### Sgt. Moncada Memorial Placed

In a service that was both moving and historic, Madera County has placed a pair of memorial markers on Road 37

between Avenues 12 and 13 in the memory of Sgt. Raul Moncada, a Ranchos resident who was killed in action in Iraq in 2009. It is the first time that Madera County has so designated a roadway that is not a state or federal high-



way. Road 37 was selected because it is the street Sgt. Moncada grew up on and his family still lives there.

On Thursday, Nov. 17 at 11 a.m., a large crowd of dignitaries, veterans, news media and thankful citizens showed up to pay their respects and witness the unveiling of the road marker by Moncada's daughter, Priscila. A luncheon reception was held immediately following at the offices of the Golden Valley Chamber of Commerce. Pictures of the event can be found on page 14.

### Medicinal Marijuana in Madera:It's Already Here

As the Obama administration and U.S. Attorneys in California outline their plans to shut down Medicinal Marijuana Cooperatives in California, the Madera County Board of Supervisors are working locally to create a new ordinance to regulate outdoor cultivation of Medicinal Marijuana. This new ordinance should be in place by March of 2012.

David Rogers, Madera County Supervisor in District 2 summarized the issues law enforcement is dealing with in his request to the Board of Supervisors. "There have been numerous complaints from constituents regarding the outdoor cultivation of Medicinal Marijuana. Law enforcement agencies have also had problems with these operations. The open cultivation has drawn a criminal element such as thefts and attempted thefts of marijuana into the neighborhoods where marijuana is grown. This has become a threat to the general population. Reports of theft in and around the marijuana cultivation operations have come from various law enforcement agencies in Madera, as well as in counties statewide. Tulare County has had three shootings, two of which were homicides. Madera County has also seen shootings at marijuana grow sites. Several counties have already adopted ordinances regulating marijuana cultivation. This is an attempt to protect the rights of legitimate medical marijuana users and the welfare and safety of the majority of Madera County constituents.'

The smell of marijuana has been so prevalent in some neighborhoods this fall that you only need to walk or drive down the street to be overwhelmed by the pungent, sweet, skunky smell. Many people with allergies or asthma can have severe reactions to the smell of budding plants. Marijuana often grows to be 10-12 feet tall, so if you don't smell them you will often see the plants towering over back yard fences. Whether it's legal or not, growing 30-50 plants in your back yard is never a great idea; it not only exposes you to an increased risk from thieves but also home invasions. It's certainly the worst kept secret in the neighborhood. If you're worried about a situation in your neighborhood, call the Sheriff's Office to file a complaint. If you know that the home is a rental, please let them know that as well. They will investigate to determine whether or not the grower has a medical marijuana identification card or not, and whether they are in compliance with county ordinances and regulations.

Many times the county's hands have been tied because until now there have been

no ordinances in place specifically prohibiting the crop. Individuals who spend the time tending a crop are often times growing marijuana for themselves as well as for others whom they've been designated as the primary caregiver. Sheriff Anderson expects that a new ordinance regarding outdoor cultivation will be in place by March of next year.

Marijuana has been approved by California, as well as many other states and the nation's capital, to treat a range of illnesses, but in a decision announced recently the federal government ruled that it has no accepted medical use and should remain classified as a highly dangerous drug like heroin. The decision comes almost nine years after medical marijuana supporters asked the government to reclassify cannabis to take into account a growing body of worldwide research that

shows its effectiveness in treating certain diseases, such as glaucoma and multiple sclerosis. Although California was the first state to decriminalize marijuana for medical use in 1996, it remains a federal crime to possess or sell it.

The National Organization for the Reform of Marijuana Laws (NORML) is a nonprofit, public-interest lobby that has provided a voice for those Americans who oppose marijuana prohibition for more than 30 years. Their literature states they represent the interests of the tens of millions of Americans who smoke marijuana responsibly and believe the recreational and medicinal use of marijuana should no longer be a crime. NORML estimates there are currently between 750,000 and 1,125,000 medical marijuana patients in California. While at the same time the Criminal Justice Statistics Center reported a moderate decline in marijuana arrests in 2010.

How did this all get so confusing?

On Jan. 1, 2004, Senate Bill 420 became law, enacting the Medical Marijuana Program Act (MMP). The intent was to clarify Proposition 215 by stipulating how patients who could not grow their own cannabis should obtain it. The MMP permits a primary caregiver to be paid a "reasonable compensation" for services provided to a qualified patient "to enable that person to use marijuana." The MMP also states that a patient may cultivate up to six mature plants or possess up to half a pound of processed cannabis per person for medical purposes.

On Nov. 5, 1996, the people of California passed Proposition 215 titled "The Compassionate Use Act of 1996." This was passed to decriminalize the cultivation and use of cannabis by seriously ill individuals under a physician's recommendation when deemed appropriate. The physician must determine that their patient's health would benefit from the use of cannabis. This was meant to ensure that patients and their primary caregivers are not subject to criminal prosecution.

Supervisor Frank Bigelow, District 1 explains, "While California residents voted to allow the use of medicinal marijuana, the California law is not well defined. It is still illegal at the federal level and is a federal offense. Each county must determine what they will and will not allow in their county and control this with zoning ordinances and regulations. If there is ever any direct contradictions between state law and federal law, federal law prevails." Madera County Sheriff John Anderson puts it simply: "Businesses must have a business license and Madera County does not issue business licenses to medical marijuana dispensaries."

Amazingly, there is a local Medical Marijuana Dispensary here in the Ranchos. Sheriff Anderson and his department are very aware of it saying, "We've shut this particular location down repeatedly." The New Image Health Center - known just last month as California Medicinal Cooperative, Inc. - is located on Highway 41 just South of Avenue 15 in a small industrial park. There is a free-standing sign in the parking lot listing this location in Madera and another in Friant, however the Friant location was reportedly closed down several months ago by the Fresno County Sheriff's Department. The only thing identifying the Ranchos location from Highway 41 is a large yellow happy face banner hanging on the chain link

#### fence.

If it's up then they're open for business. The New Image Health Center's website says, "By joining our collective, you are not only a patient of New Image Health Center, you are becoming a part of a greater movement in history for the Central Valley as we initiate the transformation of negative feelings and counterproductive ideas towards medical cannabis into understanding and healing. We welcome our patients to take responsibility as positive ambassadors for medical cannabis and encourage them to combat the hindering attitudes we have been facing for nearly seventy years due to cannabis prohibition." Its products include "Super Banana Og Kush, Kryptonite or Bubba Kush," just part of the 28 "flavors" that are listed on their website's menu.

Calls to New Image Health Center for comment on this story were not returned. The person answering the phone refused to provide the owner's name.

As a presidential candidate, Barack Obama said the federal government should not raid medical marijuana users and caregivers. Three months after Obama was inaugurated, his attorney general announced that it would be the administration's official policy. Earlier this year, however, the Obama Justice Department released a memo declaring that it may prosecute large-scale medical marijuana cultivation operations and dispensaries, defined as growers that deal with 1,000 plants a year, even in states where they are operating in compliance with state laws. Federal prosecutors are now threatening to shut down medical marijuana dispensaries throughout the state. They've sent letters to warn landlords to stop sales of marijuana within 45 days or face the possibility that their property will be seized and they will be sent to prison. Because the warning letters have just now been sent, and no actual properties have been seized, it's unclear exactly what effect the Obama administration's latest assault on medical marijuana will have throughout the state. According to a recent Washington Post article, ever since the announced crackdown, the feds have been targeting dispensaries, not underground cultivation networks like the ones run by the

### Europe's Humiliation


One hundred and fifty years ago, no one could mistake the relative power of Europe and China. When the British defeated the Chinese in the First Opium War, they imposed an indemnity, took Hong Kong and forced open more Chinese ports to British merchants. They demanded extraterritoriality for British citizens, exempting them from Chinese law. Other Western powers extracted similar privileges.

When this wasn't enough, the British launched the Second Opium War after the Chinese seized a ship flying the British flag and refused to apologize. The French joined in, and the two together captured Beijing, and burned the emperor's summer palaces for good measure.

The Chinese refer to the period from the middle of the 19th century to the middle of the 20th as "the century of shame." Now, the shame is all on their former tormentors as the Europeans beg the Chinese to help bail them out from their debt crisis.

The Europeans share a misbegotten single currency that is amplifying the inherent problems attendant to the practice of spending money that you don't have. Perhaps the Greek crisis can be contained, but what if Spain and Italy spin out of control? Europe is trying to fund a "bazooka" big enough to fend off doubtful markets, but doesn't want to -- and perhaps can't -- fund it all by itself. Germany is Europe's economic powerhouse, yet its public debt-to-GDP ratio is already larger than ours.

This is where China and its \$3.2 trillion in foreign reserves come in. If China were to contribute to a bailout fund that Europe wants to build up to \$1.4 trillion, it would surely ask for concessions in return, like the Europeans dropping their criticism of China's undervalued currency. China also might wonder why it should come to the



rescue of a European Union that still has it under an arms embargo. History comes full circle, with the ascendant Chinese in a position to extract concessions from erstwhile colonial powers.

So far, though, Beijing is not showing any eagerness to jump into the European bailout business. While it wants a robust European export market, China might be doing the math and realizing that Europe has a problem too big for serial bailouts. The official Xinhua News Agency ran a piece explaining, "Amid such an unprecedented crisis in Europe, China can neither take up the role as a savior to the Europeans, nor provide a 'cure' for the European malaise."

This reversal in fortunes was a long time in coming. Nothing could have stopped the Chinese from adopting more rational, market-friendly policies a few decades ago, and it has proven immune to appeals to allow its currency to appreciate so its exports don't have such an advantage. What Europe could control was its own destiny. It chose a comfortable, if bankrupting, social democracy and a vast experiment with a single currency. The euro was supposed to be the vehicle and symbol of Europe as a world power, and instead is laying bare its debt-addled decay.

For the United States, listing in a similar direction, the turnabout in Europe's global position should be of the utmost interest -- as a cautionary tale.

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


As President of the Golden Valley Chamber of Commerce I got to say a few words at the ceremony and I'd like to share them with you here.

My name is Randy Bailey. I'm the president of the Golden Valley Chamber of Commerce here in the Ranchos and I want to thank you for coming today and would like to share a few thoughts about Sgt. Moncada with you.

There are some in our country today, some in very high places, that would have you believe that Sgt. Moncada died in vain. That he gave his life for nothing. That he was in the wrong war in the wrong place at the wrong time.

Those people are wrong.

Sgt. Moncada understood that we don't live in a vacuum. That actions



taken in one place have consequences somewhere else, often thousands of miles away. Sgt. Moncada knew that plans hatched in caves in the Middle East could result in planes flying into the World Trade Center, killing 3,000 of his countrymen, half way around the world. And Sgt. Moncada understood that the minds responsible for creating such death and destruction were actively spreading their gospel of terror throughout the Middle East. He understood that we could fight them there, or most assuredly we would one day have to fight them here.

The freedoms that we enjoy as Americans, like being able to gather on an autumn morning to pay tribute to a fallen hero, come at a cost. Sgt. Moncada understood that if his actions thousands of miles away stopped just one person from being able to one day bring destruction to the Madera Ranchos, destroying Sgt. Moncada's home, his family, his friends and neighbors, then it would all be worth it. What he grasped was that if that same person got through, ANYWHERE, the destruction he would bring would be to SOMEONE'S home, to SOMEONE'S family, and to SOME-ONE'S friends and neighbors, just like in New York on September 11.

The world is a dangerous place. Thankfully we have people like Sgt. Moncada willing to stand on that front line, ready to give the ultimate sacrifice without hesitation or equivocation. Ready to say, "You'll be safe tonight. I'll see to that."

The Madera Ranchos is a better place for having people like Sgt. Moncada, and it's a little emptier with him gone. But what he stood for and what he believed in should make us all swell with pride. He is the embodiment of our American spirit. He didn't ask what his country could do for him; he asked what he could do for his country.

And then he did it.

On behalf of the Golden Valley Chamber of Commerce and a grateful nation, we thank you Sgt. Moncada for your service. God bless you, God bless your family, and God bless the United States of America.

When we were young my two sisters and I couldn't wait until the Christmas catalogs arrived from Sears and Roebuck or Montgomery Ward. The first half of each catalog was household items, clothing and such but the back half was toys! They were grouped into boy's and girl's toys. We would sit on the couch, each with a different colored crayon and start at the first page of the girls toys and mark on each page the items we wanted. Of course we never got what we wanted, but we always had a good Christmas. In "those days" we didn't have Target, K-Mart or Wal-Mart. We had the dime store, and sometimes the hardware store and drug store would put in a row of toys.

1 Pkg. Yel-1 Stick But-

8 oz. Cream

1 Box (1 Lb.) Powdered Sugar

1 tsp. Vanilla 1 C Crushed or Chopped Nuts

Preheat oven to 350 Mix cake mix, butter, 1 egg to-

gether and pour into a greased and floured 9 x 13 pan. Beat together cream cheese and powdered sugar (reserve enough powdered sugar to sprinkle on top). Add 2 eggs and vanilla and mix. Pour over cake mixture.

Bake 30 minutes or until tan. After it is cool, sprinkle nuts and reserved powdered sugar on top. Cut into bars.





In custody are Shawn Williams, 27, of Fresno; Benjamin Wallace, 30, also from Fresno; and James "Jimmy" Hale, 28, of Madera.

Thanks to an aware citizen last month, three men are behind bars following a tip phoned in about suspicious activity in the Madera Ranchos. In custody are James Hale, 28, of Madera; Shawn Williams, 27, of Fresno; and 30-year-old Benjamin Wallace, also from Fresno.


The 911 call came into the Madera County Sheriff's Department before noon describing suspicious activity in the Rolling Hills area on Avenue 11, just west of Highway 41. What was reported to the 911 operator was that a vehicle with three men inside appeared to be casing homes on the block, having driven at least four times through the neighborhood. Deputy Ian Roth responded to the call and found the vehicle parked at a gas station on Highway 41 and with help from Deputy Toinie Jackson quickly detained all three without incident.

Two of the suspects were wanted in Fresno and the third was found to be in possession of heroin. Fresno resident Shawn Williams was wanted in Fresno on a \$160,000 warrant for burglary. Fresno resident Benjamin Williams, who told deputies his name was Payton Ely, was also wanted in Fresno on a felony no-bail drug warrant and a \$10,000 drug warrant. Madera resident James Hale, or

"Jimmy" as he is known, was the driver of the vehicle and was found to be in possession of heroin.

All three were transported to Madera County Department of Corrections where Williams was booked on the burglary warrant as well as on suspicion of conspiracy to commit burglary. Wallace was booked on the two warrants as well as suspicion of conspiracy to commit burglary and identity theft and Hale was booked on suspicion of conspiracy to commit burglary, possession of burglary tools and drug charges.

The case remains open because deputies believe others may be involved.

item is really needed. Usually two to three sets of sheets per bed is adequate. In order to make it easier to distinguish between sizes and sets, consider using a specific color sheet set for each bed. Fold the

pillow cases and fitted sheet into the flat sheet, or store the set inside one of the pillow cases.

The number of towel sets per person will depend on how often you replace with clean ones, and how often you do laundry. Just make sure there are enough per person to hold you over until the next laundry load is clean. If there's space in the bathroom consider moving them there so that they're closer to where they're used. When placing them on the shelf, put the folded side out so they're easier to grab and look neater. Shelf dividers (available online from Amazon.com) will keep the towels and sheets from becoming a jumbled mess.

You can also label the edge of the shelves so that it's clear to all who use them where to find and replace items.

For seasonal items like beach/pool towels and throw blankets place the offseason items in an underbed bag or vacuum-sealed bag on a high shelf. Keep the in-season items on an accessible shelf. Switch them when the season changes.

Here's a great idea from www.getorganizednow.com: If you store a supply of spare toiletries and paper goods, consider placing a labeled sticky note on the last one in the row. When it's used, the person who removes it from the closet is responsible to place the sticky note on the grocery list or some other designated place. That way you'll never run out of a product!



Chocolate Crackle Cookies

- 1 C Semi-Sweet Chocolate Chips 1 C Brown Sugar Packed
- 1/3 C Salad Oil
- 2 Eggs
- 1 T Vanilla
- 1 C All-Purpose Flour
- 1 tsp. Baking Powder
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> tsp. Salt
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> C Chopped Nuts (Optional)
- Powdered Sugar
- Preheat oven to 350

Melt chocolate in microwaveable bowl. In a mixing bowl combine the chocolate with the sugar and oil, mixing well. Add eggs, one at a time into the cooled chocolate mixture, beating well. Stir in vanilla. In a separate bowl mix all the dry ingredients; add to chocolate mixture (add nuts if using) and beat well until blended together. 30 minutes.

Drop teaspoons of chilled dough in powdered sugar, rolling to coat and place on slightly greased cookie sheet about an inch apart. Bake for 10 to 12 minutes.

One of Randy's favorite cookies is a coconut macaroon. **Coconut Macaroons** 

14 oz. Sweetened Shredded Coconut

- 1 Can Sweetened Condensed Milk 1 tsp. Vanilla
- 2 Large Egg Whites at Room Temperature
  - <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> tsp. Salt
    - Preheat oven to 325

Combine the coconut, condensed milk and vanilla in a large bowl – set aside. Whip the egg whites and salt with an electric mixer in a large bowl. Beat at high speed until egg whites make medium-firm peaks. Carefully fold the egg whites into the coconut mixture - DO NOT BEAT.

Drop the batter onto sheet pans lined with parchment paper using a small ice cream scoop or two teaspoons. Bake for 30 to 35 minutes or until golden brown.

Cool and serve.


"They were a perfect group of girls," Gorman said. "The chemistry on this team couldn't be more perfect."



Mexican cartels, as well as landlords who are being threatened with property seizure if they rent or lease to a medicinal marijuana dispensary. The stepped-up enforcement appears to be a major escalation in the Obama administration's bid to rein in the explosive spread of medical marijuana outlets that was accelerated by the announcement that federal prosecutors would not target people using medical marijuana in states that allow it.

Many think the feds are surprised at how much land, especially in northern California, is being used for marijuana growing, and they realize they can start seizing these properties and turn it into federal land. Federal forfeiture can take two or three years before it goes to court, but meanwhile you lose all your property. The latest letters have baffled the state's medical marijuana activists, who believe the president has broken his word. "Obama says, 'Yes.' The conservatives say, 'No.' So they get together and huddle and they settle on 'no," said William G. Panzer, an Oakland lawyer who helped draft the state's medical marijuana initiative. "The Obama administration has been incredibly disappointing on this issue. It's just the latest evidence that despite early signs from the Obama administration that it wasn't going to interfere with the right of states to allow the medical use of marijuana, nothing could be further from the truth. By going after landowners, they can grab a bunch of land, make a bunch of money, and save face politically by saying, 'Hey, we're not going after sick patients or arresting little old ladies - we're going after rich landlords."

California's top law enforcement official Attorney General Kamala Harris stated that while, "An overly broad federal enforcement campaign will make it more difficult for legitimate patients to access physician-recommended medicine in California ambiguities in the law must be resolved either by the state Legislature or the courts."
