


In late June, the U.S. Forest Service announced that it had identified a total of 66 million dead trees throughout California's forests. Spanning six counties, approximately 760,000 acres in the southern Sierra Nevada have been affected.

The beginning of the damage can be traced back to 2010 and it is estimated that between then and October of 2015, over 40 million trees had died statewide. The U.S. Forest Service further determined that from October 2015 through June of this year alone, an additional 26 million trees had died. That means that in eight months, the number of subsequent trees that died equaled more than 50 percent of all the trees that had died in the preceding five years.

### A Perfect Storm

Forestry experts are laying the blame on three factors leading to this historic tree die-off; a "perfect storm" of factors that have come together to devastate our forests. First is four consecutive years of severe drought in California. To that is added a dramatic rise in bark beetle infestation of almost biblical proportions. The final piece of this deadly puzzle is warmer temperatures.

In an article released by the U.S. Forest Service, Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack was quoted as saying, "Tree dieoffs of this magnitude are unprecedented and increase the risk of catastrophic wildfires that puts property and lives at risk."



He further said that across the country, California's fire risk was the most extreme. Vilsack lays the responsibility for what happens next at the feet of congress. "Unfortunately, unless Congress acts now to address how we pay for firefighting, the Forest Service will not have the resources necessary to address the forest die-off and restore our forests. Forcing the Forest Service to pay for massive wildfire disasters out of its pre-existing fixed budget instead of from an emergency fund like all other natural disasters means there is not enough money left to do the very work that would help restore these high mortality areas. We must fund wildfire suppression like other natural disasters in the country."

Forest Service scientists expect to see continued elevated levels of tree mortality during 2016 in dense forest stands, stands impacted by root diseases or other stress agents and in areas with higher levels of bark beetle activity. Additional surveys across the state will be conducted throughout the summer and fall.

The Ranchos Situation

Which brings us to the Ranchos and its trees.

The trees that appear to be getting hit the hardest in the Ranchos are Coastal Redwoods. These are huge, beautiful trees that many Ranchos residents have chosen to make showpieces in their landscaping efforts. Of course, any time the word "coastal" appears in something being used in the parched Central Valley, trouble may not be too far away.

The Ranchos Independent contacted Tony Menezes, Ranchos resident and owner of The Yard Doctor Tree Services for some insight on what's happening to the trees in the Ranchos.

"There are several issues affecting the health of the trees in the Ranchos," Menezes began, "Obviously, the drought has been the leading contributor, but there are other factors as well." From there Menezes took us down the check list for tree health in the Ranchos.

"Water, soil, fungi, insects and other things," he said.

#### Water

Menezes started by pointing out that many people don't know what the proper amount of water is that a tree needs. The most widely used method is one gallon of water per day per foot of height. However, measuring tree height is especially difficult and hard to estimate. "The easiest method is to measure DBH." Menezes said. DBH is "Diameter at Breast

## Austin Quarry Benefits Madera; Madera Ranchos Will Have to Wait

The Austin Quarry Project proposed by Vulcan Materials Company, which has been in the works for about 10 years, is on the verge of coming to fruition in Southeast Madera County. A Planning Commission hearing held on Tuesday, July 19 at the Board of Supervisors' Chambers in Madera has likely decided the project's fate. Only if the Commission's decision is appealed within 15 days, in writing, to the Planning Department, will the Board of Supervisors hear that appeal at a future meeting.

### **Quarry Location**

The Quarry will be located a quarter mile west of Highway 41 near the intersection of Highways 145 and 41 on 671 acres of land to be leased from Mike Urrita. Active operations -- the quarry, plant site, entrance road and berms -- will take place on about 348 acres, or approximately half of the land of the project. Over the next 100 years, the active land area will be excavated to a maximum depth of 400 feet below ground surface, while the other 323 acres, along with another 1,970 acres to the west that Vul- ate just west of Highway 41 on Highway 145.

can purchased and designated the "Fenton Property," will remain grasslands, natural drainage channels and wetlands that will never be disturbed.

### Vulcan

Vulcan is the largest aggregate producer in the United States with 344 quarries in the U.S. and 57 facilities in California, including one located off Friant Road in Fresno and another in Sanger. Vulcan plans to ramp up operations at the Austin Quarry over the next decade or so to reach its maximum permitted production of 2.5 million tons of aggregate annually with approximately 40 on-site employees to run and maintain the facility.

As required by the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), Vulcan has reimbursed Madera County nearly \$2 million for its expenses to hire consultants and lawyers to produce an Environmental Impact Report (EIR) for the project. Analyzing potential negative impacts to the environment in categories of Aesthetics, Agricultural Resources, Air Quality, Biological and Cultural Resources, Geology

Height." He says to measure the diameter of your tree at that height and then multiply it by five, giving you an accurate amount to water your tree. "For example," Menezes said, "a 16-inch-diameter redwood times five equals 80 gallons of water two days per week." Just so you don't freak out on that amount of water, an average 100 square foot lawn with pop-up

sprayers watered in excess of 12 minutes per station uses over 500 gallons per watering. Multiply that by two times per week and you are using over 1,000 gallons of water for 10 feet by 10 feet of lawn. That's enough water for over 12 Redwoods per week.

#### Soil

"The pH in the Ranchos is not good," Menezes said. It ranges from 7 to a high of 8.2, based on numerous samples taken throughout multiple properties. Without getting too complicated, this factor locks up needed nutrients the trees need. "Also, when wet this soil can be a sticky goo or when dry it's as hard as cement," he said. Both of these factors cause issues detrimental to the plant. When it's too wet there's compaction which results in a lack of oxygen to the plant. When it's too dry there's also compaction and the microbes that are vital to the breakdown of nutrients

die and there's a lack of oxygen to the roots. "Twenty percent of the water used to irrigate is not available to the plant due to clay soil," Menezes said. He said trees in this type of soil need amendments a minimum of four times per year when healthy; more often when not. "It's also a good practice to have a mulch around the tree to at least the dripline, this will help



### Some Black Lives Matter

Back in the 1980s when I was going to Fresno State, I had to take a "diversity" class to graduate. I chose Women's Studies and will never forget the first day of class. Our instructor was a young, recently graduated black woman whose opening remarks were: "All of the problems in the world today can be attributed to men; specifically, white men." Being a white man I looked around the room at the other white men who also had to take this class and one of them spoke up and said, "Well, what kind of a chance does that give us?"

What she was most adamant about was that we would never know what it was like to have our black brothers routinely assassinated by white policemen. In one regard she was right because I didn't have any black brothers, but something didn't seem to ring true about her statement. Since there was no Internet then, I headed over to the Henry Madden Library on campus and checked FBI and Justice Department statistics for black homicides.

She was right. Someone was killing her black brothers: It was her other black brothers. I took my research back to class the next day and presented them in front of the class. After she listened she asked where I

got my statistics.

"The FBI," I said.

"Who do you think's behind the FBI?"

"White men?" I sarcastically replied.

"Exactly!"

The only saving grace I gleaned from this was thinking that reasonable, thinking people surely didn't think like this and in the future, when everyone would have had access to this information, this great lie would have a stake driven through its heart once and for all.

So much for my fortune telling expertise.

Here it is, over 25 years later, and the Black Lives Matter movement is singing the same song. It was a lie back then and it's a lie today. Here are the most current numbers from the FBI files; do with them what you will:


1. Between 2010 and 2011, 4,906 blacks were murdered by other blacks. That is 1,406 more black Americans killed at the hands of other black Americans – in two years – than *all* of the lynchings of blacks from 1882 to 1968.

2. Consider this: The FBI's Supplementary Homicide Reports and Centers for Disease Control tabulated an average of 4,472 black on black homicides annually between Jan. 1, 2009, and Dec. 31, 2012. For the same period, University of Toledo Criminology Professor Dr. Richard R. Johnson conducted research that determined 112 black men died from both justified and unjustified policeinvolved killings. At that rate, it would take the police 40 years to kill as many black men as have died at the hands of other black men in 2012 alone.

Facts are stubborn things.

Finally, according to Heather Mac-Donald, author of *The War on Cops*, black males have made up 40 percent of *all* cop killers over the last decade, even though they only represent approximately six percent of the population. What does that mean? It means that a police officer is 18 1/2 times more likely to be killed by a black male than an unarmed black male is likely to be killed by a police officer.

It appears you have to be very selective about which lives actually matter.



As I was sorting closet contents with a client yesterday, she repeatedly used the two toxic words: "for now." She's not the only one. We all do it at times. A few minutes ago I said those words as we moved a lamp we're replacing. "Let's just put it here for now," I said.

What makes these words so toxic? I believe the amount of clutter in one's home directly correlates to the number of times a person says, or thinks, "I'll just put this here ... for now."

There are three main reasons we use those words.

1. The least harmless is when we need a temporary home for something, like the lamp we're donating, or the shirt we're returning because it's the wrong size. These things will clutter up an area, but there's a plan in place for removing them.

2. Then there are deferred ac-

**tions.** The suitcase that sits waiting to be unpacked, or the clean laundry pile laying on the couch. There's the mail on the kitchen table and the box of Costco supplies to be put away. There are grocery bags of stuff cleaned out of the car or purse and tossed in the closet to be sorted out later. And all the stuff that gets crammed into the spare room when company's coming. These are all things that could be put away, but the action is deferred when we leave them somewhere else "for now."

It's frustrating when you can't find your favorite top because you forgot it's still packed or in a pile on the couch. It's costly when the mail doesn't get opened and a bill becomes overdue. I can still remember grandpa running (he was a big man, but he could sure run) to get the pump turned off and yelling something about "wasting water" - even in the '40's they worried about wasting water.

We now have the choice of seeded or seedless watermelon. I realize the convenience of the seedless – no bother with the kids eating seeds by mistake or the seeds all over the patio or ground - but I really think the seeded melons are the sweetest, plus you get to eat the heart of the melon, the best part.

I have always thought of melons for dessert or maybe a salad, but I found some ways that may surprise you. The first one makes a refreshing summer snack and kids love it.

### Spicy Watermelon

¼ tsp. ground cumin

¼ tsp. ground coriander

¼ tsp. chili powder

½ C. chopped pecans


Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Grease and flour two 9x5 loaf pans.

In a large bowl, beat together eggs, vegetable oil, sugar, vanilla and cantaloupe. In a separate bowl, sift together flour, salt, baking soda, baking powder, cinnamon and ginger. Stir the flour mixture into the cantaloupe mixture, stir to combine. Pour batter into prepared pans. Bake in a preheated oven for 1 hour, or until a toothpick inserted into the center of the loaf comes out clean. Meanwhile, combine butter and brown sugar. Microwave for 3





minutes, stirring every minute. Stir in pecans. Pour sauce over warm bread. Let it cool for one hour before serving.

### Watermelon Tomato Salsa

- 1 ½ C chopped red onion
- 1 C chopped cantaloupe
- 1 C chopped watermelon
- 1 tomato, seeded and chopped
- 1 jalapeno pepper, seeded and chopped

1/4 C fresh lime juice

1/4 C chopped fresh cilantro

Salt and pepper to taste

In a large bowl, mix all ingredients together except salt and pepper. Add salt and pepper to taste. Refrigerate at least 4 hours before serving. Be sure to seed the tomato; if you don't the dish will be too watery.

### Watermelon Margarita

2 tsp. sugar

1 lime wedge

3 ½ C cubed seeded watermelon

½ C tequila

2 T sugar

3 T fresh lime juice

1 T Triple Sec

Place 2 tsp. of sugar in a saucer. Rub the rims of six glasses with the lime wedge, spin the rim of each glass in the sugar to coat it. Set prepared glasses aside.

Combine watermelon, tequila, sugar, lime juice and triple sec in a blender; process until smooth. Fill each glass with ½ cup crushed ice. Add ½ cup margarita mix to each glass. Garnish with lime wedges or melon balls, if desired.

## **Cal Dems Spending to Save Costa**

### How to Keep Cool

Hello 93636,

Just a few tips to help you "do-ityourselfers" understand and properly diagnosis your vehicle's cooling system. In this hot weather it may just come in

Let's start by checking and servicing your vehicle's cooling system. If you drive a Toyota Prius or newer Ford diesel pickup, you have two separate and independent cooling systems. Check both. In the case of the Prius, one cooling system is for the gasoline engine and the second is for the hybrid high voltage electrical system.

If your vehicle has a radiator with a radiator cap, check the coolant level there. You should be able to visually see the coolant inside the radiator neck. The color of the coolant will differ depending on the type of coolant and vehicle manufacture. Turn the radiator cap over and inspect the large and small rubber seals for cracks. Replace the cap if any are found. For safety, only check the coolant level when the engine is cool.

If the cooling system is low, top it off. Use coolant, not water. Some beneficial properties of coolant over water are: It raises the boiling point; lowers the freezing point; inhibits rust and; lubricates the water pump. DO NOT use one size fits all coolant. Use only the coolant designed specifically for your vehicle. If you cross-mix coolants, they can create a gel. When that happens you have big problems. BE CAREFUL! There should be a manufacturer's coolant information label somewhere under the hood. Use it. If not, get the owner's manual from the glove box. If you don't know which coolant to use or the proper coolant is not available, use distilled water. Do not use tap water if possible. We don't want an adverse chemical reaction from fluoride, chlorine or whatever else is in the tap water and I certainly don't want particles of iron circulating throughout the cooling system and grinding on things like plastic water pump impellers. By the way, the cooling system service intervals are listed on the label and in the owner's manual. Service the cooling system on time. Coolant does wear out.

If you verify the expansion tank level is active, then – and only then – can it be a trusted coolant level indicator.

Some other indicators of a low cooling system are the heater does not blow hot air. There may not be enough coolant to circulate through the heater core. Also, the coolant temperature gauge on the dash is fluctuating. It should be rock solid. If the gauge is fluctuating it is an indication of air pockets passing by the coolant temperature sensor. If the cooling system is consistently low, have it pressure checked

Here's some more overheating diagnostic tips I've learned over the years: If your vehicle overheats only when the vehicle is stopped or in stop and go traffic, suspect the radiator cooling fan is inactive. When traveling down the road the cooling system is not dependent on the cooling fan because air is being rammed through the radiator from the motion of the vehicle. 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



conserve water and promote a healthy environment for your tree."

### **Fungus**

The most predominant fungus in the soil affecting Ranchos Redwoods is *Phytophthora*, which is literally Greek for "plant destroyer." "This pathogen generally attacks the root system but may attack other areas of the tree," he said. "Due to many cases of watering issues and the hardpan we have, moisture can build up around the root system causing conducive conditions." If your tree has *Phytophthora*, your odds for saving it are not very good. There is a vast array of information on *Phytophthora* at the University of California website at ipm.ucanr.edu. Go there and enter "*Phytophthora*."

#### Insects

"The predominant insects in the area are borers. Predominantly flathead borers, but there are others. Many others," he said. However, willows and birch trees are the most affected in the Ranchos. Unlike the trees being destroyed in the Sierra Nevada, Menezes said insects aren't at the top of the list in the Ranchos.

### Environment

"The wrong type of ground cover, like rocks, can be very detrimental to the root system," Menezes said. "They can cause a very warm to hot surface. That can or may harbor many disease vectors and restrict oxygen to the roots."

He also said that when you are draining or cleaning your pool or hot tub, do not dispose of the water in the flower beds or around trees. "That water is contaminated as far as plants go and can be deadly to them," he said.

Last fall, Governor Brown declared a state of emergency on the unprecedented tree die-off in California. He formed a "Tree Mortality Task Force," reprioritizing \$32 million in California to conduct safety-focused restoration along roads, trails and recreation sites. To date, the Forest Service has felled over 77,000 hazard trees, treated over 13,000 acres along 228 miles of roads around communities and recreation sites and created 1,100 acres of fuel breaks. Work on another 15,000 acres is in progress and it's all aimed at suppressing wildfires.

But that doesn't do a thing for Ranchos residents with dying Redwoods in their yards.

Menezes said that when the Ranchos first encountered problems with its wells, the draconian measure of cutting all plant watering wasn't well thought out. "If your lawn dies, you can replant next year and have a lawn. If a 20-year-old tree dies, well, you get the idea."

and Soils, Hazards and Hazardous Materials, Surface and Groundwater and Water Quality, Land Use, Noise, Traffic and Transportation, the final version of the EIR, at 10 volumes, was completed last month.

### Austin Quarry Open House

At an Open House hosted by Vulcan on Wednesday, July 13 at the Ranchos Middle School, numerous Vulcan employees from around the country as well as their Friant and Sanger plants, were present to answer questions from the 85 residents who responded to the 3,623 invitations that were sent out via direct mail about those impacts and explain how the County will require Vulcan to address them.

When asked why Madera needed another rock quarry, in addition to the newly named Madera Quarry -- purchased by Schimmick Construction from former District 1 Supervisor Rick Jenson and located less than 10 miles north -- Mike Linton, Vice President of Properties & Land Development and based in Glendale, explained that not only was the Conditional Use Permit at their Friant facility expiring on Sept. 10, 2017, but the Madera Quarry (currently permitted to remove 900,000 tons of aggregate per year) and Vulcan's

Sanger quarry (currently permitted to remove 2.5 million) together will not begin to meet the area demand projected by California's Department of Conservation over the next 50 years.

### Aggregate

Aggregate, which includes rock, sand and gravel, is used for nearly every kind of man-made structure -- roads, bridges, building foundations, parking lots, under rail road tracks, driveways and sidewalks, as well as along both river and sea shores (using a product called "rip rap," to help prevent erosion). According to David Donaldson, Vulcan's Vice President of Governmental and Community Relations and based in Birmingham, Ala., aggregate will be a major component in the work that will ensue with the passage of the federal highway bill, called the Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act, which President Obama signed into law in December 2015. The Act will pay out \$305 billion over fiscal years 2016 through 2020 in highway and mass transit funding to improve the country's dangerously deteriorating and outdated infrastructure.

### Water





tributed to the County's EIR for the Austin Quarry Project did not find that facility operations would have a significant impact on surface or groundwater, Linton and Donaldson explained that Vulcan is committed to addressing the region's most serious concern.

According to Norm Allinder, the County's recently appointed Chief of Development Services, who oversees the Departments of Public Works, Community Development and Water and Natural Resources, "County Land Use Policy requires all major developments to meet consumptive use standards." In other words, whatever groundwater is used must be replaced to create a "zero water balance." To that end, and for starters, Vulcan will take all the water it pumps out of the ground for dust control -- a permitted maximum of 85 acre-feet per year -- and collect it, along with any rainwater that falls into the pit, to feed

into the groundwater recharge basin it will create near the southern boundary of the project site adjacent to the Madera-Chowchilla Canal.

What's more, in a deal worked out with District 1 Supervisor Brett Frazier, and in what Donaldson refers to as a "belt and suspenders" effort "... to doubly reassure people that water will be added, not subtracted," Vulcan will also import and donate 100 acrefeet of surface water to Madera County each year over the 100-year life of the quarry. Both of these efforts, among others, are conditions that Vulcan must meet in order to maintain a Conditional Use Permit for the Austin Quarry; failure for which will result in permit revocation.

### Wheeling and Dealing

How the 100 acre-feet of imported water rights will actually be donated and the in a separate document called the Environ-

mental Evaluation of Conditions of Approval. According to the document, Vulcan currently receives an annual surface water allocation at its Los Banos quarry of 100 acre-feet. This amount will be exchanged for surface water rights the San Luis Water District has in Millerton Lake (and that otherwise would be used outside of Madera County). Initially, the traded water will be deposited into the County of Madera's storage account by delivering it from Millerton Lake to the Root Creek Water District via their in-lieu groundwater recharge pipeline which connects to Madera Irrigation District's (MID's) Lateral 6.2 line off the Madera-Chowchilla Canal. The County will pay MID a 15 percent wheeling fee and another \$160 per acre-foot administration fee for the use of its canal, leaving a net 85 acrefeet volume to double Vulcan's return balance of extracted groundwater and giving farmers in the Root Creek Water District the same amount of surface water for free.

#### The Ranchos Must Wait

But that is only a temporary situation, according to Supervisor Frazier. "My goal is to get the extra water to the Madera and Bonadelle Ranchos," he said, projecting that will be consummated as soon as the infrastructure to do so is in place. Frazier also said he is working with federal and state agencies to get appropriate land designations in the Ranchos area for additional recharge basins and also with McCaffrey Homes for potentially free soil removal to create the basins.

### Additional (\$) Benefits

The County will also benefit from additional annual property and sales taxes, estimated at \$270,000 and \$140,000, respectively, as well as a 10-cent-per-ton road impact fee, which will contribute another \$250,000 annually at maximum sales volume. Vulcan will also pay for two Type 6 fire engines at a cost of \$250,000 each. The Type 6 fire engine is

> a vehicle that provides CALFIRE additional flexibility in responding to fires because the engines, unlike the larger, more expensive fire trucks, do not require special training to drive and operate. Both of these fire engines will be located at fire stations in the Ranchos.

> The County is also requiring that Vulects that will reduce impacts throughout the San Joaquin air basin.

### Bigger Issues

As an example, in comparison to the 85


can enter into a Voluntary Emissions Reduction Agreement, which requires a \$600,000 payment to the San Joaquin Valley Unified Air Pollution Control District to fund proj-

acre-feet of water the Austin Quarry will use on 671 acres of land and replace twice over, the same amount of acreage, planted in almonds, would require about 1,400 acre-feet of water according to the Department of Water Resources, and no water replacement would be required or even contemplated.

A mock up of how the proposed Austin Ouarry by Vulcan Materials Company will look when process required to achieve it are described in production, as seen from Highway 145 just west of Highway 41.

Meanwhile, even in the face of California's recently passed Sustainable Groundwater Management Act (SGMA), County officials continue to allow conglomerate agricultural giants to plant hundreds and hundreds of acres of almond trees, complete with multi-thousand foot wells from which millions of acre-feet of water are drawn, a practice that still thinly qualifies as a "beneficial use" of everyone's water. Although not benefiting residents, it nevertheless constitutes 97 percent of the groundwater pumping from our severely impacted and overdrawn sub basin.


