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
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Truth Cannot Be Killed

A Tribute to Charlie Kirk

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The assassination of Charlie Kirk was not just the killing of a brilliant young mind, a husband, and a father; it was an attempt to kill the truth. It was an attempt to kill a movement of young adults engaging in public discourse about the essential truths of humanity. And it was an attempt to kill civility.

This is not to say that everything Charlie said was true; I don't think that is the case for any of us. But Charlie Kirk engaged the arena of ideas more courageously, more robustly, more civilly, and with more faith than just about anyone in the public square today, which is why he had such a following among the youth. He was different.

He did not, as far as I could tell, use the inflammatory language so common in

today's public discourse. He was obviously a staunch conservative and a man of genuine faith, with firm convictions and a preternatural gift for debate, all of which got him killed. But his conservatism was not ideological or partisan. It came from conviction, well-reasoned conviction.

The loss of Charlie Kirk at the hands of yet another practitioner of the culture of death is a tragedy for the country since he, more than anyone else, attempted good faith efforts to model civil discourse and debate in the public square. His hallmark characteristic was to use speech, with patience and kindness, not violence, to address divisive issues. You might disagree with him, but he would give anyone a genuine hearing and then respond.

The assassin and those who are pleased

with the fact that Charlie Kirk is no longer in the public arena fail to understand that what was attacked was not so much a man as the idea that the truth is more powerful than a bullet.

This sort of violence is a tacit admission that untruths are not powerful enough to combat the truth. It is cowardice, but also the fruit of the failure of lies. Yes, there is profound loss with the death of Charlie, but the truth that he relentlessly pursued cannot be killed. In the end, truth will prevail.

Just by telling the truth, we can defeat evil. This, I hope, is part of Charlie's legacy. The best way to respond to this tragedy is with truth, since the light of truth is what destroys lies, even violent lies.

We are living through a perilous moment in history. Wars in Ukraine and the Middle East threaten lives and peace everywhere. The cold civil war that exists in our country is heating up and threatens widespread violence. To acknowledge obvious truths is becoming increasingly dangerous.

And yet each of us has an obligation to speak the truth. We may not be able to do it as cleverly as Charlie did, but we must be willing to risk everything for the truth. We must give ourselves to the truth with the belief that even in death, the truth will prevail. Simply by telling the truth, evil and untruths will be defeated.

We are in a serious struggle for our freedoms and our culture, and the murder of Charlie Kirk seems to be an inflection point. Where do we go from here? There is a danger that his death will lead to more violence. Anger over his death is certainly justified, but violence will not win the day. The virtues that Charlie exhibited are what's needed: Patience and kindness with a firm commitment to the truth.

Sadly, the open – and at times violent

– hostility toward people of traditional faith in this country is becoming a new normal. Yes, there are examples of conservatives behaving badly, but it is obvious that the violence building in our country is directed at people of traditional faith.

We are not facing the systematic persecution of Nero, but the persecution is real, nonetheless. Lives are being lost, but the culture of death is destructive in other ways as well. My two teenage children were both fans of Charlie Kirk. On Wednesday, their innocence was taken away. They now know that to hold ideas that conflict with the progressive Left means that they, too, are hated and that hatred can turn violent.

Ultimately, of course, the response can only be an unwavering commitment to the truths of the Gospel. Belonging to God allows us to defeat lies and deception. Charlie Kirk was a Christian and outspoken about his faith. We've been learning that his wife went to daily Mass and that Charlie sometimes went with her. His murder cannot be separated from the fact that he had deep, personal faith.

The Christian faith is not safe. It requires a commitment to the truth that demands sacrifice. Let's hope, not the sacrifice of one's life, but our life is about the eternal, and it requires a commitment to the truth. If necessary, the commitment of a martyr.

Let us pray that Charlie's life will inspire more of us courageously to commit to the truth regardless of the risk.

For this election, ballots will be mailed out starting Oct. 6. and Drop boxes will be open to receive ballots on Oct. 6. The last day to register to vote will be Oct. 20.

11-Day vote centers will open, on Oct. 25. and 4-Day vote centers will open on Nov. 1.

Important Reminder: As with every election, if you return your ballot by mail, it must be postmarked by Election Day Nov. 4, 2025.

Rash of Vehicle Robberies in Riverstone Resolved

Riverstone was being plagued by a rash of vehicle burglaries, but with the arrest of 38-year-old Felipe Martinez Medina of Fresno by Madera County Sheriff's Office, the burglaries have stopped.

Between Aug. 28 and Sept. 2, Madera County Sheriff's Office received multiple reports of burglaries from unlocked vehicles in Riverstone. The things stolen ranged from a firearm, a tool kit and a stereo, to vehicle keys, mail and other property. Sheriff's Deputies used home surveillance footage to help in their investigation. It was this footage that helped identify the suspect vehicle, a black mid-sized SUV. They were then able to trace the vehicle to a 2008 Ford Edge and to the identification of Medina. Upon checking

Medina's record, it was discovered he was on Post Release Community Supervision for a prior stolen vehicle offense. He was also arrested in Fresno on Sept. 2nd with another stolen vehicle. Search warrants were obtained for his home, which led to the recovery of stolen mail and other property linked to yet another case in Clovis.

"Those who target Madera County should think twice," said Sheriff Tyson Pogue. "Our communities are protected by strong law enforcement and advanced technology. Criminals will be stopped, caught and prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law."

Madera County District Attorney Sally Moreno said, "My office will aggressively prosecute those who victimize

Madera County residents. Criminals need to know that we will hold offenders accountable and seek justice for our community."

My homeowners insurance was cancelled a couple years back. I have not found affordable insurance since. I've been denied for the following reasons(purportedly).

• Our subdivision is under threat of wildfires due to insufficient fire breaks along adjacent grazing lands — to which I do agree. This area experiences high winds daily. And 16-20' breaks will easily be breached by flying embers. Many properties within our subdivision are also in violation of fire prevention ordinances. Is this situation no longer being monitored?

• Secondly, I have been refused coverage because there is not a fire hydrant or fire station within 5 miles of my home. Station 19 is 5.2 miles away. It's been that way for 40-50 years. But with the density of

homes today, this needs serious consideration. The Tesoro Viejo subdivision has a modern fire station.

With just a little more consideration the station could have been placed West of that project and served both communities. Are there any plans for a new fire station to protect our community?

• As it stands now, I would have a difficult time selling my home as prospective buyers applying for a mortgage would be denied for lack of insurance. Lowering the value of my property and property taxes to Madera County.


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

Left's Political Violence

A recent post by Elon Musk on X has ignited a firestorm by highlighting a stark graph depicting “2023 Combined Violence Rates by Party.” The graph shows a towering blue bar for Democrats at 21,765 — dwarfing the red Republican bar at a mere 858. This isn’t just about general crime; it’s a damning indictment of how Democrat-run cities breed chaos, often spilling over into outright political violence. Musk’s amplification underscores a truth conservatives have known for years: Almost all political violence in America stems from the radical left and the Democrats who enable it. From historical assassinations to modern riots and targeted killings, the evidence is overwhelming — and it’s backfiring on the left as Americans wake up to their dangerous agenda.

This graph is a snapshot of a deeper pattern where Democrat policies like soft-on-crime prosecutors, defund-the-police madness and open borders create breeding grounds for violence. In cities like Chicago, New York and San Francisco — all under

decades of Democrat control — homicide rates soar, and political extremism festers. And when that violence turns political, it’s almost exclusively from the left. Take the tragic assassination of Turning Point USA founder Charlie Kirk just last week at a college event. Kirk, a vocal conservative advocate, was gunned down in what Republicans are calling a direct result of leftist rhetoric demonizing the right. House Republicans have demanded an

investigation into left-wing networks, pointing to a pattern of incitement that goes beyond one incident.

As one Town-hall columnist put it, this is the “rising tide of left-wing political violence,” fueled by Democrats who justify ag-

gression in the name of “social justice.” The response from Democrats? Predictably tone-deaf. Rep. Seth Moulton’s deranged remarks downplaying the violence as part of a broader “problem” ignored the left’s culpability, while a Democrat senator’s thread bizarrely tried to equate both sides — missing the point that polls nuke the narrative of equivalence. A recent poll shredded CNN’s talking points, showing the left is far more likely to justify political violence and even celebrate deaths like Kirk’s. This isn’t hyperbole; it’s data-backed reality. The left’s extremist policies — pushing gender ideology, racial division, and unchecked immigration — have led them to extreme suppression of dissent, including violence. As Chloe Trapanotto noted on her show on X, the media lies about symmetry between left and right violence, but it’s not even close.

Look no further than the two assassination attempts on President Donald Trump this year alone. The first, in Butler, Pennsylvania by Thomas Matthew Crooks, was spun by the media as a “Republican” act because of his registration — but conservatives knew better. Crooks donated to Act-

Summer Needs to Leave


Summer needs to leave.

know it's breathtaking. A definite win for autumn.



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

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
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Clearing the Path to a User-friendly Kitchen

I was recently on an app that was not easy to navigate. Things weren't where I'd expect to find them. Information was missing, features weren't labeled correctly, and event dates had passed.

A well-designed app provides a clear path to what you need. Related items are grouped and labeled logically and unnecessary clutter removed. Your kitchen should work the same way.

Is your kitchen missing the mark? Are items hard to find? Do labeled shelves no longer match their contents? Are cabinets cluttered with extra mugs, food storage containers, or pots you haven't

touched in years? Are expired items going unnoticed? These tips and tools will help you restore order and create a kitchen that's as intuitive as a great app.

Purge & sort – Methodically clear out cabinets and drawers. Evaluate each item: Is it still relevant to your current lifestyle? That cake-decorating kit from a decade ago

or toddler plates for kids now in elementary school might need to go. Apply the "need, use, or love" test — every item must earn its keep.

Avoid the trap of thinking, "Now that I've found it, I'll use it." If it's been forgotten this long, it's unlikely to be used now. Keep trash and donation bags nearby for anything that doesn't pass the test. Toss expired dry goods and opened cereals untouched for months.

As you purge, sort keepers into categories on a table or counter: baking, dinnerware, glasses, utensils, food storage, cookware, etc. Discard unnecessary duplicates. Clean the inside of the cabinets and drawers.

Optimize placement – Just like the home page is the easiest point of access on an app, the waist to eye range is the easiest point of access in your kitchen. No step stools or bending required.

Is your kitchen missing the mark? Are items hard to find? Do labeled shelves no longer match their contents? Are cabinets cluttered with extra mugs, food storage containers, or pots you haven't touched in years? Are expired items going unnoticed? These tips and tools will help you restore order and create a kitchen that's as intuitive as a great app.

Determine which categories are used most often and place them in this prime real estate. Factor in where they're used. Place pots, potholders and cooking utensils near the stove/oven. Dishes and glassware near the dishwasher or dining area. Mugs near the coffee maker,

etc.

Adjust cabinet shelf height to minimize wasted vertical space and make things easier to reach.

Organizing tools – Three-tier cabinet organizers and turn tables provide better visibility and access — especially in corners. Containerize front items in deep cabinets

From Soup to ... Soup!

(September 2015)

Editor's Note: With the passing of Aunt Jean, I have decided to bring you a "Best Of" of her recipes over the past 10 years. Good recipes are timeless and I hope you enjoy them all over again.



Have you had just about enough of this hot weather? I know we haven't had some of those 115 degree days I remember from the past, but I for one don't like those kinds of records.

Looking at the calendar, the first day of fall was Monday, Sept. 22. Doesn't that sound great? Makes me think of being able to cook and not worrying about heating up the kitchen or the whole house.

I think just about everyone likes soup (I know some people who could eat soup any day of the year), so looking forward to the cooler weather, let's talk soup this month.

Basic Vegetable Soup

1 T olive oil
1 onion – chopped
2 ribs celery – sliced
2 carrots, peeled & chopped

6 cups vegetables, chopped
4 C Liquid
15 ounces canned diced tomatoes
1 T dried herbs
½ tsp. kosher salt

In a large pot or Dutch oven heat olive oil on medium heat. Add onion, celery and carrots and stir and well coat with oil. Cook, stirring occasionally, until vegetables turn golden. Stir in vegetables, let cook for a few minutes, stirring often. Cover with liquid; add tomatoes and dried herbs and salt. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat until a slow simmer. Cover and let cook for about 30 minutes or until vegetables are done.

This recipe is so versatile you can do just about anything

with it – the varieties are endless:

The 6 cups of vegetables can be anything you or your family like. With the summer gardens winding down, there are different varieties of squash, okra, green beans, potatoes (including yams or sweet potatoes) or bell peppers. Or from the farmer's market, how about turnips or cabbage. If you don't have fresh vegetables available, how about canned corn, or green beans. Or how about frozen green beans, corn, peas or even a package of mixed vegetables. If you are going to use baby spinach or

Swiss chard wait until the last five minutes of cooking before adding them.

Liquid can be water or vegetable broth for you vegetarians, but the rest of us can use either chicken or beef stock. I read one recipe

that used V-8 for a liquid – but that would be your choice.

Be careful when adding dried herbs. Remember that they are stronger dried than fresh. You can use dried basil, Italian seasoning, or anything you prefer.

Carrot Soup

4 C hot water
4 tsp. instant bouillon (or 1 bouillon cube)
2 cloves garlic, minced
1 onion, chopped (about 1 ½ cups)
1 rib celery, chopped
2 T butter or olive oil
1 pound carrots, peeled and sliced
1 large potato, chopped
½ tsp. thyme
¼ tsp. ground dill
2 tsp. kosher salt
¼ tsp. black pepper

1 ½ C milk
Heat water and bouillon in the microwave until hot. Meanwhile, sauté garlic, onion and celery in butter until tender in a Dutch oven. Add water and all remaining ingredients except milk. Bring to a boil, cover and reduce heat to maintain a slow simmer. Simmer until the carrots are done – about 30 minutes. Puree in small batches in a blender or food processor. Or, if you have an immersion blender it would work right in the pan. Return mixture to pan, add milk and return to temperature without letting it boil. The milk can be whatever you choose. To keep the calories down use skim milk but for a creamier soup use whole milk – or anything in-between.

Quick and Easy Chicken Noodle Soup

1 T Butter
½ C chopped onion
½ C chopped celery
1 C chopped carrots
4 (14.5 ounces) cans chicken broth
1 (14.5 Ounces) can veg-

etable broth
½ pound chopped cooked chicken

1 ½ C egg noodles
½ tsp. dried basil
½ tsp. dried oregano
Salt and pepper to taste

In large pot over medium heat, melt butter. Cook onion, celery and carrots in butter until just tender. Pour in chicken and vegetable broths and stir in chicken, noodles and seasonings. Bring to boil, then reduce heat and simmer about 20 minutes until everything is done.

Do you have a favorite soup or a traditional soup? I read that Ruth Graham wrote that when her family was in China as missionaries her mother always served Oyster Stew for Christmas morning breakfast. After she and Billy were married she continued the tradition with her family.

I have spent the last two Christmas Eves with Randy and his family and he has served his world-famous (so he says) Corn Chowder for dinner.

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

so you can remove them easily to reach the back items.

Install metal or wood sliding drawers in cabinets for heavy items like food processors, instant pots and glass bakeware. Cutlery and utensil organizers prevent jumbled drawers by separating measuring spoons, spatulas, tongs, etc. Keep frequently used utensils in a caddy near the stove.

Use lay-flat stacking water bottle organizers. Store trays and cookie sheets in vertical

stands. Label bins for pantry items.

Reserve countertops – for daily use objects like a coffee maker, toaster, etc. Free up counter space by storing K-cups, knives, or can openers in under-cabinet organizers.

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

Blue, the Democrat fundraising arm, and his social media reeked of leftist influences. The second attempt, by Ryan Wesley Routh in Florida, was even clearer: A hardcore leftist who supported Ukraine aid, hated Trump, and echoed Democrat talking points about "democracy" threats. These aren't isolated; they're part of a continuum where Democrats' inflammatory rhetoric — like calling Trump a "fascist" or "Hitler" — incites their base to action. As Breitbart reported, even MSNBC's Peter Baker admitted the left has engaged in violence, though he weakly tried to pivot to Trump's words. This pattern isn't new. The 2020 BLM and Antifa riots, which Democrats cheered as "mostly peaceful," caused over \$2 billion in damage, injured thousands of police officers and led to dozens of deaths.

Cities burned while Kamala Harris raised bail money for rioters, and Joe Biden dismissed the chaos. The Federalist called it out: The left threatened, "It votes Biden, or it gets the riots again," using violence as electoral blackmail. Contrast that with January 6 — hyped as an "insurrection" but resulting in no armed takeover — just a riot the left uses to criminalize opposition while ignoring their own far worse excesses. Go back further, and the left's violent history is undeniable. In 2017, a Bernie Sanders supporter shot up a Republican congressional baseball practice, nearly killing House Whip Steve Scalise. Rep. Louie Gohmert warned then that such violence was no surprise given the left's portrayal of conservatives as evil. That same year, Sen. Rand Paul was brutally assaulted by a leftist neighbor, suffering broken ribs. In 2022, an armed man tried to assassinate Supreme Court Justice Brett Kavanaugh after Democrats leaked the Dobbs decision and whipped up hysteria over abortion. Pro-life centers faced a wave of firebombings by

Jane's Revenge, a radical left group, yet legacy media like ABC and NBC buried the story to avoid highlighting left-wing terrorism.

Campus violence is another left-wing staple. At Berkeley in 2017, antifa thugs rioted to shut down conservative speakers, beating attendees while administrators looked the other way. More recently, pro-Hamas encampments turned violent, with chants of "Globalize the Intifada" calling for murder — yet Democrats excused it as "free speech." As Josh Hammer wrote, "... we must stop treating these genocidal calls as acceptable." Even in 2022, an attack on New York GOP gubernatorial candidate Lee Zeldin was dismissed by the left, with Ben Domenech predicting such violence would worsen under Democrat rule. Historically, Democrats have blood on their hands. Abraham Lincoln was assassinated by John Wilkes Booth, a Democrat sympathizer opposed to emancipation. JFK was killed by Lee Harvey Oswald, a communist defector to the Soviet Union. The Weather Underground, a leftist terror group in the 1970s, bombed buildings in pursuit of revolution. Fast-forward, and the left's embrace of violence continues, justified by their moral superiority complex.

Republicans, committed to inalienable rights and law and order, reject such tactics — proving the right's moral high ground. Elon Musk's graph is a wake-up call: Democrat control equals violence, and political violence is their specialty. As Americans see through the media's gaslighting, the left's tactics are crumbling. Trump's resilience after two attempts shows the MAGA movement's strength, while Kirk's death galvanizes conservatives. The backfire is real — voters are fleeing the party of chaos for the party of peace. If Democrats want to end the violence, they should start by looking in the mirror.
