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Ave. 12 Planning Moving Forward, Workshops Coming

Phase 2 of the Madera Ranchos Enhancement Plan has begun in earnest by the Madera County Planning Department. The participation by Ranchos residents over the past year created the Draft Vision for Avenue 12 in the Ranchos. There are two final workshops on the Plan that are completely open to the public.

On Wednesday, July 21, there will be a presentation of Transportation Plan #1. Then on Wednesday, Sept. 22, will be the presentation of Transportation Plan #2. All workshops will be held at the Liberty High School cafeteria at 6 p.m. The cafeteria is located in Building "B" beside the Theatre. It's the first large building on the right as you enter the parking lot from Road 36.

Corridor Redesign

The Corridor Redesign workshop was held on Wednesday, June 23. With the community's Vision as the starting point, a design team from Cal Poly, San Luis Obispo, began in April to build design concepts for Avenue 12 in the Ranchos. You may have seen students walking Avenue 12 earlier this spring. The team includes urban design and landscape architecture faculty and students. We are very excited to have the design team on board. Public Input on several design options will be taken.

Transportation Plan

The Transportation Workshop will present likely impacts on circulation in the area and the final workshop will present the recommended circulation plan for the area. Elements of the Transportation Plan will reflect results of analyses and accommodate community aspirations and technical recommendations from the Visioning and Corridor Redesign portions of the Avenue 12 Enhancement Plan.

Please note that Phase 2 will be developed based from the Vision developed last summer and fall by the community:

1) The Madera Ranchos Avenue 12 DRAFT Vision was made available for public review and comment December 2009. It is still available at the following locations:

Four More Years - Bigelow Wins

In a decisive victory, incumbent Madera County District 1 Supervisor Frank Bigelow won the June 8 election against rival Tom Kellner with 66.2 per-

cent of the vote to Kellner's 33.6 percent. The victory marks the beginning of Bigelow's fourth term as Supervisor for District 1, the district in which the Madera Ranchos is located.

Voter turnout for the election was particularly light with less than half of the registered voters in Madera County casting a ballot. Of the 54,357 registered voters in Madera County,

only 20,402 ballots were cast, 12,756 in the form of absentee ballots and 7,646 cast at precincts.

In other Supervisorial races, Tom Wheeler held on to his position in District 5 in the Oakhurst area by earning 58.6 percent of the votes while challenger Joe Alberta ended up with 41.3 percent of the votes. Down the hill in Chowchilla, there's going to be a runoff in November for District 2 Supervisor between David Rogers and Justin White, the top two vote getters in that contest.

In the race for County Superintendent of Schools, Cecilia Massetti was the big winner, taking 65.9 percent of the vote, more than the next two candidates com-

> bined. Gwendolyn Stewart received 19.4 percent of the vote and Maria Velarde-Garcia received 14.5 percent.

In the race for Superior Court Judge Office #3, incumbent Judge D. Lynn Jones won with 60.7 percent of the votes, leaving challenger Brian Austin with 38.9 percent.

For the Assessor's seat, incumbent Assessor Tom Kidwell got the nod from the voters with 60.6 percent of the vote to Kenneth

Russell's 39 percent.

Frank Bigelow marks the beginning of

his fourth term as Supervisor for District 1

with his June 8 victory.

Madera County's Sheriff-Coroner position was also up for election, pitting incumbent Sheriff John Anderson against fellow Sheriff's Deputy, Sgt. Betty Barker. At the end of the balloting Anderson won with 67.6 percent of the votes to Barker's 32.2 percent.

The only other race was for County Clerk-Recorder with incumbent Rebecca Martinez winning over Desirae Divine, 70.3 percent to 29.4 percent.

All other elections were unopposed.

"Bottle Bombs" Look Harmless, Can be Deadly

A device usually planted as a prank can prove to be deadly if handled at just the wrong time.

An email was received by the Ranchos Independent telling of "bottle bombs," basically benign looking 2-liter soda bottles with liquid in them. By mixing two very common -- and I mean *very* common -- items from your kitchen, once the mixture is agitated, within a matter of moments the device expands and explodes with devastating effect.

What is happening in other parts of the country is people are going out on their front lawns or to their mailboxes and are finding what looks like a soda bottle with a small amount of liquid inside of it. Mistaking it for garbage, the homeowner picks it up to throw it away but the agitation of picking it up and carrying it cause it to activate. You can go to YouTube and search for videos of bottle bombs and you will see it all.

Often email warnings are bogus and not worth the time to read them, but this one is for real. There is even a page on snopes.com, the urban legend and hoax-busting website, that verifies it.

Recently in Austin, Texas, five males were charged with bottle bombing their teachers' homes and there are reports of others losing hearing and other damage.

It seems silly, but if you see a soda bottle with liquid and metal in it or if it's swelling, call the police. DO NOT TOUCH IT!

Summer Fun Begins With Pool Safety

As summer fast approaches, it is becoming more important to take a few precautions before you open your pools or spas to swimmers. Please take these few steps to help make sure your pool is safe for the summer season:

- Check fences and gates to make sure they properly latch and close
- Have a licensed contractor inspect your light, GFCI outlets, and electrical to make sure they're safe.
- Make sure filter clamps are in good condition.
- Make sure valves and pumps are properly mounted and positioned correctly.
- Inspect deck lids and diving boards for cracks or brittleness.
- Make sure your drain cover is correctly in place and is not cracked or broken. If it hasn't been updated to the new ASME drain cover which helps prevent entrapment, Wight Water highly recommends you do so.
- Check doors and gate alarms to see if they are working properly.
- Check safety covers for rips, tears and make sure they close properly.
- Have a professional check your heater for proper venting and gas leaks

Book Recommendations





Don't Waste a Crisis

President Barack Obama said at his BP press conference that when he was shaving the other day, his daughter Malia asked him, "Did you plug the hole yet, Daddy?"

If Obama wanted to give her a quick lesson in how the world works, he might have said: "No, dear, that's beyond my capacity. I can't stop oil from gushing from a well 5,000 feet beneath the ocean's surface. Now, did you do your homework?"

Malia can be forgiven for not understanding the limits on her daddy's power. She's 11 years old. What's everyone else's excuse? If the presidency of the United States is the most powerful and majestic office on Earth, it does not confer omnipotence on the mere mortal who happens to occupy it.

Perhaps Obama himself needs to be reminded. A White House aide told a reporter that the president, in a fit of frustration, barked to his aides during one meeting, "Plug the damn hole." That's a meaningless order with the world's best engineers already desperately trying to solve a hellish technical problem.

Since the Obama administration's ethic is never to let a crisis go to waste, Obama says the BP disaster means Congress should pass his energy bill and "answer this challenge, once and

for all." As with much of Obama's agenda, this is a convenient non sequitur posing as an urgent response.

A cap-and-trade bill could have passed years ago and we'd still be drilling offshore. The Outer Continental Shelf had 4,000 oil and gas facilities as of 2002. Obama proposed even more offshore drilling just a few weeks before the BP spill, an acknowledgment that drilling will be necessary even if he gets his way on an energy bill.

Cap-and-trade will increase the cost of petroleum, but not enough to end its usefulness. As Jerry Taylor of the Cato Institute points out, we use 70 percent of our petroleum for transportation, simply because nothing else is as efficient in powering our cars and trucks. In Europe, gas costs \$7 a gallon; people still put it in their cars.


At his presser, Obama sought to appear in charge, knowing that anything short of that is politically deadly for a president. But he muddled his message. At times, he acknowledged that BP is taking the lead in the response. And he admitted that he didn't know whether the head of the Minerals Management Service -- the agency at the center of the controversy over whether BP was properly regulated -resigned or was fired.

Obama can sound analytic to the point of detachment, establishing a critical distance between himself and his own team. Sometimes he referred to his own administration as "they" and "the current administration," as if his role is only to grade the blue books and offer constructive criticism.

In the light of his BP experience, one hopes Obama regrets his slam of President Bush for his "unconscionable ineptitude" in responding to Hurricane Katrina, a larger and more rapid-moving, unforgiving crisis. If nothing else, it'd be karmic payback if critics began accusing Obama of failing to stop the spill because he hates brown pelicans.

the amount of \$753,960.00, derived from the Criminal Justice Facility Construction Fund to Building Program - Jail Expansion Project, for Fiscal Year 2009-2010.

It was a 3-2 vote again.

Who Wants Grunt?

Mama always told us to "keep your mind going - try to learn something new every day. Don't let your mind dry up." Well, I learned something just the other day; in fact I learned two things that I never knew before.

I received an e-mail from Debra suggesting I do a column on cobblers, crisps and grunts. She must have been reading my mind because I had intended doing this one on cobblers - but she stopped me with a "grunt." So I went to the internet (I don't know where I'd be if it weren't for the internet). First I went to the dictionary and looked up grunt. The familiar definitions were there - A sound made when lifting; an infantry man; an unskilled worker, and then there it was: New England cooking - a dessert, made with fruit and topped with biscuit dough. Then my curiosity was really going, so I went to Google and typed in Peach Grunt and wow, there were all kinds of recipes. Not only that, I found another word I'd never heard of and that was a "slump." So, back to the internet to find the difference between a grunt and a slump. They both come from New England and one site said the grunt was cooked on top of the stove and got its name from the sound the fruit was making while cooking and a slump was baked in the oven. Both with bubbly fruit with biscuits or dumplings dropped in on top of the fruit. Well, there you have it - if you are like me, you learned two new words today to add to your vocabulary.

Peach Grunt

5 C Sliced Peaches

34 C Sugar

1 T Cornstarch

1 C Flour

2 T Sugar

1 t. Baking Powder

2 T Butter, softened

½ C Milk

Combine first three ingredients in saucepan. Cover and cook over low heat until mixture comes to a boil. In a mixing bowl, combine dry ingredients and cut in butter with a pastry blender. When crumbly, add milk, making a dough that is soft but not sticky (you may not need all the milk). Uncover the pot and drop the spoonfuls of dough into bubbling fruit, spacing evenly. Simmer uncovered for 10 minutes, cover and cook an additional 10 minutes without lifting the lid. Serve warm with whipped cream or ice cream.

I don't have a recipe for my mom's boysenberry cobbler, but I can remember how she made it saw her make enough of them. She would make her pie crust for a two

Pie Crust

2 C Flour

1 ½ t. Salt

2/3 C Shortening

½ C Ice Water

Mix flour and salt. Cut in shortening until like meal. Add water and mix into a ball. This may be a little moist but when you put it on a floured board and sprinkle a little flour on the dough ball, it should be alright. Cut ball in half and roll each piece into desired shape. Should be enough for a twocrust 9-inch pie or a 9x13 pan for

She would line the bottom and sides of a 9x13 pan with half the rolled out pie dough. In a bowl, she would mix whatever amount of berries it took to fill the baking dish (probably about 5 cups of berries) a couple of tablespoons of flour and enough sugar to sweeten the berries. Sugar would depend on the tartness of the berries, but close to a cup of sugar. Pour the berry mixture into the prepared pan and top with the other half of dough and seal the edges. Score the top with holes to let steam escape. Bake in 350 oven until fruit is bubbly and top is golden.

If you don't want to fool with making and rolling out pie dough:

Batter Topping

1 C Flour

1 C Sugar

2 t. Baking Powder

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

¼ t. Salt

2 T Butter, softened

1 Egg, slightly beaten

3 T Milk

In large bowl mix all ingredients and beat with a spoon until batter is smooth. Drop batter over fruit mix. Bake 25-30 minutes in 350 oven.

I found a recipe in her cards that sounds real easy and good – I'll pass it on:

Easy Fruit Cobbler

1 Stick Butter

1 C Flour

1 C Sugar

2 T Baking Powder

3/4 C Milk

4 C Canned Fruit (peaches)

Melt butter in 9x13 pan. In mixing bowl mix sugar and flour together, add baking powder, then add milk and beat well. Pour over the melted butter DO NOT MIX TOGETHER WITH BUTTER. Pour canned fruit with juice over batter. DO NOT MIX FRUIT WITH BATTER. Bake at 375 for 45 minutes.

Debra included a couple of recipes for homemade ice cream that I will save for another time, but she did tell me about a quick "freeze" that sounds real good:

Take a two liter bottle of root beer and mix in the ice cream freezer can with two cans of sweetened condensed milk (Not evaporated milk). Whisk to blend thoroughly, and then freeze according to the manufacturer's directions. If you like root beer freeze, you will really love this concoction. Use orange soda in place of the root beer and it

will bring back memories of a 50/50 bar (or an Orange Freeze at Foster Freeze).

Sheriff John Anderson is warning Madera County residents about an email (complete with an attachment) sent from someone posing as a Marine Corps Corporal.

"Do NOT open it, and do NOT respond to the sender," Anderson said. "Delete it immediately!"

The email, authored by a man who calls himself Bill, would have recipients assume that he's affiliated with the US Marines by virtue of his fabricated domain name. Here is the content of the email:

Sent: Thursday, June 17, 2010 1:58 PM Subject: CORPORAL WILLIAMS BARNES

Hi there, I am Corporal Williams Barnes of the US Marines currently serving in Afghanistan. I got your email from a reliable source and would like to send you a very important information. However, I'd rather send it via fax because I don't trust the security of the email system. Please provide a secure fax number where you can be reached.

Savvy recipients might find humor in Bill's "security warning," but there's nothing funny about his phony pitch.

"This email, like countless others, is merely another attempt to breach YOUR computer system's security," Anderson said.

Again, if anyone receives an email like this, Sheriff Anderson says don't be fooled into thinking it's legitimate and DON'T try to find out who this individual really is by responding to it.

"Just delete it," Anderson said. "It's your best defense."

Discipleship Not Membership

"But go and learn what this means: 'I desire mercy, not sacrifice.'" (*Matthew 9:13*)

According to Matthew, Herod the Great was King of Judea at the time of the birth of Jesus. Herod's ruthlessness in defending his throne against any threat forms the background for the massacre of the children of Bethlehem at the birth of the Messiah (Matthew 2:16ff). Herod the Great was a rough character. He was everything that Jesus was not. Jesus had compassion; Herod was incapable of compassion. Jesus had mercy; Herod was incapable of mercy. Jesus served His Father and loved God's people; Herod was incapable of serving anyone but himself. Jesus sacrificed himself for the Kingdom of God and the people of God; Herod sacrificed others. Herod was a serial killer who was made king. I think he met the psychology definition of a murderous psychopath. He completely lacked empathy and compassion of any kind. He could murder adults, children, family and friends without any remorse. Herod was a madman. He could see suffering and he could inflict suffering and he could create suffering and it didn't seem to bother him. For the people who lived and suffered at the hands of Herod the Great, he represented another aspect of a world that was too often out of control. Who could control a force like Herod the Great? Herod was the world that Jesus was born into and because there was Herod, there was great suffering and grieving.

But because there was Jesus, there was a counterpoint to suffering. Because there was Jesus, there was and is the hope of a God who is stronger and more merciful than the Herods of the world. In our world today, we need all the hope of a loving God that we can get. We live in a world that sometimes seems filled with real Herods and there are even amateur Herods. Every uncaring word, every action without the compassion of Christ, without the mercy of Christ, without the service of Christ and without the sacrifice of Christ can plant the seeds of suffering, war and conflict that can match and exceed even the violence of Herod. In a planet of more than 6 billion people where an uncompassionate act or

thought can be multiplied by billions of times, the momentum of suffering is like a juggernaut that cannot be stopped. The bible says that even creation suffers from this uncompassionate juggernaut of self-will run riot. Somehow in the rebellion of human kind, in our propensity to offend each other and even God, the whole creation suffers. Paul makes the point in Romans (8:22): "We know that the whole creation has been groaning as in the pains of childbirth right up to the pres-


In a world of modern day Herod the Greats, having the hope of Christ is the good news of God. We live in a world we don't control. Pearl Harbor and 9/11 demonstrate that we don't have everything under control. Unemployment and Bernie Madoff indicate that we don't have everything under control. Cancer and illness and even children are signs that we don't have everything under control. So in a surprising way, those of us who follow Christ are really ambassadors of hope in a wonderful loving God who rings out a message of Good News: "For I know the plans I have for you, declares the LORD, plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." (Jeremiah 29:11).

Trying to control Herod or whatever Herod metaphorically represents today, may be a worthwhile endeavor. Membership in an organization, social group, political party or club provides a certain amount of comfort in a world of turmoil and opposition. I think that the church in the world is also influenced by this desire to belong to an organization that is based on membership. There are denominations, factions, divisions, wings and off-shoots of faith everywhere and many seem to have a heavy emphasis on membership. Sometimes these divisions become hurtful and antagonistic.

My proposal of faith today is that when it comes to following Christ, that it is not about membership in a church or even about trying to control the volatile nature of our world, but rather it is about our discipleship in Jesus. Jesus told the religious rulers one time when they were criticizing him for not following their rules, he said (Matthew 9:13): "... go and learn what this means: 'I desire mercy, not sacrifice.'"

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



Monopoly: A Different War Game

Many seniors remember and lived through Pearl Harbor, WWII, and the events surrounding those years. So hopefully the following information will interest you as it did me. Starting in 1941, an increased number of British Airmen found themselves as involuntary guests of their enemy and the English were casting about for ways and means to facilitate their escape.

Now obviously one of the most helpful aids to that end was a useful and accurate map, one showing not only where things were, but also showing the locations of "safe houses" where POWs on the run could go for food and shelter. Paper maps had some real drawbacks. They made a lot of noise when they were opened and folded, they wore out rapidly and when they got wet they turned into mush.

Then someone in the MI-5 (similar to America's Office of Strategic Services) had the idea of printing escape maps on silk. It's durable, could be scrunched-up into tiny wads and unfolded as many times as needed and made no noise at all. At that time, there was only one manufacturer in Great Britain that had perfected the technique of printing on silk and that was John Waddington, Ltd. When approached by the government, the firm was only too happy to do its bit for the war effort. Purely by coincident, Waddington was also the U.K. licensee for the popular American board game, Monopoly. Waddington produced many escape aids which were sent to Nazi prison camps, but these were always sent via private, often fictitious organizations like the License Victuallers Prisoner Relief Fund. Under the strictest of secrecy, in a securely guarded and inaccessible old workshop on the grounds of Waddington's, a group of sworn-to-secrecy employees began mass-producing escape maps, keyed to each region of Germany or Italy where POW camps were located. When processed, these maps could be folded into such tiny dots that they would actually fit inside a Monopoly playing piece.

As long as they were at it, the clever workmen at Waddington's also managed to add:

- 1. A playing token, containing a small magnetic compass
- 2. A two-part metal file that could easily be screwed together
- 3. Useful amounts of genuine high-denomination German, Italian and French currency, all hidden within the piles of Monopoly money!

British and American air crews were advised, before taking off on their first mission, how to identify a "rigged" Monopoly set by means of a tiny red dot, one cleverly rigged to

look like an ordinary printing glitch, located in the corner of the Free Parking square. Of the approximately 35,000 POWs who successfully escaped, an estimated one-third were aided in their flight by the rigged Monopoly sets.

Our thanks must go to the men and boys from Flipside Christian Church who have been volunteering at our facility to help us with some gardening and other chores. These men are available to help our seniors and friends who need batteries changed in their smoke alarms, transportation to doctor appointments and similar needs. 



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
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Where Have the Parents Gone?

A strange thing appears to be happening to the 20-something, MTV, born-in-the-eighties generation; my generation. We seem to be missing a crucial component of the social structure: the parent. Many, if not most of the people my age that I know, are parents and I have noticed a disturbing common thread among them: they all seem to have adopted a "hands off" approach to rearing their children.


Most parents from my generation that I come into contact with sit their children down in front of the TV rather than read to them. Most have let their children point and grunt to "communicate" rather than interact with them and teach them to speak. Most do not monitor or screen what their young children watch. And a few, amazingly enough, seem to think that as long as there is an adult body under the same roof as their young child, it makes no difference whether that adult is awake, coherent or even sober.

It would appear, at least to this observer, that these 20-something, MTV generation parents do not have the foggiest idea of what it takes to raise a child. Not that I have a clue either, but I at least know better than to knock back a few tequila shots while my toddler lies sleeping in the next room without a sober adult present to care for him if necessary. However, I suppose if common sense was truly common, we wouldn't have to constantly remind people to use it.

It seems that parents in their twenties, at least as far as I have witnessed, have not come to understand the idea that parenting is a 24-hour, fulltime commitment and, unfortunately, there is no pause button to press when they miss having a life of their own. So, instead, they opt to take their children with them to adult parties, keep them locked up inside because they are too busy visiting with friends to go outside and play with them, and allow the TV to occupy their child because they, themselves, are too engrossed by the television to peel themselves away long enough to maybe help shape their child's intellect and behavior. Clearly, successfully getting through the first four years of a child's life without accidentally putting the kid in the dishwasher is tantamount to having raised the child. The rest is up to the public school system.

An example of this "correspondence parenting" (where you don't have to show up, as long as you send the toddler a text once in a while) is my roommate, the single mother of a 2-year-old boy. The other day I walked through the door and found her sprawled on the couch watching a horror movie with her toddler on her lap. This was not just any horror movie, it was one of the stomachchurning, vomit-inducing installments of the "Saw" series. I am not sure which was more appalling, the fact she seemed blissfully unconcerned that her son was engrossed in that movie, or the movie itself.

Never missing a chance to stir the proverbial pot, I asked her why she was letting her toddler



son watch such a thing, to which she responded, "He likes it." Oh, well, in that case, what was my problem? Never mind the fact that the next day he was kicking, punching and even choking his mother while they played together. Gee, where did he learn that? If there are any scientists out there looking for proof of correlation between violent entertainment and aggressive children, come on down to my house.

Another stunning example of the new parenting style: While at work recently, I overheard a co-worker telling a story of a recent Friday evening she had arranged with her husband. Evidently, her husband and she really wanted to go out to the bar, but couldn't find a babysitter. So they put their heads together and came up with this gem of an idea. Since the bar was right across the street, they figured, they could both walk there and back, thus eliminating the need to drink and drive. Well, there is a relief. Since they couldn't leave their young children at home alone, they decided she would walk to the bar, spend a few hours, have a few drinks, then walk home, providing the alcohol didn't impair her sense of direction landing her somewhere in Texas with a new husband and pet goat. Once she returned home, her husband would then walk to the bar, thus completing the cycle. Brilliant! One problem ... if both of you are both drunk, who is taking care of your three children? Which is exactly what I asked her, and her response? Either she or her husband were always home, the kids weren't alone. Home, sure, but certainly not fully functioning. Heaven forbid either of them would have had to defend their home, rush a child to the hospital or dial 9-1-1, which could have proved difficult if they were both seeing double. But hey, they were physically there, and there is no reason their life should be put on hold just because they couldn't find a responsible sitter for their children, right?

It is interesting to me how many parents seem to leave so many decisions up to the child. The mindset seems to be that there is no need to teach your children because that's why we have school. There is no reason to read to your children, that's what the television is for and all the good books are made into movies anyway. There is no reason to discipline your children, it stifles their artistic growth and the little children need to be individuals and express themselves. Gone are the days of active, involved parenting. Besides, who has time to be a parent when there is so much good reality TV on right now?

Organizing for Summer Survival

The kids are out of school! That statement can stir relief and panic at the same time. A break from the school schedule is great, but what do you do when the inevitable "I'm bored!" happens? A little planning and organizing can go a long way to creating a summer you can all enjoy.

For starters, plan a Summer Launch Event. Serve pizza, plan a fun activity and sandwich between a few minutes for a Family Council Meeting. Ask for your kids' input on summer ideas such as:

- Things to do
- Places to go
- People to see
- Interests/skills to pursue

Just like any other well-managed organization, a family needs defined expectations and guidelines. Before the meeting, write out a list for each of the following items and include consequences and rewards where applicable. Share these at your Family Council Meeting.

- House rules (schedule a "Tattling/Complaining Time" to cut down on the endless flow)
- Chores (free downloadable chore charts at www.chorecharts.com)
 - Summer Safety

Continue your summer activity research by checking with the library, San Joaquin River Parkway, zoo, local churches and other community groups that provide programs for kids.

Consider networking ideas. Plan a "Swapping Party" and invite your kids' friends to bring a few toys or video games they'd like to swap. Moms and dads can join in the fun and swap costume jewelry, clothes, tools, etc.

Based on your skills and interests, take turns with other parents offering kids' classes. You might teach a class on baking and another parent might teach gardening, golfing or some type of craft.

When my kids were young we liked to plan summer field trips. Together with other parents and kids, we toured a fire station, pizza parlor, saw mill and took the train to Superior Dairy in Hanford.

Include a few educational activities

that will stimulate your children's minds during their time off.

- Practice writing skills by writing letters or emails to grandparents, cousins or friends.
- Give your child a list of 20 things to find in the newspaper. See how long it takes them.
- Have a "Kids in the Kitchen" night. Kids can be responsible for finding recipes (www.allrecipes.com), creating a grocery list and adult-supervised cooking.
- Read a book aloud together as a family.
- Create and send out a summer newsletter telling what your family is up to.

Finally, create a summer plan that blends your goals, kids' wishes, budget and availability. Schedule specific activities and events on the calendar or else your good intentions may go undone. Make sure to have some "hang out at home" days as well.

Create a list of boredom busters. Gather all the supplies needed and store them in a designated place. Here are a few ideas:

- Make a Frisbee golf course in your yard. Draw large numbers on paper plates and attach them to trees or shrubs to designate each "hole" they have to hit.
- Set up a bicycle obstacle course on your driveway or grass.
- Take turns hiding a ticking timer and see who can find it first.
- Cut a hole in a refrigerator box and load clean sponges with whipping cream. Take turns being on the throwing/receiving end of the "pie" toss.
- Tie a string between two chairs to make a balloon volleyball court; a safe indoor game for really hot days.

One last tip: Stay flexible! If something doesn't work out like you planned, move on to plan B or just go with the flow. The relationships and memories you make are more valuable than implementing the plan.
