Just before midnight on Saturday, May 14, Madera Sheriff's Deputies were dispatched to the area of Avenue 12 and Road 28 1/4 in regard to a victim with a gunshot wound. The California Highway Patrol had originally taken the call as a vehicle accident but when CHP Officers arrived they discovered a male near the vehicle with a gunshot wound. Madera Sheriff's Detectives were

called out and the initial investigation revealed that three men were driving on Avenue 12 and at some point they got into an argument. It was then that the rear passenger pulled out a weapon and shot the front passenger. The driver and the shooting suspect then began struggling, causing the driver to lose control of the vehicle and crash into a tree. The shooting victim got out of the car and fell to the ground, the driver and suspect fled the scene on foot.

Detectives were able to locate and interview the driver. The victim is in a Fresno hospital in critical and unstable condition. The suspect is still at large and the investigation is on-going.

Since Mr. Parr is so interested in facts, here are a few: CSEA does NOT have a "me too" clause in their contract, however every time GVTA negotiates a salary increase solely for teachers, CSEA, as well as administration, get the increase. GVTA has the weight of CSEA and administration on their coat tails. If GVTA truly had the strength Mr. Parr accredits us, we would receive a COLA and a raise every year!

There was an attempt to keep this brief and pointed. Remember, with all that is required of a teacher, a teacher in GVUSD only makes about \$10 an hour! That's less than the current minimum wage.

Let us all be reminded of the recent events of this district and the costly amounts of money that were involved. This is a small district that is working hard to make this a great academic school district for the community families and their children. By continually vilifying the teachers makes no sense. As Mr. Parr mentioned, in business there are costs and the teachers are a precious resource that is a cost that must be considered as first and foremost in both good and bad budget years.

Your Choice is "None"

I don't know if you're aware of it or not, but California is a one-party state. The governor is a Democrat, the lieutenant governor is a Democrat, the attorney general is a Democrat, the state assembly is controlled by a majority of Democrats as is the state senate. 



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Mind Over Matter

How hard is it for you to focus on one thing at a time? Technically, our brains can't think about two things at once, but the speed at which we switch from one thing to another can make it feel simultaneous. When this happens something often gets overlooked while we move on to the next thing.

While searching the internet for information on mindfulness I came across a site that claimed mindfulness could alleviate pain. That triggered thoughts of my tendonitis and the fact that my elbow brace order from Amazon was overdue. Soon I had switched over to "track my order." Squirrel!

Anyway, back to mindfulness ... today I'm not referring to practices of yoga or meditation, but simply paying attention, on purpose, in the present moment. You might be wondering what that has to do with organizing, or your mind may have wandered off to another topic completely, in either case, we're going to look at four ways that being mindful can help create a more peaceful and productive environment.

Arriving Home - You walk in the door thinking about what you're going to have for dinner, what the PG&E bill is going to be since you left the air conditioning on again, and how to weasel out of attending an evening meeting. You're not mindful of the stuff you hauled in from the car and mailbox and how it's now landing in various places around the kitchen and living room.

By paying attention, on purpose, in the present moment, you can alleviate the piles of clutter created in this mindless state. As you pull into the garage and gather your things, consciously think about where you're going to put them. Choose to stay focused until they get there. Now you can move on with your evening without having a disaster waiting for you at the end of the day.

Shopping – Oh look, that's cute! It's on sale! One-click ordering! It's easy, it's seductive, and it can contribute to your clutter when you're not shopping mindfully. Pay attention to what's driving your desire. Is it shopping therapy after a rough week? Is it keeping up with your peers? Rather than mindlessly ordering online, or coming home with something that will get crammed into an already full closet, mindfully ask: Is it something I need, can afford and have space for in the present moment? Shopping while tired or hungry can impair your mindfulness whether at the grocery store, mall, or at your com-

Transitioning - When you finish a project or are leaving one thing to do another, what is the state of the area you're leaving? You've finished wrapping the gift, but is the wrap, scissors and tape put away? Being mindful means you're paying attention to the present moment, not moving on until you've put things into place. It's one of those valuable Kindergarten rules that keeps us from having overwhelming messes to come back to. One mindful tactic is to walk backwards out of the room or office. It may feel silly, but it will help you to be conscious of having things in their place before leaving.

Veggie BBQ Anyone?

If you haven't yet, it is certainly time to get the barbecue out and get it going. You don't have to have one of the big fancy \$1,000 gas jobs – a kettle that uses charcoal briquettes will do as well. When I lived in an apartment, I had a hibachi that used charcoal and cooked what I wanted to cook or, if I had a guest, it would grill two steaks perfectly.

Do you only cook hamburgers, hot dogs and an occasional steak on your barbecue? How about corn on the cob, potatoes and just about any other vegetable from the garden or a farmers market?

When cooking corn on the cob, it can be cooked by cleaning it and putting it on the grill. That way you would have a little "crisp" on the corn. If you want to avoid the crisp, then grill it with the husks on.

Do not take burgers, hot dogs and an octhe husks off yet. Lay the corn into a clean sink and fill with enough cold water to about any other vegetable cover all your corn. Let the corn soak for at least 30 minutes.

Pull back remaining husks from cob, but do not remove from end of corn. Remove as much of the silk as possible.

Season the cob as you like. Melted butter, salt and pepper, or you can add whatever herb or seasoning your family likes. Those can be garlic powder, rosemary, oregano, or even dill. Since the corn is cold, the melted butter may not stay melted when you brush it on but don't worry because when the corn is grilled the butter will melt.

After the corn is seasoned the way you want it, pull the remaining husks back on the cob, covering the cob completely. Using one of the previously discarded husks, tie the end of the corn so that while grilling the husks will stay on the cob.

Cook on medium to medium high heat for 10 or 15 minutes. Pull back the



husks that are covering the corn and serve. You can serve with additional

If you purchase the corn without husks, you can wrap it in aluminum foil for the same effect.

One last thing: If you want the corn to be hot when you serve dinner, be sure that the corn is the last thing you cook.

or four outer layers of husks, but be the potato that you have brushed with oil. Brush the potatoes with oil, salt and pepper and seasoning or herbs of choice. You can use sliced red onions, green onions, bacon pieces (cooked), chopped bell pepper or just about anything that you would want on a potato except cheese because the cheese might burn while grilling. Seal the bundles tight and place on a medium hot grill. These packages should cook in 20 to 30 minutes. When you take these off the grill, poke a little hole in the foil with the tip of a paring knife to let some of the steam out. Be real careful opening these packages as the steam is extremely hot.

- 3 bell peppers (red or green) seeded and halved
 - 3 yellow squash**
 - 3 zucchini**
 - 3 Japanese eggplant**
 - 12 cremini mushrooms

1 pound asparagus, trimmed

12 green onions, roots cut off and trimmed

> 1/4 C plus 2 T olive oil Salt and Pepper

3 T balsamic vinegar

2 garlic cloves, minced

1 tsp. chopped parsley leaves

1 tsp. chopped fresh basil leaves

½ tsp. finely chopped fresh rosemary leaves

** Sliced lengthwise into ½ inch thick rectangles.

Prepare the barbecue to medium high heat. Place the vegetables on a baking pan and brush them with the 1/4 C olive oil and salt and pepper. Working in batches, grill the vegetables until tender and lightly charred all over – about 8-10 minutes for the bell peppers, 7 minutes for the yellow squash, zucchini, eggplant, and mushrooms, and 4 minutes for

the asparagus and green onions. Arrange the grilled vegetable on a platter. The key to getting the grill marks is don't move them very much once they've been put on the grill.

While the vegetables cook, mix the remaining 2 T oil, balsamic vinegar, garlic and herbs in a small bowl. Blend with whisk, adding salt and pepper to taste. Drizzle this mixture over the vegetables.

I was going to do fruits and vegetables in this article, but space has just about gotten away from me so I will have to do grilled fruit some other time. I never thought of grilling fruit, but I have found some great ideas. Next month the fruit should be ready to be picked.

satisfaction because they do not see me as a customer.

They control the mail, they control the routes, and they control delivery times. Even though we pay shipping fees and our taxes pay their salaries, we are simply pigs in the pen waiting for the farmer to fill the trough. They are not invested in our happiness because it has zero effect on their jobs or their bottom line. For four days I waited for my package to be freed from the confines of its tiny, metal cage. The mail carriers came and went leaving me piles upon piles of unwanted flyers, inserts and junk mail but not once did anyone resolve my situation, regardless of how many times I

I was hung up on at least three times as I tried to resolve the issue, both by the local distribution center and by the main USPS call center. I physically went in to speak to a manager, waited in an hour long line and was told the supervisor wasn't in and to call back

the next day. Call back? What good will that do when you either won't answer the phone or hang up on me when you do? Why was this allowed to happen? Because the post office is a government agency run by government employees with no real desire to serve the public and who cannot be fired.

Business 101: When you run the risk of losing money because customers are going elsewhere to get better service you ensure that your employees are providing excellent service. Since the USPS is not a business it has no reason to adopt such a policy. Though I finally got my package I still have not heard back from the local supervisor regarding their appalling service nor has anyone reached out to me after registering a complaint with the main line. It's easy to ignore someone knowing they have no recourse against you.

The post office is nothing more than the DMV with stamps and masking tape, and like the DMV it should be eliminated or privatized. That's right, DMV, I'm coming for you next.







Golden Valley Saves Ranchos Taxpayers Millions

The Golden Valley Unified School District closed the sale on April 26 of refunding bonds that will save local taxpayers more than \$4.3 million. Dale Scott & Company served as the financial advisor to help the district refund the bonds and take advantage of lower interest rates without lengthening the payback period.

"We appreciate the support of voters who turned out to authorize this critical funding for our students," said Brian Freeman, president of the GVUSD Board of Trustees. "We have been actively

took action when presented with favorable conditions to provide savings to local taxpayers."

GVUSD refunded \$16.6 million of current interest bonds, resulting in total savings of \$4,352,602. The refunding comprised general obligation bonds approved by voters in 1999 (Measure G) and 2006 (Measure S).

"Everyone in our community has a role to play in preparing our students for the 21st century economy," said Andrew Alvarado, GVUSD superintendent. "It is only right that we manage our finances

monitoring the interest rate market and responsibly, which is why we have taken this opportunity to return savings to taxpayers."

> The interest rate of the new bonds is significantly lower than the old bonds, down to an average of 3.22 percent from 4.80 percent.

> "The district's refunding came at an ideal time to take advantage of long-term rates, which are near historic lows," said Dale Scott, president of Dale Scott & Company. "By waiting until market conditions improved, the district put itself in a position of being able to maximize taxpayer savings."

Adult Ed Classes Offered this Fall

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
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Diagnosing the RIGHT Way

Hello 93636,

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the many who visited my Flatlanders Celebration booth and for the many encouraging and supportive comments received concerning this column. It's nice to know writing this column is not a labor in vain. I actually wondered at times if anyone even reads the article, given so little feedback. Now I know. Thanks again for your kind words of support.

If you were one of the many visitors who stopped by my booth and watched a diagnostic demonstration, you have a general idea of scope waveform analysis. ALL those humps, bumps, dips and

squiggly lines displayed on a grid represent changes (electricity, pressure, temperature, etc.) over time in real time. Scope diagnostic has significant advantages over former diagnostic test methods in that the tests are per-

formed LIVE during operating conditions. To increase the odds for a successful diagnostic, it's important to test under identical conditions in which the failure occurs. If the problem only occurs when the engine is not running and everybody is resting under the shade of the closed hood, then by all means go ahead and go old school. Take the components off one by one and test them on a work bench. If not, the tests should be performed when the engine is running and the components are hot, tired and stressed. Dynamic testing for dynamic failures I always say.

Let's use electronic fuel injector testing as an example. With today's engines, the odds that you can even see a fuel injector, let alone the one you want to test, are low. Many fuel injectors live under or inside the intake manifold. If you remove the intake manifold and all the garbage attached just to gain access to test, you are going to be at it for a while so don't forget your lunch. When you finally do reach the injector, you

won't be able to start and run the engine. You will be limited to static testing. Good luck with that. Oh, don't forget: You are going to need a new set of intake manifold gaskets, minimal.

With a Lab Scope, the fuel injector component testing is done at the fuel injector fuse. We replace the fuel injector fuse with a loop of copper wire. By the way, my wire loop is fused to protect the circuit. Using this diagnostic method, EVERY fuel injector is tested and ALL at the same time. Now, before the electrons can complete their journey from the battery to the fuel injectors they must first pass through my wire loop. Whenever electrons flow, they produce an electromotive force called current. Current is measure in amps. The greater the flow the greater the current. I simply place a low current amp probe around my wire loop and measure. I also measure the available voltage at either end of my wire loop. Using two channels of my Lab Scope, I display all current and voltage values in parade fashion (two squig-

gly lines) during running conditions. The last thing I need to do before I start testing is look up the fuel injector resistance value specification.

The only thing I remove was one fuse so I can start and run the engine.

Now comes the math: Ohms Law. Resistance = Voltage divided by Current. For example, if my injector resistance specification is 2 ohms, and my available voltage is 14 volts (remember the engine will be running) the current HAS TO BE 7 amps. I know what my waveforms should look like before I even start testing. If I see a current value different then 7 amps, my resistance is NOT 2 ohms. If the current (amperage) is higher, the resistance has to be less than 2 ohms. This condition typically indicates a short across the coil winding or a short to ground. The resistance is lower because the electrons take a short cut and do not pass through the entire injector winding (resistance). If the current is lower, the resistance has to be higher. This condition typically indicates an open or gap in the circuit making it more difficult for the electrons to pass.

A typical electronic fuel injector current waveform looks similar to the

outline of a dorsal fin of a shark. The leading edge of the waveform gradually curves into a horizontal position as it reaches its max height. It's not a straight slanted line, like a motorcycle ramp; it's rounded. That leading edge represents the building up (ramping) of an electromotive force (magnetism). When the magnetism is strong enough to overcome the fuel pressure, a metal pintle inside the fuel injector is lifted off its seat allowing fuel to pass into the cylinder. This fuel injector opening event is displayed as a dip and then a flattening out of the leading edge ramp. That dip should be located about 2/3 of the way up the ramp. The dip in the waveform not only indicates the injector opened, but when it opened. Too early would create a rich condition. Too late

would create a lean condition.

Finally, the trailing edge of the waveform should be a vertical line. This represents the powertrain control module (PCM) de-energizing the fuel injector and stopping fuel flow. This needs to happen rapidly. If the trailing edge is slanted or rounded, the PCM driver is too slow to turn off the fuel injector and the precise quantity of fuel entering the cylinders is incorrect.

In conclusion, old school automotive diagnostics need to go the way of the Dodo Bird. It's too slow, too inaccurate and too labor intensive. I know when you hear the words diagnostic technology they sound expensive. That is very true if you are the one purchasing the technology. If you are the customer it represents fewer parts being replaced and a higher quality repair.

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Madera County District Attorney Implements "Veterans Court"

Madera County District Attorney, David A. Linn announced on May 16 that Phase I of his offices' Veteran's Court Plan will be offered at the Caring Veterans of America, Inc., Veterans Stand Down, which will be held at the Sierra Pines Church, located at 40855 Covey Court, off of Highway 49 in Oakhurst. The Veteran's Stand Down begins at 9 a.m. on Saturday, May 21 and will go until 2 p.m.

The Stand Down will include not only the first Phase of the Veterans Court, free medical examinations for Veterans and consultations with Veterans Administration personnel, both from the VA Hospital in Fresno and Madera County Veterans Affairs Office.

Caring Veterans of America, Inc., will be the coordinating organization of the Veterans Court of Eastern Madera County, and VFW Post 1981 will help coordinate Veterans Court in Madera at future events.

The purpose of the Veterans Court is to help Veterans clean up their prior criminal record and help them with any

current legal criminal problems they have in Court today. The Veterans Court, which was a promise made to Veterans by District Attorney Linn in his 2014 campaign, will include a cooperative effort between the District Attorney's Office, the Public Defender's Office and the Madera Superior Court. Specifically, Presiding Judge Ernest J. LiCalsi and Judge Dale Blea will be holding Veterans Court in Madera two days per month.

In recent meetings with the Veterans Administration, the Madera program has been declared as "far ahead of many other Counties that are attempting to help Veterans."

DA Linn's new program of working with Veterans who find themselves afoul of the law will work with each Veteran to help benefit them, even if their problem is in a different jurisdiction.

DA Linn is a Navy Vietnam Veteran and said that he understands that bad things do happen to good people, and that good men and women occasionally make poor decisions.

New Boat Registration Locations

2016 Bass Lake Boat Registration Stickers Available at Lake Area Businesses

The 2016 boat registration stickers for Bass Lake are not being sold at the Sheriff's "Island" Office this year, they are now available for purchase at three new locations. Bass Lake Water Sports, Millers Landing Resort, and the Forks Resort are currently selling registration stickers. The Sheriff's "Island" office is not issuing the stickers this year and no boats will be registered by Sheriff's personnel as had been done in the past.

Sheriff Varney said that "this new procedure will be more convenient for the boating public and will also save tax-payer funds since Sheriff's personnel will no longer be needed to issue the registration stickers."

The registration sticker fees vary based on type of vessel and are available for purchase now: Vessels up to 35 horsepower are \$32; 36-250 horsepower are \$50; 251 horsepower or higher are \$63; and Personal Water Craft are \$50. Registration stickers are required year-round for any vessels op-

erated on Bass Lake.

Sheriff Varney is also pleased to announce that Deputy Amy Roussell will be assigned to oversee the Bass Lake Patrol Operation this year. Deputy Roussell had worked patrol assignments on Bass Lake during four summer boating seasons previously; this year she will be coordinating enforcement efforts on the lake as well as in the surrounding areas of the Bass Lake basin.

Dear Editor:

"NIMBY" (Not In MY Back Yard) is the acronym quickly taught to all new Supervisors and Planning Professionals as the broad brush often, but not always, used to dismiss valid community concerns which do not fit their agendas. Issues of possibly dangerous, incompatible, intrusive and unsustainable development are thus summarily dismissed by name calling. "NIMBY" - I heard it a lot during my three years as District One Planning Commissioner

But March 25th was the first time I was ever called one. To my inquiry concerning the inadvisability of locating a proposed OHV (Off Road Vehicle) Park at historic Black Hawk Mountain, one of the "Gang of Five" said: "Actually green sticker money is a CA thing. And this has nothing to do with TP or any tax issues. THIS is a 'not in my backyard' issue. Just like the Casino on 99, 'farmers using up all the water.' Need to stand up on fact base issue and not try all the tricks in the trades to change the minds. Just say, 'not in my back yard,' I respect and understand [their] mind set."

Yep, there it was, the "NIMBY" name calling which substitutes for thoughtful discourse when the controlling party cannot muster the facts to support their argument. From what I have seen, there has been no official public notification or input on this major project; its location or purchase by Madera County; no adjacent property owners were notified; and there is yet to be an appraisal of the property which may be grossly overpriced for the area and so far no available environmental report. Perhaps most importantly, there is no business plan. Heck, even the failed Grizzly Stadium and Granite Park projects in Fresno had business plans.

While there are many others whose concerns for Black Hawk Mountain are in the areas of Native American heritage, environmental, school safety, fire and security, my personal position is regarding the financial inadvisability.

Madera County spending temporary (state grant) money on getting into what may be a significant permanent taxpayer expense (without a business plan?) is financially irresponsible. I do find it curious that none of the counties surrounding Madera have any interest in accepting this "opportunity" from the state. Maybe they have a business plan model to guide them?

I know what a NIMBY is and, alas Mr. Supervisor, I do not qualify. I have had an adjacent neighbor's private motorcycle track "in our back yard" for over a decade without incident or complaint. When one resorts to name calling, one has already lost the argument.

Public servants should at least try to be both forthright and forthcoming.
