finishes 2028 • Avenue 15 Rehabilitation — Expected Summer/Fall 2026 • Lanes Bridge circulation improvements — Late 2025 • Peck Blvd improvements — Construction in 2027 • Rio Mesa Blvd Phase 1 — Expected completion March 2026 • Avenue 12 & Road 35 turn pocket upgrades — Summer/Fall 2026 Additional SBn1 and Measure T projects continue, including Avenue 12 rehab (completion Nov. 2025) and Avenue 15 (already completed).

## Water Infrastructure (MD-10A)

Major improvements include the Berkshire Treatment Plant (completion 2026), Phase 1 and Phase 2 system distribution upgrades, and the completed and operational Dublin 1 million gallon storage tank.

#### California Highway Patrol (CHP)

CHP reported that three to four officers patrol the valley floor at any given time. Residents with traffic concerns are encouraged to contact PIO Sergio Moreno with detailed descriptions. The Madera CHP region now has seven Drug Recognition Experts, strengthening impaired-driving enforcement. CHP was also thanked for assisting

with Liberty High football game traffic safety.

#### Madera County Sheriff's Office

Residents were encouraged to download the MCSO Sheriff App for real-time alerts. Deputies are now enforcing the updated Noise Ordinance 24/7, issuing a warning on the first visit and a citation on return

#### Measure T Oversight Committee

Janice Gomes presented an update on Measure T compliance, explaining how the citizen committee reviews transportation spending twice per year to ensure funds are used exactly as voters approved. Their Annual Report was available for attendees to review.

# Ozempic for All

Yes, Ozempic for all

Americans are going to get a little healthier. President Trump cut deals with the drugmakers Eli Lilly and Novo Nordisk to increase access to obesity drugs in a major benefit to American public health.

The agreements are a win-win-win - good for consumers, good for the companies and good for Trump.

One of the most irrational superstitions of our time is that Big Pharma, which has superstitions of our time is that long been routinely delivering near-miraculous therapeutics to extend and improve our lives, is a public enemy. Its latest breakthrough is a class of so-

called GLP-1 drugs that make it easier to lose weight and to avoid associated serious health problems, from Type 2 diabetes to heart disease.

The basic dynamic of the Trump deals is that the companies will, through lower prices, expand their market share, thus generating more revenue. The companies also get tariff relief and expedited review for select

Health and Human Services Secretary Robert F. Kennedy Jr., the MAHA leader with a paranoid streak about modern medical advances, has been hostile to GLP-1 drugs, the most famous of which is Ozempic, sold by Novo Nordisk.

If everyone could do as many pushups and pullups as the hyper-fit 71-year-old Kennedy, perhaps we could turn our back on GLP-1s.

Certainly, RFK Jr. is correct that Americans should eat better and work more. But our body mass index has been increasing for about 150 years, as we've made calories cheaper and more abundant over time. As it hap-

pens, the things that we like to eat or drink that are bad for us -- fast food, soda, chips, cookies -- are cheap, convenient and taste good.

Even if we manage to convince people that they should eat more fruit, vegetables and legumes, while taking a Peloton class every day, not everyone is going to do it as a matter of lifestyle constraints, individual preference or simple lack of willpower.


There's also the fact that once you put on weight, physiological changes make it more difficult to shed it.

About 40% of Americans are obese. Wouldn't it be great for them -and for American society at large, which spends roughly \$170 billion a year on obesity-related medical costs -- if there were a safe, relatively convenient way for them to slim down?

Lo and behold, here it is. The GLP-1s started out as a treatment for diabetes and have exploded in popularity as weight-loss drugs.

Trump's reflex to make it easier for people to obtain Ozempic and the like -- while, not incidentally, boosting his reputation as the nation's foremost dealmaker -- is the correct one. Drug pricing is complicated, but by expanding the sale of the drugs direct to consumers, the companies can re-


make it to work every morning because of a decent car and a working heater and air conditioner. There's hot water when I shower and electricity to power everything I might





Editor's Note: With the passing of Aunt Jean, I have decided to bring you a "Best Of" of her recipes over the past 10 years. Good recipes are timeless and I hope you enjoy them all over again.

Before I start my column, I want to congratulate the Liberty High FFA on their recent fund raiser. For \$35 you got a tri-tip, barbecued perfectly, beans, rice, salad and rolls and it was delicious. My only question is: When are you going to do it again?

Secondly, I want to apologize for not doing original articles the last two months.

My computer died. After getting a new hard drive, when things were back to working order, everything on my Word was lost. As it was explained to me, it went to never-never land. That and a couple of personal things are behind me and

everything is back to normal I hope and pray!

Before everything happened a couple of months tional turkey and all the trimmings ago, I was telling you about the cook book Randy bought for me to use. It is the Good Housekeeping Cook Book, printed in 1961. I'll continue this article from that book.

Growing up I

had heard of succotash and never knew rice cereal what it was until I got older and found out what it was and realized that I had been eating it for years. My Grandma Drinnen fixed it for supper quite a lot, opening jars of vegetables that she had canned during the summer. I loved it.

#### Succotash

1½ C hot cooked or canned whole kernel corn

2 T. butter or margarine

1½ C. cooked or canned green beans or green lima beans

½ C. light cream

Salt and pepper to taste

Combine all ingredients, adjusting salt and pepper to taste. Heat.

I love rice dishes but hate to cook rice because it is so messy. You have to be so careful or it will boil over. This recipe sounded good and you don't have to pre-boil the



rice

#### Spanish Beef Rice

2 T. fat or salad oil

11/3 C. packaged precooked rice

2 T. minced onion

1 C minced green peppers

3 T. diced celery

1 lb. ground chuck

1 T. salt

2 8 oz. cans tomato sauce

1 bouillon cube

1 C hot water

1 tsp. soy sauce

1 tsp. sugar

Snipped parsley

In hot fat in skillet, cook rice with onion, peppers, celery and beef until golden brown. Add salt and rest of ingre-

Start heating oven to 350. Place all ingredients on baking pan; toss together well. Bake 15 minutes. Can be served cold or warm. Even better if prepared a day or two early and stored in a tightly covered container to mellow the flavors.

Every family has their favorite recipe for turkey stuffing (or do you call it dressing?) Ours is just bread crumbs, sautéed onions and celery in lots of butter seasoned with salt, pepper and dried sage (Mama always insisted on rubbed sage) and chicken stock. There are a whole lot of things to be added to dressing that people like: oysters, pecans, dried apricots, raisins, prunes or chopped apples, cranberries – just about anything your family would like. I found this recipe in the book and thought it a little different but someone may like it for their family.

#### Down South Stuffing

1/2 C Butter or margarine

<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> C minced onion

½ C minced green peppers

½ C minced celery

1 chicken bouillon cube

5 C day old white bread crumbs

5 C crumbled corn bread (made without sugar)

½ pound pork sausage links, cut up

½ tsp. salt

1/8 tsp. pepper

½ tsp. poultry seasoning

2 eggs, beaten

3/4 C chopped pecans

In hot butter in skillet, sauté onions,

celery, and green peppers until tender. In large bowl combine bread crumbs. Dissolve bouillon cube in 3/3 C hot water; sprinkle over bread crumbs. Add sautéed vegetables. In same skillet, sauté sausages until browned. To crumb mixture, add salt, pepper, poultry seasoning, eggs, pecans then sausages with drippings and toss. Any stuffing left over after stuffing the turkey can be put in a buttered casserole and baked after the turkey comes out of the oven. Be sure to refrigerate the stuffing to be cooked while the turkey is baking.

Here it is Thanksgiving. Whether you are having the traditional turkey and all the trimmings or ham, roast beef, tamales or barbecued hamburgers and hot dogs, I sincerely hope you are having it with family or friends that you love and love you in return.



duce prices. Meanwhile, Medicare will do more to cover the drugs, also bringing down their cost.

According to Gallup, about 12% of Americans report having used a GLP-1 drug at some point for weight loss, a stunning increase from about 6% in early 2024. Not coincidentally, Gallup is also now showing a slight dip in obesity. From 2008 -- when the polling organization regularly began asking about weight -- to 2022, the percentage of obese Americans increased by 14 percentage points, to nearly 40%.

Where any number of fashionable diets and continual government exhortations for more physical exertion have failed (before RFK Jr., Michelle Obama was urging, "Let's Move!"), drugs to slow digestion and reduce the urge to

eat are working.

The percentage of Americans using GLP-1s will inevitably keep growing, especially if prices continue to go down, if more oral GLP-1s come online in addition to injectables, and if other medical benefits of the drugs emerge. GLP-1s could easily match the saturation level of statins, the cholesterol-reducing drugs.

By all means, we should all eat more arugula. Until then, we have found a pharmaceutical path to alleviating an ongoing health crisis. President Trump and the drug companies are to be congratulated for their creative cooperation to make it available to more Americans.

dential election decisively, yet Republicans hold only a razor-thin margin in the House. That mismatch is not by chance. When districts are drawn to guarantee that one party always wins, it shifts power away from the people and toward special interests. It lets political insiders and activist groups pick the politicians who govern us, rather than letting voters choose their representatives.

If the Court agrees with Callais, the decision could dramatically limit the use of race in redistricting nationwide. That means the gerrymandered maps Gavin Newsom is pushing with Prop 50 could be ruled unconstitutional. This is one of the most important redistricting

cases in decades. The outcome could restore fairness, compactness, and accountability to how congressional districts are drawn.

Our Constitution does not tolerate this racial gerrymander.


Should the Supreme Court find that states have gerrymandered districts based on race, thereby violating the Equal Protection Clause, an estimated 30 states may be impacted and forced to redistrict ahead of the 2026 midterm elections, in an outcome that could lead to Republicans drawing 19 more seats and Democrats losing up to a dozen local seats, primarily in the South. A decision by the Supreme Court is expected as early as next Spring.

- Leftover bread can be repurposed as croutons or breadcrumbs. In fact, this is an excellent job for kiddos. With clean hands and a butter knife, older children can cut leftover rolls into manageable size pieces. Spray with olive oil cooking spray and bake at a low temperature (225° F) to dry out. Or crumble stale bread into crumbs and store in the freezer.
