


When Madera Community Hospital filed for bankruptcy and closed in January of this year, many thought that was the end. But many Madera County officials knew there was something else on the horizon. For the hospital to remain as a viable option for another medical group to possibly acquire it and begin providing services again, it was crucial that Madera Community Hospital retain its licensing and certification fees to the state of California. Without current licensing, any potential suitor for the hospital would have to start at "square one," possibly incurring an entirely new and different – and perhaps more costly – set of needs and demands compared to what are already in place.

"The bottom line is that if it's going to reopen as an acutecare hospital, that licensing is very important, and I think it would be a reasonable commitment on behalf of the County to pay for that licensing," Madera County Administrative Officer Jay Varney said at the May 9 Board of Supervisors' meeting.

The hospital's license is currently in suspense and set to expire on May 26, but California hospital regulatory officials have shown a degree of flexibility to allow Madera County the ability to find an option to reopen. After Varney's admonition,

one week later on May 16 the Supervisors unanimously approved \$100,000 in federal COVID-19 recovery funds to cover license renewal costs for the hospital. Varney said that the vote will allow Madera County to set aside \$100,000 in American Rescue Plan Act – COVID-19 – money until the state finally makes a formal request for the license fee.

The California Department of Public Health said that licensing and certification fees for a general acute-care hospital are \$828 per licensed bed, giving Madera Community Hospital's 106 beds a bill for \$87,768 just for license renewal.

Interestingly, the day before, Governor Gavin Newsom signed the Distressed Hospital Loan Program. This legislation provides interest-free loans for public and non-profit hospitals in the same boat that Madera Community found itself. It is structured to prevent local hospitals from closing, or to help closed hospitals to reopen. It does this by making up to \$150 million available from the state's general fund for a loan program that will be available through the end of 2031.

After voting to spend \$100,000 to pay state licensing fees, the Board then decided to hire a consulting company to look at potential options for resurrecting the hospital. The Board opted to go with Force 10 Partners, LLC – but at a price. At the time of the agreement the contract had no set amount, but was estimated to be somewhere between \$400,000 and \$440,000.

The Distressed Hospital Loan Program, or AB 112, was created specifically "... to provide zero-interest cash flow loans to nonprofit or public hospitals experiencing extreme financial distress." It is intended that the loans will help struggling hospitals stay open or recently closed hospitals to open again.

"This new program will help hospitals in extreme financial distress get the assistance they need as quickly as possible," said Governor Newsom.

The legislation was the result of collective work between the Governor's Office, California Health and Human Services Agency and the Department of Health Care Access and Information. Cumulatively they worked with the California Health Facilities Financing Authority and the California Legislature to develop the program.

"Hateful" Activity? Snitch on Neighbors



Here's another example of leftists being authoritarian under the guise of trying to protect marginalized groups. California has rolled out a program ostensibly designed to stop hate crimes and other acts of bigotry.

How?

By creating a hotline allowing residents to snitch on one another for engaging in "hateful" activity.

The program, which is called "California vs Hate," is "a non-emergency hate incident and hate crime reporting system to support individuals and communities targeted for hate," according to its website. The state legislature provided funding to its Civil Rights Department to establish the initiative. This program is intended to support victims of hate by giving them "options for next steps after an act of hate," "connect people targeted for hate with culturally competent resources and care coordination services," and "improve hate incident and crime reporting data to enhance prevention and response."



On its "Frequently Asked Questions" page, the program defines a "hate incident" as "a hostile expression or action that may be motivated by bias against another person's actual or perceived identity." Examples of a hate incident can include: "derogatory name calling, bullying, hate mail and refusing service." Readers are encouraged to report these incidents by phone through a hotline or from its website. The group claims it "is not run by the police" and that it does not send any information to law enforcement without the person's consent. The program will "identify civil legal options that don't involve the criminal legal system, both through the Civil Rights Department and other agencies."

After a caller reports a hate incident, they are "connected with a professional trained in culturally competent communication and trauma-informed practices," who will make sure they provide access to resources including "legal, financial, mental health and mediation services."

Ranchos Man Going to Trial for Sex Trafficking

A Ranchos man first reported on in the August 2020 issue of the Ranchos Independent on suspicion of sex trafficking, is finally going to trial. A Madera County judge has determined there is enough evidence for Dylan Dobbs to stand trial.

According to the article at the time, Dylan Colby Nichols Dobbs, who was then 27, was arrested in Madera County by the Madera County Sheriff's Office on July 29, 2020 and was held on \$1,025,000 bail for charges of human trafficking, possession of ammunition by a prohibited person, financial elder abuse, grand theft and probation violations.

At the time, it was alleged that Dobbs abused and coerced a 22-year-old woman for the purposes of sex trafficking, as well as potentially other women and girls as far away as the San Francisco area and Las Vegas. Detectives believed Dobbs arranged his contact with potential victims

through social media.

At that time, the Sheriff's Office said

that Dobbs had a history of offenses involving weapons, domestic violence and drugs.

At the pre-trial hearing, Madera County Deputy District Attorney Spenser Wagner presented the evidence against Dobbs while Dobbs was represented by Defense Attorney Martin Taleisnik.

Arresting Madera County Deputy Sheriffs were interviewed about the events of that day three years ago. The officers related items that were found in the suspect's car, including, "... several cell phones and tablets ... [and] a loaded magazine with nine live rounds." One Deputy testified that "... there was marijuana as well as what appeared to be wax."

The judge ultimately ruled there was enough evidence for the case to go to trial and Dobbs remains in custody. The judge determined that Dobbs will be back in court on June 2, 2023, to set a date for the trial.

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

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

People should be threatened by this administration, but -- with a few ex-


lyptic "Dark Brandon" speech prior to the midterms -- they don't feel threatened by Biden himself. Or they fear his incompetence more than anything else.

Biden's age is an asset in taking the edge off his left-wing governance, yet the effects of it are obvious for everyone to see. At 80, he makes the elder statesmen of yore seem youthful by comparison. Golda Meir became prime minister of Israel at 70. Ronald Reagan was elected president at 69. The longserving French legend Charles de Gaulle retired permanently at 79.

If the reaction to Joe Biden isn't a vociferous rejection, it is still an emphatic, "No, thanks." According to the new NBC News poll, more than half of Democrats and 70% Americans don't want him to run for reelection. 
Look at the Animals!

All in all, it was a pretty interesting trip to the zoo. You learn a lot observing animals; you even learn from observing those in the cages.



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
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Handling "Sneaky" Clutter

The supposed aim of the hotline is the "stop the normalization of hate in our communities and ensure impacted individuals get the help they need." To some, this type of program might sound wonderful at first glance. But there are some serious issues with this. For starters, whether one believes in the idea of "hate crimes" or not, if someone witnesses an act of violence against someone else, would it not make more sense to call law enforcement directly instead of going through some government-funded program? If something like this happens, chances are the witness or victim isn't thinking about calling a hotline, right?

So, it seems to make more sense that this website is more about "hate incidents" involving bullying or the use of derogatory names. In essence, California's government is encouraging its residents to report people who use disgusting rhetoric against others based on immutable characteristics. Of course, any decent person detests bigotry in all its forms.

But the notion that we should be filing reports with the government seems rather Orwellian, doesn't it? It is the same type of behavior that other states encouraged during the COVID-19 pandemic when people were calling hotlines to snitch on their neighbors for not complying with the onerous restrictions their governments imposed.

There are several other problems with this program. For starters, the hotline system relies on individuals reporting "hate incidents" or acts of bigotry, which can be subjective and open to interpretation. This leaves room for potential misuse and false reporting, as people may exploit the system to settle personal grievances or silence

those with differing opinions.

The lack of clear criteria and guidelines for identifying and verifying hate incidents could lead to a chilling effect on free speech and the expression of unpopular views. Also, considering the fact that folks on the hard left view any utterance with which they disagree as bigoted makes this even more problematic.

Secondly, the program's emphasis on bypassing law enforcement and offering civil legal options raises concerns about due process and accountability. By encouraging individuals to seek alternatives to the criminal legal system, the program could undermine the principles of fair and impartial justice. It may result in a lack of proper investigation and legal protection for both the accused and the alleged victims, potentially leading to unjust outcomes.

Lastly, the program's broad definition of a hate incident, including actions such as name-calling and refusal of service, raises questions about the proportionality of the response. While such behaviors may be undesirable, categorizing them as hate incidents and potentially subjecting individuals to legal or social consequences could be seen as an overreach of governmental authority, especially if these incidents end up in the hands of law enforcement. This approach risks stifling open dialogue and debate, as individuals may fear retribution for expressing controversial or unpopular opinions.

This is the type of program that could easily be taken to a dark place despite its supposedly noble intentions. It could be weaponized to "crack down on speech" and intimidate people into censoring themselves. This outcome wouldn't exactly be surprising in the People's Republic of California, would it?

2023 Precipitation and Climate Update

This year we had abundant precipitation statewide through Jan. 31 at 18.17 inches. This is 147 percent of the average for this time period. A significant weather pattern change arrived with the winter solstice with the blocking high pressure moving south and a stronger jet stream pushing a series of warm storms into California. A series of nine atmospheric rivers impacted California with heavy precipitation and strong winds. In a three-week span from Dec. 25, 2022 to Jan. 15, 2023, 11.18 inches of precipitation fell over California, which is 46 percent of a total water year. While precipitation was statewide, the major sum was in the center between San Francisco Bay and Santa Barbara.

Statewide reservoir storage at the end of January was 97 percent of average. Snowpack at the end of January, based on the automated snow sensors, reported approximately 206 percent of average snowpack for this time of year and 129 percent of a full seasonal snowpack expected on or around April 1. This is one of the strongest starts to a snowpack in the last 40 years.

In 2014, California voters approved \$2.7 billion for dam expansions that were supposed to create 2.8-million-acre feet of additional storage capacity. Construction was due to start this year after slow-footed state representatives' reaction to the program execution. During the Jan. 9 storm alone, public works en-

gineers estimated 55,000 acre-feet of water went into the Pacific Ocean from Los Angeles (18 billion gallons).

Over 340 projects have been proposed by communities in California, while the state itself has a goal of expanding average groundwater recharge by at least 500,000 acre-feet each year.

In January of this year, state agencies opened a fast-track groundwater recharge pilot project to capture flood waters for underground storage. The data to submit an application is through the California Board of Water Resources, in which grants/applications can be submitted through the local General Services Administration.

One other option that was suggested is a permeable pavement, or a surface that allows runoff to pass through pavement and into underlying stone beds and soil. San Francisco has already started building some roads with this type of pavement. Hopefully this will be the beginning of a new era.


Riverstone Carjacking, Wild Ride

A man working out of his AT&T van was carjacked at the Riverstone shopping area at Avenue 12 and Highway 41 just before 1 p.m. on Tuesday, May 9. The carjacker, later identified as 42-year-old Marcus Banksbey of Sacramento, brandished what turned out to be an airsoft pistol and a scuffle ensued, followed by Banksbey spraying the victim with pepper spray.

Banksbey then took the vehicle and drove to Fresno and Nees where he attempted to rob a Central Valley Community Bank, after he phoned in a false claim of a "man with a gun" at Bullard High as a diversion. Banksbey was ultimately captured less than five miles from the bank.

In a bizarre turn of events, background on Banksbey revealed that he served in the California Army National Guard as an information systems operator/analyst from 2000 to 2012 and as a command/unit chaplain from 2012 to 2019, attaining the rank of captain. He deployed to Jordan from November 2017 to April 2018, a National Guard spokesperson said.

media that is out to get him but is incredibly sympathetic and accommodating.

Biden broke with tradition by not holding a press conference while on his trip to Ireland. He's done 54 interviews so far in his first two years, according to The New York Times, the fewest since Ronald Reagan. He has averaged 10 news conferences a year, whereas Calvin Coolidge -- you know, "Silent Cal" - did about 90 annually during his first two years in office.

The standard isn't very high, though, when you are a default can-

didate. That's how Biden won against Donald Trump in 2020; it's how he avoided a midterm drubbing in 2022; and it's how he hopes to win again against Trump, should he be the nominee, in 2024.

Biden has built on the old adage, "Never interfere with an enemy when he's destroying himself." His version is basically, "Never bother going out in public when your enemy is destroying himself."

The lesson of the last couple of

years is that Biden doesn't have to be scintillating, impressive, or inspiring. Heck, he doesn't even have to be popular. He simply has to be there. To paraphrase Woody Allen, 90% of getting elected for Joe Biden is just showing up.

His campaign could be barely evident and still succeed.






GO FIGURE! by Linda Thistle
