According to an article from Ameri- ministration announced. can Action News, inflation in the Biden economy is continuing to run hot, with the newly released Consumer Price Index for September showing another 5.4 percent year-over-year increase.

There may be a silver lining however, at least for those individuals receiving Social Security Benefits.

As CNBC reports, the Social Security cost-of-living adjustment will be 5.9 percent in 2022, the Social Security Ad-

The 5.9 percent cost-of-living adjustment will be the biggest boost to Social Security beneficiaries' checks in about 40 years. In 2021, the Social Security cost-of-living adjustment was 1.3 percent. Social Security beneficiaries will see the increases in the monthly checks starting in January. The estimated average monthly benefit for all retired workers will rise to \$1,657, up from \$1,565.

## **Newsom Bans Gas Equipment**

As part of his goal to remove all gaspowered engines from California, Gov. Newsom signed a bill into law on Oct. 4 that will effectively ban all gasoline powered leaf blowers, lawnmowers, other lawn equipment, generators, pressure

washers, chainsaws, weed trimmers and golf carts. The ban targets new gas-powered equipment using 25 horsepower or less engines. Essentially, this means that all future landscaping equipment used by homeowners and professional landscapers

will have to be either battery powered or plug in models. The new law orders the California Air Resources Board to apply the new rules by Jan. 1, 2024. Add this to the fact that last year, Newsom decreed a ban on the sale of all new gas-

To participate, individuals must show proof of receiving both doses of the Pfizer or Moderna vaccines, or single dose of Johnson & Johnson vaccine at any location where the wristbands are distributed. To obtain a wristband, individuals will need to show their physical or digital vaccine card at one of these locations:

Proof of vaccination can be in the form of a physical or digital vaccine card. Digital vaccine cards can be downloaded instantly at www.MyVaccineRecord. cdph.ca.gov.

MaderaCounty.com/VaccineDeals, where you will find a complete list of participating business and locations where the wristbands are distributed. Businesses may also sign up through this webpage which is updated regularly.

fering rebates to change equipment, with \$30 million set aside for that purpose in the state budget, but many in the landscaping industry say the amount is way too low, citing nearly 50,000 small businesses that will be impacted.

"This Legislature hates fuel, which is very sustainable," said Republican State Senator, Brian Dahle who opposed this action. "It's easy to access. And when the power is off, you can still use it. You can still run a generator to keep your freezer

going, to keep your medical devices going. But when your battery's dead and there's no power on, you have nothing."

Not everything about this new law is smooth sailing for Newsom, however. For example, written into the law is an allowance for the California Air Resources Board to delay implementation if elements are found to be "not feasible." Under the federal Clean Air Act, California must also apply to the Environmental Protection Agency for authorization to "enforce its own standards for new non-road engines and vehicles."

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

## Who Pays for the Woke?


During the Trump Administration, Republicans passed one of the biggest tax cuts in American history and the greatest regulatory relief ever. The result was the biggest economic expansion in our lifetimes. Before the "lockdown left" took a wrecking ball to our economy, Americans were prospering with the lowest unemployment rate in 50 years – the lowest poverty rate in 60 years – and the fastest wage growth in 40 years. For the first time in decades, the income gap was narrowing.

Joe Biden and the Democrats have reversed these policies with reckless abandon. It is no coincidence that real wages for Americans have declined every single month since he took office.

History is crystal clear on this point: No country has ever taxed, spent and borrowed its way to prosperity – but many have done so to their ruin.

Brian Riedl tallied up the total cost of the Democrats' new spending bills for the New York Post and estimates \$8 trillion of new spending over the next ten years – about \$60,000 per family. Joe Biden and the Democrats tell us this won't cost you a penny. It will all be paid by somebody else.

Here is the dirty little secret of government spending: Government



cannot put a dollar into the economy that it hasn't first taken out of the same economy. Every dollar it gives you it must take from you and there are only three ways to do it: Current taxes, which rob you of your current purchasing power; borrowing, which robs you of your future purchasing power; or printing money, which robs you every time you go shopping by reducing the value you of your earnings, all while it silently hollows out your savings and retirement funds.

And don't fall for their lie that their taxes will only fall on businesses. Businesses don't pay business taxes. YOU pay business taxes: As a consumer through higher prices; as an employee through lower wages; and as an investor through lower earnings. That's your retirement fund.

You know they're coming after working families because they want to hire 87,000 new IRS agents. That is every man, woman and child living in Miami Beach, Florida. Or Ogden, Utah. Imagine the entire population of one of those cities unleashed to go after every taxpayer in America.

The Democrats' so-called "American Families Plan" will require your bank to report every one of your private transactions over \$600 to the IRS. Does that sound like they're going after the Biden family? No, they're coming after YOUR family. And if you're typical, you already paid more in taxes last year than you paid for food, clothing, health care and entertainment combined. According to the Democrats, that's not enough.

What else do you get for your \$60,000 of new taxes, inflation and tax-driven price increases?

Amnesty, legal permanent residence and a fast track to citizenship for eight to ten million foreign nationals who illegally entered our country and are demanding to stay. Eight million is the entire population of Wyoming, Alaska, Vermont, South Dakota, North Dakota, Rhode Island, Montana and Maine – combined. 




So, here's to you Michelle; I hope you are treated as well by others as you treat me and my friends.











#### Smartphone Tips to Try

A few of my clients think I'm a tech wizard. My kids would say that's hyperbole. In many cases our tech savviness is linked to our age, or connection to people with skills. I'm blessed with a son who's a software engineer. He's helpful when I have questions and every so often drops a tidbit of info that boosts my skills and productivity. This article is for those who aren't of the tech savvy generation, or simply haven't taken time to discover how smart their phone really is. It's also specific to iPhones since my son generously shares his Apple hand-medowns. I'm sure Androids have similar features but the set up may be different.

Magnifying Glass: So handy for us "older folk" when there's fine print - like expiration dates,

receipts, etc. Go to Settings > Accessibility. Tap Magnifier, then turn it on. To add it to your Control Center, go to Settings > Control Center, then tap Customize Controls. Tap the add button (+) next to Magnifier. You're able to adjust the light, zoom and even snap a picture, if needed. Now nothing is hidden from view.

Zoom In on a Website: For magnification while using Safari, tap on the AA icon on the top left corner of your screen. Directly below you'll see a small A on the left and a larger A

on the right with a percentage block in between. Click on the large A complain, remind them that Skills: Swipe until the website font or image is the size you need.

Save Website Pages for Later:

When you want to save a website in Safari, tap the box with the uparrow icon at the bottom of your screen. Then, tap "Add to Reading List." To view, click on the book icon at the bottom of your Safari screen. You can even save it to iCloud for offline reading when you're not connected to the internet. Go to Settings > Safari, then turn on "Automatically Save Offline" (below Reading List).

Close Safari Tabs (all at once):

Years ago, before I learned to close my websites, I remember my son's friend grabbing my phone and Xing out website after website for what seemed like five minutes. Now, you can easily close them all at once. While in Safari hold the tab button (two squares icon) on the bottom right-hand corner and select "close all tabs."

Kodak Moments: To quickly access your camera, engage Siri. Simply command "take a selfie," "take a photo," or "take a video" and your camera will appear ready in the correct

mode.

Expand ... ask your kids. If they your Photo you once taught them how to up (if vertical) or left (if horizontal) from the basic photo controls to find

> a row of hidden camera modes including a timer, night mode, exposure. etc.

> Give Your Photos a Caption: Launch the Photos app and tap a photo to which you want to add a caption. Swipe up on the pic to access the caption field. Tap "Add a Caption." Write your caption, press return, and done. You can easily search for a photo using the caption you've created.

> > Calculator Tip: If you mistype

a digit while using your calculator, rather than starting over with the C or AC button, swipe to the left or right at the top of the screen. The motion will act as a backspace and remove the number you entered last.

Flash for Notifications: If you have a hard time hearing, you can set your phone to blink the flashlight in addition to, or instead of ringing. Go to Settings > Audio/Visual and look for "LED Flash for Alerts."

*Sing-along:* To see the lyrics of songs you have downloaded on your phone, tap the three dots of the "Now Playing" screen. A menu will come up with "See full lyrics" as an option. Beware of singing along while using your earbuds like in a plane.

Some settings/steps may vary depending on the age of your phone. If you need extra guidance, search do а on www.support.apple.com, check for a video on YouTube, or ask your kids. If they complain, remind them that you once taught them how to use a spoon.

### What's in a Name?

Editor's Note: With the passing of Aunt Jean, I have decided to bring you a "Best Of" of her recipes over the past 10 years. Good recipes are timeless and I hope you enjoy them all over again.

Have you ever wondered if there was someone out there in this big world with a name the same as yours? In doing our family's genealogy for the last 20 years (I've been able to trace three of my grandparents' families back to the 1700's. I'm having a little trouble with my dad's mother's family. She always told us we were related to John and John Quincy Adams

but haven't been able to prove it yet). Growing up, I always thought "Aunt Jean's Recipes." Wow, Briner was not a common name but in doing the few of the Aunt Jean's Recipes I that aren't even mine. genealogy, found out differently. One of the problems is when

our families came from the old countries, their names were not written correctly, or ineligibly and got recorded incorrectly. An example of that is my Great Great Great Grandfather came over from Germany as Petrus Breiner, Sr. but his son is recorded as Peter Briner, Jr. I also found out that the name has been spelled Breiner, Bryner and Briner – and they are all related.

If you would like to find out if there are other people out there with the same name as yours, look it up. The website I use a lot to look people up is zabasearch.com and click what state you want to search. If your name is Tom Brown, or Nancy White, it might tell you there are too many to list, but if your name is not that common, you might be surprised what you find. Another way to look your name up is Google it. You might also find that names may not be spelled the usual way. I have four nieces with names we hear quite frequently, but the girls names are spelled different: Our girls are Eryn (Erin), Sara (Sarah), Rachael (Rachel) and Savanna (Savannah). Even Randy's name - his full



name is Randahl (it is said his dad had a "thing" for the movie star Arlene Dahl), so take that into consideration when researching names.

thinking of writing my article ... so I thought I'd Google about, he Googled the site and was what a surprise. So here are a reading some of the recipes. He copied this one said and sounded interest-

> ing. Aunt Jean's Easter Rice Pie

- 8 Eggs 1 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> C rice, cooked and cooled
- 3 lbs. ricotta
- 1 <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> C sugar
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 2 (9inch) unbaked pie shells Cinnamon

Preheat oven to 350. In a large bowl, beat the eggs, add the rice, ricotta, sugar and vanilla, stir thoroughly. Turn the mixture into the pie shells and sprinkle with cinnamon. Bake for 1 hour. This recipe makes two pies, but if you want to make only one pie, just divide all the ingredients in half. Half of 1 <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> C sugar is 1 C less 2 Tablespoons. Randy's daughter Rachael made this recipe that night and they all really liked but said next time they would add more sugar. Seems it just wasn't quite sweet enough.

The following recipe sounds real good and I love both pork chops and rice so I am going to buy a can of onion soup when I go shopping and try

it – I'll let you know. And another thing to like about it: it's done all in one pan!

Aunt Jean's Pork Chops

Pork Chops

1 can Campbell's French Onion soup

1 can water

1 cup uncooked long grain rice

Season pork chops with salt and pepper and brown in large frying pan. Once browned, pour in soup and water. Cover and simmer 30 minutes. Pour in rice around chops. Cover and cook for 20 minutes or until rice is fully cooked.

I love rhubarb so this recipe really caught my attention. I'm anxious to try it.

Aunt Jean's Rhubarb Crumble Preheat oven to 350 1 C flour

1/2 C brown sugar <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> C melted butter <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> C dry oatmeal 4 C chopped rhubarb 1/2 C white sugar 2 T cornstarch 1 C water 1 tsp. vanilla Mix the flour, brown sugar, oat-


meal and butter together until crumbly. Press half into bottom and part way up sides of greased 9x13 pan. Set remaining crumbs aside.

Sprinkle rhubarb mixture over crumbs. In a saucepan, combine white sugar, cornstarch, water and vanilla. Heat to boiling. Cook and stir until thickened. Pour over rhubarb. Sprinkle remaining crumbs on top. Bake in preheated oven for 45-60 minutes. Serve warm. Maybe with a scoop of vanilla ice cream.

But who wants to sit up till 2 a.m. to change the clock back? Before you go to bed Saturday, Nov. 5, move your clocks back an hour. 

The following will try to shed a little bit of light on some of the complex government architecture of water management such as DWR, SGMA, GSA, GSP and IRWMG. These agencies are playing a large role in the future of water sustainability in our community.


To start, the California Department of Water Resources (DWR) is responsible for the State of California's management and regulation of water usage.

Laws passed by the California Legislature related to water usage regulation such as the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act (SGMA) which established goals for water sustainability and has major implications on local control of our water basins. The law establishing SGMA was signed by Governor Brown in 2014 with the goal of stopping overdrafting and bringing groundwater basins into balanced levels of pumping and recharging. Based on that law, sustainability must be reached by 2040.

SGMA has required that local Groundwater Sustainability Agencies (GSA's) will manage our local basins and adopt Groundwater Sustainability Plans (GSP's) toward that goal. The Madera County Supervisors are the board of directors of the Madera White Area's GSA. The "White Area" designation is the area not covered by a city or water district.

The Integrated Regional Water Management Group's (IRWMG) purpose is to create a collaboration among all water

districts and agencies as well as Madera County with a purpose of identifying and implementing water management solutions through grants given by DWR.



## More New Details Regarding Ranchos Library Internet Lending Abilities

September was a great month, with the official recognition of National Library Card Sign-up Month. We had a lot of fun giving away prizes for all the people who signed up for new cards and can't wait to continue helping everyone find whatever they need within the library itself. October is a pretty slow month for us, but that gives us time to get everything caught up and recovered from our busy summer season and prepare for the upcoming winter. Throughout this time, I will be working on organizing and re-organizing various parts of the library, so forgive me for the dust — I promise it will be worth it in the end. Expect to see new signage up around the library to help with navigating the stacks, more accurately alphabetized sections, ratings stickers on our DVD selection and many more improvements.


I touched on it last month, but now we have more finite details regarding our internet lending abilities. We have five mobile hot spot devices that can be rented out from the library (much like a book) for seven days at a time. We also have five Chromebooks that do not have independent internet access available for checkout for 14 days at a time. These devices must be returned inside the library during business hours and there are filters on the internet (the same as those on our branch computers), but they offer access to internet and computers where there may not be pre-existing access and we are so excited to be able to offer this to our community.







## Patriotic Lessons from a Basketball Game

The following was published in the Ranchos Independent in 2015, but its message seems to be even more important and applicable today.

I love God, country, family and friends. And basketball.

My husband and I have been Fresno State season ticket holders for probably 40 years and have seen many game highlights, thrilling victories and agonizing defeats. But the total experience of one of last season's games impressed me in many ways.

Because I had recently undergone knee surgery and couldn't comfortably walk down steps to my regular seat surrounded by rabid fans, I found a vacant top-row aisle seat at the Save Mart Center, rested my weary knee and observed rather than participated in the usual fanatic frenzy.

This is what I enjoyed watching from my comfortable bird's eye view. *A Different View* 

Everyone in the arena stood for the National Anthem and faced the American flag hanging over Section 109 – with hats removed, most with hands over hearts, and all silent and respectful. I fought back tears as I have so many times during stirring renditions of the Star-Spangled Banner. "Everyone in the arena" (court crew, cheer leaders, coaches, players, fans, arena staff, invited guests) included different ages, sizes, races, ethnicities, political persuasions and economic circumstances. We cheered or applauded before taking our seats when the anthem ended, only to rise again at the start of the game and remain standing, as is the custom, until the home team – our team – made its first basket (which on that particular night took much too long for my comfort).

From the beginning our team was missing two starters, so other players had to step up. Then another starter went down with an injury, our starting guard warmed the bench more than the fans wanted, and a freshman became our unexpected all-star.

Fans cheered for their respective teams: Fresno State and San Diego State. Although greatly outnumbered, San Diego fans rooted against the home team with no fear of reprisal. A man sitting near me chanted "San – Di-e-go – State" throughout; and I appreciated, or maybe just tolerated, his enthusiasm and then cheered as loudly as I could for Fresno.

Our team members came in all sizes and shapes, from 6' 1" to 6'10" and weights up to 285 pounds. They hailed from the local area as well as Texas, Colorado, Kansas, Oklahoma State, Minnesota, Los Angeles, Nevada and Arizona. But they were, and played as, a cohesive team.

At the end of the first half, we were down by a point.

Non-stop halftime activities entertained and inspired the crowd; at least they did for those of us who hadn't rushed out to the concourse for food or beverage. A member of the military was introduced and honored by a standing ovation. Student athletes ringed the court as they were acknowledged for individual achievement and the best collective GPA average ever. Fans clamored for the pizza giveaway. The dance cam caught some amazing and not-so-amazing moves. The "blimp" dropped coupons to waving hands. The audience-member free-throw contest was the usual hit, with winners and los-
