# **Despite Fires,** Clean Valley Air

Last month, the "Check Before You Burn" program finished its 16th year with what was one of the cleanest in recorded history, despite record-breaking wildfires at the beginning of the season.

The Check Before You Burn Program, which takes place annually from November through February, is designed to minimize the build-up of harmful fine particulate pollution. Regional high pressure systems often cause pollutants to become trapped in the bowl-shaped San Joaquin Valley, creating high concentrations of particulate matter (PM) 2.5 that build up quickly at ground level, resulting in poor air quality.

November's Camp Fire, which was the deadliest wildfire in the state to date and burned 153,336 acres in northern California, generated some of the most significant smoke impacts ever experienced in the Valley. The District issued several Health Caution notifications, encouraging residents to proactively protect their health by monitoring the Real-Time Air Advisory Network and limiting their outdoor activities when air quality became poor.

Despite the devastating Camp Fire and other wildfires, the wintertime air quality this season improved overall. Fre-

# **County Transportation Commission Public Meeting**

The Madera County Transportation Commission (MCTC) will hold a Public Hearing to take testimony regarding transportation needs within Madera County. The hearing will be held on Wednesday, April 17, 2019 at 3 p.m., in the Madera County Transportation Commission offices, 2001 Howard Road, Suite 201, Madera.

The Madera Area Express will provide fixed-route rides at no cost for the Unmet Transit Needs hearing. If passengers are unable to ride the fixed route because of disability, free Dial-A-Ride service to the hearing will be provided to the Madera County Transportation Commission offices. Call Annie Self at 559-661-7435 before 5 p.m., April 16, 2019 to make a reservation. A Spanish language interpreter will be available during the public hearing for those who wish to testify before the Commission in Spanish. If you would like to testify in a language

other than Spanish and English or require other special accommodations in order to testify, please contact the Commission by April 12, 2019, by 3 p.m.

Under the California Transportation Development Act (TDA), this hearing opportunity is provided annually to take testimony on potential unmet transit needs within the region. The Commission must, subsequent to the hearing, make a determination whether the needs presented are "reasonable" to meet. After all "reasonable" needs have been met through the expansion of existing services, or the creation of new transit systems, the Commission may release remaining TDA funds for street and road purposes (repair, reconstruction, etc.).

Members of the public, interested agencies and civic groups are encouraged to appear and testify to any transportation needs not being met by the current system. Testimony should be as specific as possible with regard to those citizens, or groups of citizens, not currently served by transit, the requested type and amount of transit service, the geographic area in which service is needed, and any other supporting evidence of information, which will help in the evaluation of the "reasonableness" of the requested service.

Those wishing to speak are encouraged to contact Evelyn Espinosa, MCTC Associate Regional Planner, at 2001 Howard Road, Suite 201, Madera. The MCTC telephone number is 559-675-0721. A request to speak need not be scheduled, individuals may simply appear at the hearing and request to be recognized, however a scheduled appearance is encouraged to help organize the testimony. Those that are unable to attend the public hearing are encouraged to submit their comments in writing prior to April 17, 2019 for inclusion in the public record.

Dear Editor:

Abraham Lincoln told the story of boarding with the family of a Presbyterian minister on the night of the greatest meteor shower ever recorded in North America. He was awakened by the minister who shouted, "Arise Abraham, for the heavens are falling and the day of judgment has arrived." But Lincoln noticed that despite the hysteria around him and the chaos above him, he could still see the familiar constellations fixed in the sky, and he knew the world was not about to end.

No one denies that our planet is warming, carbon dioxide levels are increasing and ocean levels are rising. But before we run screaming into the night, let's also do a quick reality check. The sky isn't falling.

Global warming (and cooling) is nothing new: Our planet has been warming on and off since the last ice age. There have been periods throughout both recorded history and pre-history when scientists tell us temperatures were much hotter (and colder) than they are today. Science tells us that carbon dioxide levels have varied widely throughout the planet's history, and have often been many times *higher* than today. Science tells us that at the end of the last ice age, ocean levels were 400 feet *lower* than they are today and the modern rise has been steady, small and

doesn't correlate to carbon dioxide levels. In the Caribbean, where continuous hurricane records date back to 1690, hurricane frequency dropped 20 percent in the last century.

And despite what we are told, there is a vigorous debate within the scientific community over how much human activity influences climate compared with vastly more powerful natural forces that have driven climate change for 4½ billion years. As Chicken Little belatedly discovered, there is a big difference between an acorn and the sky.

Science thrives on civil and dispassionate debate. When someone tells you the debate is over, that dissent should be forbidden and dissenters should be personally attacked – that's not a scientist talking – that's a politician.

We also need to consider the enormous costs that the left would impose on each of our families in pursuit of its "Green New Deal." We already have a taste of these policies in California, where carbon taxes have produced among the highest electricity and gasoline prices in the United States and contributed to the nation's highest effective poverty rate.

This doesn't mean we can't find common ground. There are many ways to reduce carbon dioxide emissions and adapt to our changing climate that are desirable in themselves, quite apart from the debate over the causes of the Modern Warm Period. For example, nuclear power plants and hydro-electric dams offer abundant and reliable power with no carbon dioxide emissions at far lower costs and with far smaller ecological footprints than wind and solar.

If we can store less moisture in the mountains as snow because of warming temperatures, doesn't it make sense to build more reservoirs to save that water rather than lose it to the ocean?

If oceans are rising, doesn't it make sense to phase out flood insurance subsidies that encourage people to build in flood plains by hiding the risk?

Last year's California wildfires pumped 68 *million* metric tons of carbon dioxide into the atmosphere, making a mockery of carbon dioxide restrictions. Doesn't it make sense to harvest excess timber before it can choke off the forest and burn? Doesn't it make sense to manage our forests to match the tree density to the ability of the land to support it? Doesn't it make sense to space trees so that snow isn't trapped in dense canopies to evaporate before it can reach the ground? And if we can't agree on these measures, then how seriously are we really taking the purported apocalypse?



# Yes, There's a Border Problem

We interrupt the talk of the president "manufacturing" a crisis at the border with this hair-raising report about the crisis at the border.

Alarming new numbers about border apprehensions from U.S. Customs and Border Protection should puncture the lazy conventional wisdom about the border being under control, except in the lurid imagination of President Donald Trump.

More than 76,000 migrants were apprehended crossing the southern border last month, the highest February in more than 10 years and the highest month of the Trump administration. The number of apprehensions tops any month during the 2014 border surge under President Barack Obama, which no one had a problem calling a crisis at the time.

Yes, there were more overall apprehensions in the 2000s. But it was a different population, made up overwhelmingly of adult males from Mexico who might be apprehended trying to cross multiple times and were reliably returned home when they were caught. Now, we are apprehending people but not returning them.

Migrants are coming in greater numbers from Central American countries instead of Mexico, and are primarily families and children. In an astonishing shift, in 2012, 10 percent of apprehended migrants were families and children; in recent months, it's been 61 percent.

The rules for dealing with migrants from noncontiguous countries and with family units make it all but impossible to swiftly return or detain them, not to mention that our physical facilities were built with single adults in mind.

There is no mechanism to return these migrants home, to hold them after they cross the border, or to remove them once they are in the interior. And word has gotten out. There's a reason that the subset of migrants that we can't stop from getting into the country is growing so rapidly.

Needless to say, a spiraling border crisis is maddening for a president committed to controlling the border, which is why we've seen such frenetic activity from Trump. His rhetoric may be over the top, but the impulse to get a handle on this is absolutely correct.

First, there's the question of basic sovereignty. If we are going to welcome a large number of migrants from three or four foreign countries, we should make that decision as a conscious policy, rather than slip-sliding into it unawares.

Then there's the matter of assimilation and legality. Poorly educated immigrants, like the ones coming from Central America, have the hardest time assimilating, and they will lack legal status on top of it.


Finally, there's the humanitarian question. Migrant families show up needing medical attention that we aren't well-prepared to provide. We'd be much better positioned to tend to the migrants under our care if the numbers weren't overwhelming.

But we are at a stalemate. The New York Times editorialized the other day that Trump declared "that there's a crisis at the border, contrary to all evidence." Then, the paper ran a news story headlined, "Border at 'Breaking Point' as More than 76,000 Migrants Cross in a Month."

Both of those pieces can't be right. There's manufacturing a crisis, then there's ignoring one for fear of conceding anything to Trump.


I imagine the popular counter



#### Kale Soup

2 T Olive oil

1 small yellow onion – chopped (about 1-1/2 C chopped

1 T freshly minced garlic

1 bunch Kale - rinsed, large stems removed and coarsely chopped

1 (32 ounce) container veg-

1 (28 ounce) can diced tomatoes (undrained)

(15.5)ounce) cans cannellini beans (undrained)

4 carrots peeled and sliced (about 2 cups)

3 russet potatoes, peeled and sliced into bite sized chunks (about 4 cups)

1 T Italian seasoning Salt and pepper to taste

Heat olive oil over medium high heat in a 6-quart Dutch oven or soup pot. Add onion and garlic and cook for 2 minutes, or until onions are soft, stirring constantly. Add kale and cook for an additional 2 minutes, stirring constantly. Add vegetable broth, diced tomatoes, cannellini beans, carrots, potatoes and Italian seasoning. Bring to a gentle boil then reduce heat to maintain simmer. Cover and cook for 25-30 minutes or until vegetables are tender. Season to taste with

<u>Kate's Shelf:</u> Year One by Nora Roberts


I've never read a Nora Roberts book before this one because she's always seemed to write books that fit either the romance genre or the romantic suspense genres and I am not at all driven to read those. When I read the description of this book of hers though, I was intrigued. *Year One* is a dark fantasy that defies her usual tropes in books and managed to completely draw me into its storyline right from the start.

Year One follows three main groups of people as they continue fighting to live after a brutal disease suddenly obliterates the majority of the population. As this sickness spreads throughout the world, a select few are waking up to find that they have magical abilities that have arisen within them and are now considered "uncanny." Among the Uncanny there are those that strive for darkness and destruction and others that are light and want to further the human race beyond this catastrophic disaster. The abilities manifesting are anywhere from recognizing when someone will die to literally growing wings that allow you to fly — and its causing quite the uproar among the survivors that do not have abilities. Groups of standard humans have taken to roving the streets and basically hunting the Uncanny in an attempt to cull their population and ensure that they remain part of the world as they know it.

Overall this book is quite intriguing and a great variant among Nora Roberts' prolific bibliography. I highly recommend it and its sequel *Of Blood and Bone* which is already out.

Jerrica's Shelf: Night Circus by Erin Morgenstern

This book comes highly acclaimed from most of my reading groups and I was always hesitant to pick it up for some reason. Now



Night Circus revolves around two dueling magicians who both have their own respective careers as illusionists. One is rather silly and goofy about it all, reveling in his ability to fool people into thinking his magic tricks are just sleight of hand instead of the truth: That he can actually do magic. The other takes it all much more seriously, choosing to spend his time studying and perfecting his abilities rather than showing off to unassuming people who don't know any better. Both performers have entered into an agreement that they will take a ward and train them. These wards will then have a chance to compete to see who the better magician overall is — by proxy. Obviously, whoever is able to train the better ward is the better magician, right?

I'm loving this book and my sleep schedule is definitely not happy with me over it, but I have no regrets with this one. If you're interested in magical realism, this is absolutely something I recommend to you.

Thank You Marie Kondo (Part II)

Thrift stores are experiencing a rise in donations as people discard things that no longer "spark joy." There are more photos of organized sock drawers on Instagram than ever before. The U.S. has caught the "tidying" bug thanks to Marie Kondo.

There's much Marie and I agree on when it comes to organizing, or as she calls it "tidying up." Perhaps the most important being that "Tidying is just a tool, not the final destination." We all desire homes that promote a peaceful and productive environment. A home in which we can rest, enjoy the com-

pany of others and easily access our belongings.

Many people think if they just get the right containers, shelving or more storage space, their clutter problem will be solved. However, reducing to what you need, use and

love will dramatically decrease your storage needs. In *Thanks Marie Kondo* (*Part 1*), I shared about the Mindset for Change and Action #1 – Purging. That's always the place to start. In this article I'll share the KonMari (Marie Kondo) and OBC (Organized by Choice) methods for Action #2 – Storing.

The principle element of Action #2 is **CREATE A HOME FOR EVERY-THING.** 

KonMari method: "I have only two rules," says Marie, "store all items of the same type in the same place and don't scatter storage space. Forget about flow planning and frequency of use." Her book, *The Life-Changing Magic of Tidying Up*, was originally released in Japan. In it she says, "Considering the average size of a Japanese dwelling, a storage layout that follows

the flow plan is not going to make that much difference. If it only takes 20 seconds to walk from one end of your home to the other, do you really need to worry about the flow plan?"

OBC method:

Keep like things together with some exceptions. Exceptions include things you use frequently in multiple areas of your home — scissors, reading glasses, cleaning products, pens, etc. It's more convenient and you're more apt to put these things away if there's a designated home for them where they're used. Store the majority of your belongings, "like" things, together. That way, when you need a light bulb, vase, battery, etc. you're sure to find it on your first try because there's only one place to look.

Keep close what you use most. This is the "flow plan" that Marie deems unnecessary. In her book she proposes daily drying and placing the soap and shampoo from the shower back in their home with other soaps in the cupboard. Call me lazy, but the home for the shampoo and soap I'm currently using is in the shower. I'm an advocate of placing a holder near the

stove for frequently used utensils and having hooks near the door for coats, purses and backpacks. In other words, create homes for things where they fit with the flow of how and where they're used.

KonMari method: "Once they [clients] finish my course, all of them, without exception, have told me, 'Folding is fun!'" Really? Wow. Marie promotes folding almost everything, but not just for the fun of it. Everything is folded so it can stand on end and is stored vertically in drawers or bins. "By neatly folding your clothes," she says, "you can solve almost every problem related to storage."

1 tsp. baking soda

Preheat oven to 350.

Dry ingredients:

1/4 C plus 2 T sugar (pure cane sugar)

½ C oats

1 tsp. baking soda

½ tsp. baking powder

1 ½ C flour

½ tsp. ground cinnamon

In large mixing bowl, mix all wet ingredients together. Add dry ingredients, mixing well. Pour into loaf pan and bake in preheated oven about 50 minutes.

We received confirmation this past week the amendment has been drafted and it will include the time extension and is ready for signature, which is great news. Also, in this past week, we received the reimbursement check for the 2018 4th quarter applicants and

the rebate checks will be going out ASAP. We know it took it a little longer than expected to get the check from the state, so we truly appreciate everyone's patience.

As a reminder to those in the 93636-zip code, an incentive to the grant is you will get \$350 back for purchasing a new Energy Star, High Efficiency washing machine or dishwashing machine, or \$700 for both. Go to SEMCU's web page at www.semcu.org for an application form.

#### Dry Well Info

For the Dry Well Recharge Project, we are still working hard toward a \$1M Prop. 1 Department of Water Resources Grant. While preparing for the application process and going through the budget, we were able to calculate that

IM DE MERA Owner/CEO we would be able to drill more than 200 of the 3 ft. wide by 75 ft. deep dry wells. throughout Madera. With this project, the dry wells will provide benefit during and after rain events or when there is surface water available, generally whenever there is rain from November to April each year. The long-term testing of our wells resulted in over 40-acre feet of water, per one well, recharged in just 19 days of operation. That can provide for a family that uses 200 gallons a day enough water for 23 years. These dry wells are FREE to qualified people and we will look to drill once we're awarded the grant. We anticipate beginning next summer when the ground is less wet. Information can be picked up at the Golden Valley Chamber of Commerce or by calling Verlaine at 559-363-9095.


# **Kiwanis Cross the River Run Coming**

#### Being an Enabler

Hello 93636,

A common misperception I deal with on a daily basis is the perception a vehicle emissions repair and a smog check can be completed on the same day. If the emission failure has illuminated the Malfunction Indicator Lamp (MIL), commonly known as the "Check Engine Light," the likelihood both can be completed in the same day is very low.

There is also the misperception the MIL can be activated by engine failures like low oil pressure or overheating. The MIL is an emissions light ONLY and is ONLY illuminated when tailpipe emissions exceed 1 1/2 times the allowable standard. WARNING: If the MIL is flashing, STOP and turn the engine off. A flashing MIL indicates the presence of a catalyst-damaging emission failure. An expensive catalytic converter failure can occur in less than one mile of driving. STOP and get the vehicle towed.

Now, standing between a successful emissions repair and a successful smog check is a complicated maze of verification testing know as an OBDII drive cycle. Without a successful OBDII drive cycle, a vehicle will fail its smog inspection even if the MIL is off.

What is an OBDII drive cycle? An OBDII drive cycle is a special pattern of driving that enables all OBDII readiness monitors to run and complete during a single driving event.

What is an OBDII readiness monitor? A readiness monitor is an "On Board" self-evaluation test(s) designed to quickly and accurately evaluate the state of health of an emissions system or component. A modern vehicle can have up to 11 readiness monitors or one per emission systems.

There are two types of OBDII readiness monitors: Continuous and non-continuous. Continuous monitors constantly run and test when the engine is running. They monitor misfires, fuel trim and the comprehensive components. If a failure occurs with a continuous monitor, the MIL will immediately illuminate.

A non-continuous monitor runs only once per trip. For several systems that translates to only once per day. Non-continuous systems include the catalytic converter, oxygen sensor, oxygen sensor heater, evaporative emissions, air injection

and exhaust recirculation. If a failure occurs with a non-continues monitored system, the MIL will be illuminated with the second failure. If a readiness monitor fails, there is a possibility other readiness monitors will be suspended.

Let's say an oxygen sensor fails its monitor. The catalytic converter and Air Injection Systems (AIS) monitors will be suspended as a result. The reason for that is oxygen sensor data is used in the catalytic converter and AIS evaluation calculation. False oxygen sensor data will adversely affect those calculations. When the oxygen sensor failure is successfully repaired the catalytic converter and AIS monitors will be unblocked.

If the catalytic converter and/or AIS are faulty, we won't know that until their monitors are unblocked and complete. That's why I don't like to return a vehicle immediately after an emissions repair. I like to conduct an OBDII drive cycle until ALL monitors pass. I don't like surprises.

After an emission repair is completed and prior to the OBDII drive cycle, the trouble code(s) are cleared and the MIL is turned off. This process also clears all previous readiness monitor test results. Without a successful drive cycle, the vehicle will fail its smog inspection even if the MIL is off. Now we have to start all

over

WARNING: Whenever the vehicle's battery is disconnected or replaced, the OBDII test results are also cleared. It's my suggestion you wait at least one week before you attempt a smog inspection. Hopefully you will drive in a sufficient number of different driving patterns and the vehicle's readiness monitors will be completed.

An OBDII drive cycle is designed to complete all readiness monitors during a single drive. During a drive cycle, the vehicle is driven in a variety of unique driving patterns designed to enable all readiness monitors to complete. Enabling criteria includes engine speed, engine load, throttle position, engine coolant temperature at start up and during testing, and elapsed time since startup. Enabling criteria algorithms can be complex or simple. I've seen as many as six sub-tests per monitor, depending on the emissions system being tested.

A simple example of enabling criteria can be found with the Air Injection System. A typical catalytic converter is inefficient until light-off occurs between 400-600 degrees F. From an emission standpoint, it is important the converter reach light-off as soon as possible since most vehicle emissions occur at start and warm up.

During engine warm up the AIS pumps fresh air into the exhaust to light-off the converter and catalyze the vehicle's emissions. It's the same

principle as fanning a fire. The obvious enabling criteria for AIS testing is a cold, idling engine.

During a California smog inspection, the vehicle is connected to the state's data base so the vehicle can report its readiness monitor's status and verify the correctness of emissions repair(s). In California, 1996-2000 model year vehicles must complete and pass all OBDII monitors with the exception of any one. For model years 2000 and newer, all monitors must complete and pass except the EVAP System.


The moral of the story is when your vehicle's smog inspection is due and your MIL is illuminated, don't wait until the last minute to start. Here's where the extra time comes into play. Depending on how long the MIL has been illuminated, it might take some time to sort through the maze of testing, repair and on-board verification tests. There is no legal way to speed up or alter that process.



quent winter storms immediately following the Camp Fire, along with favorable weather patterns, a high level of cooperation by Valley residents with the Check Before You Burn Program and the use of much cleaner wood, pellet and natural gas devices, had a positive impact on air quality.

Funding is still available to help Valley residents reduce their contribution to particulate pollution by upgrading from an openhearth fireplace or older wood stove to a cleaner device using the District's Burn Cleaner incentive program. This program provides funding toward the purchase of a cleaner wood/pellet insert, freestanding stove or natural gas insert. To apply, visit valleyair.org/burncleaner.

Additionally, residents can register their clean burning devices to take advantage of the "No Burning Unless Registered" days by visiting valleyair.org/ CBYBregistration.



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
