A YOUNG DOG WAS SHOT IN BOTH OF ITS FRONT LEGS AND ONCE IN ITS SIDE WITH BIRDSHOT, BREAKING BOTH OF ITS LEGS. AND THEN WAS ABANDONED. THE DOG WAS FOUND NEAR AVENUE 12. By DJ Becker

A starving, and seriously injured young dog was found just before dark on May 10, collapsed, riddled with bullet holes, and struggling to survive on a rural road just south of Avenue 12 in The Madera Ranchos. X-rays revealed the emaciated, 11-pound dog was unable to walk due to being shot repeatedly with what appeared to be birdshot, fracturing both his front legs, with another shot entering his side and both his hind quarters, and fracturing a toe. Information on the shooting incident is being sought by the Madera County Sheriff's Office.

Residents commented that the shooting incident was extremely disturbing and questioned whether the helpless dog had been used for target practice or repeatedly shot in the legs as some kind of torture or for sick amusement. Intentionally abandoning or injuring an animal is a crime and considered felony animal cruelty under California law, Penal Code 597.1, punishable by fines up to \$1,000 and up to 6 months in jail.

The Madera County Animal Shelter



had alledgedly refused to accept the dog and his four other littermates from an estate caretaker on April 25, after the owner had died, according to representatives of the estate, potentially resulting in the five dogs being abandoned to fend for themselves for weeks in the area of the Madera Ranchos canal.

Social media sites NextDoor and Facebook are full of residents' complaints that the Madera County Animal Control and Services Department is not doing its job, refusing to pick up or accept the many unwanted, hungry, and collapsing stray dogs and cats found by or brought in by residents. Due to an apparent ongoing contract dispute, the Madera County animal shelter has not been accepting or limiting most animals from city residents or even city animal control officers for many months or longer. Residents claim they are being told to "chase the stray animals off their property or feed, take care of it, or handle it themselves."

The friendly dog, now named "Hot

Mess" Benny due to the severity of his many injuries, was found and picked up by Megan Bowe, of Bowe's Animal Rescue, a nonprofit dog rescue funded solely by donations in the Madera Ranchos. He immediately was taken to a veterinarian for emergency treatment. Two other starving young dogs

believed to be littermates were also found in the area and rescued by Bowe.

Both of Benny's front legs are currently splinted to stabilize the bone fractures caused by the gunshots, according to Bowe, in the hope that some of the damaged bones may begin to heal. If not, the left front leg may have to be amputated, she said. "He would not have lasted much longer out in that orchard. But he wanted to live. He's still fighting to live, so I'm not giving up on him." Bowe said.

An investigation into the circumstances of the dogs' abandonment and shooting is ongoing with the Madera County Sheriff's Department. Anyone with information on the shooting and or situation of the dog is asked to call the Madera County Sheriff's Department at 559-675-7928. The dispatch line is answered 24/7.

A GoFundMe account has been set up by Bowe's Animal Rescue to provide ongoing veterinary care for Benny and to support other injured or abused animals found in Madera.

Amy Toler, Director of Animal Services for Madera County, was contacted for a comment on the situation. She said,

"Regarding the property on Road 26, our officer has been in contact with the property owner, who is in the process of selling her late aunt's estate. Unfortunately, five dogs were left on the property, and our department was not contacted at the time. For over a year, the dogs have been cared for by a family friend and were observed by my officer to be in good health. The property owner agreed to relinquish the dogs, pay the fees, and arranged for the friend to transport them to the shelter. However, she did not inform him of the relinquishment fees. Upon learning about the fee, and after being denied payment assistance from Mr. Tice (her brother), the friend chose to leave with the dogs."

It appears there has been some misinformation shared regarding the conversations that took place between my staff and the niece, nephew, and their family friend. To be clear, at no point did any member of my team advise them to euthanize or abandon the dogs.

Despite our limited shelter capacity at the time, we made a good-faith effort to assist by offering to accept the animals through proper relinquishment. Our goal has always been, and continues to be, the welfare of the animals and clear, compassionate communication with the community.

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

The Future of Warfare is Here


Ukraine may not have "the cards," as President Trump put it, but it does have drones. They were used to great effect over the weekend in an audacious attack within Russia that has focused the world's attention on a revolution in warfare.

A badly outmanned and outgunned country just reached far inside its adversary's territory to destroy or damage hugely expensive, nuclear-capable strategic aircraft with low-cost drones basically indistinguishable from ones available on Amazon.

It's not quite David versus Goliath, because the Russian giant is not going to be felled by the blow, but the diplomatic and psychological impact of the raid could be profound, as Ukraine seeks to demonstrate to the West its staying power.

For creativity and outsized effect with widely available devices, the Ukrainian attack is in the same league as Israel's beeper attack on Hezbollah operatives in Lebanon last year. Both operations also carry a message about new vulnerabilities -- to a compromised supply chain and to a surprise drone attack -- that should make us take notice.

We've just watched the equivalent of aviation legend Billy Mitchell's demonstration in 1921 when he had



U.S. planes sink a former German battleship, in a display of the emerging potency of air power.

Ukraine's Operation Spider Web combined Mission Impossible-style intrigue -- the drones were secreted within Russia and some of them launched from containers attached to trucks, unbeknownst to the drivers -with clever innovation.

The attacks spanned several time zones and hit 41 Russian aircraft, according to the Ukrainians. The operation was the latest iteration of a cat-and-mouse drone war between Ukraine and Russia. The Ukraine conflict is essentially a war of attrition, yet it is anything but static, as the means of waging it change almost by the week. Offensive innovation is met with defensive countermove, triggering another change on offense.

Drones are vulnerable to electronic jamming? Then, they'll be controlled by massive spools of fiber optic cable. Drones threaten supply routes? Then, the roads will be covered with netting. And drones will be attacked by other drones. What the siren of the Stuka dive-bomber was to the Blitzkrieg -- an unmistakable herald of a new way of waging war -- the highpitched whirr of the drone is to the Ukraine war.

Estimates are that drones now inflict about 70 percent of casualties on both sides, and there are literally millions of them. Russia deployed roughly 4 million drones last year, and Ukraine about 1.5 million. We have much to learn from all this. After last weekend, every commander of a U.S. base should be thinking anew about potential vulnerability to drone attack, and it's not hard to imagine the Chinese utilizing drones to execute a wide-ranging strike in the Western Pacific if Beijing goes after Taiwan.

Once a leader in drone technology when its Predators were taking out targets in the War on Terror, the U.S. hasn't kept up with the adaptations happening in the Ukraine war. Inevitably, our own bureaucratic processes are our worst enemy.

As head of the U.S. National Drone Association, Nathan Ecelbarger, writes, the system for acquiring drones "remains deeply flawed,

Somewhere between the invention of the self-checkout lane and the rise of the OR code menu, customer service quietly packed its bags and left the building. I must have missed the farewell party. Probably because I was on hold with an automated operator who was cheerfully unable to understand the phrase, "representative, please," no matter how many times I shouted it into the phone.

I used to think of customer service as, well, a service. A smiling human behind a counter. A friendly voice answering the phone. A person who could take care of the situation without summoning a manager, having a math degree, or perhaps divine intervention. These days if you want help, you better be prepared to help yourself, and heaven help you if you actually need help doing that.

Take grocery stores for example. Once upon a time, there was a lane with a cashier and a bagger. Now there's a row of soulless kiosks

blinking like slot machines. I scan, bag and pay all by myself – and if I make one false move, an attendant, who's keeping watch over all of us like that one coworker who thinks she's your supervisor, gets summoned and stomps over like I


tried to rob the place. Which I might consider if I keep doing all the work and not getting the employee discount.

Last week I'd run into the store to grab a few missing ingredients for dinner and thought I'd save time in self-checkout since the rest of the cashier-manned lines were backed up. All was going well until I couldn't get something to scan. When I flagged the attendant down, she looked at me as though I called on her on her day off to scan an artichoke for me because I couldn't be bothered.

Even restaurants have embraced the whole self-service model. I went into a fast-food restaurant the other day to use the bathroom and get a snack and no one was working the front counter. I stood there a minute until I realized that the employees milling around in the back weren't going to do more than look at me funny, so I wandered to the kiosk to take my own order. I looked through the menu, only the item I wanted wasn't there. They sold it. They had pictures of



it around the store. It just hadn't made its way into the kiosk menu yet. I flagged someone down, explained the situation, and was met with a barely suppressed eyeroll as he had to stop what he was doing to take an order. Then he spun the screen around for me to tap my card and I was greeted with the request for a tip. A tip for taking an order with absolutely zero positive interaction. A tip for taking an order I could have placed myself had




Don't get me wrong, I'm not opposed to convenience. I'm grateful for technology when it works, but we've reached a point where convenient means figure it out for yourself and don't complain. And it appears the only backup plan when one of these "convenient" selfserve kiosks breaks is a surly attendant who just shrugs and says they don't know how it works either. Which, let's face it, is probably true because companies who go all-in on self-service don't really put a lot of stock in proper training, either.

Here's the other thing: taking the interactions away from the customers also affects the employees. Developing customer service skills doesn't just include human interaction, but problem-solving,

I appreciate the convenience, but I also



MORE Oldies **But Goodies** (June 2015)

Editor's Note: With the passing of Aunt Jean, I have decided to bring you a "Best Of" of her recipes over the past 10 years. Good recipes are timeless and I hope you enjoy them all over again.

I was telling you about a cookbook Randy found for me in a thrift shop. It is Honest American Fare by Bert Greene, published in 1981 by Contemporary Books, Inc. Mr. Greene was a cookbook author and food columnist for the New York Daily News from 1979 until his death in 1988. It was his contention that basic American food was some of the best in the world and he put together a book of just such recipes. Let's go back 34 left over mashed potatoes and fryyears and see.

I love yogurt and of course my favorite flavor is lemon. So when I saw this recipe for a lemon yogurt cake, I thought how could it to fry with. I can remember many not be delicious?

Lemon Yogurt Cake 1 C unsalted butter, softened 1 ¹/₂ C granulated sugar 4 eggs 1 T grated lemon rind L tsp. vanilla 2 ¹/₂ C sifted all-purpose flour 1 tsp. baking powder 1 tsp. baking soda ¹/₂ tsp. salt 1/2 pint unflavored yogurt ³⁄₄ C finely ground almonds ¹/₂ C lemon juice Preheat oven to 350. Beat the Cheese

butter in large bowl until light and fluffy. Slowly beat in 1 cup sugar. Beat in eggs, one at a time, and beating thoroughly after each addition. Beat in lemon rind and vanilla.

Sift the flour with baking powder, baking soda and salt. Add flour mixture to the butter in three parts, alternating with three parts yogurt. Fold in ground almonds. Pour into a buttered and floured 9 inch tube pan.

Bake cake until a toothpick inserted in center comes out clean, about 1 hour. Cool on wire rack 5 minutes.

Meanwhile, heat remaining 1/2 cup sugar with lemon juice in



small sauce pan until sugar dissolves. Slowly pour over cake, allowing mixture to soak in. Cool cake completely in pan before unmolding.

As I've told you in previous articles, I love potatoes - cooked just about any way you can fix them. Years ago, my Aunt Alma and I would sit in front of the radio listening to soap operas and eating raw potatoes and soda crackers. I read recently that Queen Elizabeth II of England hates potatoes – her loss!

I can remember my mom taking ing them for another meal. She would pat them out like little pancakes, dredge them in flour and fry them. She always used shortening a time getting my fingers slapped trying to steal one or just a part of one before the platter made it to the table. The following recipe is a little different take on my mom's leftover potatoes.

Pennsylvania Dutch Potato Dumplings

3 C cold mashed cooked potatoes

1 C (approximately) all-purpose flour

2 egg yolks

1/2 C grated Swiss or Parmesan

1/2 tsp. freshly grated nutmeg ¹/₄ C butter, melted

Salt and freshly ground pepper Heat oven to 300 degrees.

Place potatoes on a floured surface or in a large bowl. Work in 1 cup flour, the egg yolks, cheese and nutmeg by hand, adding more flour, if necessary, to make soft dough. Roll into ropes about one inch in diameter. Slice into 1-inch lengths. Press ends of dumplings with the tines of a fork.

Drop dumplings 8 to 10 at a time into a large kettle of boiling salted water. Cook dumplings until they float to the top, about 2 min-

overly bureaucratic and resistant to innovation."

We'll have to focus more on defenses, too, from early detection to counter-drone capabilities. The problem with using missiles to defeat drones is the asymmetry in expense -an SM-2 missile costs millions, whereas a Houthi drone costs thousands. And drone swarms could overcome a battery of missiles.

This is the reason why the work of next-generation defense firms like Epirus, which has developed a scalable, high-power microwave technology platform that can knock a swarm of drones from the sky, is so important.

What's happening in the Ukraine war is the norm in human conflict. It's adapt or watch your castle get reduced to rubble, your fleet get sent to the bottom of the ocean or a leg of your nuclear triad get assaulted by, essentially, a plaything of hobbyists.





utes. Remove with a slotted spoon and drain on paper towels. Keep warm in oven. Just before serving, pour melted butter over dumplings, sprinkle with salt and pepper.

My mom used to fix round steak and potatoes. She would salt, pepper and flour round steak cut up into serving size pieces and brown it. Then slice peeled potatoes and an onion over the top then pour in two or three cans of bouillon soup into the pan and add enough water to cover the potatoes, cover the pan and simmer for about an hour until the meat was done. The following recipe is a little different, but still sounds good.

Eight Layer Dinner

3 T unsalted butter

1 ½ pounds baking potatoes, peeled, cut into quarter inch slices

4 ounces salt pork, cut into quarter inch strips

- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 3 stalks celery, diced

1 large red pepper, finely chopped

1 to 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ pound beef shoulder steak, cut into pieces quarter inch thick, 4 inches square

Salt and pepper

1 large onion, sliced

1 large green bell pepper, finely chopped

1 can (17 ounces) plum tomatoes

¹/₄ C chopped fresh parsley

Heat oven to 325. Rub the bottom of a 3 quart Dutch oven with 1 tablespoon butter. Layer the sliced potatoes over the butter.

Render the salt pork in a large heavy skillet over medium heat until crispy. Remove with a slotted spoon; spread evenly over potatoes in Dutch oven.

Pour off all but about 2 teaspoons grease from skillet. Sauté garlic over medium-low heat for about 3 minutes. Remove from skillet and spread over potatoes. Sprinkle the celery and red peppers over the potatoes.

Heat remaining butter with oil in skillet over medium high heat. Sauté meat, a few pieces at a time, until well browned on both sides. As the meat is done, place over the celery and peppers in Dutch oven. Sprinkle meat lightly with salt and pepper. Place sliced onion over meat, then the green pepper and finally the tomatoes. Sprinkle tomatoes with salt and pepper. Bake covered in oven until meat is tender, about 1 1/2 to 2 hours. If dinner seems too wet, bake uncovered 15 minutes. Sprinkle with parsley before serving.
