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## Ranchos' Virginia Vick Earns Lifetime Achievement Award

In August, Ranchos icon Virginia Vick was honored by the Madera District Chamber of Commerce with its Lifetime Achievement Award at an award dinner held at the Madera Fairgrounds. According to the Madera Chamber, the Lifetime Achievement honor is presented to individuals for, "... significantly demonstrating a lifelong dedication to Madera within one or more of following areas: business, agriculture, economic development, education, community and cultural enhancement, advancement of healthcare, and government relations," the Chamber's website explained. "During their time of service, they have possessed and displayed many of the following characteristics: knowledge, creativity, ability to lead, collaborate and create partnerships, deal with adversity, motivate others, show compassion, and maintain a strong sense of integrity. The work and efforts of our recipients have resulted in making Madera a better and stronger community."

Virginia has been in the Ranchos for nearly 50 years. With her late husband, Merven, they bought lots in the Ranchos and built homes and businesses on them, most notably the Maywood Shopping Center in the heart of the Ranchos. In addition, over the years she has owned a series of businesses in the Ranchos as well, including a video rental store and a tanning operation.

She was one of the original members of the Golden Valley Chamber of Commerce in the Ranchos and is proudest of being the driving force behind the creation of the Flatlanders Day Parade. In addition, she was fundamental in getting the Madera Ranchos Branch of the Madera County Library in the Ranchos and she was on the committee to create the Golden Valley School District in the Ranchos.

Virginia said she believed she was the first person from the Ranchos to be honored by the Madera Chamber. When asked why she thought she was honored, she said, "I was a businesswoman and a member of the Chamber."



## **LIFE Games Bring Out the Best**

More than 325 students with special needs participated in the 7th Annual LIFE Games hosted by Madera County Superintendent of Schools on Tuesday, Oct. 8 at the Madera Fairgrounds.

LIFE Games is an event that demonstrates that all students, even the most severely



disabled, can be included in any activity with the right preparation. Students participated in activities focused on physical education, sensory, and visual and performing arts standards, and also demonstrated teamwork with large team activities. Community agencies offered informational booths for students who come from all districts in Madera County and are served by this regional program.

More than 250 staff members and community volunteers participated. LIFE Games has received a Golden Bell Award from the California School Boards Association and the 2016 Apple for Excellence Award from California County Boards of Education.

#### 10 Propositions on California's November 5 Ballot

**Prop. 2** — **NO** — would waste even more taxpayer dollars on the wasteful, dumbing down, politically correct K-12 government schools and community colleges. Making this \$10 BILLION bond all the more expensive are interest payments, which nearly doubles the huge debt it proposes to levy upon already-hurting Californians.

**Prop. 3** — **NO** — would permit polygamy, bigamy, child marriages, incestuous marriages (and even people-animal and people-object marriages) by superseding all marriage statutes with an extremely broad and subjective state constitutional amendment claiming "a fundamental right ... to marry" whomever and whatever (the sky's the limit). Prop. 3 won't make any practical difference on same-sex marriages, yet by preempting all existing marriage definitions, standards, and limits, this radical proposal opens up "Pandora's Box."

**Prop. 4** — **NO** — would fund another lie-based, subsidization of wasteful environmental groups via a \$10 BILLION bond, costing taxpayers even more money, and with interest (a bond is always more expensive than a direct tax). **Prop. 5** — **NO** — would permit higher property taxes (attacking Prop. 13 from 1978) by lowering the "vote threshold from 66.67 percent to 55 percent for local special taxes and bond measures to fund housing projects and public infrastructure." 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
Dear Editor:

When Measure T failed in 2022, the Madera County Transportation Authority and all our member agencies had to take a hard look at what we did wrong and figure out how to deliver a package of investments that would reflect the needs and expectations of our residents and business community. So, we started over. The new Measure T expenditure plan on this year's ballot reflects almost two years of reassessing, adapting, and changing the form and structure of the Measure to meet those needs and expectations.

We gathered a steering committee of regular people from each of the five County Districts instead of having our elected officials appoint people to make it more independent. They toured the County and met six times over the past year. They unanimously supported the Measure that was sent to the Board. Yes. A group of citizens formed a Political Action Committee to place the Measure on the ballot with a lower threshold for passage, but - despite claims made by some - it is the same Measure. Period.

Measure T 2024 bears little resemblance to any of its predecessors. With a 20-year horizon, it is not a "forever tax" as was proposed in 2022. We listened and heard people wanted more investments in our local streets and roads so that perhaps finally – we could improve our pavement condition countywide. That's why 80 percent of all revenues will go to those local roads. That category also includes options for evacuation planning, which residents and businesses in the eastern part of the county badly wanted. It contains options for bike and pedestrian improvements in areas where they are desired and even Safe

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

## Secret Service: Just Embarrassing

Barney Fife was better or-

ganized and more accountable.

If this is what the Secret Service has become, it's a wonder that something worse than Butler, Pa. hasn't already happened. That event was terrible enough, with one rally-goer killed and Donald Trump coming within an inch of losing his life. If Trump hadn't turned his head at the right moment, Butler would have become one of the most notorious locations in American history and we'd be living in a different world.

At the time, the Secret Service's failure seemed unfathomable, and none

of the revelations since -- set out in a report by the Senate Homeland Security Committee -- make it any better. Barney Fife

was better organized and more accountable.

The Secret Service is given responsibility for avoiding a calamity that would traumatize the nation and derange its politics for years, perhaps decades, to come. Its competence is a matter of the utmost national consequence. Yet, the agency was bumbling and slow-reacting, a disaster waiting to happen. Surely, this sort of ineptitude wouldn't be tolerated by Taylor Swift's security detail.

The Secret Service, which we ex-

pect to be run with a vigor and precision befitting its mission, instead operates as though it's a typical bureaucratic outfit housed within, say, the Health Resources and Services Administration. The Senate report relates "multiple foreseeable and preventable planning and operational failures," as an armed man was permitted to climb atop the roof of the American Glass Research building within 200 yards of where Trump was speaking and get off eight shots.

The story of how it happened is muddled by finger-pointing and confusion over who was in charge. Secret


> Service advance agents didn't know who was responsible for final decisions and didn't know who determined the

security perimeter for the event. State and local law enforcement were responsible for the AGR building because it was outside the perimeter. But advance agents didn't share planning documents with them, and didn't ask for the operational plans of state and local law enforcement. Someone from Butler Emergency Services warned during a walkthrough that local law enforcement didn't have the manpower to lock down the building.

Advance agents did suggest putting large trucks or other heavy equipment between the stage and buildings to block lines of sight, but nothing came of the idea. The local officers and Secret Service agents operated on separate radio channels, and the only communications connection between the Secret Service and police communication centers was via cell phone. Some agents' radios had technical problems or didn't work, while the counter unmanned aerial system was inoperative at the time the shooter Thomas Matthew Crooks flew a drone over the rally site in the afternoon.

Crooks fired his shots at 6:11 p.m. At 5:44 p.m., the Secret Service security room got word that local police had spotted a suspicious person with a rangefinder near the AGR building. This should have been a five-alarm event, yet key Secret Service personnel weren't told that local police had



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

That's the thing, just like with so-


abused the privilege of having cameras on our phones. Too many people have self-awareness, or spacial awareness come

observed Crooks and lost track of him.

Three minutes before Crooks fired, a local law enforcement officer sent a radio alert that someone was on the AGR roof, with the Secret Service security room getting word a minute after that.

When a Secret Service countersniper saw local police running with their guns drawn toward the AGR building, it didn't occur to him to tell Trump's detail to get him off the stage. He said the police running meant only an "elevated" threat level.

The explanation of one top Secret

Service officer -- "I can't put out fires that I don't know exist" -- should never be acceptable. It could have been worse, but that's not the standard.

Given the contents of the Senate report, it's not shocking that the Secret Service allowed another would-be assassin to get close to Trump just two months later. An agency that should fade into the background because the quality of its work can always be taken for granted is instead a national embar-

Spicy-Sugared Walnuts

1 C. Sugar

1 tsp. salt

2 tsp. cinnamon

½ tsp. nutmeg

½ tsp. cloves

½ C. water

2 C. walnut halves

Combine sugar, salt, cinnamon, nutmeg, cloves and water. Boil together, stirring often to 236 degrees on candy thermometer (soft ball stage). Remove from heat and add walnuts, stirring until creamy. Turn out on waxed paper and separate walnuts.

Who doesn't like to mix some ingredients together in one pan and have dinner? There is a chapter in this book for casseroles, so I picked (shredded) a couple that really sound good.

Chicken Enchilada Casserole

1 can Cream of Mushroom soup

1 C. Milk

2 - 7 oz. cans Ortega Green chili salsa or 1 can green chili salsa and 1 can tomato sauce.

1 C. Chicken broth

1-1/2 doz. Corn tortillas

1 large can olives, sliced

4 C. grated longhorn cheese

1 T. chopped onion

1 cooked chicken

Combine first four ingredients together. Cut tortillas and chicken into bite-size pieces. Butter a large baking dish. Starting with the tortillas, layer tortillas, chicken, cheese, olives and sauce. Repeat layers. When complete, top with onions. Refrigerate four to five hours or overnight. Bake at 350 for one hour 15 min.

Chili Rellenos Bake

1-1/2 lb. hamburger

1 C. chopped onion

2 cans 7 oz. green chilies

2 ½ C sharp cheddar cheese

2 ¼ C milk

6 eggs, beaten

34 C. flour

1 tsp. salt

½ tsp. pepper

Several dashes hot pepper sauce.

Brown beef and onions; drain off fat. Sprinkle with salt and pep-

Remove seeds from chilies and dice. Place half the chilies in baking dish and sprinkle with the cheese. Top with meat mixture. Place remaining chilies over

Combine remaining ingredients and beat until smooth. Pour over meat. Bake in moderate 350 oven for 50 to 60 minutes or until knife inserted comes out clean. Cool five minutes before serving. This dish

Being a late bloomer, he was 34 years old before he attained a bachelor's degree. In his forties, he started a Master's Degree but never finished it. 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

Here are some interesting general facts pulled from different sources about the beginning of Madera, relating to its history as well as today's community.

Madera's history began with a California lumber company's establishment of the town of Madera in 1876. The town was named after the Spanish word for "lumber" – Madera – because of the lumber company's connection to the area. The town was built where the company's flume met the railroad. A lumber flume refers to a long, water-filled channel used by lumber companies to transport cut logs or partially finished lumber from the mill to a shipping location.

The first post office in Madera opened in 1877. At the time, the Madera community was located in Fresno County. Madera County was established on May 16, 1893, after a special election in Fresno County. The vote was 1,179 to 358 in favor of separating from Fresno County. Madera became the first incorporated City in Madera County on March 27, 1907 and became the County Seat.

#### 2020 Census

Madera County's median household income is reported at \$76,920, which is below California's median of \$91,551, reflecting economic disparities within the region. Additionally, Madera County's poverty rate of 24.3 percent surpasses the state's 12.2 percent rate, underscoring significant economic challenges, particularly affecting children under 18, with 38.2 percent living in poverty. Comparatively, Madera County's median income slightly exceeds the national median of \$69,717,

however, its poverty rate of 22.0 percent also exceeds the national average, indicating a notable income inequality within the county.

In terms of housing, Madera County offers relatively more affordable options compared to the rest of California, with a median gross rent of \$1,189 against the state's \$1,870. The homeownership rate in Madera County is 69.0 percent, which is higher than California's rate of 55.8 percent.

The labor force participation rate in Madera County is 56.4 percent, which is lower than the national rate. The County has a youthful demographic, with 27.1 percent under 18 years old, compared to the national figure of 22.4 percent. The percentage of elderly residents in Madera County is slightly below the U.S. average.

Madera County is notable for its higher percentage of foreign-born residents at 20.3 percent, surpassing the national average. This contributes to the county's multicultural identity, with a significant Hispanic or Latino population of 59.6 percent. Linguistic diversity is evident, with 46.5 percent of residents speaking a language other than English at home. An estimated 12,500 to 15,000 people in Madera County are undocumented immigrants.

The California History and Family Research Room is in today's Madera County Library. This room has records and historical information about the county's social, political, economic and cultural development.



Routes to Schools.

We heard that many of our communities felt overlooked, lacking the investments they see happening in other areas. The Measure now sets aside 10% of all revenues for disadvantaged communities using the same criteria as those used by the state and federal governments for grant eligibility.

Regional projects identified in our Regional Transportation Plan, updated in 2022, will be eligible for 14.5% of the funds. We doubled investments in transit to address the future needs of our aging population, which may include point-topoint service and on-demand options.

Finally, we drastically improved the process for Citizen Oversight, mandating quarterly public meetings and presentations to the MCTA Board, offering the option of an independent auditor selected by the Oversight Committee, and enhancing outreach to support better transparency.

It's hard to overstate the immense amount of outreach conducted to develop this new expenditure plan for Measure T. More than 40 meetings and presentations, nine town halls, and a Measure website with thousands of visitors provided opportunities to ask questions and review all expenditures made for the last 17 years. We conducted two statistically valid polls to confirm what we thought we heard from the public.

In the end, I am very proud of this effort, my staff, and all the partners, steering committee members, and others who developed this community-based plan, which has the potential to bring over three-quarters of a billion dollars to our County and Cities. Our transportation infrastructure is crucial for our future economic growth, safety, and community sustainability. For more information, please visit MeasureT-2024.com.

## Trump to Withhold Cal Disaster Funds

Speaking from the Trump National Golf Course in Rancho Palos Verdes in September, former President Donald Trump said that, if elected, he would withhold federal disaster money from California until Governor Gavin Newsom allows more water to go to farmlands and cities in the Southern part of the state.

For years, Trump and California have been at odds over water usage in California. During his term in office, Trump constantly battled California over where water flowed, with Newsom and California pushing more water for environmental reasons, such as releasing water from reservoirs in drought years to help protect endangered fish species, while Trump pushed for more water to go to farms. This came to a head in 2020, with then-President Trump signing an order to divert water to farms in California, only for the state to file a lawsuit against the Trump administration the very next day.

This water diversion soon bent toward environmental reasons during the Biden years. When the megadrought occurred in the early 2020s, California's environmental diversion programs, particularly in releasing water from reservoirs for water outflow for fish, began being severely challenged. More Californians came out against the state policies, with farmers warning that more diversions could decimate the California farm industry, even with city and rural conservation measures coming into place.

However, wet winters in 2022-2023 and 2023-2024 erased the drought. Now drought free, and with reservoirs literally overflowing, the state went back to having enough water for urban, rural and environ-

mental uses. However, with future droughts likely on the horizon, future battles between the state and others over water usage are likely to come. Both Biden and Newsom are attempting to put federal and state laws into place by January so that, in case Trump wins, he may not be able to do as much about water usage compared to 2020. Speaking from Rancho Palos Verdes in Los Angeles County, Trump struck back in his own way, saying that he would force California to bend to federal rules on water usage.

"Gavin Newscum [sic] is going to sign those papers," said Trump on Friday. "If he doesn't sign those papers, we won't give him money to put out all his fires, and if we don't give him the money to put out his fires, he's got problems. To protect a little tiny fish called a 'smelt,' they send millions and millions of gallons of water out to the Pacific Ocean. If they turned it back, all of that water would come right down here and right into Los Angeles.

"I'm here today in California with a very simple message for the American people: We cannot allow comrade Kamala Harris and the communist left to do to America what they did to California. The state of California is a mess, with people leaving, and nothing's gonna stop them. Those fields are going to be all green instead of 1 percent green. And maybe even more important, you're not going to have illegal immigrants pouring into your country and killing your family. You're not going to have the problems that you have right now. We're going to lower your taxes. But with this group, everything is dead. The water coming here is dead. He's a lousy governor."

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
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
