Local dog saves family of three from certain death

As election night wound down on Tuesday, June 6, most of the Ranchos was lost in a mix of preparing for bed, catching some late election returns on the evening news or nodding off in front of the TV. But in the 12000 block of North Road 37, a life and death drama was beginning to play itself out right around 9:20 p.m.

Mary Ann Rykema-Williams, 65, was tired and had just put her pajamas on as she prepared for bed. Husband Jack Williams, 69, had fallen asleep in front of the TV and Dan, their border, was asleep in his room. It was a scene that had played out exactly like this countless times before.

In the backyard, a large of the laundry room between Golden Retriever named the kitchen and the garage. Teddy was a little spooked. "Earlier in the day the lights Teddy had two interesting were flickering and I never

idiosyncrasies: One, he never went in the house. Even on cold nights, the family would have to force him to come in out of the cold to warm up. He was an outside dog and had no muse for the inside of a house. His second idiosyncrasy was he didn't like fireworks. Every Fourth of July for all 9 of his years, Teddy dreaded the incessant popping and hissing and would whine and look for a place to hide.

On Tuesday night, Mary Ann had thought she had heard fireworks earlier. "It was a faint popping, like kids a few blocks away were lighting some off," she remembered. But what she was actually hearing was an electrical short progressively getting worse somewhere in the area of the laundry room between the kitchen and the garage. "Earlier in the day the lights were flickering and I never got around to changing the bulb." The fire investigators that talked to Mary Ann after the fire said that flickering lights is often a sign of a potential fire problem.

As Mary Ann prepared to lay down in bed, Teddy became excitable. "He tried to come through my bedroom window!" Mary Ann said. She tried to calm him down

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Bigelow, Measure "S" Glide to Victory in Ranchos

The voters of Madera County have spoken and when all the counting was done Tuesday, June 6, incumbents won and measures passed handily.

Frank Bigelow, the incumbent Supervisor for District 1 beat opponents Hal Grant and Santos Medrano handily, garnering 52 percent of the vote and eliminating the possibility of a run-off election in November.


The surprise in District 1 was how poorly Medrano performed. Backed by some big guns and some strong unions, he only was able to get 585 total votes for 14 percent. Local boy Hal Grant finished with a respectable 1,460 votes for 34 percent of the total and a strong second place. The obvious question is where the votes would have gone if it had only been a two-horse race, however even if all of Medranos' votes went to Grant, the total would still only be 48 percent and Bigelow would still be Supervisor.

Measure "S", the \$70 million school bond measure for Golden Valley Unified passed by 57 percent to 43 percent. The key here was that it had to have 55 percent or more to pass, so it just made it, but made it none the less. What I find amazing is the power of one vote. If you don't think your vote counts, look at Measure "S". There are over 13,000 people living in the Ranchos and a measure that will impact everyone's tax bill was decided by 1,193 people. Democracy!

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
Random Notes

Dear Editor:

Ten years ago, Avenue 12 looked like laundry day on the farm, with possibly hundreds of signs tacked up on fences and utility poles. The poles at the corners of Rd. 36 and Ave. 12, and Highway 41 and Ave 12, were loaded with dozens of posters, many of them nailed on top of old ones. The ground in the vacant lot at 36

and 12 was littered with old signs that had finally weathered off the pole. This was a disgraceful trashing of our community, and constituted a severe risk to any linesman who might have to climb a pole the old fashioned way, because of the forest of nails driven into the poles.

A Madera County sign ordinance specifically forbids posting materials on utility poles, among other things, except for political material at election time, which requires a special permit.

Two members of the then Madera Patrol set out one day and took them all down. Subsequently, for the next 10 years one Patrol member removed signs every week, along with removing graffiti. Citizens may remember that our Ranchos neighborhood streets looked pretty clean all that time. This volunteer was occasionally cursed and physically threatened, but never was sued! About a year and a half ago he stopped removing signs, because of burnout and increasing age. Now you will notice trash collecting on our poles again. On June 11, there were 73 signs on our poles between Rd. 35 and Highway 41 along Avenue 12 and nearby cross streets!

Now the plot moves from the general to the specific. Recently a respected and nor-

We are looking for a new shaded, secure and well-traveled location that could host our Grand Book Sale for a 2-3 week period twice a year. Book Recommendations

Adult Fiction Book: Ireland written by Frank Delaney. This is a wonderful book that tells the history of Ireland through the stories of a visiting storyteller. Set in the 1950s in the home of a small town lawyer, John O'Mara's son, Ronan, is mesmerized by a storyteller that is invited into their home for a few days to

share stories Ireland. neighbors drop by each night to listen and enjoy the pleasure of hearing a good story everyone except Ronan's She mother.

teller packing when no one is around to stop her. This leaves Ronan broken-hearted and determined to find the storyteller. Several years go by and Ronan has written and memorized all four stories he heard from the storyteller. Without his mother knowing, he covertly follows the trail of the storyteller yet always missing him but able to hear the last story left in his wake and then commits it to his memory. He too will one day become a storyteller. And each story tells a tiny spot of Ireland's fascinating history. If you have any storytellers in your family as I do, you will appreciate this ancient oral tradition of sharing family history.


Young Adult Non-fiction: The Rose That Grew From

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
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
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A Great Exchange

Most of us are much too young to remember, but there was a time when someone would stand at an appointed place and yell out 'HEAR YE, HEAR YE, HĔAR YE," then, in a loud voice, begin to speak out whatever the news was that the people needed to hear. This particular person was called the "town crier." Everyone knew that when they heard the town crier crying out, they needed to lend an ear to whatever he had to say because it was sure to be pertinent to their very lives. It could even be a matter of life and death.

As in days gone by, some heed the words of the one crying the news and some don't – and some simply (for whatever reason) still have not yet heard the words of the crier. As much as the crier would yell out, and with everything that was within him, some just couldn't hear, or wouldn't hear his voice and the words he spoke.

There was such a time when this "town crier" cried out as loud as he possibly could that there was a "Great Exchange" taking place. The crier cried out, "The King has proclaimed a promise to anyone who will hear. The King will exchange all your debts for a declaration of pardon with his insignia on it that would be a sign to anyone who would try to collect, that all had been forgiven and that they would have to go through the King to try and collect."

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
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Remember "STR" and Save a Life

The first three letters of "stroke" may identify a stroke victim

(Editor's Note: This was sent to me by Mary Tucker at Ranchos Auto Repair and she thought it was pretty important information. 'This could be very helpful to someone,' she said in her note to me. I agree.)

A neurologist says that if he can get to a stroke victim within 3 hours he can totally reverse the effects of a stroke ... totally. He said the trick was getting a stroke recognized, diagnosed and then getting the patient medically cared for within 3 hours, which is tough.

RECOGNIZING A STROKE

Thank God for the sense to remember the "3" steps, STR . Read and Learn!

Sometimes symptoms of a stroke are difficult to identify. Unfortunately, the lack of awareness spells disaster. The stroke victim may suffer severe brain damage when people nearby fail to recognize the symptoms of a stroke.

Now doctors say a bystander can recognize a stroke by asking three simple ques-

"S" - Ask the individual to SMILE.

"T" - Ask the person to TALK; to speak a simple sentence coherently, i.e. "It is sunny out today.

"R" - Ask him or her to RAISE BOTH ARMS.

Another potential sign of a stroke is this: Ask the person to stick out his or her tongue. If the tongue is "crooked" and goes to one side or the other, that may also be an indication of a stroke

If he or she has trouble with ANY one of these tasks, call 9-1-1 immediately and describe the symptoms to the dispatcher.

Frustrated she got up out of bed and went out into the living room to yell at Jack to yell at the dog and make Teddy stop. Jack was asleep in his favorite chair and Mary Ann began trying to wake him, with Teddy carrying on madly outside. She finally got Jack to wake up and was explaining what the dog was doing when just past Jack something from the kitchen caught the corner of her

It was fire.

"It didn't look too big so I went and got the cordless phone to call the fire department," she said. What she didn't realize was that the fire was already working its way through the attic, structurally weakening the supports for the heavy tile roof. "When I got the 911 operator on the phone the smoke detectors started to go off," Mary Ann continued. Upon hearing that the operator insisted she get everyone out of the house NOW! "I only had pajamas on and I wanted to go to the bathroom first," Mary Ann said, but the operator was insistent. Jack went and got Teddy who made a beeline for Mary Ann and never left her side the rest of the night. They awoke their border and moved

"There was really nothing to see when we got outside," she said. Then all of a sudden Hell was unleashed. From the weakening of the joists inside the attic, the heavy weight of the tile roof couldn't be supported anymore

"It was like dominoes."

Starting at the garage at the north end of the house, the heavy tiles fell in succession, crushing everything underneath.

"And then the heat was so intense, I was over at the driveway and could still feel it," Mary Ann said.

It melted the front of her car that was parked next to the garage and just raged.

Firefighters arrived and had the fire out relatively quickly, but the nature of the burn was such that it tore through the house. "It happened so quickly," she said.

After the shock of having her house burn down hit her, Mary Ann began taking account of what was happening around her. "Neighbors that I didn't even know were offering me clothes to wear and offering their homes to us," she said in disbelief. The Red Cross was on the scene almost immediately

providing vouchers for a Fresno hotel for a few nights while other arrangements were made. "I literally lost everything. Credit cards, ID's, checking accounts." Worried about her medications that had been destroyed, a kindly pharmacist helped her replace everything she needed.


The experience was truly horrifying for Mary Ann, but in retrospect she counts her blessings that no one was killed and the items that were lost were just "things." "One of the most amazing things was that one wall in the hallway, where everything came crashing down, was where all of the family pictures were hanging. It was the one wall the fire didn't touch," she said in amazement

This was the first time in her life she had ever been in a fire. "I'll tell you the truth, there are only two things I'm afraid of: electricity and fire," she said, realizing that her worst fear was what she had just been through. "But now I'm more than OK," she said as she stroked Teddy's golden fur over and over. "I'm more than OK."

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Sheriff to OHV Riders: Obey Laws

Complaints phoned into the Sheriff's Department regarding excessive use of Off-Highway vehicles in areas where it is illegal has prompted Sheriff John Anderson to again remind Off-Highway Vehicle (OHV) riders that driving in ANY residential zone of Madera County is against the law.

"Off-highway vehicle" includes: motorcycles, sand buggies, dune buggies, all-terrain vehicles, jeeps, mopeds, mini bikes, go-carts and any vehicle registered pursuant to Section 4000 of the California Vehicle Code.



No person shall operate an off-highway vehicle within any residential area except as follows:

- 1. An off-highway vehicle may be operated for the sole purpose of parking or storing that vehicle on a lot or removing the vehicle from the lot for operation outside the confines of the residential area.
- 2. An off-highway vehicle may be operated for a period no longer than 15 minutes between the hours of 8 a.m. and 10 p.m. for the purpose of maintenance and repair of the vehicle.

Per Chapter 10.28 OPERATION OF OFF-HIGHWAY VEHICLES, reasons for prohibiting



such use: off-highway vehicle riding results in the creation of dust and the generation of noise which disturbs the peace and quiet and threatens the welfare of the residents within the residential area. They further create traffic hazards to other vehicles, pedestrians and the operators themselves.

Those caught violating the law face citation, possible arrest and their vehicle could be impounded.

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
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
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






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Identity Theft: Massive Toll to You

Welcome to the Second edition of "Safe & Sound." I hope you are all well and that you enjoyed the first edition back in March and that it brought you some helpful tips and stirred your thought processes or at least some lively debates. I would like to take a moment to encourage you once again to please give me your feedback, concerns, questions, and suggestions. This column will only get better the more I hear from you.

This month we are going to talk about Identity Theft but first I would like to some important points. Prevention and Preparedness should be our focus. Prevention comes from education, action and consistency. Preparedness reduces paranoia and increases self-confidence. Effective preparedness comes from realistic training. "Defensive Awareness." To be calmly and constantly aware of you surroundings (ALL of your surroundings) and mentally prepared to react appropriately to whatever, without feeling nervous, apprehensive, afraid, or paranoid. In fact, done correctly, you should feel very comfortable, confident and secure. This mental and physical sense will in turn be very evident to the criminal element.

OK, answers March'sh's Educational Challenge.

#1. (Part A) Course of Action: Make sure your alarm has not been tripped or activated in any way; review your alternate escape routes should someone enter your home; let someone else know what's going on and what your plans are; don't stand too close or directly behind the door; speak with an authoritative voice; turn all outside lights on; have a phone in hand (preferably a cell phone); try to ascertain, by asking questions, why this person is at your door. DO NOT OPEN THE DOOR. ANYTHING THEY MAY NEED, YOU CAN GET FOR THEM BY PHONE. Ask her if she has specific Towing or Insurance Company that you could contact for

(Part B) Let her know what they say i.e., their estimated time of arrival. If something does not feel right, don't hesitate calling your local Law Enforcement Agency.

#2. (Part A) Course of Action: Scan the exit area, then the entire parking lot. then the immediate area near your vehicle. Without being paranoid, make sure you have a plan should something not feel or look right, i.e., returning to the

(Part B) Make sure to look closely at, below and into all vehicles parked directly near your vehicle. Be especially leery of vans or other large vehicles, especially vehicles with tinted windows. Place the merchandise inside the vehicle first. If you place the baby in first and they take control of your vehicle, you really have a problem. You can always get more groceries and a new

(Part C) Your keys should always be in your hand, held tight and ready to use as a weapon if need be.

IDENTITY THEFT

OK, on with this month's topic: Identity Theft. By now I would suspect most people have heard of this term and what it implies, but I would bet most of you didn't know the following: Identity Theft is the fastest growing white collar crime in America; has affected 27.3 million Americans over the last 5 years; and less than 5 percent of the identity thieves are caught. It accounts for \$48 billion in losses to businesses and financial institutions and \$5 billion to individuals

MISCONCEPTIONS

Identity Theft is primarily credit card related - This has been proven by the FTC to be wrong. Only 42 percent of identity theft is credit card related. Remember credit monitoring is great but it's just credit monitoring. If something happens, you're on your own when it comes to restoring you identity. Ask yourself the following questions: Do you hand your credit card to servers at restaurants? Do you sign your credit cards? Do you supply personal information over the internet? 

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Couple's 4th Arrest Since Dec. '05

Over a thousand dollars worth of Meth was seized in their home in March and now a Madera couple is back behind bars facing felony drug possession after MADNET agents seize 1/8 of an ounce an "8-ball" - of Meth. This arrest marks the couple's fourth drug related arrest since December 2005. Taken into custody was 26-year old Alberto Alvarez and 21-year old Jennifer Cota.

Agents served their warrant at the couple's home on Garfield Street in Madera, seizing Methamphetamine they found stashed in their infant's sock. The twoyear old baby boy was turned over to his Grandmother

The couple's troubles over the last six mopnths read as follows:

1. On Dec. 22, 2005, agents arrested the pair for possession - finding 61/2 grams of Methamphetamine and 121 grams of Marijuana - total street value for the drugs, approximately \$350. Both were booked on felony drug charges with bail set at \$10,000 each. Both posted bail and were scheduled to appear in Court Jan. 23.

2. On Feb. 16, 2006, agents arrested the pair again for possession

- finding 48 grams of Methamphetamine and a small amount of Marijuana with a street value for the Meth at approximately \$500. Both were booked on felony drugs charges and committing a felony while on bail, with bail set at \$30,000 each. Both posted bail and scheduled to make a court appearance March 13.

3. On Feb. 28, 2006, agents arrested the couple for possession - finding 9%grams of Methamphetamine with a street value of approximately \$200. Both have

been booked for felony drug possession and committing a felony for the second time while out on bail. This time bail has been set at \$35, 000. At this hour, the pair remain

Sheriff John Anderson again commented on the positive results that come from the close working relationship all Madera law enforcement agencies share in the county.

"MADNET's success is based on the cooperative efforts of every law enforcement agency in Madera County," Anderson said. Those agencies include, the Madera County Sheriff's Department, Madera County probation, Chowchilla and Madera Police Departments, Madera County District Attorney's Office, California Highway Patrol and the Bureau of Narcotic Enforcement(or BNE, which is part of the California Department of Justice.)

Both Alvarez and Cota now face felony drug charges in addition to committing a felony while out on bail.

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Cogdill Targets Identity Theft

Cogdill (R-Modesto) to help combat financial fraud and identity theft was approved by the Senate Committee on Banking, Finance and Insurance late this afternoon. Assembly Bill 618 will add ATM the list of information that law enforcement officials can request when investigating an identity theft or fraud crime.

"California is unfortunately a haven for ID theft criminals," said Cogdill following the vote. "We currently rank third out of all states in the number of identity theft crimes. Modesto alone saw 2,310 cases of ID theft investigated last year. That's not something to be proud of and it's time we did something about it. I'm pleased that my colleagues on the Banking and Finance Committee are standing with me in fighting this insidious crime.'

AB 618 will add surveillance photos and video taken at an that law enforcement can request of a bank during an investigation of an ID theft crime. Current law provides law enforcement officials with certain information, including access to the bank records of a customer's account covering the 30 days before and after the occurrence of a crime. AB 618 gives legal authority to banks, allowing them to provide law enforcement with the photos and video necessary to solve cases.

"Basically, we're tired of having to tell victims of this awful crime that we're sidelining their case because we don't have a photo of the suspect," stated Stanislaus, and Tuolumne.

Legislation by Assemblyman Sergeant Scott Blom of the Cogdill (R-Modesto) to help com- Modesto Police Department, Investigation Division. "The photo is often the missing piece to the puzzle that would allow us to go after these criminals."

Sergeant Blom, who attended photos and video of a suspect to the hearing in support of Cogdill's measure, provided examples of ID theft cases that had gone unsolved because of the lack of ATM photo evidence. According to a letter of support, Blom identified a case in May of 2005 that was suspended after the detective was unable to obtain the ATM surveillance photo of the transaction in question. Without a photo, the victim and law enforcement officers could not identify the suspect. In contrast, Sergeant Blom also outlined a case where surveillance photos were used to positively identify and arrest a habitual offender who was attempting to open a checking account with a stolen identity.

"It's estimated that ID theft ATM to the list of information crimes cost consumers over \$547 million in 2004 alone." commented Cogdill. "Californians deserve to have all options on the table when it comes to protecting their identity. AB 618 will give law enforcement the tools they need to combat the recent wave of ID theft crimes."

AB 618 will now move to the Senate Public Safety Committee for consideration.

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

"We're Watching You!" is Message; **Copper Wire Thieves are the Target**



A day that nabbed three arrests for stealing copper wire began with 28-year-old Michael Wilkinson of Sanger ...

Despite nearly a dozen arrests since January, Madera County's Agriculture Community continues to be victimized by copper wire thieves. Fed up, the Madera County Ag Crimes Unit - on its own volition - launched what they call "Directed Enforcement" beefing up patrols throughout the county in an effort to hunt down copper wire thieves. The plan paid off in late May with the arrest of 28-year-old Michael Wilkinson of Sanger and his believed accomplice, 36-year-old Linda Sullivan of Fresno.

Detective Cliff Kirkes saturated areas he believed would probably be targeted, passing by one business at least twice and seeing noth-

ing. But as the old adage goes, third time's the charm and when Kirkes passed by a third time he saw a vehicle parked on the property.

The pair claimed they parked there for a "rendezvous," however, neither could explain the extensive number of cutting tools inside the car - including two bolt cutters and multiple receipts from various ferrous metal recyclers in Fresno.

Kirkes took both into custody without incident.

Besides entering the tools into evidence, Kirkes also seized drug paraphernalia and Methamphetamine, booking Sullivan for possession of a hypodermic needle and burglary tools. With bail set at \$250,

Department of Corrections cited her out. She is set to appear in Court June 26.

Wilkinson remains jailed for possession of a controlled substance, drug paraphernalia as well as burglary tools. His bail was set at

The price for copper wire has risen since Kirkes' last arrest in April when the cuttings would net \$2.10 a pound. Just two months later, the price of copper wire now goes for \$3.65 a pound.

"Our Ag Crimes Unit is one of the more aggressive detective units in the valley," Sheriff John
Anderson said. "Both Cliff Kirkes ... continued with the arrest of his and Bud Smith continue to conjure accomplice, up creative ways to catch criminals Sullivan of Fresno ... and since April, with the arrest of

42-year-old Roel Angel Soliz, they are without a doubt making good progress in getting the message out to would-be copper wire thieves: We're watching you.'

Later on the same day, another man suspected of stealing copper wire - not once but twice, based on his own admission - was caught by Sheriff's Deputies.

Barely a week on the job, newly hired Deputy Bryan Hieger and his Field Training Officer Valerie Breedlove celebrated the arrest of 43year old Ricardo Abundiz of Firebaugh.

According to Breedlove and Hieger, they received word that a suspicious looking vehicle was parked on a piece of property on Road 7 and Avenue 7 1/2 near Eastside Drive. When deputies arrived, Abundiz was still there. He not only admitted this trip was his second trip to that location, he spontaneously confessed to stealing wire from the property. Deputies seized copper wire from the bed of his truck and his tool-

36-year-old Linda

Breedlove and Hieger took Abundiz into custody without incident, booking him into the Madera County Department of Corrections where he remains jailed facing possession of stolen property. His bail is set at \$5,000.

What You've Been Waiting For: Main Growing Season is Here at Last

June marks the beginning of summer, the time that Mother Nature is at her peak in the garden. Flowers are in full bloom with fruit trees and veggies ripening. Don't forget Dad this month. Something as simple as helping with garden tasks, like mowing the lawn, can make him feel special. Or buy him a nifty garden tool.

There are plenty of plants that can take the heat of our summer.

Color: ageratum, begonias, coleus, cosmos, gerbera daisy, impatiens, marigolds, petunias, salvias, spider flower (cleome), sunflowers, verbena, vinca and zinnia.

Vegetables: From seed plant beans, corn, cucumber, gourds, melons and squash. Eggplant, peppers and tomatoes should be planted using seedlings.

Harvest zucchini when young; it is not meant to hurt your back when you pick it up. Don't forget, June is the month to plant pumpkins to harvest for

GARDEN CHORES

Plant, patch, or reseed: Warm season lawns like bermuda or St. Augustine. Now that the heat is here they will really take off and grow. Lawns need to be mowed regularly, at least once at week, every five days or so is better. On tall fescue lawns it's time to set the mower up a notch or two for the summer months. Keeping the grass a little longer conserves water and shades out weeds during the sum-

Regularly shear: Established woody herbs such as oregano, rosemary and thyme to keep producing fresh green growth for those summer recipes or use a bouquet of herbs in your home. Pinch several inches off chrysanthemums, New England aster, Autumn joy sedum and phlox to encourage branching and plenty of flowers in the fall.

Feed: Roses after each bloom cycle, remove spent flowers and water regularly. Apply a light amount of fertilizer to summer flower and vegetables to keep them producing.

Brown spot: On the bottom of your tomatoes? Blossom end rot is usually caused by either irregular watering or the lack of calcium in the soil. Be sure to water regularly and apply gypsum or even crushed eggs shells to improve soil.

Fruit drop: Some fruit trees may drop small fruit. This is normal so don't be alarmed; the tree is getting rid of excess fruit. Help nature along and thin fruit to at least 6-inch intervals. Yes. I know it hurts taking all those little guys off but you will be rewarded with large fruit rather than fruit the size of golf balls. To protect ripening fruit from birds, hang reflective tape, metal discs, or place nets over your fruit trees just before fruit ripens.

Weeding: Be sure to keep weeding your garden. Each weed plant can have thousands of seeds so pull them before they develop flowers or worse: seed heads.

CRITTER CONTROL

Watch for signs of spider mites: look for mottled leaves and fine webs; they always seem to appear with hot, dry weather. Plants along dusty roads are particularly susceptible. Hose off plants with plain water, or use insecticidal soap if necessary to prevent mite infestation.

Green caterpillars or "tomato worms" on tomatoes and corn are active now.

If your petunia buds fail to bloom and have little black specks on the buds, try Bt on them also. Prevent mosquitoes by remembering to clean birdbaths regularly, dump water left in pots and saucers, add fish to your pond or buy doughnuts of Bt to float on the water.

Dripping trees, or curled or deformed leaves, are signs of aphids. Controlling ants will help control aphids and scale in trees. Try using Tanglefoot around the trunks of trees and setting out ant baits. Visit our Website under UC Info for the Pest Note on Aphids.

Hunt for snails in the evening as they come out to feed. You can usually discover an army of the little slimers coming out just at dusk.

WATERING

Be water wise! Water deeply and infrequently in the early morning to ensure minimum disease problems and maximum irrigation efficiency. Give water time to soak in between watering cycles. Use a timer if you have a habit of forgetting that the hose is on. If you develop dry patches in your lawn check the sprinklers and try pushing a screwdriver into the spot. If the ground is too hard for the screwdriver to go in, then you need to aerate the area to provide better water penetration.


Deep water all trees, ornamentals, fruits and nuts; this is especially important for any new plants.


BE SMART

Before you leave on the family vacation, mow, trim, weed and water; a well kept yard won't tip off anyone you are gone. Move pots into a shaded area where they will be automatically watered by the sprinklers. Harvest your veggie garden to keep it productive. Give produce to neighbors or a local food bank. Check the battery on your automatic sprinklers and replace if necessary. Water houseplants thoroughly then place out of direct light so they retain moisture.




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Pastor's Kindness not Enough, Charges Now of Burglarizing Church

Madera-area church gave a room for the night, \$20 gas money, and then was burglarized. Stolen objects found in suspects' truck

One kind act met with a felonious gesture of thanks.

Four days after their arrest, two out-of-towners (claiming to be down on their luck) remain jailed – now charged with burglarizing a Madera Church, the same one where the Church Pastor had given the couple \$20 to help them buy gas.

The couple not only took the \$20 but are now charged with stealing gas that belongs to the church.

David Alan Safarik, 49, and 38year-old Staretta Melvina Warren, both of Georgetown, Texas, are now in custody.

According to reports, on June 11 at around 3:19 a.m., Sheriff's Deputies Bryan Cutler, Darrell Swengel and their Sergeant responded to a tripped alarm at the Madera Baptist Church. While en route the Sergeant made a vehicle

stop – a stop that would help the department quickly close this case.

Evidence the Sergeant found inside the stopped truck made her suspicious and she told the pair she was detaining them to wait for another deputy to arrive who was responding to a crime. That's when Warren spontaneously offered the first of two pieces of information that would later implicate the pair.

"We were at the Church," Warren said.

At no time did the Sergeant tell the couple where the crime had occurred.

Warren went on to tell the Sergeant that she and Safarik stayed the night and the Pastor was even kind enough to give them \$20 for gas.

When the Deputy asked about

gas containers in the truck, Warren said they used them to get around. But the containers were filled with mixed gas, the type that is used in gas-driven power tools. Warren was advised by the deputy that this kind of fuel couldn't be used to "get around." Warren had nothing further to say.

When asked if they had bolt cutters or any other kind of cutting tools they both denied having anything like that. Deputies seized the containers of mixed gas and also found cutting tools in the truck, including bolt cutters, a pry bar, a hacksaw and blades.

A Church employee was later able to positively identify the containers as belonging to the church.

Safarik remains jailed on burglary and vandalism charges with his bail set at \$15,000. Warren also remains jailed for receiving stolen property and her bail is set at \$5,000.

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Auto Accidents Top Cop Killer

According to a nationwide study, more officers lose their lives to traffic-related accidents than to gunfire.

A nationwide study released by the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial Fund suggests that "the number of traffic-related deaths nationwide in both 2004 and in 2005 was greater than the number of deaths by gunshot."

In 2005, out of 155 officers who died in the line of duty 63 "lost their lives in traffic related incidents – 41 percent of total deaths for that year."

Not since the tragic deaths of Madera County Sheriff's Matron Lucille Helm and Sgt. George Harvey Terry - both killed in a traffic accident July 13, 1959 has the Sheriff's Department suffered the loss of a deputy due to a vehicle-related accident.

In California last year, three officers from Tulare County, San Bernardino County and the California Highway Patrol died after losing control of their vehicles responding to emergency calls, and a fourth died while on assignment for the Department of Justice.

Recognizing the critical need for continuous training in Madera County, Sheriff John Anderson enforces mandatory driver's training classes for all uniformed officers, including Community Service Officers, as well as members of the department's volunteer program,

Citizens On Patrol. "Routine refresher courses are critical in order to keep our deputies adequately trained," Anderson said. And while the training can be costly, Anderson added, "You can't put a price tag on an officer's life or that of our citizens."

On a number of occasions deputies have actually refused to take life-threatening chances during pursuits, scaling back considerably when driving in dangerous conditions – like icy roads in the mountains and fog-related near zero visibility on the valley floor.

Supervisor Vern Moss of District 1 in Chowchilla shares the conviction that refresher courses are critical in order to keep driving skills of deputies up to speed.

Supervisor Moss said he personally understands how crucial continuous training is and he recognizes that while it comes with a price tag, "Without proper training too many lives would be at stake. One life lost is one life too many and that includes both law enforcement as well as the citizens of our county."

Since 2002, the Madera County Sheriff's Department has retired 1.5 vehicles a year due to collision. "To the credit of our deputies, the number of vehicle-related accidents in which an officer has been seriously injured or has died is zero." Anderson said.

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Attempted Murder Charged in Bloody Fight

Four months after completing their investigation into a bloody battle between two men in Raymond, Mountain Deputies have made an arrest of 30-year old Daniel Robert Mitchell on charges of suspicion of attempted murder.

Sergeant Karl Hancock and Deputies Larry Rich and Paul Chetwood took Mitchell into custody after receiving a tip that they would find Mitchell (who also goes by the name Jacob Daniel Dunn) at a residence located on High Point Court in Ahwahnee.

Monday's arrest follows a fourmonth long investigation into a bloody brawl that ended with one man shot and another man stabbed.

On Feb. 13, Deputies say at around noon the bloody confrontation erupted between the pair, roughly a half block away from the famous Frontier Inn in Raymond. The stabbing victim managed to make his way to the bar where someone inside called 911. Mitchell was then taken to an area hospital in critical condition suffering from gunshot wounds while the

other man, listed in serious condition. was also transported to an area hospital, suffering from multiple stab wounds.

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
