Page 2 LAFCO: The Future of the Madera Ranchos is Being Decided Right Now

On March 13, 12 selected residents gathered at the Ranchos/Hills Senior Center with several Madera County officials to study how the municipal services are administered and delivered to Madera Ranchos. This first meeting of the Madera Rancho's Local Agency Formation Commission, (LAFCo), was largely an orientation and a process formation meeting. There was a chance to ask questions with regard to how? Why here? Why now?

The local commission members learned the Ranchos LAFCo study is going to be the first time the County is attempting a "self-help process," based on previous lessons learned. The hope is that it will be more responsive to the Rancho's needs and wants, it will be more effective than a previous attempt, and it will save the County money. Since this is considered a self-help type study, the greater the participation by all residents, the more likely it will be the Ranchos will get the government and services it wants.

LAFCo is actually the county arm of the California Local Agencies Formation Commission, (CALAFCo). It was dreamed up and created in the 1960s to help slow the sprawl and conflicts of governing districts in California. In 1972, LAFCos were designed to decentralize the process and be more responsive to local issues. They are county based commissions working largely with, not for, county planning and engineering offices. Their authority is to assist in the creation or combining of districts, provide support to districts' administration, regulate boundaries, and aid in resolving boundary issues. LAFCos cannot change land use issues, raise taxes, or make changes to laws or county policies.

In 2000, LAFCos were mandated to do a Municipal Service Review, which is a comprehensive study designed to better inform the commission, local agencies, and the community about provisioning of municipal services. This action is required by, and in conformance with, both the Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Act and CALAFCo MSR Guidelines. Every five years requires the Review to be restudied to insure it is still an accurate and viable document for given area.

The City of Madera, Rio Mesa and Oakhurst areas have already had their Muhicipal Service Review completed. Yosemite Lakes Properties Community made some efforts to restore a Community Service District, with some valuable lessons learned. That leaves the Madera Ranchos in the middle, with no governmental community recognition, or a general growth plan in place to go after grants or municipal aid.

With that said, how and why should any Ranchos resident care? It sounds like more government interference. Actually it is an opportunity to lessen government, and to make it more effective. The County has some 120 Road and/or Water Districts, not including Irrigation Districts. Additionally, there are Mosquito Districts, a Cemetery District, Resource Conservation Districts, Hospital Districts, and the list goes on. Many of these districts may not be solvent and are actually costing us money. There are also about 20 Special Districts and several mutual or private water companies which aren't regulated by LAFCo.

The question as to why this is happening now is because the Gateway Project at Highway 41 and Avenue 12 is getting ready to begin and some questions need to be answered, including those regarding the school location. These are but the first of many hard questions we all have to deal with. Change is coming, like it or not. We now have an opportunity to manage some of that change.

The City of Madera conducted its study about five years ago and is now in the process of reviewing the document. In the usual practice around the state, this is largely being conducted with city officials holding a public workshop or two. Part of all Municipal Service Reviews includes a Sphere of Influence Area as part of its conclusion. The review, or study process, is a state prerequisite in determining a Sphere of Influence. The Sphere of Influence is the expected growth area for the municipal services as they are now, or where they are planned. In the terms of a city, this is the planned area of future annexation. The combined Municipal Service Review and Sphere of Influence produces a "roadmap" for future goals, growth and development. That plan is referred to as the Community Service Plan. The City of Madera's current Sphere of Influence extends to the Santa Fe Rail Line which is the Ranchos' western border.

Rio Mesa's Municipal Service Review was largely done by a consultant, hired by LAFCo, approximately three years ago. The consultant looked at the various special districts and recommended combining them. A boundary was drawn to define Rio Mesa's Sphere of Influence. A Community Service Plan should have been written in consultation with those effected, recommending goals, how to grow services, and administration of those services. Under the recommendation of the consultant and approved by the County LAFCo, Rio Mesa's Sphere of Influence came across to the west side of Highway 41 to take in Rolling Hills, Bonedelle 9, Business 41, Children's Hospital, and the Brickyard Industrial Park, or virtually all of the Madera Ranchos' eastern border. Did the consultant hold public meetings? Are the residents even aware of this? Are the documents public record? This represents a possible loss of allocated tax revenues to our interests at some point. It also does not provide river access for planning of parks, sewer treatment plant placements or possible well locations. These areas are currently in our Golden Valley School District, but could become part of some future school district in the Rio Mesa development. These areas also fall in SEMCU's service and planning area, currently part of a joint water study grant.

Recently, the residents of Oakhurst engaged in the process and considered a Community Service Plan. One of the goals of the Community Plan was to look into becoming self-governing as a municipality. A committee of people took approximately five years to technically answer the big three questions: How? What is going to Cost? Where is the money going to come

The North Fork Rancheria of Mono Indians of California recently became only the sixth tribe in the past 25 years to successfully navigate the Secretarial "two-part" process for acquiring new land for tribal-government gaming.

The North Fork Rancheria of Mono Indians, with over 1,950 tribal citizens, engaged in this rigorous and lengthy federal process because, like other Indian people nation-wide, it had been denied a land base or "functional" reservation from which to conduct economic development for the betterment of its people due to numerous historical injustices.

LAFCO Community Survey Questionnaire Available Online and at Ranchos Library

The Madera Local Agency Formation Commission is required by state law to periodically study service providers throughout the County to evaluate their performance and to determine if there are ways that they may be encouraged/reorganized to do a better job. In order to do the best possible job, the Commission hopes to conduct this study in close consultation with the community of the Madera Ranchos.

There are four different parts of our study area:

1. *Maintenance District 10 - Madera Ranchos* - Provides road maintenances only

2. *Maintenance District 10, Zone A - Madera Ranchos -*Provides road maintenance and domestic water service.

3. *Maintenance District 95 - Continental Estates* - Provides road maintenance and domestic water service.

4. Surrounding Areas - Outside any district which may or may not require services in the future.

For over a decade, the North Fork Rancheria of Mono Indians worked in a collaborative and transparent manner with local, state and federal officials to reclaim a small fraction of historical land base. The project was assessed and approved by two gubernatorial administrations, two federal administrations, four Interior Secretaries, nine Assistant Secretaries, and multiple local jurisdictions.

The Tribe now has 305 acres of tribal

land in Madera County in trust and its goal with this land is similar to the goals of other California tribes with trust land eligible for gaming. The ultimate goal is to seek to build a tribal-government gaming facility on sovereign land to provide economic self-sufficiency for the Tribe and its citizens and generate business opportunities and investment in Madera County.

The project, which is overwhelmingly supported by the local community, carries the added, and perhaps most important, benefit of being able to immediately generate thousands of local jobs in one of the most economically depressed regions of the state and nation.

The final remaining administrative step in this process is the State Legislature's ratification of the Tribe's State-Tribal Gaming Compact, which was negotiated with Governor Jerry Brown. Similar to other recently ratified gaming compacts, the compact provides substantial payments to mitigate local impacts and funding for nongaming tribes across the state while lessening local and state fiscal obligations. Paired with the Wiyot Tribe's compact, the North Fork Rancheria of Mono Indians' compact also avoids large-scale economic development in ecologically sensitive regions near the Sierra National Forest/Yosemite (North Fork) and Humboldt Bay National Wildlife Refuge (Wiyot).

The Tribe is very grateful for all the local support it has received over the years from community groups across Madera County. The Tribe looks forward to being good partners in building a better Madera together in the years ahead

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
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


Let's Hear it for the Gutless Wonders

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
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Setting the Record Straight

A man is driving home from work one

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

Similarly, an elderly woman is struggling to survive. She is a responsible, lawabiding productive member of society who has worked her entire life and paid her taxes, and yet her income from social security barely covers her living and medical expenses and there is often not enough over at the end of the month to put food in her house. Happy Easter

Since Easter is my favorite holiday of the year, either Christian or secular, I couldn't let it slide by without writing about it. We celebrate Easter Sunday because Jesus was crucified for our sins (John 3:16) died on the cross on Friday, was buried and rose from death on Sunday (Mark 16:6). Egg Dying Time

In our families, Saturday before Easter is egg dying day. Each family with children begins with two or three dozen eggs but don't always

end up with that many. There are the one or two eggs that crack during the boilalways the ones that "accidentally" hit the floor.

On Sunday when we get home from church, there is always egg hunts for the kids -

seems like every year there is one egg that just can't be found (until rated, put the whites in the fridge about July). Eggs are a traditional symbol of new life. According to the book Festivals and Celebrations by Rowland Purton, eggs were dyed in ancient times by the Egyptians and Persians who exchanged them with their friends. "It was in Mesopotamia that Christians first gave eggs to their friends at Easter to remind them of the resurrection of Jesus," Purton wrote.

Our Easter Feast is real simple -Baked Ham, Scalloped Potatoes, green beans, green salad, rolls and desserts. Oh, and deviled eggs. NOT the ones that were up in a tree, behind a lawn chair or stepped on a couple of times earlier that day.

I start the eggs (I usually boil about two or three dozen) in cold water, and after they start boiling, turn the fire down and cook at a light boil for about 10 minutes. After the



10 minutes I usually test one to make sure it is done then IMMEDIATELY drain the hot water into the sink and turn the cold water onto the eggs. I let the cold water run on the eggs until you can pick up an egg easily then crack and peel them, leaving them whole. I have found this method the easiest to peel the egg without tearing it up. I have read of other methods but this one works best for me – if you have a method you have used, then by all means use it. After you have peeled them and they have cooled enough that you can

handle them, cut them in half from top to bottom My favorite Easter Hymn is with a sharp paring knife, putting the yolks into a bowl and the whites on a flat surface. I have a Tupperware cake saver that I use. going to finish deviling them at this point be sure to put them in the refrigerator.

> When the eggs have been sepauntil you have the yolks ready. All I do is smash the yolks with a fork until they are kind of like corn meal. Add enough mayonnaise or Miracle Whip (I prefer Miracle Whip for most things, but in these eggs, I use half mayonnaise and half Miracle Whip) to make them moist, but not runny. If you aren't used to doing this, start with only a couple of tablespoons, and add a little at a time until you get the consistency you want. Add a squirt of mustard (not too much) and salt and pepper to taste. Last year I added just a couple of tablespoons of sweet pickle juice. After you have the yolks tasting the way you want, put them in the whites and refrigerate until ready to serve. I use a teaspoon to fill my whites, but a pastry bag with a pretty tip would

Tax Time - No Sweat!

If that's not your sentiment, read on. Does tax preparation mean piles of papers and receipts strewn all over the kitchen table or living room floor and hours of agonizing sorting? Or perhaps, paying your accountant to sift through grocery bags of documents scraped off your desk, countertop, and car floor? By following some simple steps, you can alter that scenario and breeze through next year's tax season.

First decide on ONE place where you will store all tax related documents. This might be a section in your file cabinet, or a separate portable file tote box. Some people prefer to use an accordion file. Just make sure it's easily accessible, since filing your documents regularly throughout the year will be essential to your success

Create labeled folders for each of your taxrelated categories. To determine your categories, you can look back at last year's tax filing to see what was required. You may also email me at info@organizedbychoice.com for a detailed tax guide from Janet Merk Mitchell, CPA at Bandy & Associates.

Here are some of the standard categories and items to file away for next year:

Income - You may put your paycheck stubs in this folder throughout the year. At the end of the year your W-2 should match the accumulative deductions, which at that point means you may shred the stubs. This is also where you would place 1099-MISC forms showing your gross earnings if you're an independent contractor. And for our senior folks, your Social Security Benefits form (SSA-1099).

Interest/Dividends/IRA/Pension Distri*butions* – File your statements and end of the year tax forms from each account holder.

Sale of Property - File documents showing original cost and cost of improvements, escrow closing statement, and cancelled debt information.

Business/Farming/Rental Income - File your Profit and loss statement and capital equipment information.

Miscellaneous Income - This might include documents regarding income from jury duty, alimony, gambling winnings, Medical Savings Account, scholarships, etc.

Equally important are the documents required to reduce your taxable income. Make sure to create folders for these as well:

Donations - These include receipts for cash donations (if it's under \$250 a cancelled check or credit card statement will suffice), and donations of goods. Even your volunteerism can act as a deduction. Keep record of your mileage and you can deduct a specific amount per mile driving to and from your event.

make them more festive.

The Easter Ham

As far as the ham goes, I think everyone has their favorite glaze and some people don't like any – but it is entirely whatever your family prefers. We drain the juice from a can of pineapple chunks into a bowl; add enough brown sugar to make a paste - not real thick - and a squirt of mustard. When the ham is almost done (about 30 minutes before it is ready) take it out of the oven and score the outside (not real deep) in diamond shapes. With toothpicks put the pineapple chunks on the ham and spoon the juice mixture over that. Put back in the oven until it is done.

When it comes to the potatoes we really cheat here! We have found that the boxed ones are good, and a lot

less trouble. With our gang, usually between 15 and 20, we usually use 10 to 12 boxes. Can you imagine peeling that many potatoes? You'd feel like you were on KP duty in the Army. We use about four disposable aluminum baking pans, cooking two pans at a time.

The balance of the meal is simple, and just whatever your family likes.

Like so many of our meals (we have seven households coming together) there are always a lot of desserts. My sister usually makes a coconut cake, I make a pineapple upside down cake (probably won't this year as my oven is on the fritz, and doubt if I can get it replaced before Easter). Adam will bring a couple of his apple pies and there will probably be a banana pudding (I can remember my grandma always made one for Thanksgiving dinner. But she made

This is by no means an exhaustive list. It is simply a starting point. You should always seek the assistance of a professional who knows your particular situation for advice on your taxes, investments, legal and business practices.

An important note is that if you choose to leave the theater you cannot re-enter. There are no exceptions.

but he made the decision to move out. So he picked up extra shifts at work, disconnected the cable and lived as meagerly as possible to get by. The point here is that he didn't expect the government to pay his rent or fill his fridge with food just because he made a choice that turned out to be a difficult one.

The same applies to having children. It is a

choice you make, whether planned or unplanned; the stork didn't just drop a bassinette off on your doorstep with a big bow. So if your goal is to have children, I applaud you. Being a parent is a treasure and a miracle, and by far the most important job a person can have, but just like whatever it is you want in life, be it a new car, a new home or a child, it is your responsibility to work for it, save for it and provide for it, not mine, and not the American people.

from? It became apparent toward the end of the process not enough information was communicated publicly throughout the process or public questions answered. Though technically and cost-wise the plan would have worked, groups of people confused residents in raising questions, spreading rumors and misinformation. Residents comfortable with what they had versus the uncertainty raised by change rejected the issue in an election. It is important that as Ranchos residents we all make the effort to be informed throughout the process to avoid this situation. The Community Service Plan being a "roadmap" is a set of goals and a direction, and should not be measured only by its conclusion. It may take years or decades to implement some of those goals, which may be changed if warranted. The plan needs to be studied in its totality.

At the conclusion of writing of the Ranchos' Municipal Service Review, we need to review and understand all of it, in context, before passing judgment. The time to raise questions is during the process, not at the end when you haven't participated. If 50 percent plus one registered voters file a written protest to the Ranchos Municipal Service review, it will fail. If less than 25 percent of all registered voters provide written protest to Rancho's LAFCo Community Service Plan, the County LAFCo will approve the plan. Between 25 percent and 50 percent providing a written protest will cause the plan to be put to an election for all voters within the affected territory. Any future proposal to establish a new district in the area will require a protest hearing.

A couple of years ago, Yosemite Lakes Properties started looking into changes of governance and going back to a Community Service District. Their issues were not with their goals or desire to meet those goals; they were in not resolving the next two big questions in the making a roadmap to get them there. The community was not prepared to answer what the development and operational costs were. How they were going to pay for them now and the later operation costs. Grants, if won, may pay part of the costs for studies, engineering, or even development costs, but not continuing maintenance and operation costs. They could not answer those questions adequately to satisfy the state guidelines or County's LAFCo. Their community did not have the size or the sufficient commercial or industrial diversity for a sustained tax base. Their Community Service District was eventually dissolved due to lack of activity.

Most of us live in a Maintenance District in the 93636 zip code, with two districts providing water and people needing water living just outside those areas. Some want a Community/Library Center, parks, storm water control with recharge basins.

Can we keep our lifestyle here in the Ranchos?

Do we continue to operate as we do now, and let the developers and the County control our area? We need to be recognized as a governmental entity to help us get grants for water meters. Their projected costs are \$1,500-\$2,000 each by 2018 or will we pay for them ourselves? For the purpose of drinking water, with the lowering water table, how many more community wells do we need? How about considering what an eventual sewer plant is going to cost. How big? Where? Who is going to be allowed to hookup? Is there going to be a sewer tax?

At the rate we are going, with the limited involvement from residents, we will lose the Ranchos identity, independence and what little autonomy we have. The next thing to happen will be going shopping in the City of Rio Mesa followed by the City of Madera knocking on our door to annex us. These are just some of the questions the residents of the greater Ranchos area will need to start answering now and in the next few years.

LAFCo can help set the framework to get the Ranchos where it needs to go. The first step is to work on a Municipal Service Review and get help for our community to do that. Recently there was a call for volunteers to sit on a Local Agency Formation Commission for the Madera Ranchos. Twenty or so volunteered and, of those, 12 were chosen by the County and the Executive Officer, Dave Herb. These 12 neighbors came evenly from the various parts of the greater Rancho area of study. They are: Todd Chase, Vince Guthrie, Thomas Walsh, Jeff McGrath, Seth Thomas, Richard Hallert, Johal Sarbjit, Thomas Zonsius, Mark Tootle, Tom Kellner, Edmund Bergthold and Bill Prince, serving as an alternate.

The County LAFCos' study area for the Ranchos' Municipal Service Review does not include all of Gateway, but does include the Liberty Groves Development. In general terms, the study area is the western edge of Liberty Groves (Road 34), north to 145, east to roughly Road 38, then south to Avenue 10, then west again to Road 34. By the time of this printing, it is hoped the maps of the proposed Madera Rancho study area showing the service districts, subdivisions and other details will be displayed on the County's website.

The County LAFCo is defining the study area and guiding the review process. The main focus for the Ranchos study is to look at how municipal services are deliv-

Ranchos Middle School Brings Home Academic Pentathlon Awards

Ranchos Middle School defended their title and won the 2012 7th grade Academic Pentathlon. A new winner was named as Wasuma Elementary School won the 8th grade competition on Saturday, March 16.

Ranchos Middle School placed second in the 8th grade competition with Sherman Thomas Charter School coming in third in the competition.

"What a wonderful day for our students to showcase their talents," said Cyndy Dolph, Associate Superintendent, Madera County Office of Education. "The energy level was high and the competition stiff throughout all final events."

Each event contained a maximum of six students per team. Students were allowed to compete in as many tests as they wished. Teams had been practicing for this event since October.

Saturday's competition began with the speech and literature events. Participants delivered a four-minute prepared speech on the topic of responsibility and a two-minute impromptu speech in front a panel of three judges.

Literature students took a test based on the required reading, Esperanza Rising, by Pam Munoz Ryan. Participants had 30 minutes to answer 50 questions based on the book, a poem and language skills.

ered now, and into the future, for the defined area. One of the options is to combine districts so we are only dealing with one Road and Water District. This could provide greater efficiency in sharing of resources, governance and working with the County. This is the next logical step from three separate Road and Water Maintenance Districts, plus whatever Liberty Groves bring to the table. The alternative would be to manage these issues as a County Service Area. There are about 20 of these in Madera County now. We then could have our own governmental structure to deal with parks & recreation, community facilities and other municipal services. As a Community Service Area we would be given the Governmental recognition making it easier to pursue Grants as well.

This is not making the Madera Ranchos a city.

There are actually two more hurdles to that process and the Ranchos is a long way from even considering that. We all need to learn more and talk responsibly about what this means in managing our issues. Finding answers and alternatives is why LAFCo is here.

We all have families, churches, work, sports and our own lives. People don't make a town; neighbors getting involved do. Your

local commission, by request, falls under the California Conflict of Interest laws and the Brown Act rules for conduct and openness of the members' proceedings. The commission needs your input. Call the members listed above; stop them on the street and come to the meetings. The Ranchos LAFCo meets every third Wednesday at 6 p.m. at the Ranchos/Hills Senior Center at 37330 Berkshire. The first step for everyone is to take a survey on the Internet. It asks some basic questions that will help point us in the right direction. 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
GO FIGURE! by Linda This
