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## Professional Basketball in the Ranchos? Believe it!

Basketball fans and sports enthusiasts in the Madera Ranchos will be excited to hear that the Ranchos is now home to a professional sports team. The new local basketball team, the American Basketball Association (ABA) California HeatWave, will be facing off against the Central Valley Titans on Saturday, Nov. 30 at Liberty High School at 6 p.m.

The California HeatWave is a member of the ABA, an association of semi-professional minor league teams throughout the United States. According to ABA CEO Joe Newman, the HeatWave is the ABA's oldest team with nine seasons under its belt. The ABA has its roots in an older league by the same name that eventually merged with the NBA in 1976. The current ABA was founded in 1999 and has no official affiliation with its older predecessor. Several familiar NBA teams such as the Denver Nuggets, the Indiana Pacers and the San Antonio Spurs were once a part of the older ABA until the two leagues merged. The California HeatWave will compete in the ABA's Southern and Northern California divisions.

The California HeatWave was acquired by Reggie Davis and Greg Chambers in 2004 while it was still based in Fresno. The team moved to Sacramento, where it enjoyed moderate success in the basketball-enthusiastic city, but they never completely won the city's support, presumably due to the already popular and well-established NBA Sacramento Kings. The move was finalized earlier this year, along with the decision to change their name from the Sacramento HeatWave to the California HeatWave. Their first season in Madera will begin this month and extend into next March.

Several other locations were also considered for the team's new home but according to Davis, the decision to move to the Madera Ranchos was partially motivated by the proximity of the Ranchos to surrounding cities such as Madera, Chowchilla, Fresno and Merced. This means a greater pool of potential players as well as fans. "We're in a good place for a community to support a minor league," he said. When asked why the Ranchos, Davis said, "Why not the Ranchos?"

A longtime resident of the Central Valley and a graduate of Fresno State University where he was heavily involved in sports, Reggie Davis describes the California HeatWave as "a community sports team" and explains that this means closer connection to the community than a major team. "We try to get involved with things that support the community," Davis said. An important goal of the team is to support the local community. According to its website, www.heatwavelive .com, the HeatWave seeks to serve the entire region with high quality basketball and entertainment, along with spreading the message of living a healthy lifestyle through community support "... for the issues that plague our society."

It remains to be seen whether this move will pay off. The lifeblood of any team, as Davis explained, is sponsorship. He hopes that local sponsors will emerge from the community and surrounding communities. While they have yet to find sponsors in the area, Davis said, "We are working on a short timeline to

## **Community Tree Lighting Axed**

The annual lighting of the community Christmas tree at Maywood Center has been cancelled this year by the Golden Valley Chamber of Commerce. The reason given was lack of community participation.

At the monthly Chamber meeting held Wednesday, Nov. 13, the decision was made to not hold the event this year and see if there was interest next year.

At the heart of the issue is the reason behind the Christmas tree lighting. Since its inception, the Chamber of Commerce has used the event to gather items for veterans at the V A Hospital in Fresno. Every year, the Chamber has put paper stars on the tree. Community members are invited to take a star and by so doing "adopt" a veteran, agreeing to put together a small care package consisting of T-shirts, warm socks, a toothbrush, paperback books and a lap blanket. Last year, so few community members bothered to get involved that the sparse donations were barely adequate for a handful of veterans, prompting two Chamber members, not wanting to disappoint the hospital-bound veterans, to dig

into their own pockets.

The V A Hospital in Fresno houses hundreds of veterans. Sadly, many are at a stage in their lives where family and friends no longer visit, making the holidays a painful time for them. Chamber members who have taken the care packages to the hospital in the past unanimously speak of the tearful gratitude awaiting them for such a small offering. These men and women have become America's forgotten warriors and, up until last year, had always received a little something from the Ranchos.

The discussion at the Chamber meeting stressed that there was no interest in pulling the plug on the tree lighting permanently, but since the purpose of it was about the community getting an opportunity to, in a small way, say "thank you" to our sick and dying veterans, the ultimate decision would have to rest with the community.

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## Letters

#### Dear Editor:

High Speed Rail (HSR) was a good idea. I do not oppose the idea of a useful High Speed Rail system. What I do vehemently oppose is the utterly arrogant and disrespectful manner in which the High Speed Rail Authority (HSRA) has shoved it down our collective throats. I oppose the "bait and switch" tactics, the criminal and unconstitutional disregard for property owners, agriculture, the environment, the voters and the taxpayers of our county and state. I am disgusted with the financial deceit and morally bankrupt non-elected individuals who have been placed in charge of our destiny. I am saddened over the irreparable pending effects on our farmland and rural communities such as Chowchilla and Fairmead.

Governor Brown and Washington D.C. are insisting that the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) is too restrictive and should be set aside for HSR but not for the development and delivery of more (new) water to Madera County and California. The California High Speed Rail Authority filed a brief with the 3rd District Court of Appeal in Sacramento claiming that federal environmental laws typically considered less stringent than the California Environmental Quality Act supersede state regulations. Therefore, we are told to swallow that High Speed Rail is much more important than our environment or collecting and storing the water which will create thousands of real jobs and billions in economic benefits.

I would like to ask the local wonks who are still so loudly promoting the much talked about, but never pinpointed, jobs issue to step up and personally guarantee that there will be 1,500 high-paying, permanent HSR jobs which will all go to Madera County residents. "Put up or shut up," as my Grandfather was fond of saying to the posers.

Awarding construction contracts to a poorly rated company which just happens to have ties to a sitting Senator because they were able to tender a low bid, knowing full well that they traditionally collect much more in cost overruns? What have they not learned by the Bay Bridge fiasco? They must know better than we commoners. After all, we elected them.

Ironically, whatever good there may have been in the original HSR idea has been morphed and marginalized by elitist and socially inept bureaucrats. I have heard it sometimes referred to as "criminal stupidity."

In 2008 the voters approved a \$10 billion HSR Bond against a \$40 billion total estimated projected cost. So much for another promise made to voters deciding whether to award the project \$9.95 billion in initial bond funding. That soon ballooned to nearly \$100 million and was "pared down" to today's favorite underestimate of \$68 billion by making compromises to their stated performance goals and promises. Some recent revised estimates have run as high as \$200 billion and the state hasn't yet secured all of the additional funds needed. The voters were told it would meet the highest environmental standards; that it would cost \$43 billion; that the ticket to go from San Francisco to Los Angeles would cost \$55 and the trip would take no more than two hours and 40 minutes.

Quentin Kopp chaired the state Senate transportation committee for years and co-wrote legislation that launched the bullet-train project. He later served as board chairman of the state agency overseeing construction of the system. In a recent legal declaration, he filed a civil suit seeking to halt the project. Kopp, a retired judge, said the project as now planned violates the law. "They have just mangled this project. They distorted it. We don't get a high-speed rail system. It is the great train robbery," Kopp said.

The HSR project is no longer anything like what Californians approved and

## Just Stop It

There are a lot of hot topics out there in the news these days. All of the stuff about Obamacare, or the shortcomings of the kickoff of Obamacare, leads the list. Iran, Afghanistan, NSA spying on our allies, Benghazi, using the I.R.S. as a political tool ... the list goes on and on. When I used to pick my daughters up from Liberty High, I would park where I could watch the stop sign before entering the roundabout. If 50 cars came up to that sign, two might stop. On my street in the Bonnadelle Ranchos we ought to change the writing on the stop signs to read "roll." That is, when they slow down enough to actually just roll.

What I don't get is when you go to Fresno and you pull up to the intersection of Blackstone and Herndon and the light is red, why don't you just roll on through the intersection? What's the difference?

The answer is, "nothing."

A cop stops a lawyer who has just rolled through a stop sign. The lawyer believes he can fast talk his way out of the ticket by making the point to the cop that there is essentially no difference between "stopping" and "slowing down."

"I know the law," the lawyer says. "There is no meaningful, definable difference between safely slowing down upon entering an intersection and coming to a complete stop for an intersection. I defy you to show me a difference."

The cop asks the lawyer to exit his car. Once he does he takes out his nightstick and begins beating the lawyer with it. Above the blows the cop calls out, "Do you want me to stop or just slow down?"

Stop means stop. And it means stop for all of us. When you pull up to a Ranchos stop sign, note that weightless feeling when your body is no longer travelling forward ... Eureka!

1 T butter <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> C chopped onion

2 C water

The 28 years of experience I bring to the table will allow the Madera Sheriff's Department to be well prepared for future gangrelated crime and have a leader in place that not only will talk about gang violence but a leader who will enact plans to deal with gang violence and prevent gang violence.

We live in a County with fantastic talent and terrific opportunities to improve our quality of life. This can be accomplished by increasing volunteerism and making sure information related to current crime trends are communicated to you. I will accomplish this by making sure current crime trends are available to you through internet access and open up Preventative Crime Prevention techniques through computers and mobile devices.

I announced my intent to run for this Office in December of 2012. I specifi-

cally chose to announce early for one reason: I felt it was critical to get to know as many of you as possible and spend my time learning what is important to you and the communities you live in. Since this announcement, I have spent time in Oakhurst, North Fork, South Fork, Chowchilla, Madera, Madera Ranchos, Coarsegold, Rolling Hills and Raymond. One question that continues to come up is my stance on the 2nd Amendment right and your right to carry concealed weapons. should, at the very least, be brought back to the voters in its current bloated and divisive form for reconsideration. How many voters would have approved the initial HSR bond issue if they knew that it would trigger the Governor's 10 cent-per-gallon gasoline tax and the stripping of surface water storage language out of the water bond to help pay for it? It is the mid and lower income families which are now being penalized by higher fuel costs and lack of employment to finance an aging politician's attempt at a legacy to equal that of his late father, a former Governor.

We must also be reminded of the lessons of the recent threatened BART strike. The voters will have no say as to whether or when the train will run or not run. Depend on that.

Recently, Sacramento effectively influenced the 3 to 2 decision by our own Madera County Board of Supervisors to abrogate their solemn promise to participate in the Farm Bureau's lawsuit against the HSR. That kind of flip-flop almost assures that those responsible will not be doing as much future business based upon their word or their handshake.

The federal stimulus grants are scheduled to run dry in 2017. Which of our local social, educational and safety programs will we have cut in order to pay for the continued expense of a train which will likely not stop in Madera nor make it over the Grapevine?

Jim Patterson, member, California Legislature Assembly District 23 states, "Proposition 1A promised existing rail routes would be used, prime AG land would be spared, average speeds would be 250+ mph and at least a third of the capital and operating expenses would come from private investment. None of those promises to the people have been kept by the High Speed Rail Authority. That is why thoughtful people ought to oppose this mess, rethink and re-vote on this entire proposition. Even Judge Quentin Kopp, one of the founding members of the High Speed Rail Authority, agrees. There is still time for cooler heads to prevail. We all want more jobs and a better economy, but this is not the way to do it."

We are told that we must swallow it or be forced to choke on it. I, and more than a few other clear-thinking folks, prefer to chew on it for a while, at least until we can wash it down with some new water.

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## **Food Services Meal Price Update**

With limited funds available for educational programs and career technical education, providing a contribution from the general operating fund to the cafeteria fund to supplement insufficient food revenues further affects the district's ability to provide additional program offerings. For more than five years; however, the cafeteria fund has not collected enough revenues to support the district's food services operations requiring a contribution from the general fund. During the 2011/2012 school year the contribution peaked at \$70,146 (see chart below):

staff has closely reviewed all operational

costs, including food and staffing and have

ensured that the food services department

is running efficiently. Much of the increase

in expenses is attributed to new, stricter

state and federal nutritional requirements and rising fuel and food costs. The district has not raised prices in more than 10 years and meal prices have fallen behind the expense increases.

To support the needs of the food services department, keep up with expenses and provide more financial resources for educational needs, the governing board of GVUSD has voted to raise meal prices by 50 cents for breakfast and 75 cents for lunch. The new prices are comparable to neighboring districts at \$1.75 for breakfast and \$3 for lunch. The meal prices of neighboring districts are shown in the chart below:

Since Saturday, Nov. 16, the Ranchos has had its very own public auction house and every Saturday in the future will have over 1,000 items auctioned without reserve — meaning everything must go. Prices range from \$1 on up and items being auctioned consist of anything you can think of — with the exception of animals.

"We had over 100 people show up," said owner Amanda Florez about their first auction on that Saturday earlier in the month. Public Auction R Us, located on the frontage road for Highway 41 at Avenue 11, felt

it was a success despite being advertised only on Craigslist and by word-ofmouth. She said unusual items auctioned that first week included a rifle from the 1600s and an old slot

plained the auc-

tion starts at 10:30 a.m. and goes until everything is sold. People can survey the auction items from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Fridays and starting at 9 a.m. on Saturday morning. The auctioneer, Rick, who comes from the Bay Area, has over 30 years experience auctioning items from \$1 up to \$1.2 million dollars, which can be the case with high-end cars. "Rick didn't take a break from 10:30 when we started until around 5 p.m. when everything was sold," Florez said.

When asked why she decided to open the public auction house, Florez said she saw a need in the Fresno-Madera area. She also wanted to do something big, offer a place for consignment and be a part of the new auctioning fad. She mentioned she is planning to have Dan Dotson, from the A&E network reality T.V. show Storage Wars, conduct the auction in one of the next few weeks, adding that there would be a big announcement when the date was confirmed.

Florez explained that Public Auction

R Us obtains many of its items from stores like Costco, Sam's Club, Home Depot and Wal-Mart as well as the U.S. Government, and said that people can bring in any item, in any condition, that they would like to sell. Items need to be at the auction house by 9 a.m. on Monday for auction that Saturday.

For those wanting to sell an item, Florez explained that when you bring it in it will be inventoried and you'll get a receipt. Then, after your item sells, you will receive a check within a few days for 75 percent of the auction price. Additionally, Public Auction R Us will buy any item on the spot, if you prefer. And, for estate sales, they will come and pick everything up and bring it to the auction house for you.

Florez said she was surprised to see

how excited everybody was at the first auction. "People were getting lots of bargains and having a lot of fun," she said.

bid number when you arrive which includes a sheet to write down the inventory numbers of the items you're interested in, what they sell for, and which ones you've bought. And if you want to stay all day, there is a food truck with tri-tip sandwiches available.

Florez said she could guarantee there will be at least 1,000 items auctioned every Saturday because she keeps extra inventory. And she mentioned that in upcoming weeks she will have lots of toys and over 200 artificial Christmas trees with LED lights for auction.

Florez is a former San Francisco 49er cheerleader as well as former ballet, jazz and hip-hop dance teacher. Originally from Fowler, she is currently attending Fresno State University working on a business degree.

## **Sheriff Shares Staying Safe Strategies**

The biggest shopping day of the year is fast approaching, so Sheriff John Anderson is asking citizens, "Are you doing your part to protect your family and your property?"

It's not even Thanksgiving and already Madera County has encountered a number of burglaries and car break-ins. With that in mind, Sheriff Anderson is releasing his annual list of safety tips, titled, "If I were a thief, you would now be a victim," and urges all citizens to take the Safety Check Test that he says should be followed year-round.

*Protecting your vehicles and valuables:*Don't leave your car unlocked even if you will be gone for just a few minutes.

• Don't leave purchased items in plain

view. Instead, store them in the trunk of your vehicle.

Don't leave your vehicle unlocked when gassing up. It takes a second for thief to jump in while you're focused on the pump.
Don't leave your car unlocked while driving. Thieves can easily open a door while you wait at a stoplight.

## Protecting you and your valuables when shopping:

• Don't place your purse in your shopping cart when shopping for gifts or groceries. Turn your back even for just a second, and your bag may be gone.

• Don't leave your purse in your cart when placing items in your car.

• Don't place your personal effects on the hook of a restroom stall or on the floor where thieves can reach them. Instead, keep them close to you at all times.

- Always park in a well-lighted area.
- Always try to shop with a buddy.

Always prepare your children about what to do in the event you become separated.Always have your keys in your hand

when returning to your vehicle. *Protecting you from online scams:* 

• Beware of high-tech scams such as phony e-

card greetings. If you receive an e-mail card and are advised to download the latest software to view it, don't do it. You may be giving someone complete access to your computer.

• Phony lottery or sweepstakes notices that state you're a winner. You get an e-mail or phone message suggesting you visit a website or return the call to collect your prize. Don't respond. Delete the message.

• Phony sales found online. Be it eBay, Craigslist or any other venue, do your homework and find out if the company hosting these ads is legitimate.

#### Protecting your home:

• Create open lines of communications with neighbors and businesses within your immediate area.

• Take outgoing mail and packages to the post office or courier. When away on vacation or for the holidays, request the post office hold your mail delivery and ask your neighbors to retrieve your packages.

• Consider installing motion-detector lights around the outside of your home, and electric timers for your lights inside your home.

• When at home or away, always draw your shades to keep outsiders from peering in.

• Keep windows and doors locked at all times. If you need to leave an extra key, don't leave it in a flower pot or under the mat – leave it with a neighbor you know who you trust and can reach.

• Secure all doors with quality deadbolts and latches on all windows and sliding glass doors.

• Vehicles stored in the garage should be locked at all times. Don't leave your keys in your vehicle.

• Let neighbors know if and when you may be gone. If a strange vehicle is seen in your driveway, neighbors will know to call 911. You can also ask the Madera County Sheriff's Citizens on Patrol Unit to patrol your street when you're away. Call 559-675-7770.
