
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

In This Issue

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On Monday, Oct. 21, the Madera County Board of Supervisors adopted a resolution declaring Madera County a "Second Amendment Sanctuary" County with a 4-0 vote, with one abstention.

The Second Amendment to the United States Constitution protects the right of the people to keep and bear arms. It says, "A well-regulated militia, being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms, shall not be infringed." Across the nation, counties have adopted "Second Amendment Sanctuary" resolutions to reaffirm their commitment to this fundamental right. District 1 Supervisor Jordan Wamhoff

became alarmed by recent actions by Governor Gavin Newsom and California's state legislature for placing increasing restrictions on responsible, law-abiding gun owners.

"The Governor's sweeping gun control legislation targets law-abiding citizens instead of cracking down on criminal behavior," said Wamhoff. "This resolution sends a clear message that Madera County stands with the Constitution, the Second Amendment and the rights of responsible gun owners."

The resolution declares Madera County a "Second Amendment Sanctuary," symbolizing the County's support for the constitutional rights of lawful gun owners and aligning Madera with other counties throughout California and the nation that have taken similar action. The resolution does not change existing laws or enforcement practices, but serves as a symbolic affirmation of Madera County's support for the Second Amendment and the freedoms it guarantees.

It is estimated that there are thousands of "Second Amendment Sanctuary" counties across the U.S., though the exact number is difficult to pinpoint as many have adopted resolutions rather than local laws. These counties pass non-binding resolutions to declare their opposition to stricter gun control laws and their commitment to protecting Second Amendment rights, but local law enforcement is still required to enforce state and federal laws.

A Second Amendment sanctuary resolution

means it's a symbolic resolution passed by a local government to express its opposition to potential new gun laws at the state or federal level. These resolutions are often not legally binding and do not change how local law enforcement operates and Sheriffs and police are still obligated to enforce state and federal laws, but what the resolution does show is a political signal to state-level politicians that voters and local officials support Second Amendment protections and may influence legislative decisions. Citizens may become encouraged to contact politicians and create platforms for pro-gun rights legislation.

The "Second Amendment Sanctuary" movement is a response to gun control measures and is distinct from "sanctuary cities" or counties, which are typically associated with limiting cooperation with federal immigration enforcement. Some jurisdictions are designated as "sanctuary" for immigration purposes, but this is a separate issue from Second Amendment Sanctuary resolutions.

Like any other contentious political issue, Second Amendment sanctuary is very complex. Some consider its legal status to be non-existent, while others believe it is imperative for maintaining rights guaranteed to citizens under the Second Amendment. Regardless, new laws are sure to come, new challenges to those laws are sure to be initiated, and this debate will rage on as an important facet of firearms discourse in the United States.

Tesoro Viejo A.M. Raid Arrests

rant served at a home in Tesoro Viejo on Thursday, Oct. 9 resulted in two arrests – a 35-year-old woman and a 15-year-old boy. Authorities say they were searching for illegal weapons, firearms and wanted fugitives.

unmatched expertise to high-risk cases, and together we are enhancing public safety throughout Madera County," said Sheriff Tyson Pogue.

Scholarship Opportunities Available

California table grape growers are once again providing scholarship opportunities to graduating high school seniors from the table grape growing regions of California. Three categories of scholarships are available again in 2026.

Two scholarships are available to field workers and their families. The Field Worker Bridge Scholarship is a \$14,500 scholarship for students who will attend two years at a community college and transfer to a four-year university in California. The Field Worker Scholarship is a \$25,000 scholarship for students who will attend a four-year university in California. Eligible high school graduates or graduating seniors, or their parent/legal guardian, must have been employed as a field worker in a California table grape vineyard during the 2025 harvest or plan to be employed during the 2026 season to be eligible for the Field Worker Scholar-

The third scholarship is a \$25,000 Agricultural Scholarship available for students interested in building a career in the California table grape industry and investing their undergraduate years of study in academic areas related to the industry. Eligible high school graduates or graduating seniors must pursue a four-year undergraduate degree from a California university in a field of study pertinent to table grapes and be residents of the Coachella or San Joaquin valleys.

Three scholarships from each category are available. Applicants for all scholarships must plan to attend a California college or university. The deadline to apply for all scholarships is Friday, February 6, 2026.

Whereas "international opinion" believed we had to isolate and cut off Israel, Trump armed the Jewish state, bombed Iran and squeezed Qatar to bring Hamas to heel -- and it worked. The deal is a tribute to avoiding the well-worn ruts of Middle East diplomacy.

As for Israel, it needed to find a

way out of a conflict that had become a disaster. Getting the hostages back is an important national goal, even if the exchange is lopsided (these swaps always are). Meanwhile, Israel will pull back to an agreed-upon line, but still hold an estimated 53% of Gaza as a security

buffer. Even if things eventually go south again, Israel has bought time by decimating Hamas and significantly diminishing the threats from Iran and Hezbollah.


It is certainly true that Phase 2 of the deal, which is supposed to disarm Hamas and establish a technocratic Palestinian government in Gaza, will be much more difficult to pull off. If it were to come to fruition, though, it would be transformative for Israel's security and for the lives of Gazans.

There will presumably be no speeches at Hollywood awards ceremonies crediting Trump for his peacemaking. Among other things, there's too much cognitive dissonance in saying, "I think President Trump is a dangerous fascist -- but appreciate how bound and determined he is to end conflicts around the world.'

Trump is a gonzo version of standard U.S. foreign policy. All American presidents want to make peace in the Middle East, and all want, whether they say it or not, to win the Nobel Peace Prize. What's different about Trump is his methods, and his openness about seeking a call from the



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


I also have a theory that my friends can't get me to let go of. I'm convinced some of it is real, why else would a levelheaded person such as myself be so terrified, right? RIGHT?

No Crust to Screw Up

Stick it in the oven and forget it for an hour and half. Easy, peasy. My 11 year old niece could have made it last year or the year before! But wait, Sara's recipe is as good as her story:

Make the pumpkin-pie mixture from the large can of Libby's pumpkin. Pour it into a large deep casserole. (I'd say she used about a 3 quart Corningware dish.)

In a large bowl blend a packaged spice cake mix with two cubes melted butter.

Drop this mixture by spoonfuls on top of the pie mixture in the casserole dish.

Bake at 350 for about 1 ½ hours.

Now I ask you - doesn't that sound good? How about a big spoon of this with a

> blob of whipped cream on it - or a scoop of vanilla ice cream. Yummy.

The following bread pumpkin recipes are for everyone, but especially for the lady that called the office and requested them and before I could get back to her, I misplaced her phone number. The first

one is my mother's:

Pumpkin Anyone?

And what are you reminded of when we say "Pumpkin"? Pumpkin Pie, Pumpkin Bread and lots of other desserts made with pumpkins? Most people don't bother with seeding, peeling, and cooking a pumpkin any more, they just buy a can.

Although pumpkin pie is not my favorite, my mom did make delicious ones. She usually made two for Thanksgiving except when she knew her grandson Steve would be there, then she would always make a couple extras. She didn't have any secret recipe, not even one written on her cards. Her recipe was on the back of a can of Libby's pumpkin. Each large can will make two pies.

In going through mama's recipe cards, I found this one. She has cut it out of a newspaper and taped it to one of her cards so I will copy it as it is. If you can't make good pie crust (like me) or just don't like to make pie crust, this recipe would be ideal

Pumpkin Nut Bread

- 1 C margarine
- 3 C sugar
- 3 eggs
- 1 large can pumpkin
- 3 C sifted all purpose flour
- 1 ½ tsp salt
- 1 tsp baking soda
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 1 tsp cinnamon
- 1 tsp cloves
- ½ tsp nutmeg
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 2 C chopped nuts
- 1 C raisins

Cream together margarine and sugar. Beat in eggs, add pumpkin and vanilla, mixing well. Sift together dry ingredients, blend with pumpkin mixture. Add nuts and

Bake in loaf pans for 40 to 45 minutes in preheated 350 oven.

The following recipe is my sister Faye's (Randy's mom). You will notice it doesn't take any eggs.

Faye's Pumpkin Bread

Oven 350 Yield – 3 loaves

- 1 can pumpkin
- 4 C sugar
- 1 C oil

Mix together, then add to pumpkin mixture:

- 2 tsp baking soda
- 2 tsp cinnamon
- 1 tsp cloves
- 1 tsp nutmeg
- 1 tsp salt
- 5 C flour

Bake in prepared pans 70 minutes

I have a very dear friend living in Chowchilla that I went to school with since the seventh grade. She took over as manager of the high school cafeteria when my mother retired. Every year she invites my sisters and me up to her house for a Christmas luncheon. A couple of years ago she served a pumpkin roll that was really delicious. I asked her for the recipe and I'll pass it on to you.

Pumpkin Cake Roll

3 eggs

1 C sugar

1 tsp lemon juice

2/3 C pumpkin

1 C chopped nuts

3/4 C flour

1 tsp baking powder

½ tsp ginger

½ tsp salt

2 tsp cinnamon

1/4 tsp nutmeg

Filling:

1 C powdered sugar

6 oz. pkg. cream cheese- softened

1/4 C butter - softened

½ tsp vanilla

Preheat oven at 375. Grease a 15x10x1 inch baking pan and line with waxed paper. Grease and flour the paper. Set aside.

In a mixing bowl, beat eggs on high for 5 minutes. Gradually beat in sugar until thick and lemon colored. Add pumpkin and lemon juice.

In another bowl (I use a large piece of wax paper so you won't have another bowl to wash) mix flour, cinnamon, baking powder, salt, ginger and nutmeg, fold into pumpkin mixture.

Spread batter into prepared pan, sprinkle with nuts.

Bake at 375 for 15 minutes or until



cake springs back when lightly touched. Be careful not to bake too long or it will be too dry to roll.

Immediately turn out on a clean towel that has been dusted with powdered sugar. Peel off paper and roll cake up in the towel starting with the narrow end. Cool.

Meantime, in a mixing bowl, beat cream cheese, 1 cup powdered sugar, butter and vanilla until fluffy.

When cake has cooled, carefully unroll the cake. Spread filling over cake to within 1 inch of edges. Roll up again (not in towel). Cover and chill until serving. Dust with powdered sugar if desired.

Nobel committee.

A hallmark of his policymaking at its best is an unwillingness to take "no" for an answer, an unremitting sense of urgency and a creativity that is considered unrealistic or reckless by conventional metrics. We saw it during his first term with his success in securing the border, with the historic achievement of Operation Warp Speed and with the Abraham Accords.

"The reasonable man adapts himself to the world," George Bernard Shaw maintained, "the unreasonable one persists in trying to adapt the world to himself. Therefore, all progress depends on the unreasonable man."

In this sense, Trump is usefully un-

reasonable. Everyone around the world needs to be a little afraid of him, while he is willing to talk to anyone or consider anything. His optimism can be misplaced (the Ukraine war was a tougher nut than he thought) and his highly personalized diplomacy can misfire (he got unnecessarily crosswise with Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi), but he can also prove all his doubters wrong.

The Washington cliche is that there is no limit to the good you can do if you don't care who gets the credit. Trump shows, to the contrary, that sometimes there is no limit to the good you can do if you want all the credit.
