If nine California Democrats have their way

... you won't even be allowed to vote for this man. **By Dustin Gardiner**

emocrats in the California Legislature are trying a novel approach to remove former President Donald Trump from the state's March 5 primary ballot. But first they need a fellow state Democrat to get on board the longshot effort.

Just Nine Lawmakers

Nine California lawmakers wrote a letter to Attorney General Rob Bonta over the weekend, arguing that Trump isn't eligible to be on the ballot for inciting an insurrection when a mob of his supporters attacked the U.S. Capitol on Jan. 6, 2021. The move, which comes amid several lawsuits to keep Trump off state ballots across the country, is unique because Bonta could use his standing as California's top law enforcement officer to expedite a state court ruling on the matter. Should the effort succeed, California could be the first state to bump Trump off its ballot, even if the ruling is ultimately overturned. Bonta would also be the country's first state attorney general to take a swing at knocking Trump off the ballot. The other cases rely on secretaries of state.

Like the suits in other states, the California case would argue that Trump is disqualified from the ballot because the 14th Amendment prohibits any public official who has been party to an insurrection from ever holding office again.

"We all watched in horror Mr. Trump's insurrection against the United States when he ordered a mob of his supporters to the United States Capitol on January 6, 2021 to intimidate Vice President Pence and the United States Congress," the lawmakers state in the letter which was obtained bv POLITICO.

Bonta's office said he is reviewing the lawmakers' request. A spokesperson added, "There is no denying that Donald Trump has engaged in behavior that is unacceptable and unbecoming of any leader — let alone a President of the United States."

Taking On Trump

Taking on Trump in such a highprofile way could also bode well for the attorney general's political ambitions. He's considering running for governor in 2026, when Gavin Newsom is termed out.

Bonta, as the attorney general, has automatic standing to proactively ask a court for declaratory relief, a process where a judge can quickly rule on an unresolved legal question. The lawmakers asked Bonta for "immediate intervention" on the issue. Trump has pushed back against the campaign to keep him off the ballot, which has included legal challenges in New Hampshire, Minnesota, New Mexico and Colorado, though such attempts are in the early stages. Trump spokesperson Steven Cheung previously said it was a "political attack" that was "stretching the law beyond recognition" and compared it to the various criminal indictments against Trump, which the former president has described as witch hunts.

No Legal Basis

"There is no legal basis for this effort except in the minds of those who are pushing it," Cheung told POLITICO last month.

Most efforts to remove Trump have focused on the theory that secretaries of state can unilaterally disqualify him on constitutional grounds. At least one lawsuit, brought by a voter, has already been filed in California calling on Secretary of State Shirley Weber to take action. Weber, however, hasn't ruled anything out. Her office told Playbook they are "carefully reviewing this issue" after receiving many requests to disqualify Trump. But Democratic secretaries of state have largely been



The suspect, described as a Hispanic male, was arrested by Madera County Sheriff's Deputies who were as-






Change Kids' Gender ... or Else!

A new California law makes it a crime if you don't accept your child's choice of gender identity. "The bill could potentially make you guilty of child abuse if you refuse to call your son 'Jane' and buy him dresses," said Bob Hoge in *RedState*. "Authorities could take away your kid if you don't bend the knee."

California's controversial AB 957, which requires parents to affirm their child's gender identity or lose custody, passed the state Senate. The standard of the well-being of a minor is being changed to "include a parent's affirmation of the child's gender identity as part of the health, safety and welfare of the child." Now that it's passed the Senate, the Assembly will need to agree, which the heavily Democratic legislative body assuredly will. Then it heads to Governor Newsom, who will almost certainly sign it since he endorses gender politics.

A group of dysfunctional people allege that they can change their birth sex and instead of calling them out, our society accepts it and our government uses it as a tool to destroy the nuclear family. California wants to impose sex changes on children who are too young to make an informed decision about their sexuality. Doctors will be forced to treat these children with puberty blockers, hormonal treatments and sex surgeries. "Society has accepted a destructive



lie that you can create your own reality and define your own identity," says author Ben Shapiro. "Children should not be subjected to the whims of politically driven adults when it comes to massive bodily mutilation that impairs function for a lifetime — all before the child has experienced puberty," Shapiro said. "And society should not be obligated to obey the gender theory nonsense of the radical left, which seeks to confuse as many children as possible in the name of an anti-biological program in service to a political agenda."

"Transgender isn't real," explains Kara Dansky, women's advocate and author of *The Abolition of Sex.* "It was simply made up. Words like 'gender identity' don't have any meaning. Every single human being is either a male person or a female person." Despite the obvious truth of Dansky's statement, we have reached a place where to state the obvious gets you attacked as a child abuser. Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton says what most of us are thinking — the push to have kids permanently change their bodies is the *real* form of child abuse.

Transgenderism does not describe a marginalized group of people who need civil rights protection, Dansky said. On the contrary, "The so-called transgender agenda is being fueled by a massive, vicious and well-funded industry in the guise of a civil rights movement. It is all a lie," Dansky said. "The obliteration of the material reality of biological sex should scare everyone."

There is no "right" that says you can demand whatever you want. If I identify as a rhinoceros, it is not reasonable for me to demand that everyone ought to agree with me. In fact, it would be ludicrous if anyone agreed with me. My mental state would rightly be open to question. Why do our elected representatives ignore reality by glorifying the delusions of people who think they can change their birth sex?

We have the right to disagree. Parents especially have the right to question children who adopt ridiculous notions about their sexuality. Up to the age of puberty, our kids have all sorts of weird ideas about who they are. The function of parents is to decide what is best for their children. The big question is, why would our elected representatives want





As I've said before, I was raised as the country was coming out of the Great Depression when things were a whole lot different than they are now. Meals were cooked at home and the family all sat at the kitchen table together to

I guess you would call some of the meals "comfort food," as they made me think of the times with family.

What is comfort food? According to the internet, they are foods that remind us of comforting childhood memories. For most of us, these foods are a long way from gourmet. They bring on feelings of nostalgia, safety and security. Someone took a poll and listed the top 25 most popular comfort foods, and believe it or not, in this poll peanut butter and jelly sandwiches and grilled cheese sandwiches came out on top. I won't list all 25, but here is a partial list: apple pie, fried chicken, meatloaf, chocolate chip cookies, chicken and dumplings, chili, beef stew, tomato for about an hour or until meat and

Have ready a large baking pan with a lid or aluminum foil. Heat the oil in a large frying pan. Cut the steak into serving size pieces, salt and pepper to taste, and dredge in flour. Shake excess flour off and brown good in the frying pan and when meat is browned good, transfer to the baking pan. Scrub enough potatoes for your family and slice in quarter to eighth inch slices and lay on top of the steak. Peel and slice as many onions as you will need (one is usually enough) and put on top of the potatoes. Salt and pepper to taste. Add the can of soup or the bouillon cubes and enough water to just come up to the top of potatoes.

After taking the roast and vegetables out and placing on serving platter, make gravy with the liquid remaining in the pot, spooning

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

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

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
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GO FIGURE! by Linda Thistle



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
