Now that the 2016 election is behind us - many would say "thankfully" - we know the election outcome nationally and how we voted in California, but how did Madera County vote? How "in tune" with the rest of California are we? Since hindsight is 20/20, let's take a look.

Some Background

There are almost 155,000 people in Madera County. Of those, 112,373 are over 18 and (providing they're citizens and not criminals) are eligible to vote. How many *are* registered to vote? About a third, or 58,128. Think about that the next time you get in a group of three people who are complaining about the government. If you're registered to vote, chances are neither of them are.

So, with only about a third of Madera County's eligible voting population registered to vote, and the 2016 vote being billed as a pretty important election, how many actually did show up to vote on November 8? Just a touch over 35,000. Here's what I love: That means about 22 percent of the population determined what the other 78 percent are going to have to endure. Actually, it's worse than that. If you realize that to win all you need is 50 percent plus 1, now you're talking about 17,501 votes determining the welfare of 155,000 people. That's 11.2 percent of the total population. Tell me your vote doesn't matter.

If you were wondering, Madera County loves its absentee ballots. Of the 35,000 votes cast, over 22,000 were absentees. Approximately half, 13,000, made

how did Madera County vote?

vote. Enough back story. Here's how we voted:

Local – the only local election we had was for Golden Valley Trustee Area 3 between Andy Wheeler and Warren Parr, vying for the seat being vacated by Mike Kelly. Since Trustees are elected now by area, we all didn't get to vote in this one, but those in Area 3 did and they chose Andy Wheeler over Warren Parr by a vote of 456 to 324. That's right, 57 percent of 780 people chose who has jurisdiction over your child.

Regional – there were three regional elections. California Assembly District 5, U.S. House of Representatives District 16 and the U.S. Senate. These races encompassed more than just Madera County. In the Assembly, Frank Bigelow continued his winning streak by besting Robert Carabas 64.5 to 35.5 percent. In Madera County, Bigelow's home turf, the numbers were 67 to 33 percent. For U.S. Congress, Johnny Tacherra was the Madera County favorite with 59.5 percent over Jim Costa. Unfortunately, there was also Fresno County and Merced County that got to vote. When you added them into the mix, Costa won with 57.7 percent.

The U.S. Senate race was interesting because it was the outgrowth of California's wise Prop. 14 law that was passed in 2010 (by us no less) that allows the top two vote getters to compete in the general tween Democrat Kamala Harris and Democrat Loretta Sanchez. Similar to your ability to get a Model T Ford in any color you wanted, as long as you wanted black, the only guarantee in this election was that, by God, we were going to get a Democrat Senator. California voted for Harris 62.5 to 37.5 percent. Madera County, wisely noting that it was a glorified coin toss, gave Harris 50.1 percent to Sanchez' 49.9. Let's hear it for choice.

North Fork has Solution for Energy Needs, Devastated Forest Trees

If life gives you lemons, make lemonade. With millions of dead trees in the Sierra National Forest, disposing of them before something catastrophic happens has been on the top of the mind of many people in the North Fork area. On Thursday, Nov. 3, there was a groundbreaking ceremony for what many con-

sider a clever solution to the problem.

North Fork Community Power and Yosemite/Sequoia RC&D Council hosted what is the first steps of building a 2-Megawatt bioenergy facility at the Old Mill Site located at 34000 Koso Nobe Road in North Fork.

The groups have been working with Phoenix Energy, a San Francisco-based private label power company that "...

builds, owns and operates on-site biomass gasification plants in partnership with businesses in the agricultural, waste, and forestry industries." Phoenix Energy helps its partners become their own energy providers.

Two Years in the Works

The project has been in the works for at least the last two years, focusing on financing to complete the project at a deserted sawmill in North Fork that closed down in the early 1990s. Once in operation, the biomass facility will generate power through its process of disposing of dead forest trees.

Funded through a \$5 million grant from the California Energy Commission and \$900,000 in New Markets Tax Credit





Facebook Election Misinformation

Now that the election is over we can get back to things that matter. Number one among things that matter? Disseminating wrong information on Facebook.

Social media added a whole new wrinkle to the latest election cycle. People who didn't know their butt from their elbow now had a means by which to weigh in on the topics of the day and get it all wrong. Early on I saw it coming. I very gently suggested to friends and acquaintances that Facebook which up until that point had been the domain of pictures of the grandkids, funny cat videos and recipes ad nauseam ("Tasty!") - was probably not the best venue for political discussion. Something just gets lost in the translation on Facebook. As an example, I tried to explain to an acquaintance on Facebook who was going off about Donald Trump losing the popular vote that the difference in votes (at that time) was only equal to about a city the size of Fresno. I then explained that it's the Electoral College that elects the president. Her response? "This isn't about Fresno."

OoooKaaaay ...

Matt Masur is a "progressive activist" who wrote a Facebook guideline piece that was posted in the Huffington Post. His key point? "Even more dan-


gerous are the posts that don't appear to be far-fetched until you dig into the details. The big problem with that ... people don't dig for the details." He concluded his thought by saying, "What we have now is not only uninformed but *misinformed* masses. That's something that should scare us all." Here are his key points:

- 1. Read first. *Then* share. Don't share based on the headline. This is the worst thing any of us can do. Stop being lazy.
- 2. Check the source (and *their* sources). In the age of new media, true and valid information comes from nontraditional sources but so does a lot of garbage. Any article that posts facts, figures or quotes should provide a source for that information. If there is no backup for their claims, move on.
- 3. Watch out for recycled stories. Often old stories are being presented as happening *now*. Check the date on the story before you read on. You'll be shocked to see how many are from another time and aren't applicable to the current event you thought they were talking about.
- 4. If you care about facts, ignore the blatantly slanted. Having a slant or taking a position on a story is not wrong in itself. What is wrong is when these ideas are taken as unbiased fact. You can avoid all of this by simply avoiding websites with the words Conservative, Liberal, Democrat, Republican, etc. in the title. They are just advertising how slanted they are. That's ok if you choose to live in your side's bubble but please don't have any delusions that these stories reflect the whole picture.
- 5. Google it. God gave us Google for a reason. If you see a story that's unbelievable or has no sources or even if it does, *verify*. See if the same facts are reported across multiple outlets. See if anyone disputes these facts. Read these pieces and then make up your mind.

Masur says, "If we could all take these simple steps our society would be a better place. We all have opinions and leanings. There is nothing wrong with that, but could we at least all come from a starting point based on facts and reality? The truth is, sharing illogical things begins to erode YOUR credibility and it makes you look foolish. Trust me, I speak from experience."



What do you usually think of when this time of year gets here? Football games? Beautiful orange and red leaves on the trees (and then you have to rake the lousy things up)? Thanksgiving? Pumpkins! Over the past few years I used to pick up Randy's, and then Adam's, kids after school at Sierra View and I loved to sit there and watch the little ones on the days they came back to the school after their trip to the Pumpkin Patch. What excitement! They were so protective of their precious treasures. They hung on to them like the star football player running with the ball

to the goal line. Hopefully they all had someone at home that could help them make that all important Jack 'O Lantern.

Pumpkin Anyone?

And what are you reminded of when we say "Pumpkin Pie, Pumpkin Bread and lots of other

desserts made with pumpkins? Most people don't bother with seeding, peeling, and cooking a pumpkin any more, they just buy a can.

Although pumpkin pie is not my favorite, my Mom did make delicious ones. In going through Mama's recipe cards, I found this one. She has cut it out of a newspaper and taped it to one of her cards so I will copy it as it is. If you can't make good pie crust (like me) or just don't like to make pie crust, this recipe would be ideal and it sounds good too.



No Crust to Screw Up

Make the pumpkin-pie mixture from the large can of Libby's pumpkin. Pour it into a large deep casserole. (I'd say she used about a 3-quart Corningware dish.)

In a large bowl blend a package of spice cake mix with two cubes of melted butter.

Drop this mixture by spoonfuls on top of the pie mixture in the casserole dish.

Bake at 350 for about 1 ½ hours.

Now I ask you – doesn't that sound good? How about a big spoon of this with a blob of whipped cream on it – or a scoop of vanilla ice cream. Yummy.

The following pumpkin bread recipes are for everyone, but especially

for the lady that called the office and requested them and before I could get back to her, I misplaced her phone number. The first one is my Mother's.

Pumpkin Nut Bread

- 1 C margarine
- 3 C sugar
- 3 eggs
- 1 large can pumpkin
- 3 C sifted all purpose flour
- 1 ½ tsp salt

- 1 tsp baking soda
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 1 tsp cinnamon
- 1 tsp cloves
- ½ tsp nutmeg
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 2 C chopped nuts
- 1 C raisins

Cream together margarine and sugar. Beat in eggs, add pumpkin and vanilla, mixing well. Sift together dry ingredients, blend with pumpkin mixture. Add nuts and raisins.

Bake in loaf pans for 40 to 45 minutes in preheated 350 oven.

Faye's (Randy's mom). You will notice it doesn't take any eggs.

Faye's Pumpkin Bread

Oven 350 Yield – 3 loaves

1 can pumpkin

4 C sugar

1 C oil

Mix together, then add to pumpkin mixture:

2 tsp baking soda

2 tsp cinnamon

1 tsp cloves

1 tsp nutmeg

1 tsp salt

5 C flour

Bake in prepared pans 70 minutes

I have a very dear friend living in Chowchilla that I went to school with since the seventh grade. She took over as manager of the high school cafeteria when my mother retired. Every year she invites my sister and me up to her house for a Christmas luncheon. A couple of years ago she served a pumpkin roll that was really delicious. I asked her for the recipe and I'll pass it on to you.

Pumpkin Cake Roll

3 eggs

1 C sugar

1 tsp lemon juice

2/3 C pumpkin

1 C chopped nuts

3/4 C flour

1 tsp baking powder

½ tsp ginger

½ tsp salt

2 tsp cinnamon

1/4 tsp nutmeg

Filling:

1 C powdered sugar

6 oz. pkg. cream cheese- softened

¹/₄ C butter - softened

½ tsp vanilla

Preheat oven at 375. Grease a 15x10x1-inch baking pan and line with waxed paper. Grease and flour the paper. Set aside.

In a mixing bowl, beat eggs on high for 5 minutes. Gradually beat in sugar until thick and lemon colored. Add pumpkin and lemon juice.

In another bowl (I use a large piece of wax paper so you won't have another bowl to wash) mix flour, cinnamon, baking powder, salt, ginger and nutmeg, fold into pumpkin mixture.

Spread batter into prepared pan, sprinkle with nuts.

Bake at 375 for 15 minutes or until

cake springs back when lightly touched. Be careful not to bake too long or it will be too dry to roll.

Immediately turn out on a clean towel that has been dusted with powdered sugar. Peel off paper and roll cake up in the towel starting with the narrow end. Cool.

Meantime, in a mixing bowl, beat cream cheese, 1 cup powdered sugar, butter and vanilla until fluffy.

When cake has cooled, carefully unroll the cake. Spread filling over cake to within 1 inch of edges. Roll up again (not in towel). Cover and chill until serving. Dust with powdered sugar if desired.

Happy Thanksgiving.

Don't Fail Your Water Pump

Hello 93636,

I chose today's topic due to the rash of failed water pumps I replaced this month. These water pump failures were predictable and preventable because the primary cause was low coolant levels.

At my shop, whenever an engine oil change is performed we also perform a large vehicle preventative maintenance inspection. That includes cooling system testing. If the vehicle's coolant level is low, it indicates a leak. Some customers choose not to repair cooling systems leaks as long as the engine is not overheating. Instead, they choose to top off the cooling system from time to time. In my professional opinion, that's a bad decision. Sooner or later the leak will need to be repaired. Many times it's later, when the water pump fails. That's what happened with the three water pumps I have replaced so far this month.

The vehicle that prompted this article is a 1993 Mitsubishi pick up. The upper radiator tank has been cracked and leaking for some time but the customer adopted the top off from time to time strategy. Yesterday when I saw the Mitsubishi on the flat bed of the tow truck I knew it probably wasn't good. When the water pump failed, it also took out the belt. Hope he caught it before the engine overheated and damaged the cylinder head gasket. We will see tomorrow. Cooling system leaks can lead to catastrophic engine failures. The proper time to repair a cooling system leak is before. Now, instead of just a radiator repair, I need to replace the water pump and belt. Oh, almost forgot, the water pump on this vehicle is under the timing cover which means the timing belt is likely in the way. WOW. I see a longawaited vacation in my near future.

Here's my explanation of how water pump failure is caused from LOW (not empty) coolant levels. The water pump impeller moves coolant through the engine block, cylinder head and back into the radiator where the heat is dissipated. The impeller draws fresh, cool coolant from the ra-

diator into the water pump, compresses it and pushes it out the other side into the engine block. When the water pump impeller is not submerged, it mixes air bubbles into the coolant resulting in foaming and cavitation. Waves in the ocean kind of do the same thing as the wave curls over and traps air into the ocean water creating the white foam. The illustration I like to use with my customers to explain cavitation is imagine a large ship riding high in the water with its propeller partially submerged. As the propeller blade rotates it smashes into the water pulverizing and aerating it. The consequence of this action is cavitation. When cavitation happens, a heavy vibration occurs when the air bubbles burst and then again when the blade slaps the water. Same thing happens when the water pump impeller vanes are partially submerged. The vibrations on the impeller are transferred through the impeller shaft, destroying the water pump bearing. Once the bearing fails the pump shaft no longer spins true and the shaft seal begins to leak. Also, worn out coolant also allows bubbles to form on cast aluminum housings and create pits, or cavities, when they explode.

I recommend pulling the owner's manual from the vehicle's glove box and read the manufacturer's recommended service intervals. Engine coolant does wear out. Exchanging coolant at the recommended interval does reduce premature failures of the cooling system. Just a footnote here: If you haven't noticed, the lower radiator hose is larger than the upper radiator hose because it's on the suction side (negative pressure) of the water pump and suction is less efficient. The upper radiator hose is smaller in diameter because it's on the discharge or positive pressure side of the water pump. Whenever a radiator hose blows apart, it's the upper hose because it's the one with positive pres-



were saying, "Enough! We've been taxed enough." A good cause? Maybe. Good enough to get their votes? No.

Prop 53 was voted down by the state while Madera County said, "Yes." And what did the state say "No" to? Letting the people have some say over how BIG (over \$2 billion) state projects would be managed. It's as if the rest of the state said, "It's OK. We trust you with our money. Spend it any way you see fit. Why would we think you might be less than trustworthy with it?"

Prop 57 was real easy for the people of Madera County. They didn't think the solution to prison overcrowding was releasing criminals back into our communities. Changing the name of a crime doesn't change the nature or severity of the crime, and the people of Madera County understood that.

Prop 59 was just silly. Asking the voters for permission to defy a Supreme Court ruling? While it just squeaked by to be passed by the state, Madera County said "No" 62 percent to 38.

I believe people who live in rural areas more fully understand the Second Amendment than people who live along the coast. Prop 63 was just another in a long line of confiscatory measures sent down from Sacramento and the people of Madera

County saw through it. The numbers for Madera County were almost exactly opposite the numbers from the state to pass Prop 63. The State passed it by 63 percent to 37 while Madera County voted AGAINST it 38-62 percent.

Prop 64 legalized recreational use of marijuana. Again, the numbers from Madera County were completely opposite of the passage numbers. What does it mean? It could mean the majority of people in Madera County are reluctant to have more people running around with diminished capacities than there already are. When you're the sober one, that sometimes seems like a lot.

Finally, Prop 67. Getting rid of the single-use plastic bags from grocery stores. Another one that squeaked by on the final vote while being trounced two-to-one by the voters of Madera County. Did Madera voters reject it out of the perceived loss of convenience? Did they see it as an example of the nanny state telling them how they could and couldn't bring home groceries? Who knows? All that can be determined from the 2016 presidential election results is that the people of Madera County tend to skew more Conservative than other areas of the state. Their voting patterns show that they do not fall into lockstep with the majority of California and on topics which they disagree, they disagree strongly, often voting two-to-one in opposition to the majority.



Picking the Perfect Cat

DEAR PAW'S CORNER: I'm really excited -- my mom has decided we can get a kitten! We're going to adopt one from the local shelter. Do you have any advice on picking the best cat? -- Jaynah and Sherar in Poughkeepsie, New York

DEAR JAYNAH AND SHERAR: First of all, congratulations! It's exciting to get your first pet. And I'm glad you're choosing to adopt from a shelter.

While I've always liked to say that we don't pick cats, they pick us, that's not entirely true. Sometimes it takes a little time to find that perfect fit. With kittens, it's even harder, because they're almost universally cute.

When you visit the shelter, ask if you're allowed to play with the kittens before choosing one, or to observe them in a play area outside of their cages. Note how they interact with each other and with humans. Are they confident or aggressive? Standoffish, or anxious and shy? Will they play with a toy or string that is dangled in front of them?

Note the kittens' general health. It's easy to spot a potential problem if a cat is listless, won't play, has visible sores, shakes its head frequently or has trouble walking. Most shelters are open about a cat's known health problems. That way potential owners can decide if they want to take on the costs of bringing an adopted cat back to health.

Again, take your time and don't commit to one kitten immediately. If there are multiple shelters in the area, check them out as well.

And of course, once you've found your new friend, be sure to schedule a checkup with a veterinarian to give it the healthiest start with your family.

financing, the facility should produce enough energy to power approximately 1,000 homes. Rather than burning the dead trees, the biomass facility will "bake" the wood then collect the gas emissions. It is those emissions that will be used to create the electricity through a state-of-the art "gasifier" developed by General Electric which will be installed later this year.

Phoenix Energy CEO Greg Stangl was interviewed in Biomass Magazine and talked about water treatment at the facility. "Hopefully we can put in a biological treatment process — using plants, water and biochar as a filter media — and allow the water to sit there for some time," he said. "It's a polishing step, and will get the water into a position where it is reusable outside the plant. Gasification is water accretive — we create it every hour we operate, and in California, the last thing you want to do is have water that you need to throw away. And, since these projects are out in the middle of nowhere, there is no sewer or utilities; it provides a very cost-effective way of getting a tertiary treatment."

The North Fork Biomass Facility is projected to be built in stages, with the first Megawatt of capacity on-line by late first quarter 2017. The plant is projected to be fully operational by the end of the year. Additionally, researchers from the University of California, Merced will be analyzing its operation during its initial start-up period.

Madera County Supervisor Tom Wheeler was quoted on KFSN-TV as saying part of the plan is to sell energy back to PG&E. "We're going to sell it back to the grid via PG&E, and the money generated with be an economic engine [for] the community," Wheeler said. "Now we can get some of these other businesses to come here and bring jobs here."

Equalize

"You're going to need a BIGGER CLOSET," said the shoe ad in my *Real Simple* magazine. It was touting the idea that if the shoe fits, buy one in every color. But, what if you're like the woman who called me today and already has 200 pairs of shoes? I'm going to go out on a limb and say a bigger closet isn't always the answer.

In today's society "bigger" and "more" is almost always associated with "better." We don't want to admit that we don't have room, don't have time, or can't afford it. So, we cram more into our space or calendar. We extend our credit to create the illusion that we have unlimited resources.

I recently listened to a wealthy young man being interviewed on the radio. He was very philanthropic. The interviewer asked, "How do you decide how much you're going to give?" His

answer was compelling. He said that he and his wife determined how much they need to live on and then choose to give away everything they earn above that amount. That gives a whole new meaning to "more is better," doesn't it?

A term made popular by Julie Morgenstern in the organizing world is "equalize." It's the final step in her SPACE formula – Sort, Purge, Assign Homes, Containerize, and Equalize. In her book Organizing from the Inside Out Morgenstern uses the term to describe the maintenance part of organizing. There are many facets to maintaining organization, but today I want to focus on equalizing as it's defined in the dictionary: to make even or equal.

Whether we're organizing our homes, offices, schedules or finances, equalizing offers some outstanding benefits. Let's first take a look at what *doesn't* happen when we equalize.

We don't create walk-in closets that we can't walk into. We don't have pantry supplies spilling out of the cupboards, or office storage so tightly jammed that we can't see what we have. We don't still have every set of sheets or towels that we ever purchased crowding the linen closet.

Likewise, we don't have every minute scheduled. We don't add and add new responsibilities until we're running ragged. We don't crumble under the weight of over commitment.

We're not smothered in credit card debt due to purchasing things we really can't afford. We don't succumb to "buy one in every color" ads.

Do any of those sound familiar? Good news — they're fixable! It's a matter of choice. Getting organized *by choice*. Here are some of the choices necessary to achieving that equalized state.

Just like the rich guy, you need to determine how much you need. How many pairs of black boots? How many mugs? How many sets of sheets? Once you've determined how much, keep your favorites and let the rest go. And then practice equalizing. You've already decided you have enough, so when faced with the opportunity to bring more in, keep it equal. One comes in, and one goes out.

taining organization, but today I

want to focus on equalizing as it's

defined in the dictionary: to make

even or equal.

Two come in, two go out.

For consumables, decide how much space you have for them to occupy. Equalize by not buying more than what you've determined you have space. Yes, even

when it's on sale. Remember, it may cost you more later, but it will cost you more now in terms of space and stress when you exceed your boundaries.

Same thing with your schedule. Rather than adding things willy-nilly, evaluate how much discretionary time you have. Make a list of what's most important to you. Schedule those commitments and activities according to priority. Don't forget to include down-time. Now, when a new request or opportunity arises, before saying yes, look at your schedule and make a choice. Is it going to replace something because it's more important than something already on your schedule? Is it something you can add later, when another commitment ends? Equalize.

In Time for the Holidays

As we head into the holiday season, I can't think of a better time to consider how to equalize with our finances. The most obvious way is to not spend more

than is coming in. Can you imagine a January not stressed by credit card bills? Give yourself permission and explain if need be that you're intentionally cutting back this year to keep from acquiring more debt.

As with your time, determine the discretionary amount of money you have to work with. Create a list of priorities and from that list a holiday budget. When you discover something cost more than you thought, equalize by cutting back on some-

thing else. It's easier said than done — but it's possible! You can do it! And in January you will breathe a sigh of relief instead of grief.
