A group of private citizens, mostly from the Madera Ranchos, are sending gift packages to troops originally from the Central Valley who are currently serving in the Middle East. "Word From Home" is made up mostly of family and friends of

military personnel who gather and ship everyday items that are not generally available and are greatly missed by the troops. The items range from dental floss and insect repellant to Ziploc bags and CDs. Packages go to as many Central Valley military personnel as possible, not just to troops related to or known by members of the group, making it a truly "community" service project.

Two Meth Lab "Dump Sites" Discovered 5 Miles from LHS

Two latest discoveries in close proximity to the Madera Ranchos brings number of Meth Lab "Dump Sites" to eight.

On Monday, June 18, Madera County Sheriff's Deputies discovered two different Methamphetamine "dump sites" within a mile of each other near Road 32 and Avenues 7 and 8 in rural Madera County. The two finds bring the total number of dumpsites discovered recently by Deputies to eight and illustrate just how close this type of activity is to the Ranchos with their locations a mere 5 miles from Liberty High School.

Meth dump sites are where the spent materials used to produce Methamphetamine in

cotics agents sorted through four 5-gallon buckets filled with acid, two acid cylinders, a 40gallon trash can filled with lab debris and a flammable liquid. All highly toxic and flammable, agents are convinced they are the remnants of a "Super" Meth lab, capable of producing in excess of 10 pounds of pure Methamphetamine.





Is this enough digging for this month? My paws are killin' me.

Just a little background first:

The Water Commission - according to Chairman Moss - is to be an advisory group reporting directly to the Board. It will study and report on any issue related to water use or management, including flood, watershed or wastewater. I personally believe this could be one of the most important commissions in the County, considering how important water is.

The Water Commission first surfaced several weeks ago. Depending on when you looked at it, the numbers changed.

According to Madera County Council, David Prentice, when it was conceived it was a total of 10. By the time it got to the first public hearing it was up to 13 to be appointed by established groups or organizations and one "at large" member. The problem was that only one of the assigned representatives was to be from Eastern Madera County (defined as east of the Madera Canal).

There was a pretty good showing at the hearing and the number of at large members was upped to three, with two of them being from Eastern Madera County, Another first hearing was set and the number of at large members was increased to six. When Supervisor Bigelow made the motion to add them he placed all six to be chosen from Eastern Madera County. His motion Passed 3/2.

Another first hearing was set for June 5 and when the June 5 agenda came out item 5 was a motion to reconsider.

PROBLEM: A motion to reconsider can only be requested by someone on the prevailing side of the vote to be reconsidered. I do not believe this one was.

When item 5 was called, Supervisor Dominici said that he could not ask for it to be reconsidered but was wondering if someone else would. For whatever reason - I do not know - Supervisor Wheeler said something to the effect of "... Out of respect for Supervisor Ronn and because I want to hear what he has to say, I will make the motion." Supervisor Ronn Dominici seconded it.

PROBLEM: There are only certain reasons why you can ask for a motion to reconsider and neither of the ones Wheeler gave are on the list.

The mater was discussed by the Board and a vote was taken to reconsider.

PROBLEM: Any item on the agenda means members of the public must be given an opportunity to talk before the vote is taken. I moved to the area of the podium, gestured and even went up and talked to the County Counsel to protest but the Chairman would not open it to public comment. The issues:

1) The posting of item 5 was not in order (was not done by a member of the prevailing side).

2) The motion to reconsider by Supervisor was not in order (had he just made the motion it could have been debatable but he explained his reasons).

3) The action of the Board - the vote to reconsider was not legal - was in violation of the Brown Act (members of the public were not permitted to speak on the issue before the vote).

So what now? If they go forward and I win my case everything after this point could be thrown out and we would have to start over.

Dear Editor:

Jerry Brown's election as Attorney General last November worried more than a few Californians.

The new sheriff in town is telling some people who aren't following the strict letter of one particular law – at least as he sees it – to get out of Dodge.

Unfortunately, the people in question are not violent criminals, but businesses and law-abiding workers vital to California's economy.

At issue is Assembly Bill 32, a bill signed by Governor Schwarzenegger last year requiring a 25 percent reduction in greenhouse gas emissions by the year 2020. The warnings issued by my Republican colleagues and I were drowned out, overshadowed by "the sky is falling" hysteria generated by the left and by the pressures of the upcoming November election. Now, thanks to a lawsuit filed by Attorney General Brown and environmental activists against the County of San Bernardino, the full consequences are becoming all too clear.

The lawsuit charges that San Bernardino County's General Plan violates the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) because it fails to consider and reduce carbon dioxide emissions and other greenhouse gasses, as mandated by AB 32.

That may sound like a lot of arcane letters and numbers, but this is not just some bureaucratic showdown that might bother you if you took the time to look into it. On the contrary, this lawsuit threatens to cause devastating harm to our already ravaged infrastructure and, by extension, to our state's economy. It also could radically alter how you live on a daily basis. For decades, environmentalists and opponents of growth have used – and abused – the subjective and convoluted provisions of CEQA to delay countless projects up and down the state, from highway construction to housing developments. Though intended to protect the natural resources we all appreciate, it has become a favored weapon of those bent on stopping progress. Local governments and private developers pay thousands, if not millions, more trying to comply with CEQA's restrictive mandates, increasing costs to prohibitive levels.

The implications of the lawsuit filed against San Bernardino reach much further. No county or state agency has ever been asked to consider carbon dioxide in the CEQA review process. So, if our AG gets what he wants, there won't be a single county or city in California with a growth plan that meets the new standard.

How could they? Nearly a year after AB 32's passage, the state's own Air Resources Board (CARB) still hasn't developed proposed regulations for how California is supposed to meet the law's directive of reducing carbon dioxide emissions to 1990 levels.

Here's a preview: Considering the fact that our population has increased 23 percent, and vehicle miles traveled have increased 27 percent since 1990, CARB's elusive plan will almost certainly require drastic changes.

Essentially, I'm not talking about some big, bad smoke factory belching pollutants into the air, either. Millions of taxpayer dollars once intended for roads, schools, parks and clean water projects will instead be spent on studies, consultants, reports and litigation. Every Californian will be forced to make economic decisions about where they live based on the increased cost of fuel and consumer products.

You can kiss every pending infrastructure improvement goodbye, too – including all those projects being funded through the Proposition 1B transportation bonds overwhelmingly approved by voters last year.

So, in short, the attorney general has taken legal action in the name of the state to cut down the most ambitious effort to repair and expand California's highways in decades.

Essentially, we can build the desperately needed infrastructure projects and add lanes to our congested highways as long as we don't use them!

Liberals like to use the court system to socially engineer an outcome in which Californians, frustrated by idling on gridlocked freeways, demand mass transit. However, the electorate spoke loudly and clearly when they authorized \$20 billion in bond funding for transportation improvements. They want to get in their cars and be able to get from point A to point B quickly and safely – which, not insignificantly, would also reduce air pollution.

That was the point of AB 32, wasn't it?

However, as I am sure Mr. Grauer will recognize, all of these activities were done in the public domain, not on private property that we had worked all our lives to purchase.

I have seen most of the things I have loved in life either outlawed or driven underground, and I am at the end of my patience with the attitude that "if it bothers me in the least, it should be illegal." In case anyone has forgotten, America was founded on individual rights and liberties, but that ideology, so treasured by the

New Library Planning Committee Update



Dear Editor:

I am writing about the recent articles in the Ranchos Independent that dealt with attempts to improve the quality of life in our area by building a better library and a community center. While I applaud these attempts, for they are important, I do believe there is a more pressing need that should be addressed first.

The roads in this area are old, poorly kept and in need of resurfacing. Many of the roads are very rough, with small to large pot holes. These conditions cause our cars to rattle and vibrate badly as we drive over them. This increases the wear and tear on our vehicles and shortens their driving lives and/or increases expenses with repairs related to these driving conditions.

The roads affect our property values out here and the desirability to move out here. Roads in poor condition give the impression to potential buyers that this area is poor economically and therefore not a quality place to live. But this is not true.

I am requesting that the Ranchos Independent give serious thought to prioritizing your collective efforts to improving the road conditions before building another library (we already have one) or a community center (nice but not necessary).

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
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Finishing the GV School Budget



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
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

From Home project? We started in March of this year. We mailed our first packages this month.

How many troops have received your packages? We have mailed 14 packages to date. Our first packages were sent on June 13, 2007. Our next ones will go out on July 11. We meet on the second Monday of each month to fill packages and get them ready to post. The packages go in the mail the following Wednesday.

From what Valley cities do the soldiers come? The soldiers receiving our first packages were from calls received from families in Fresno, the Madera Ranchos, Dinuba and Reedley. We got phone calls from Selma, Reedley, Dinuba and Fresno. We will respond to every caller who gives us a complete address of a soldier in a combat zone.

How do you select the recipients of your packages? We will send a package to any soldier upon request, as long as they are stationed in a combat zone. Our goal is to get addresses of soldiers from the Valley who are currently not receiving mail from home. But, donations permitting, we will not refuse anyone.

How many packages do you plan to send in the next 12 months? Our goal is at least 25 packages per month, for a total of 300, but it could be higher, depending on the response. With 13 volunteers and growing, we anticipate being able to send up to 50 packages per month, or a total of 600 for the year. We will add volunteers as the project grows. Two other communities have contacted us to get info to start their own project. Every soldier needs to know that we are supporting them.

How many items do you require for the next 12 months? We fill boxes that are 11-inches long, 9-inches wide and 6-inches deep. These are flat-rate postage boxes,

so we can stuff them full. We need enough items to fill 300 - 600 boxes for one year.

What are your financial needs for the next 12 months? We estimate we will need \$2,700 - \$5,400 for postage; we currently have \$650 in financial donations.

How much of that is for items and how much for shipping? The major portion of the financial donations will go to shipping at \$8.95 per box. We will spend a minimal amount on fliers and decorations. We are hoping that the items for the packages will be donated, so we don't have to spend cash on them. Everything mailed has been donated so far and hasn't cost us anything. We have a business in Sacramento donating used DVD's. We are still contacting local businesses for phone cards, magazines, books, etc. Last month's car and sports magazines are great donations.

What other organizations are supporting your project? We currently have four individuals who have donated money. Several individuals and one business have donated supplies. We are seeking donations from other businesses.

We have three bins in the Madera Ranchos (Central Valley Wireless, Pizza Factory and Madera Ranchos Assembly of God Church), and anticipate placing bins in Fresno (R&R Automotive), Clovis and Visalia (Roger Vogt's Performance Auto and Air) in the next two weeks. We also have a couple of quilting groups (Coalinga and Chowchilla) offering to donate small pillows and hat coolers.

Donations are tax deductible, as this is a ministry of the Madera Ranchos Assembly of God Church. Financial donations should be designated for troop support.


Ranchos' Golden Valley Martial Arts Qualifies 9 for National Tournament










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

work, says that all of the lab dump sites have been found within a 2- to 5-mile radius on Avenues 31 and 32 near Roads 7, 8 and 9.

"Based on evidence seized from the site [on the 18th], we believe that all the dumps come from the same lab," Anderson said. He further stated that similar dumps found in Modesto and Merced may be linked to the lab dumps found in Madera.

There is no way to know just how much Meth was produced from all of the other "cooks" - the term used for creating Methamphetamine in clandestine Meth labs – but agents say one super lab can produce a minimum of at least 10 pounds. Agents say that once the Meth is produced it is then "cut" with another substance, anything from baking powder to chalk or talc, to increase the quantity of the finished product. One pound of pure Meth can be cut into five pounds to sell on the streets. With a going street rate of \$15,000 per pound agents conservatively estimated that the labs responsible for these dump sites probably generated over \$5 million in Meth.

"The materials made to manufacture Methamphetamine are toxic and can be deadly if touched, even inhaled," said Anderson. "It is imperative that if anyone sees a trash site, you may not realize that what you think is simply trash is really the deadly remnants of a Meth lab.'

Anderson is warning citizens, farmers and ranchers to steer clear of the sites because a farmer in Madera County was injured when he opened up a bag of what he though was trash but turned out to be Methamphetamine production waste. He was burned when he opened one of the bags but was fortunately able to quickly hose himself off and avoid serious injury. The dump site found on the 18th was removed just before a resident was preparing to clean the debris up herself, thinking it was simply trash that had been dumped near her home.

Obvious signs that a trash site may in fact be a Meth lab dump site include: • Black plastic trash bags

• Camp fuel

· Cans of denatured alcohol and charcoal lighter fluid

• Drain cleaning products

The cost to clean both Meth lab dumps will total nearly \$20,000.

Anyone with information regarding any Meth lab dump site is urged to steer clear of it and call the Madera County Sheriff's Department at 559-675-7770 or toll free at 1-800-560-4911.

Cash Crop Grazing with Madera Cows

In what is being called one of the most brazen cultivation moves in Madera County, MADNET (Madera County Narcotics Enforcement Team) agents not only found thousands of plants surreptitiously planted on a cattle ranch in Raymond, they also successfully captured one of the growers. Behind bars is Antonio Huerta Magana, 33, a Mexican national who claims to live in Modesto and whose bail has been set at \$500,000.

Agents found and destroyed an elaborate campsite littered with poisons, pesticides and human waste and believe there were at least four people tending to the gardens. When agents low-crawled into the area about 1 mile in from Road 415, just above River Knowles Road, at around 4 a.m. the morning of June 14, they came across one garden where the plants had been removed. They followed a trail only to find yet another garden where the

plants had been uprooted. Then, after walking approximately 100 yards further they found scores of gardens with the first having nearly 1,000 plants with some as high as 4-to 5-feet tall.

"How theses growers managed to avoid being spotted until now is a miracle," said Sheriff John Anderson. "These people trespassed onto private land, set up house and basically took over. We are extremely lucky that no one (and that includes the owner of the property and her ranch hands), was harmed.

"These growers not only pose a threat to our way of life but the very livelihood of the people who live here," Anderson said. "Without MADNET and its team of agents, there's a good chance the growers would have made a financial killing."

The plants had an estimated street value over \$10 million.

Page 14 **June 2007** "Dusting" can be Deadly for Kids

(Editor's Note: This was sent to me in an email from a friend. It sounded pretty far-fetched so I checked it out. I went to www.snopes.com, the authority on all Internet hoaxes and urban legends, and found that word for word this is a true account of one father's tragic experience with "dusting." The actual link to the webpage is www.snopes.com/medical/toxins/dustoff.asp. I have teenage daughters and I had never heard of this before and thought it was worth passing on to you.)

First, I'm going to tell you a little about me and my family. My name is Jeff. I am a Police Officer for a city which is known nationwide for its crime rate. We have a lot of gangs and drugs. At one point we were #2 in the nation in homicides per capita. I also have a police K-9 named Thor. He was certified in drugs and general duty. He retired at 3 years old because he was shot in the line of duty. He lives with us now and I still train with him because he likes it. I always liked the fact that there was no way to bring drugs into my house. Thor wouldn't allow it. He would tell on you. The reason I say this is so you understand that I know about drugs.

I have taught in schools about drugs. My wife asks all our kids at least once a week if they used any drugs. Makes them promise they won't.

I like building computers occasionallv and started building a new one in February 2005. I also was working on some of my older computers. They were full of dust so on one of my trips to the computer store I bought a 3 pack of Dust Off. Dust Off is a can of compressed air used to blow dust off a computer. A few weeks later when I went to use one of them they were all used. I talked to my kids and my two sons both said they had used them on their computer and were messing around with them. I

yelled at them for wasting the \$10 I paid for them.

On Feb. 28 I went back to the computer store. They didn't have the 3 pack which I had bought on sale so I bought a single jumbo can of Dust Off. I went home and set it down beside my computer.

On March 1, I left for work at 10 p.m. Just before midnight my wife went down and kissed Kyle goodnight. At 5:30 a.m. the next morning Kathy went downstairs to wake Kyle up for school, before she left for work. He was propped up in bed with his legs crossed and his head leaning over. She called to him a few times to get up. He didn't move. He would sometimes tease her like this and pretend he fell back asleep. He was never easy to get up. She went in and shook his arm. He fell over. He was pale white and had the straw from the Dust Off can coming out of his mouth. He had the new can of Dust Off in his hands. Kyle was dead. I am a police officer and I had never heard of this. My wife is a nurse and she had never heard of this. We later found out from the coroner, after the autopsy, that only the propellant from the can of Dust off was in his system. No other drugs. Kyle had died between midnight and 1 a.m. I found out that using Dust Off is being done mostly by kids ages 9 through 15. They even have a name for it. It's called "dusting." A take off from the Dust Off name. It gives them a slight high for about 10 seconds. It makes them dizzy. A boy who lives down the street from us showed Kyle how to do this about a month before. Kyle showed his best

friend. Told him it was cool and it couldn't hurt you - it's just compressed air. It can't hurt you - his best friend said so.

Kyle was wrong.

It's not just compressed air. It also contains a propellant called R2. It's a refrigerant like what is used in your refrigerator. It is a heavy gas, heavier than air. When you inhale it, it fills your lungs and keeps the good air with the oxygen - out. That's why you feel dizzy and buzzed. It decreases the oxygen to your brain and to your heart. Kyle was right. It can't hurt you - IT KILLS YOU!

The horrible part about this is there is no warning. There is no level that kills you. It's not cumulative or an overdose - it can just go randomly, terribly wrong. Roll the dice and if your number comes up you die. IT'S NOT AN OVERDOSE. It's Russian Roulette. You don't die later. Or not feel good and say, "I've had too much." You usually die as you're breathing it in; if not you die within 2 seconds of finishing "the hit." That's why the straw was still in Kyle's mouth when he died. Why his eyes were still open.

The experts want to call this huffing but the kids don't believe its huffing. As adults we tend to lump many things together, but it doesn't fit here and that's why it's more accepted. There is no chemical reaction, no strong

odor. It doesn't follow the huffing signals. Kyle complained a few days before he died of his tongue hurting. It probably did. The propellant causes frostbite. If I had only known.

It's easy to say, "Hey, it's my life and I'll do what I want." But it isn't. Others are always affected. This has forever changed our family's life. I have a hole in my heart and soul that can never be fixed. The pain is so immense I can't describe it. There's nowhere to run from it. I cry all the time and I don't ever cry. I do what I'm supposed to do but I don't really

care. My kids are messed up. One won't talk about it. The other will only sleep in our room at night. And my wife, I can't even describe how bad she is taking this. I thought we were safe because of Thor. I thought we were safe because we knew about drugs and talked to our kids about them.

After Kyle died another story came out. A probation Officer went to the school system next to ours to speak with a student. While there he found a student using Dust Off in the bathroom. This student told him about another student who also had some in his locker. This is a rather affluent school system. They will tell you they don't have a drug problem there; they don't even have a D.A.R.E. or D.A.R.E. Plus program there. So rather than tell everyone about this "new" way of getting high they found, they hid it. The probation officer told the media after Kyle's death and they, the school, then admitted to it. I know that if they would have told the media and I had heard it, it wouldn't have been in my house. We need to get this out of our homes and school computer labs. Using Dust Off isn't new and some "professionals" do know about it, it's just that it isn't talked about much, except by the kids. They all seem to know about it. April 2 was one month since Kyle died. April 5 would have been his 15th birthday. And every weekday I catch myself sitting on the living room couch at 2:30 in the afternoon and waiting to see him get off the bus. I know Kyle is in heaven but I can't help but wonder if I died and went to Hell.

Potty Mouth Earns Trip to Jail

Foul language got the better of an alleged drunken Clovis man at Bass Lake on Saturday, June 2, and he now sits behind Madera County bars with bail set at \$32,000.

Christopher Perry Gordon Grill, 27, was arrested by Madera County Sheriff's Deputies after they received

reports of an apparent drunk subject standing on the Wishon boat ramp at Bass lake, reportedly mouthing off unwanted comments of a sexual nature. Bass Lake prides itself on its family friendly atmosphere and the profane comments drew the attention of the Bass Lake Boat Patrol.

Christopher Grill, 27, was arrested after a barrage of foul language alerted deputies.
