as you are not perpetrating a fraud or taking advantage of the system, then I take no issue with it. But, at least have the common sense to recognize your current state of affairs. If you are accepting help, then you are by definition, not independent. Period.

The point I am trying to make is that if you want to be independent, as well as be perceived as independent, then you cannot be actively relying on someone else, even the state, to survive. Conversely, if, due to circumstances beyond your control, you need to rely on the state for a short time in order to live, then you have to let go of the idea that you are independent, at least for the time being. Simple as that. But stop wandering around claiming that you have your act together, making reference to others living off their parents as mooches when you yourself are surviving off the backs of the tax payers. Own up to it. Once you do, maybe that healthy realization can help motivate you to get off the assistance and become truly independent, in the traditional sense of the word.

trial it was what I thought to be a burden. "OH NO! JURY DUTY!" who hasn't said that? Well, after they called roll at lunch, if your name was called you were to report to courtroom 70. Yes, my name was called and I reported to the courtroom as they asked. There were about 60 of us remaining so the chances of being selected were still pretty slim. So I'm feeling pretty good; I might just still get out of this. Then they call roll again, but this time there was catch: as your name was called you were to come forward and fill the seats in the jury box. There are 19 and they call roll randomly so my last name starting with a "B" really does not come into play. After they called the unlucky 19 in which I was not one of them, the judge started to ask questions of us all. Then slowly they went through everyone one at a time to see if there were conflicts or concern. The judge said to be honest in your answers. The one question that stuck out to me was, "Would serving on a jury from five to seven days be a financial burden"? I.E. not pay rent, PG&E ... As I am considering, pondering – call it what you want, I call it trying to figure a way out of this – this feeling comes over me and a little voice says, "I got this. Remember I am in control."

To say that it would be a financial burden is a little too steep. Hurt? Yes, but I would still be able to pay my rent. My reply to my feeling, the voice I heard or whatever you want to call it was, "Your will, not mine

be done." So, when they finally got to me I just let them pass. Stayed seated, sat on my hands and kept my mouth shut. Make a long story short, I made the short list and was picked as a juror. My first thought was, "Really, man ... I'm gonna' be broke." On the third day of the trial I received a phone call from the house manager of House on the Rock, the sober living home where I lived for almost a year. Cedric, whom I love very much and care for deeply, a man that I aspire to be, tells me that I have a check at the house. From where I do not know and from whom I don't know that either, but hev it's a check. I pick up the check and it is roughly the amount I make in a week's pay period. It is from an old past due account when they had garnished my wages. As I am staring at

> the check all I hear is, "I got this. I am in control." I look up and glorify His name with thanksgiving and praise. That, my friends was only the first blessing and answered prayer that week.

The next day the jury was let go to deliberate. It was after 4 p.m. and they want us out at 4:30. There was no time for us to deliberate that day. When I got home, the burden was heavy to say the least. I had a man's future in the palms of my hands and so did 11 others. As I prayed, I asked for clarity of what I was feeling and for God to make it really, really clear that what I was feeling was correct. In the morning I prayed the same prayer. I left it at the cross, I gave the burden to Him. Once at the courthouse all of us were going over a few things. A few of the other jurors and I thought that an anonymous vote should be taken just to see where we all were. Once the votes were tallied it was a unanimous vote, everyone had voted as I had. It was really, really clear that what I was feeling was correct. Another answered

This is good news because it means kids are reading over the summer instead of having their brains turn to mush due to inactivity. So if your kid looks as if his or her brain is turning into mush, tell that kid to get to the library and sign up for the reading program pronto!

On July 18, we had a scheduled visit from magician Chris Lopez and then we wrap things up with songs and fun with the theme "Starry Night" from Rick and Linda Cole on July 26. Plus, all those completed reading logs get thrown into a big jar and a winner for our grand prize will be selected. What is the grand prize? I'll never tell (okay I will tell, but not until the suspense is almost unbearable). So kids, keep reading. And keep your feet on the ground, but keep reaching for the stars.

Need another great reason to visit a library? Sure, you can check out books and book on CDs from our library. They are very popular. But do you know that you can checkout music CDs from our libraries? So why would you go to a music store? You have an awesome collection of music right at your library. As you may well know from previous articles, I'm a big music fan. I borrow CDs all of the time because the San Joaquin Valley Library System (SJVLS) has an absolutely astounding collection of CDs. So here, in no particular order, are my five favorite "finds" from the SJVLS CD collection (sorted by different musical genres):

R&B/Soul: Otis Redding - He was only 26 when he died in a plane crash in 1967, but Otis Redding's legacy is undeniable. His songs range



from tender ballads (I've Been Loving You Too Long or I've Got Dreams to Remember) to dance floor r a v e - u p s (Shake, his e x c ellent recording of

Respect, later a huge hit for Aretha Franklin) and sometimes he just hits a sweet spot somewhere in between (his classic [Sitting on the] Dock of the Bay,). The Madera Ranchos library has two of his collections in our CD area; I suggest you check them out.

Classic Rock: Big Star - This Memphis "power pop" band from the early '70s never had a huge hit (September Gurls [sic] is probably the closest), but are big influences on every band that ever heard them (one of my favorite bands, The

Replacements, even wrote a song called Alex Chilton after Big Star's lead singer). Their two greatest albums, #1 Record and



Radio City are pack-

aged together on the Rykodisc label and are available to order through our library. But beware of their third album, *Third/Sister Lovers*. It's a major drop-off.

Country: Justin Townes Earle - He's the son of country star Steve Earle and he was named after Texas troubadour Townes Van Zandt, but the only thing he inherited from those two is his penchant for getting into trouble. Still he's got miles of style, hopping from Hank Williams-like honkytonk to plaintive ballads and choice covers (his version of John Prine's Far From Me is a knockout). My favorite Earle albums are Midnight at the Movies and Harlem River Blues.

Rap/Hip Hop: Big Boi - He's the harder working half of OutKast (come on Andre 3000, put out a solo album already, you lazy goat). Big Boi (real name Antwan Andre Patton) is still

"cooler than a polar bear's toenails" (his words, not mine). I read somewhere that when he submitted his album Sir Lucious Left Foot: The



Son of Chico Dusty to his label the

label reps didn't know what to do with it because they didn't hear a single. It sort of shows you how tone-deaf label reps can be. The album doesn't have a dud on it. Check out *Hustle Blood* or *General Patton* for proof.

Alternative Rock: Cloud Nothings - This Akron, Ohio band is one of my favorite finds. The library system has their eponymous debut album and it's filled with poppy sing-alongs with choruses that will burrow into your brain. But it's their second album Attack on Memory that is the real gem. They slowed down the pace a bit, stretched out song lengths and let loose an intense, angstridden caterwaul of sound that is both unique but grounded in '90s alt rock.

So stop in your library or go online to check out whatever type of music you're into. I can guarantee you you'll be shocked and amazed at the great selection. No matter the genre of music you're into, you'll find it at your local library. Happy listening!

ber of laps around the course. Kieran, racing for Pinnacle Women's Racing/Hammer Nutrition, competed in a combined race which featured the junior women in the 15-16 age group and the 17-18 age group. Having placed second last year, Kieran was able to come away with the win in the race this year and was crowned the new Califor-

nia State Champion in the junior women 15-16 age group.

Then on June 3, Kieran drove north once again to Davis to compete in the California State Time Trial Championships, a race which pits the cyclist against the clock. A time trial race differs from a criterium in that each rider starts at a different time and is racing against the clock to see who can establish the fastest time over a designated

Last Christmas he told his grandmother that he did not want any Christmas gifts all he wanted was a Big Brother. Even so, he remains on the Big Brothers Big Sisters waiting list along with many other boys and girls. BBBS matches mentors with youth in Madera, Fresno, Kings and Tulare counties. Despite his situation, he is described as having a warm and delightful personality. He shows kindness, is helpful with a sense of social appropriateness. However, his desire to be matched is very strong.

Local Artist Brings Unique Technique to The Coffee Spot Arts Show

A resident of the Madera Ranchos known for her artistic versatility, Ramona Frances will be showing her work Aug. 17 through September at The Coffee Spot and will be featured at the next Meet the Artist event on Friday, Aug. 24 from 4 - 7 p.m.

After leaving the newsroom environment in 2011, Frances, a former reporter and photo-journalist, began experimenting with the application of ink, felt pens, paint and protective chemicals and graphics to create an often one-of-a-kind, 3-D effect for portraits and land-scapes.

"With the eye of a photographer, the talent of a painter, and the sophistication of a graphic artist, Ramona brings life into her custom portraits with this exciting new technique," said Linda Leach of the Madera Ranchos.

Frances often describes her art as the marriage between painting and photograph, "But

until you actually see it, it is hard to imagine," she said. "For good or for bad, the results may be totally unexpected but usually in a very good way. I honestly don't know if it's ever been done this way before. I did a lot of experimentation and botched some canvases before I got that 'aha' experience."

Frances learned that putting acrylic paint directly onto an untreated ink canvas undesirably draws the color out of it. By finding compatible chemicals, she was able to achieve something entirely new in that the realism could be considered extraordinary. Meanwhile she has built confidence in a highly marketable product. Today, she has more invitations to show her work than work to show. Even so, she has agreed to host three art shows in summer and fall and plans to enter the Celebrate Agriculture in the Arts competition sponsored by the Madera County Arts Council. The show at The

Coffee Spot will feature human portraits. Those interested in hiring Frances can either provide a portrait or digital file, "Provided it meets a certain photographic standard, and I will paint it," she said.

Sheriff John Anderson is issuing a Million Dollar Promotions Program."

In order to collect, the recipient is instructed to contact a claim agent. In this case, the agent is a Dr. Frank Martin, foreign operations manager of Claim Funds Payment Company. It listed their email as claimfunds@rocketmail.com and also listed a telephone and fax number.

If you receive such a notice in the mail, Sheriff Anderson says to just throw it away.

• If you receive a check, and are advised to wire a portion of it back, it's probably a scam.

• If you're asked to wire money for any reason to someone you do NOT know it's probably a scam.

• If you receive a check or money order from someone you do NOT know, it's more than likely fake and you will be responsible for the entire amount if you cash it.

Organized Travel Tips

Wasn't vacationing as a little kid the best thing ever? You excitedly anticipated the trip for weeks, and then the morning of, you woke up, got dressed, and off you went! As adults we know there's a lot more involved and we really need a vacation with the time and energy it takes to prepare for one. Here are a few tips that will streamline the process for you.

Create a labeled folder or document envelope to store your itinerary, reservation confirmations, tickets, maps and packing checklists. Make photocopies of your prescriptions, passports and credit cards you're bringing and place them inside. This is also a great place to pack postcard stamps, addresses and emergency phone numbers. Bring the folder along in your suitcase and use it to

place brochures and memorabilia you collect while traveling.

Contact the post office (www.usps.com) and newspaper to put a hold on your mail and newspaper subscription while you're gone. Inform your credit card company if you'll be using your card overseas. Arrange care for pets, plants, and home protection. Put house lights on timers, secure valuables and give your emergency contact info to a neighbor or friend. Schedule a tune up for your car and car inspection if planning a road trip.

Packing only what you need will save you time, space and money if traveling by air. If staying in a hotel, find out what amenities they offer (hair dryers, swim towels, shampoo, etc.) so you don't pack items they provide. Use a packing checklist (www.realsimple.com/packingchecklist) or create your own customized list on the computer. This is especially handy if you have an annual trip to the same location.

Keep a basic toiletries bag packed at all times with deodorant, toothpaste, cotton swabs, etc. This way you're less likely to forget one of the essentials when leaving for a weekend or vacation.

Place bagged shoes, books and other heavy objects at the bottom of the suitcase near the wheels, so they don't crush clothes when suitcase is being rolled. Fill the nooks and crannies with rolled up underwear, T-shirts, jeans and knitwear. Shrink towels, linens, bulky sweaters and dirty clothes (on the way home) in travel compression bags.

Use packing cubes, packing folders or large zipper bags to separate clothing by category (workout clothes, shirts, etc.), or contain complete outfits and layer by when it's going to be worn. Wrap easily wrinkled items around the packing cubes to prevent folding creases.

If you've given up on packing nice jewelry, try threading necklaces and bracelets through straws and place them in resealable bags or toothbrush holders. Jewelry can also be stored in seven-day plastic pill holders or in snack-size resealable bags pinned to the corresponding outfit. Bag small items, like electronic chargers, and place them in the shoes you're packing to make the most of your space.

If packing for air travel, remember the 3-1-1 rule: 3.4 ounce bottles (or less) packed in a 1 quart-size clear, plastic zip-top bag; 1 bag per passenger. To expedite your trip through security, bring your car keys, loose change, belt, cell phone, pens jewelry, etc. to the airport in a clear zip-top bag. That way you can easily place it on the conveyer and pick it up without a lot of small pieces to manage. Once you're settled in waiting for your flight, you can put everything in or on where it goes.

Keep prescription medicines in their orig-

inal containers — in case you need to prove they're yours. Tie a brightly colored luggage tag or ribbon to your suitcase to help identify which black one is yours in the baggage claim area.

Finally, be prepared to be in the airport longer than expected by packing a snack bag with granola bars, snacks and water. You don't want to exhaust your spending money before arriving at your destination! Be sure to bring your water bottle through security empty. Happy travels!


